

Message From the President



Today I come to you not only as a fraternity man, but also as an educator—and I want to share with you some views about American higher education which, to me, show what an incredible opportunity the undergraduate Phi Kappa Psi experience provides.

While some in higher education feel that we are doing a credible job of educating young men and women who come to our campuses, two reports which have been issued recently suggest that we can improve upon what is presently being done.

And as I raise these concerns and questions about our system of higher education—I want you to ask yourself, does Phi Kappa Psi provide me with an opportunity to overcome the shortcomings?

In the first report, "To Reclaim A Legacy" by William J. Bennett, Secretary of Education, four general questions of educational import are raised:

- 1. Does the curriculum on your campus insure that a graduate with a bachelor's degree will be conversant on the best that has been thought and written about the human condition?
- Does your curriculum reflect the best judgment of the President, Deans, and faculty about what an educated person ought to know?
- 3. Is your institution genuinely committed to teaching the humanities to undergraduate students? Does your faculty make the humanities come alive by helping you confront great minds and great ideas?
- 4. Are you broadly educated in fields of knowledge other than your primary one?

Certainly these are four important general questions.

In the second report, "Integrity In The College Curriculum," by the Association of American Colleges, a proposal for minimum requirements in terms of nine specific experiences is suggested: (Remember, ask yourself, does Phi Kappa Psi provide me with opportunities in these areas?)

- Inquiry, abstract logical thinking, and critical analyses. How
 do we know? Why do we believe? What is the evidence? All
 subjects should provide students with a continuous process of
 thinking.
- Literacy: writing, reading, speaking, and listening. A bachelors degree should mean that its holders can read, write, and speak at levels of distinction, and have been given the opportunities to learn how. It should mean that most of you can do so with style.
- Understanding numerical data. We have become bombarded with numbers. Numbers are not neutral. They are not inert. They are as alive as we are when they greet us and we greet them; they become what we understand them to be.
- 4. Historical Consciousness. We grow older and know that we were younger. We have a history. If everyone and everything has a history, then the opportunities for historical consciousness in a baccalaureate curriculum are unlimited.
- Science. A person who understands what science is recognizes
 that scientific concepts are created by acts of human intelligence and imagination. He understands, too, that there are
 limits to scientific inquiry... the kinds of questions science
 neither answers nor asks.
- 6. Values. Men and women must make choices, assume responsi-

bility for their decisions, be comfortable with their own behavior, and know why. I might suggest here my belief that, "if we don't live by our principles . . . then we don't have them."

- Art. Without some experience in the performing arts, we are denied the knowledge of disciplined creativity and its meaning as a bulwark of freedom and an instrument of social cohesion.
- International and multi-cultural experiences. Colleges must create curricula in which the insights and understandings, the lives and aspirations of the distant, foreign, different, and neglected are more widely comprehended by their graduates.
- Study in depth. One experience that students should have is concentration in a discipline or a group of disciplines that convey both the possibilities and the limits of such study. Sequential learning, blocks of knowledge, and efforts at synthesis are central to the thinking process.

Dean Rusk, a past Secretary of State, had some thoughts on the personal resources that are essential when great issues arise: intelligence, imagination, leadership, willingness to sacrifice, commitment, emotional stability, and determination. These traits are not reflected in test scores but reside in individuals.

But how do we hone these traits?

There's an old adage that goes something like this:

"Show me-and I will see

Tell me-and I will hear

But, involve me-and I will understand"

If you want to take advantage of the opportunities which are afforded you as undergraduate members of Phi Kappa Psi, get involved, really involved in your university and your Fraternity.

Your generation must understand and find your own answers, so you must find an experiential opportunity, not just another classroom opportunity, to test your decision making identity. You will not take your answers from us, and anyone who sells you short is making a serious mistake.

You face your future with profound optimism . . .

And I share that optimism, not because American higher education is adequately addressing the concerns and questions which I have just enumerated, but rather because other great institutions like Phi Kappa Psi provide the leadership opportunities within which you, future leaders, can become involved, can try, can have the privilege of failure, can try again, and can understand in a profoundly practical way.

As for my optimism, it owes a great deal to what transpires in this undergraduate experience that we know and love as Phi Kappa Psi.

And in conclusion, let me sum up these comments with one short thought:

Education is not an expense——it is an investment. So is Phi Kappa Psi.



Productive and pleasurable: that's how anyone who attended the 1986 GAC would describe it. Over 400 members, spouses and Fraternity guests gathered at the magnificent Camelback

Inn to recapture the Phi Psi spirit of enthusiasm and rededication. In every way, the 63rd biennial meeting of the Fraternity offered five days of business and fellowship to all who attended.

The GAC began on Wednesday, August 13, with an authentic Western Cookout on Mummy Mountain. In the early evening as the Arizona sun went down across the desert, Phi Psis, ladies and guests met and renewed acquaintances in an informal, Old West atmosphere.

The Centennial GAC in Pittsburgh in 1952 qualifies as the record attendance year in recent memory with 471 members and guests enjoying that convention.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS OF THE 1986 GAC..

- Elected Dr. David F. Hull Jr. president, J. Robert Meserve vice president, Robert E. Lazzell secretary, and Paul J. LaPuzza treasurer.
- Re-elected Ralph D. Daniel to a six year term as a trustee of the Endowment Fund.

MANDATE

• That all Chapters of our Fraternity shall at this time and forevermore eliminate the existence of any undergraduate women's auxiliary organization.

Through various committee reports, the following recommendations were made:

- That the 1984 GAC proposal to develop a Greek magazine advertising consortium has been accomplished. The Greek Advertising Group, GMAG, has hired an advertising representative to sell space on our behalf. The editor of THE SHIELD and the director of publications, Carole Wiebke, should continue to pursue advertisers who can provide Phi Kappa Psi with income as well as tasteful ads which reflect the ideals of this Fraternity.
- That the present Alumni Relations Manual is deficient and therefore it is recommended that an updated manual be produced. The manual should then be distributed to Chapter AGs and alumni corporations to increase effective communication procedures, which is the basis for the Chapter's continuing success.
- That the Fraternity formulate a task force to develop a member needs assessment to determine how we can help each other. This task force should then make recommendations to Chapters and alumni associations based on survey results.
- That the 1984 GAC recommendation to create a SHIELD feature called "Hire a a Phi Psi" has become a reality, and it is recommended that the program be continued due to its success.
- That the Executive Council provide more workshops and training for new and existing alumni groups and house corporations.
- That the 1984 GAC recommendation to produce a videotape program to be used in Chapter/Colony education and rush is a reality and has been distributed to the Chapters and Colonies. If this video, entitled "Phi Kappa Psi: A Proud Tradition," is successful, it is recommended that the Fraternity continue to pursue the development of a video education program to further the learning process of this Fraternity.
- That two distinct sets of guidelines and criteria be created and followed in colonization situations. One set of guidelines would deal with groups which approach the Fraternity with the intent to colonize. The second set of criteria should be followed when Phi Kappa Psi approaches a campus with the intent to colonize. We recommend that these guidelines be published and implemented in an effort to expand the Fraternity.
- That the current Colonization Manual be revised and updated; that the Fraternity develop a more comprehensive program to aid resident alumni in their efforts with the Col-

- ony which may be located at their university; that the Fraternity develop a program to identify and enlist members who are in graduate school or are transferring schools to aid in our colonization efforts; that the aforementioned be carried out through the formation of a study group under the director of extension to investigate these possibilities and submit their findings to the Executive Council.
- That individual Chapters adopt a defined, clearcut collection procedure to deal with the problems of delinquent financial obligations of Chapter members. This procedure should incorporate the following items:
 - That each Chapter be aware of and encourage the use of Fraternity publications which aid the implementation of financial programs and in the duties of Chapter financial officers.
 - 2. That each Chapter be aware of the fact that collectibility of accounts receivables drops off drastically with time. Therefore, a legally binding document should be used to insure the collection of such debts.
 - 3. That each Chapter encourage pre-payment of fees at the beginning of each term, possibly incorporating incentives.
 - 4. That Chapter alumni be actively involved in the collection of past due accounts.
 - 5. That promissory notes be required for all accounts past 30 days overdue.
 - 6. That parents of Brothers and pledges be made aware of the financial obligations to the Chapter.
 - 7. The Chapter's collections procedure should be in writing and should be provided to each Brother and pledge. In addition, all financial obligations of membership should be provided to rushees.
- That each Chapter determine their legal responsibilities in such areas as the use of alcohol and other controlled substances, physical safety around the house, and hazing. Educational leadership consultants may help Chapters determine what the responsibilities and liabilities are. The VGP and the governing committee shall be the entities within the Chapter to be involved in the area of risk management.
- That the Executive Council review the impact of the 1987 per capita fee prior to confirming the 1988 per capita fee. The Finance Committee of the 1988 Grand Arch Council should carefully review the results of the per capita fee and investigate alternate methods of funding Fraternity operational costs. The Council should be cognizant of four-year cost of membership and should follow the traditional positioning of Phi Psi in the average cost range for fraternities.
- That each Chapter should review and tailor its rush program in such a way that it is conscious of and sensitive to legacy membership in the Chapter.
- That the director of membership and the director of alumni affairs should work to coordinate special mailers to local alumni associations in order to pool lists of potential legacy Brothers that can be made available to local Chapters for rush purposes.
- That the director of membership, the executive director and

the educational leadership consultants create and make available a booklet on various uses and effective applications of the rush videotape.

- That the director of membership explore and generate new membership videotape applications on such topics as effective bidding techniques, how to structure a successful rush program and how to run an effective Chapter meeting.
- That the director of membership conduct annually a rush survey taking into consideration such factors as demographics, dry/wet rush activities and successful Chapter programs which increase the ratio of bid acceptance. The final results of this survey would be released in potential booklet form to each Chapter in late spring for use during summer and fall rush periods.
- That the director of membership, the executive director and the administrator of the Endowment Fund collaborate to design, publish and distribute to all Chapters and Colonies an attractive contemporary poster which would list and promote Endowment Fund grants, gifts and awards which are available to our membership. This will be suitable for display at rush functions.
- That the director of membership, executive director and the educational leadership consultants develop and promote a more encompassing program which is voluntary and the cost is underwritten by the Chapters and/or their alumni house corporations. This program should be help at the Fraternity Headquarters in Indianapolis under the coordination of the executive director and the director of membership, and it should recruit qualified alumni and guests to present sessions. This conference should be called the Heritage Hall Educational Institute and that its operations in the future be considered in the form of an endowment that could be provided by a generous Brother.
- That the Grand Arch Council should never be operated at a loss.
- That every second or third GAC be held in Indianapolis to offset rising costs.
- That a complete cost analysis of less exotic locations for the

- GAC would result in decreased cost and increased participation by undergraduates.
- That other creative means be used to lower GAC costs, including official airline or official sponsor.
- That the Executive Council should actively pursue all housing loans.
- That Chapter Advisors attend pledge meetings to explain their role as liaison between the Chapter and the House Corporation.
- That the Fraternity form a task force to develop a member inter-survey for Chapters and alumni associations to assess their needs.
- That pledges attend alumni association functions and corporation board functions.
- That a procedure of networking should be implemented involving alumni communicating with alumni.
- That, at the 1987 Woodrow Wilson Leadership Schools and at the Grand Arch Council, more workshops on Chapter operations be conducted. Specifically, workshops should address rush management/loss control and Chapter treasurers.
- That the Fraternity seek IRS approval of a new bylaw which will give the Endowment Fund more flexibility and permit it to receive funds which might be used for grants to Chapter houses for educational purposes or for loans to house corporations.
- That an advisory committee of prestigious Phi Psis be appointed to help in support of certain projects and in developing support for the Endowment Fund.
- That the Endowment Fund survey past awardees of the Endowment Fund to interest them in support of Phi Psi activities.
- That the Scholarship Awards Committee conduct a 10 year review to evaluate the programs.
- That we continue the grant and loan program to help Chapters obtain computer terminals.

LEGACIES

Greek-letter parlance can be strange. Rush, bid, pledge—all seem rather peculiar. But one word in particular, legacy, should have a welcome sound. In ordinary English it means something to be inherited, a gift entrusted from one generation to another. Perhaps an occasion for rejoicing. Perhaps.

Among fraternities "legacy" has come to mean a member's brother, son, grandson, or maybe nephew: in short, someone closely related to a fraternity member and thus deserving of special treatment. Here is proof incarnate of the

organization's vitality and continuity, or at least of a member's ability to reproduce. When such a person presents himself at a chapter, shouldn't he be hailed by his relation's latter-day brothers as a rightful claimant? Well, maybe.

For some chapters in some fraternities any legacy offers a decidedly mixed blessing. "Do we really have to pledge this guy?" puts it mildly. Just how dull, hapless, inept, and misfitted does a legacy have to be before he can be dismissed? What academic or social inadequacies can a chapter bear to overlook? How much of a burden will a legacy

prove to be? With misgivings in mind many members await the arrival of the latest legacies, and even before they've laid eyes on them are pretty certain there must be something inherently defective in the whole species. Hardly a generous view, especially when these doubters may one day have legacies of their own to pass muster.

Hence it's heartening to know that Phi Kappa Psi, for the most part has treated its legacies with civility and hospitality, as befits a Fraternity that presumes to be made up of gentlemen. There is no stated policy on what to do about legacies.

Should there be? Not so long as Phi Psi Chapters make a practice of paying serious attention to the kin of the Fraternity's members and, moreover, of giving them the benefit of the doubt. Or so one supposes. Strictly speaking, no Chapter of the Fraternity is under obligation to pledge a legacy, but every Chapter, as a matter of courtesy and respect, is expected to grant careful consideration to a legacy. This expectation, does not include an invitation to pledge if a legacy, like any other rushee, is clearly incompatible or falls short of the Chapter's standards.

Occasionally, one hears of chapters (not Phi Psi's, by the way) that are willing, yea eager, to pledge unlikely young men in hopes of being rewarded with swimming pools, new wings, or tanning parlors. Sort of a quid pro quo, and nonetheless sleazy for the Latin tag. Taking bribes is scarcely our style, and the Chapter that would take one as much as the alumnus who would offer one is beneath contempt. The related offense is a kind of extortion in which pressure to pledge a legacy (or anyone else for that matter) is applied by influential alumni or fraternity officials with the implied threat that things will not go well for the chapter unless....That, too, is rotten.

To the credit of Phi Kappa Psi we seldom make too little or too much of legacies. There are fraternities that seem to view the failure of a chapter to pledge a legacy, or the failure of a legacy himself to accept a bid, as a violation of their collective manhood. This is a bit much and contrary to a reasonable regard for individual differences and the freedom of choice. No man is born a Phi Psi or Beta or Phi Gam, and no chapter of any fraternity remains the same as it was when his forbears were in college. There is that disturbing phenomenon called change, which tends to make for history.

When it comes time to make such a choice, that should be done on the basis of current conditions as much as in respect to family loyalty. It is doubtless true that when a man's son joins his fraternity, his own sense of brotherhood is quickened and renewed, because his choice has been reconfirmed and, in a way, vindicated.

Contrariwise, there are also many men whose sons join other fraternities, and a few may react with keen disappointment, even bitterness. Which perhaps says more about their own confusion of identity and need to control their sons' lives than it does about the depth of their fraternal loyalty.

In any case, what is often forgotten about legacies is that the term is merely a

category of relationship, which does little to define what is essential. A legacy is not an object. He is a young man with his very own combination of strengths and weaknesses who deserves to be considered on his own merits, regardless of his Greek-letter connections. He should be free to choose his friends and associates, and likewise to be chosen. Whether the experience of fraternity is at all right for him as a distinct person is the first question, and that he will have to decide for himself. After all, he may be his father's son, but he must become his own man. Phi Psi has lost good men in the past because they were treated too much as legacies and not enough as individuals in their own right. It is one form of error to take a legacy for granted, and another to overstate the importance of that relationship. Four generations of Phi Psis do not necessarily a Phi Psi make. At least a good one. This will of course smack of heresy to those who believe there is something uniquely Phi Psi encoded in DNA and transmitted thereby, like royal blood or the ability to hit the curveball. All the same, the assumption that Phi Psi bloodlines and households will inevitably produce ideal Brothers needs to be regarded gingerly.

The Fraternity has yet to discover a better set of standards for membership than what Mr. Jefferson proposed to John Adams as those for a natural aristocracy: talent and virtue. It is no easier than it ever was for young men to possess moral imagination powerful enough to see beyond the facile nice-guyism, fashionable looks, athletic prowess, or routine talk of their contemporaries. Or even harder, beyond the rough complexions, awkward manners, unimpressive presences, sheer callowness, or unconventionality. Character-the essential elements of integrity, moral responsibility, and honor-takes time to discern. and the usual conditions of fraternity rush seldom permit such scrutiny. Obviously, personality shows itself off to better advantage on brief exposure, and possibly that's what most fraternities are obliged to settle for. Even with all the SAT scores, GPAs, class rankings, letters of recommendation, and other indicators of relative merit, those more subjective measures—judgment, common sense, intuition-must tell a number of young men whether several others are the right ones to recruit and befriend.

Selecting new pledges mustn't be resented as a tiresome chore. Obviously, it's the Chapter's way of replenishing itself, its means of survival. If seniors and underclassmen treat rush as little more than a necessary nuisance, such an atti-

tude will eventually—and inevitably—produce a good crop of indifferent and lackluster Brothers. Charles P.T. Moore's dictum on quality control is still the Phi Psi standard: "Good men—or none."

What constitutes a "good man" is up to the Chapter, for it is the Chapter, and only the Chapter, that has the right to pledge and initiate a man into Phi Kappa Psi, according to the Fraternity's constitution. All the same, we need to remind ourselves to search thoroughly and thoughtfully for such men. There is a careless tendency to ignore graduate or professional students, international students, students in some way handicapped or impaired, students whose religious, ethnic, social, or economic backgrounds may be different from those of the Chapter's current members. Just as no man should be excluded merely because of "accident of birth," as the unhappy phrase puts it, so should no man be pledged only because he is a track star or a valedictorian or a Unitarian or, for that matter, a legacy. It is the whole man, and not a single aspect of him, that should be valued and affirmed.

Goethe said something to the effect that when one takes a person only for what he is, that makes him less than he is; when one takes a person for what he can become, that enables him to become all that he should be. Thus it is an act of faith to accept a man for his potentiality. That requires foresight, tolerance, and yes, dumb luck. That is why oneeyed scarecrows like James Thurber, homely dyslexics like Woodrow Wilson, poor Irish Catholics like William Donovan, bashful saxophonists like Paul Winter and Buddy Rogers, and thousands of other awkward nonconformists were—and are today—loyal Brothers of Phi Kappa Psi. In retrospect almost all were risks worth taking, then as now.

All in all, then, the Chapters of Phi Kappa Psi evidently do as well as comparable fraternities in selecting their members. Much better, we like to believe. After all, it is curious, this matter of choosing young men all over the country to carry on the traditions, principles, and ideals of a Fraternity more than a century and a third old. That older men should still care intensely about upholding standards, that they should concern themselves with the quality of the young men who come after them that in itself is a tribute to the Fraternity's lasting significance. It is a loyalty that surpasses nostalgia, sentimentality, or yearning for lost innocence. It affirms a sustaining, steadily fulfilling good. That is the true legacy of Phi Kappa Psi.

Maurice J. Warnock Named Distinguished Alumnus

Maurice J. Warnock, Oregon '23, former chairman of the board of Armstrong World Industries, Inc., was presented Phi Kappa Psi's Distinguished Alumnus Award at the 1986 Grand Arch Council Banquet in recognition of a lifetime of service to the Fraternity, higher education and the business world.

He was initiated into Oregon Alpha in 1923, the year the Chapter was chartered. After graduating with a BS degree in business, Brother Warnock began his career with Armstrong Cork Company, now called Armstrong World Industries.

In three years he advanced to district manager, and later would be responsible for sales, promotions, advertising, public relations, employee relations, finance and the Armstrong's munitions operations.

He was elected company treasurer in 1943, vice president in 1950 and a member of the board of directors in 1959. In 1962, he became the president and chief executive officer of the firm.

At every level of management, he was lauded for his ability to cut through inhibiting organizational fences to release unrealized and under-utilized talent. His motto insists that today's standards are not good enough for tomorrow.

And while working his way up the Armstrong corporate ladder, Brother Warnock's civic service and accomplishments mirrored his professional career. His service to education spans the educational spectrum and four decades, from the country day school level to colleges and universities.

Denison University, Franklin and Marshall College and the University of Oregon are some educational institutions that have benefited from his fund raising or service as a trustee. He currently serves on the board of directors of the Foundation for Independent Colleges, and was chairman of the board from 1970-76.

Brother Warnock was the first man to be designated a distinguished alumnus by the University of Oregon. He received

the honor in 1968, after an alumna was recognized in 1967.

His contributions to education alone merit his receiving Phi Psi's Distinguished Alumnus Award, but his work in other areas is equally impressive.

Brother Warnock's concerns for business and industry were demonstrated in his service as both regional vice chairman and later director of the Business-Industry Political Action Committee. He also was a founder of Pennsylvanians for Effective Government and the Business Roundtable.

He has been a member of a national task force for the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, as well as a trustee for the U.S. Council of the International Chamber of Commerce. He has held a number of positions with the National Association of Manufacturers, and now is an honorary vice chairman for life.

In Phi Kappa Psi, Brother Warnock served as a trustee of the Endowment Fund from 1970-76. He has maintained his interest and involvement in Phi Psi throughout his life.

With Brother Warnock's permission, we are pleased to present the comments he made at the Grand Arch Council upon receiving the Fraternity's Distinguished Alumnus Award.

Thank you, Brother Humphries. Phi Psi has so many distinguished alumni, including many here tonight, that I never dreamed I would be considered for this honor. Last January, when I was told I had been selected to receive it, I was quite surprised, but very pleased. Phi Psi has meant so much to me and has influenced my life in so many ways for the past 63 years that I am also extremely grateful. With former recipients Mil Batten, Dick Baker and "Buddy" Rogers, I'm obviously in very good company! And, of course, receiving this award from an Oregon Alpha Brother, especially one who has done and continues to do so much for the Fraternity, really puts the icing on the cake.

This is only my third GAC. The first was in Kansas City in June, 1926, where

I represented Oregon Alpha. The second was in Philadelphia, in 1970, when I became a trustee of the Endowment Fund. So I am delighted to be here and have the opportunity to renew old friendships and the pleasure of meeting some of my undergraduate Brothers for the first time. Having talked with several of you, it's my impression that the future of Phi Psi is in very capable hands.

In this spring's issue of THE SHIELD, Brother Humphries asked all of us to share, as he did, some of our Phi Psi experiences and I decided tonight would be an appropriate time for me to respond to his request.

I consider myself very fortunate to have pledged Phi Kappa Psi. Oregon Alpha was a Chapter with strong, dedicated leaders who taught us the importance of believing in each other and working together as a team. They insisted on high standards and worked hard to maintain high morale.

I didn't realize it then, but as I look back on my undergraduate experience, I am convinced that the years I spent living in the Chapter house, sharing common goals with about 50 intelligent men of widely diverse backgrounds and interests did as much to prepare me for life in the outside world as did my academic education, important as that was.

Our goals were campus leadership in scholarship and extra-curricular activities, along with good fellowship and active, happy social lives. In support of our goals, we also stressed the importance of identifying outstanding men, developing the rushing skills to pledge them, followed by constructive and effective training.

It was a well organized and successful effort. Each year we ranked high in scholarship, had athletics in every varsity sport, top officers in the Reserve Officers Training Corps, publication editors and business managers, musicians, debaters, campus politicians, and members in almost all the honorary fraternities Achieving our goals gave each of us pride, loyalty, and the self-discipline to live up to the objectives and ideals of Phi Psi.

Living with this group taught me how to get along with people and the importance of treating others as I would like others to treat me, and I believe most of the Brothers had the same experience. As a freshman, the guidance, wise counsel and constant encouragement of my elders, especially my Big Brother, Gene Whitten, also taught me that by working harder I could achieve much more than I realized I was capable of accomplishing.

I began many lasting friendships in Oregon Alpha. Two of the Brothers, Robert Gardner and Kenneth Stephenson, were among my very closest friends. During our freshman year, we pooled our resources and bought a canoe. Sharing the canoe worked out so well that next we bought a Model "T" Ford sedan (which was great for triple dating). Bob, Ken and I were so close we seemed to do everything together . . . well, almost everything! In fact, we were such intimate friends and did so many things together that the other Brothers called us "The Triumvirate."

As a senior, I began thinking about employment after I graduated. The goals and principles that made Phi Psi such a great Fraternity (and Oregon Alpha such a strong Chapter) were the same goals and principles I was looking for in the outside world. I hoped to become associated with an organization that was a leader in its field, known for its integrity, the quality of its people, and the soundness of its operating principles.

In the last term of my senior year, I carried a lighter academic schedule so I could spend more time looking for work. I received several offers—all in my home state of Oregon. One day, Don Davis, an Oregon Alpha alumnus who had graduated five years before, visited the Chapter house. He had spent those years with the Armstrong Cork Company and had just received an important promotion. I had never heard of that company but checked on it, and found it was a leader in its field and enjoyed an excellent reputation for integrity and for the quality of its people and products.

Don told me his company employed only young college graduates for its sales force, and brought them to the home office in Lancaster, Pennsylvania, for five months of intensive training, followed by several more months of training in the field. Those who made the grade were then assigned to specific sales territories somewhere in the United States.

I told Don that Armstrong sounded good to me, and he arranged for me to meet the general sales manager from the home office who would be visiting customers in Portland about a month later. I was hired and started my training in Lancaster July 1, 1926.

I might never have heard about Armstrong if it hadn't been for Don, and neither would the other members of "The Triumvirate." About a year and a half after I joined the company, Ken did too; and a year after that, Bob came aboard. They both had very successful careers and our close personal relationship continued until they were called to the Chapter Eternal just a few years ago.

Sometimes a Phi Psi Brother can do you a great favor without realizing he's doing it. In March 1927 I was assigned to a sales territory in the Seattle District.

I knew several undergraduate Brothers at the University of Washington, so I rented a room in a private home near the campus so it would be convenient for me to visit the Washington Alpha Chapter on frequent occasions. Among the many friends I made there was Eddy Munroe, an alumnus from Illinois Beta.

One evening Eddy introduced me to Isabel Cherry, a Radcliffe alumna from Los Angeles who was visiting friends in Seattle. We hit it off so well together that we agreed we should see each other again. A year and a half later we were married and had 44 good years together before she passed away. Obviously, I'm very grateful to Brother Eddy!

In 1929 I became Seattle district manager, and in 1930 I was promoted to assistant sales manager in the home office in Lancaster, Pennsylvania. The Great Depression of the thirties was just getting underway and for several years kept getting worse. Business was so bad that every few months our wholesaler in some major city was forced to liquidate his business. When that happened, my assignment was to go to the city, rent a warehouse and office, then hire and train the personnel to operate our own wholesale operation.

It would usually take about three weeks to complete each job. I discovered that my Phi Psi training in identifying and rushing outstanding pledges was very helpful when selecting and motivating capable people. Although I had never been to most of these cities before, I usually found that I either knew or met Phi Psis whose assistance and fellowship did much to make my assignment easier and keep me from feeling like a stranger, far from home and friends.

For example, in Chicago I met Brother Frank Whiting and his older brother, Lawrence, both of whom had the keys to the city. In Los Angeles the late Brother Shirley Meserve, former president of the Fraternity, was very kind to me and introduced me to several other Brothers who were living in the area. It has been a real pleasure for me to meet Frank's son, Frank Jr., and Shirley's son, Bob, at this GAC.

In 1941 and 1942 I was Armstrong's director of advertising and promotion. During those two years Brother Ruddick Lawrence, Washington Alpha '31, called on me representing Fortune Magazine. We soon found we had much in common thanks to my former relationship with Washington Alpha. Our friendship continued as our paths crossed from time to time through the years; and in 1970 I served with Rud and Brother Bob Elliott as a trustee of the Endowment Fund. I retired as a trustee in 1976, but, as you know, Rud has remained very ac-

tive as its chairman.

By now it's probably rather apparent to all of you that Phi Psi has played a very important part in my life since I was pledged in 1922. Had I not been a Phi Psi, I would not have:

- —been associated for fifty years with what is now Armstrong World Industries...
- —met my first wife and raised two fine sons...
- -met my second wife, Trudy
- —known many of my closest friends and shared countless memorable experiences...
- —and I doubt if I would have appreciated the importance that pride, loyalty, and discipline play in building a strong, successful organization—a lesson that has served me well.

Over the years, I've drawn again and again on my experiences as a Phi Psi. The one message those years have brought home to me that I would like to pass on to my undergraduate Brothers here tonight is this: the reason Phi Psi has flourished for so long and remains the great Fraternity it is today is that for 134 years, each generation of Brothers has not only passed on to their Brothers of the next generation their devotion to Phi Psi's ideals, and objectives, but has also made a life-long commitment to continue their own active interest and support.

Soon it will be your turn. When you graduate, I urge you to continue practicing the Phi Psi creed in your everyday life, wherever you may be. Clearly, your active interest and support is essential to the perpetuation and achievement of the goals for which Phi Psi stands. If you do


so, I believe you will find the fellowship and bonds you share with Brothers throughout the country will be as relevant and rewarding for you as they have been for me.

Greetings from the University of Arkansas! My travels this Fall have taken me through many of the central and southwest states of this great country. Now, I am on my way back to Indianapolis and the Headquarters of our great Fraternity, Phi Kappa Psi.

I started as a consultant for the Fraternity Staff in June of this year. When I accepted this position, I did not really know what to expect while traveling as a 'consultant.' I am now very pleased to say that it has not only been a very rewarding experience, but also one that has been a great lesson in working with people. I would like to take the time to thank all of the Brothers that have made my visits so enjoyable and successful.

In my travels there have been several areas that have stuck out in my mind as needing more attention at the undergraduate level. One area which I feel needs to be addressed is Chapter organization and management. Many of our groups lack the foresight and planning that is necessary to be an accomplished Chapter on their respective campus.

One recommendation that can be instituted at the Chapter level is to organize a Brotherhood retreat early in the semester. Such a retreat can be very beneficial to a group, especially when considering the scope of topics that can be handled by the Chapter. Several benefits include (1) increased member participation in Chapter planning, (2) avenue for open discussion on Chapter strengths and weaknesses, (3) increased fellowship among the members, and (4) a way to address most topics that affect the Chapter and its operations. Such an event needs to be scheduled far enough in advance so that the entire Chapter is in attendance. Other benefits include interaction with the current group of pledges. They should be encouraged to contribute in the discussions on an equal basis; this opportunity is not normally present since they are not voting Chapter members.

Guides are available for structuring a good retreat through each Student Activities Center or office. Contact your Director of Greek Affairs for more information and input. They are usually very willing to help organize and plan such an event. My hope is that more of our Chapters will begin to participate in similar programs that are not only a good time, but very beneficial to a Chapter's organization and management.

I would like to wish all of our Chapters and Colonies a very successful semester and an even better new year.

Editor's Note: The Endowment Fund meeting convened in the Arizona Ballroom of the Camelback Inn Resort on August 15, as part of the important work of the 1986 Grand Arch Council. The biennial meeting and election of trustees was called to order by Ruddick C. Lawrence, Washington '31, Endowment Fund Chairman. Brother Lawrence's report provides insight into Phi Psi's educational foundation established in 1914, and explains the Fund's purpose and programs through the current academic year. Rud Lawrence has served as an Endowment Fund trustee, a volunteer position of considerable dedication and impact within the Fraternity, since 1960. Endowment Fund Chairman Lawrence opened the session at 9:15 a.m. that Friday morning and the meeting transcript follows . . .

BROTHER LAWRENCE: Gentlemen, good morning. As chairman, it is my pleasure to call to order the 36th biennial meeting of the Endowment Fund.

As Phi Psis, you are all voting participants in this meeting.

First, the cast of characters. The Endowment Fund has three Trustees:

Ralph "Dud" Daniel is known and beloved by all Phi Psis. He is a founding

member of Arizona Alpha, class of '47. For 31 years, he was Executive Director of the Fraternity.

Gene Conley, Nebraska Alpha '47, is President of Guarantee Mutual Life Company in Omaha. He was an Archon from 1949 to '51 and has a Phi Psi son from Penn Iota.

I am Rud Lawrence, Washington Alpha '31, President of Lawrence Associates in New York. My father was a Phi Psi at Wisconsin Gamma in Beloit.

The Endowment Fund is greatly indebted to three distinguished educators who serve on the Scholarship Awards Committee. They help us select the three Outstanding Summerfield Scholars, the largest such awards in American fraternities, as well as the many other special awards. I would like to ask those who are here to join us on the platform.

Dr. Ted Urban, Northwestern '46, who is Dean at the Creighton Dental School in Omaha. Ted has a small heart problem, is in the hospital, and can't be with us. We wish him a speedy recovery.

Dr. David Hull, Louisiana State '66. He is vice chancellor of student affairs and professor of education at Louisiana State.

Dr. Jack Oswald, *DePauw '35*. Two years ago Jack retired as President of another small educational institution, Penn State University.

In the room, we have a former chair-

man of The Endowment Fund and former President of the Fraternity, Bob Elliott, Ohio Alpha '35.

Another former Trustee is Moose Warnock, Oregon Alpha '23, retired chairman of Armstrong World Industries. Moose is to address the Banquet and to receive our Distinguished Alumnus Award.

In the 72 year history of the Fund there have been only 19 trustees and here at this GAC we have five of them.

No GAC would be complete without Hyatt "Pat" Eby, Penn Kappa '12. For years, he has handled publicity for the Summerfield Awards in hometown newspapers. Pat has been a Phi Psi for 74 years, longer than the Endowment Fund has been in operation.

Like most such volunteer groups, we depend heavily on the help of the staff. We are grateful for the marvelous support from Gary Angstadt and Jane Chasteen. In the audience, I also see Kent Owen, Mystagogue of the Fraternity and former part-time director of the Endowment Fund.

These are only part of the team working on the Endowment Fund. We also seek the advice and support of the Executive Council and of Phi Psis and educators everywhere. Specifically, we welcome your ideas and suggestions here or later.

The three trustees are charged not

only with seeing that the funds are invested soundly, but also with determining how the funds can be invested best in people and in projects to further Phi Psi's goals.

All of these jobs take a lot of time and thought. But all of us feel well compensated with the knowledge that thousands of Phi Psis are benefiting directly and indirectly from the Endowment Fund.

With all of this talent, is it any wonder that our Endowment Fund is the second largest and one of the most active and successful in the entire fraternity system. It is also the oldest such fraternity fund. The Endowment Fund is the only Phi Psi fund able to receive tax deductible contributions and two years ago we became a public foundation.

Thanks to the generosity of generations of Phi Psis and—we like to think—to good management, we were able to announce at the last GAC that the Endowment Fund had topped \$1 million.

As of May 31, 1986, we are happy to report that the Endowment Fund assets reached a new record—\$1,178,847. That does not include that part of the capital funds of the Summerfield Endowment from which we receive the income. That might amount to another \$500,000.

Naturally, we are pleased with this result. But the real question is what do we do with this money? How does it benefit Phi Psis and education?

The goal of the Endowment Fund is to recognize, encourage and reward scholarship and leadership. We want Phi Psis on campus and as alumni to be equipped intellectually, morally and spiritually to lead productive and satisfying lives and to be leaders of men and women.

We also recognize that to survive on university campuses today, fraternities must promote, or at least *not* interfere with, the universities' educational objectives. Phi Psi will survive and thrive just as long as it contributes to scholarship and education.

When the Endowment Fund was founded in 1914, the government was not in the loan and grant business and few banks would loan money to students. So Phi Psi pioneered the concept of making fraternity loans to students.

Through our loan programs over the years, the Endowment Fund has invested in nearly 1,000 Phi Psis. Today we have only 27 such loans outstanding, but that is up from 17 at the last GAC. Eight of these loans are to Brothers who are lost to us. Naturally, we are trying to locate them.

As the Fund has grown, the Fraternity's needs have grown and we have changed our focus from providing loans to giving grants and supporting other educational and leadership programs.

FINANCIAL RECORD

Here is the financial record:

On May 31, 1980, just six years ago, the Endowment Fund had assets totalling \$642,000. Today, the fund stands nearly double that figure at close to \$1.2 million. Since the last GAC, we are pleased to report a gain of more than \$150,000—about 15%—plus supporting Fraternity and educational projects with more than \$350,000. Our invested assets are broken down as follows:

Over the past 5 years, our investment portfolio has been handled by Merchants' Investment Counseling which is affiliated with the Merchants' National Bank of Indianapolis. The Bank is largely owned by Phi Psis. They have done a good job. For example, over the past two years, the total fund of equities and fixed income securities has shown a return of 63.5%. That compares with 43.5% for the Solomon Median Treasury Index and 77.9% for Standard and Poor's 500 stocks.

To get an independent evaluation, Gene Conley had the professional staff of his insurance company review our portfolio. They reported that the record is excellent and that we have good diversification and good holdings.

The Fund's revenues for the year '84-'85 amounted to \$233,150, and for '85-'86, it was \$286,412 for a total of \$519,652. That includes the amounts we receive from The Summerfield Endowment which is about \$30,000 per year capital gains on investments and increase in market value of securities.

Because of some of the Fraternity's urgent needs and because of a good

stock market, the trustees felt that over the two years we could afford to contribute about \$250,000 to the Fraternity's educational projects and expenses. Our total expenditures for the biennium were \$366,652.00, giving us an excess of revenues over expenditures of \$152,910. About 85% of these expenditures go to educational projects for undergraduates. Some are projects which the Fraternity could not undertake without additional support.

We are indeed grateful for this support, and we promise to make good use of it.

NEW ADMINISTRATOR

Looking toward the 21st century, the Endowment Fund is embarking on some dramatic changes. We believe these innovations will make the Fund an even greater force for education and for Phi Psi. At a recent meeting, the Trustees have taken the following actions:

- 1. To seek IRS approval of a new bylaw which will give the Endowment Fund more flexibility and permit it to receive funds which might be used for grants to chapter houses for educational purposes or for loans to House corporations. If approved, we would embark on such program experimentally. We continue to encourage, of course, unrestricted donations. John Donnell Jr., Ohio Epsilon '59, a former Phi Psi President wrote a helpful report on such possibilities.
- 2. To hire an Endowment Fund Administrator. Besides administrating the present Fund programs, he will provide support for Chapter house fund raising efforts and for any capital campaign which the Fraternity may undertake on behalf of the Endowment Fund. The Fraternity has actually hired the Administrator and we welcome him today: Robert F. Marchesani, Jr. Bob received a BA in Journalism from Indiana University of Pennsylvania in 1983. He served three years with the National Interfraternity Conference in Indianapolis. He was Assistant Executive Director in charge of public relations, government relations, university and media relations. Please come up here. Bob is going to be a busy man. We want everybody to know you.
- 3. The trustees have also agreed to underwrite expenses up to a limit of \$30,000 for a capital drive on behalf of the Endowment Fund.
- 4. We are also going to move ahead on appointing an Advisory Committee of prestigious Phi Psis which can be of help to us on certain projects and in developing support for the Endowment Fund.
- 5. Our new Administrator will also permit us to move ahead on a survey of our past awardees—such as The Summerfield Scholars and The Founders Fellows. We want to know what they are doing, what are their goals, and whether we can interest them in support of any Phi Psi activities.
- The Scholarship Awards Committee has promised us a 10-year review which should give us an evaluation of those programs.
- 7. We will continue the grant and loan

program to help Chapters obtain computer terminals. So far four Chapters have taken advantage of the offer.

Phi Psi has the most extensive Scholarship and reward program offered by any fraternity. Let me list some of them:

- The Summerfield Awards for scholarship and leadership. We announced 74 winners in the summer SHIELD and in hometown newspapers and gave them a check for \$100. In addition, three Outstanding Summerfield Scholars received prizes of \$3,000, \$2,000 and \$1,000, plus three honorable mentions of \$500 each.
- The Founders Fellows for professional or graduate study. They are given based on outstanding academic achievement along with leadership and service. The \$2,000 awards sound like a roll call of great Phi Psis:
- The Shockley Prize
- The Charles Page Thomas Moore Prize
- The Sion Smith Prize
- The William Henry Letterman Prize
- The C. F. "Dab" Williams Prize
- The Louis D. Corson Prize
- The Tutor-in-Residence Program is especially for Chapters in need of academic support. Experienced Phi Psis receive up to \$2,000 for graduate school and the house corporation provides room and board. Last year we had nine tutors. If any of you are interested in graduate work, be sure to look into this program. So far we have two hold-overs and three new applicants.

Special awards for Chapters or Colonies include:

- The Griffing Tate Fraternity Education Award of \$1,000 for the Chapter that carries out the most effective program.
- The Community Service Award which provides \$1,000 to the Chapter or Colony for the program of greatest benefit to the Community.
- The Woodrow Wilson Achievement Awards for the Chapters or Colonies which attain first place in academic ranking among fraternities on campus.

OTHER ACTIVITIES

Other activities of the Fund include:

- sponsoring two participants at weeklong Interfraternity Institutes.
- contributing to the Center for the Study of the College Fraternity.
- serving as a charter member of the Foundation Division of the National Interfraternity Conference,
- and paying expenses for speakers to

special Fraternity events, such as District Councils, Leadership Schools, Founders Day, etc.

All of this is made possible by Phi Psi alumni who over the past 72 years have remembered what Phi Psi meant to them and who have wanted to help other Phi Psis achieve their goals. Some of these alumni didn't have much money. Some of them had a great deal. But all of them shared in that generous impulse of helping others through Phi Psi.

Our only formal business is the election of a trustee. Dud Daniel is completing his six-year term. Before accepting nominations for trustee, we would like to have any questions or suggestions about the Endowment Fund Report. With all of these experts up here, this is a great opportunity to find out about any of these activities and to present your ideas.

Who has the first question? I now declare the meeting open to receive nominations for trustee—a six-year term.

MEET THE BOARD...

Dr. David F. Hull, Jr., Louisiana State '66, comes to the Fraternity's presidency with a wealth of experience. He was a founder and charter member of his Chapter, and held every Chapter office including two terms as GP. He was also the Interfraternity Council president at LSU, Deputy Archon of District IV, and he served as assistant dean of men and fraternity advisor while still an undergraduate. To our knowledge, he was the only "student dean" in the history of American higher education. Also on the local level, he has been an officer and director of two housing corporations, has served as both Chapter and faculty advisor for two Chapters, and has chaired two supervisory committees. Dave's involvement on the national Phi Psi scene started while he was an undergraduate, and subsequently he has served on the Executive Council of the Fraternity a total of 12 years: six years on the Executive Board, four years as secretary, and the past two years as vice president. He was initiated into the Order of the S.C. in 1980, and has been grand chairman of two GACs. He also serves on the Scholarship Awards Committee of the Endowment Fund, and was an originator of the prestigious scholarship awards programs. These are just some of the highlights of Brother Hull's involvement in Phi Kappa Psi. Listed in four Who's Who publications, the details of his activities in our Fraternity, the interfraternity world, and in civic and professional arenas are far too extensive to mention here. He is married to the former Laura Weil, Pi Beta Phi, Vanderbilt '65, and they have four children. The eldest, David, was initiated as a Phi Psi at Louisiana State in 1985.

The new vice president of the Fraternity is Robert J. Meserve, Stanford '34. Coming from a family with many Phi Psi connections, his father and grandfather were both Phi Psis. His father, Shirley, served as president of the Fraternity from 1924-1926. Brother Meserve has served the Fraternity in many areas including four terms as director of extension where he was instrumental in bringing in several new Chapters. He also held the office of attorney general of the Fraternity. A former president of the Southern California Alumni Association, he was also involved in the installation of the California Eta and the California Zeta Chapters. He helped formulate the area director concept in the Fraternity's organizational structure. He has attended 13 Grand Arch Councils and is a member of the Ancient Order of the S.C. He and his wife Dottie live in Newport Beach, California. Also living nearby are son Ed, USC '62, and brother Ed, Oregon '32.





The Renovation of

The \$1 million-plus renovation of the original 1923 "Rockpile" and the 1957 addition includes a library with study carrells and computer rooms, expanded dining room and kitchen space, and an enclosed side porch.

Thanks to extraordinary alumni support, the men of Indiana Alpha moved into a totally renovated Chapter house upon return from summer recess at De-Pauw University in Greencastle, Ind. The Chapter house, known as "The Rockpile," was originally constructed in 1922 and a major addition was built in 1957. Because of the age of the building, the overall general deterioration of the wood cross-members, the marginal safety of the electrical system and the heating system's being at the end of its useful life, a major renovation was proposed in 1984.

In order to raise the necessary funds for the enormous project, a general partnership named Phi Kappa Psi Alpha Associates was formed. The general

partnership is composed of six Brothers of Indiana Alpha: James W. Emison, Rabb Emison, David L. Joyce, James E. Brumbaugh, Robert W. Gibson and Dr. James C. Dillon. Using this structure, a limited partnership has been formed named Phi Kappa Psi Home Restoration Associates Ltd. This limited partnership is selling \$5,000 shares, and other financing may be forthcoming from the Indiana Alpha Home Association. The total cost of the project is anticipated to be approximately \$1.2 million.


Renovation of the entire house began in December 1985, as the Brothers of Indiana Alpha moved out of The Rockpile. A vacated sorority house proved an ideal location for the Chapter to be housed throughout the second semester. Although the Brothers were apprehensive about a change in surroundings, the temporary housing kept the undergraduates in close communication with each other.

As the restoration progressed throughout the semester, the contractor gave tours for the Brothers on Friday afternoons, allowing everyone to see how the renovation had progressed. One immediately noticeable difference is the back stair tower connecting all floors between the basement and the new section library (formerly an attic). The library is airconditioned, and has such features as conference rooms, individual built-in study carrells and natural lighting from new windows.

The kitchen has been extended to include a separate room for a dishwasher and commissary. The connecting dining room has been extended toward the front entrance, and opens into a now closed-in lower porch. The lower porch will serve as an informal living room, as

well as a room for overflow dining room seating.

The formal living room is connected to the lower porch by two doors surrounding a fireplace, and will be reserved for formal affairs. The main stairway to the old section was left intact, but the back stairs were rebuilt to accommodate a fire code. Stairs to the enlarged basement descend near the front door entrance to the house.

Although many rooms have been somewhat standardized with built-in bunks, study desks and dressers, there's still much room for personal additions to the rooms. The restored structure houses 69 Brothers, an ideal number to meet the needs of the Indiana Alpha Phi Psis.

The upper porch between the old and new sections has been insulated and tiled to protect the new living room below.


The Chapter Room of Indiana Alpha has undergone minor plastering repairs, and plans call for new blinds in the remaining windows.

When contractor bids and architect fees were first being estimated, the idea of building a completely new house was suggested. Without doubt, the majority of undergraduate and alumni Brothers were in favor of preserving the charm of The Rockpile, despite the initial problems presented by working with a structure built 65 years ago.

The undergraduate members of Indiana Alpha are grateful to the alumni for the many man-hours and monetary contributions made to the renovation project, as it would not have been possible without this strong alumni support. In celebration of the new Rockpile, the annual fall Alumni Symposium featured the rededication of the Chapter house.



The goal, in Winter's words, was to create music "of the Canyon rather than about it." Carrying cello, frame drums, a small pedal pump organ, hand-made woodwinds, and Winter's soprano sax, members of the Consort worked on creating the musical framework for their current album, "Canyon." As the group creates the music, the film's images reflect the awesome beauty of the Canyon that inspires it. Paul Winter has been identified with the natural world for over 10 years. He has been called a musical Jacques Cousteau. Recently he was awarded a United Nations citation on World Environment Day for his work to improve the health of the planet. Winter performed his "Concert for the Earth" for the General Assembly.

Six months after its release, the "Canyon" album is still in the top ten of the jazz charts and has become his most successful release in 10 years. Over 6,500 copies of the recently released home video of Canyon Consort have been purchased through mail order catalogs and other outlets.

Michael H. McCoy, Indiana '58, has formed Capitol Communicators, a public relations firm, in Madison, Wis. The Eagle, a 23-ton racing yacht, was christened by Mrs. Warmington on April 6, 1986, culminating a three-year project to advance the Eagle from drawing board to reality. With the guidance of Peter V. Ueberroth, honorary chairman of the Board of Trustees, and under the direction of Gary F. 



appeared . . . so we'll begin immediately. The article which prompted the most comments from the '86 Summer SHIELD (all of them most favorable, I might add), was "The Great Joy of Serving Others." Our Phi Psi journal is often treated to the writing talents of Fraternity Mystagogue Kent Christopher Owen, Indiana Beta '58, but this in depth review of our Founders personalities was very popular. The article received an award from the National Interfraternity Foundation December 5th, during the annual meeting of the National Interfraternity Conference; there are 59 members of the NIC, and only 3 journal articles were so honored . . . our congratulations to Brother Owen! Here following is the Mystagogue's letter on the article:

Several pretty compliments and some helpful corrections came my way about the Letterman and Moore essay. Bro. Robert Bland, West Virginia Alpha '24, and his sister, Miss Urilla Bland, the grandchildren of Charles Page Thomas Moore, were kind enough to read the piece before it was published and vouch for its accuracy. Miss Bland did point out that her grandfather's hair was brown. and her grandmother's maiden name was spelled Kline. She said she recalled her grandfather vividly, especially his joviality, sense of humor, and scholarly interests. On one occasion when she was visiting him in his study at Riverview, he spoke to her in French, much to her delight, and then encouraged her to learn the language for her own pleasure. Miss Bland took him at his word, and after graduating from Goucher, became a teacher of French, her life's work. If one may judge from her wit, acuity, and high spirits (she sang a couple of verses of "Let's Sing a Song of Colleges," putting in the best lines for Goucher women), Miss Bland must have been an inspiring and delightful teacher. Brother Bland was just as lively and good-humored, eager to express his loyalty and enthusiasm for the Fraternity his grandfather founded. What a treat!

The Mystagogue Emeritus, Walter Lee Sheppard, Jr., reminded me that I had carelessly perpetuated the myth of Jefferson College's typhoid fever epidemic. As I well knew, Bro. Sheppard, an historian in his own right, proved some years ago in these pages that according to a student diary of 1851-52, it was influenza, not typhoid, that beset Jefferson and Canonsburg. Furthermore, he reasoned that typhoid is a warm-weather disease, and hence unlikely in mid-February. Hereafter, let it be remembered that influenza was what felled the students whom Letterman and Moore attended. Bro John C. McMichael, Penn Lambda '35, of Sarasota, Florida, pointed out that Chartiers Creek flows upstream, not downstream, from "little" Washington past Canonsburg "to become one of the first tributaries of the Ohio River just west of Pittsburgh." Bro. McMichael is a native of Canonsburg with clear memories of the McMillan log cabin on the site of old Jefferson. So, keep in mind, it's upstream, not down

One last point: The Texas county where William Henry Letterman is buried is Erath, not Earth, even if the typographic gremlins think otherwise.

This issue of THE SHIELD contains within excellent coverage of the 1986 Grand Arch Council, held at the magnificent Camelback Inn, in Scottsdale, Arizona. As part of the GAC festivities, it was appropriate that we honors Brothers elected as Archon, a unique position in the interfraternity world. As your Phi Psi memory banks will recall, Archons are members of the Fraternity's highest board, the Executive Council, and must be students when elected. This unusual system of government was created 100 years ago, at the 1886 GAC, held that year in Indianapolis. Today, we have six Archons, who with the four officers of the Fraternity comprise the 10 man Executive Council. All past Archons (who had not yet joined the Chapter Eternal!) were invited to attend the GAC Banquet, where a special song was presented and a toast made in their honor. A number of past Archons were on hand, and one who was not, Fred B. Zoll Jr., Penn Iota '36, of McLean, Virginia, wrote the following:

Dear Brother Angstadt,

I regret to say that I will be unable to attend the GAC and the affair honoring past Archons.

Message From the President



An Open Letter To My Undergraduate Brothers

Dear Brothers:

As I have traveled around the country in the last few years in my roles as a university administrator and national Fraternity officer, I have observed a number of dilemmas which are facing the undergraduate fraternity world and related groups such as university presidents, student affairs officers, fraternity deans, national fraternity officers, alumni advisors, and housing corporation officers/ directors. These university and fraternity representatives with whom I have been interacting are spending much of their time and energy discussing—even arguing—about who is responsible for and who will respond to the major problems facing the American college fraternity system (i.e., the rise in hazing practices, increased incidence of alcohol and drug abuse, and declining grade point averages).

It is my suspicion that if universities and fraternities are experiencing these problems in general, you may be facing them in your Chapter. It is my conviction that the quickest, most profound, and certain way to resolve these problems is to turn to you, my undergraduate Brothers, and invite you not only to help yourselves, but also, in the process, the larger university environment. As you all know, Phi Psi is controlled and governed by the college undergraduate Brothers. The national Fraternity is helpless to impose its will or direction. As I compose this letter just a few days away from the 135th celebration of the founding of Phi Kappa Psi, I am reminded of the ideals and standards espoused by our founders. I am reminded of the words of our sacred Ritual, of The Phi Kappa Psi Creed, and those of our founders Letterman and Moore. But they are more than just words-they are ideals-and it is my belief that if we would devote more time and energy striving for those ideals, we would all be better Brothers, better students, and better men.

Generally, I believe that it should not fall to national fraternity leaders or university officials within certain customs and laws to prescribe to you, even if we could, what the specific undergraduate fraternity experience should be. By situation and therefore necessity, that experience will differ from Chapter to Chapter, campus to campus, and Brother to Brother. It is my concern, however, that the boundaries of those customs and rules have been so violated in some cases (sometimes even riding the excuse of tradition), that unfortunately I can envision a time in the not too distant future when our sheltering institutions will be forced to address these excesses with ever-increasing demands and constraints on our fraternity systems. Our Fraternity, however, cannot demand such control without a revision in our governing documents.

Herman B Wells, past president and chancellor of Indiana University, national fraternity leader, and one of the giants in the history of American higher education, has written about "eliminating the gap between our fraternal ideals and undergraduate fraternal behavior." In my view, if this schism addressed by Chancellor Wells remains, the opportunity that you have as undergraduate Fraternity men to exercise your leadership and to define what the undergraduate Phi Kappa Psi experience will be may diminish.

If we want to be the masters of our own destiny, I urge you to honor, promote, and live by the Fraternity values to which we have pledged ourselves. If we indeed want to be our Brothers' keepers, then commit and act out these ideals to that end. Let me conclude by stating that I am not inviting you to take these actions because external forces may demand it, but rather and more importantly, because it is your responsibility, my undergraduate Brothers. Confronting these student life issues is easily within your grasp. It is up to you.

JOHN W. "JACK" OSWALD, DePauw '35. witnessed the naming of a ten-story tower in his honor during an October ceremony on the Penn State campus. Oswald was President of Penn State from 1970-83. The Oswald Tower is one of the tallest structures on campus, and houses Liberal Arts faculty and offices. Dean Hart M. Nelsen said at the dedication ceremony: "Selecting a Liberal Arts building to be named in honor of a University President signifies the central importance of our (liberal arts) college for Penn State, and we are grateful for this designation . . . As early as 1977, when many were predicting the complete eclipse of liberal arts, Dr. Oswald had the foresight and courage to point out how essential and fundamental the liberal arts are to prepare students."

DR. WILLIAM M. KENDRICK JR., Indiana '35, was present at the groundbreaking ceremonies last November for the addition of the new orthopedic wing at Kendrick Memorial Hospital. The \$3.4 million project will be added to a hospital which has been limited to only colo/rectal procedures and reflects the need to seek diversification in a changing medical climate. The hospital, located south of Indianapolis in Mooresville, Indiana, dates back over 100 years, and has been sustained by the efforts of the Comer, Swisher, and Kendrick families. Also present at the ceremonies was board member Charles Swisher, West Virginia Alpha '59.

WILLIAM G. OWEN, Pennsylvania '39, will retire from Pennsylvania University as executive assistant to President Sheldon Hackney. He has been associated with Penn as a student, alumnus, and employee for almost 50 years, and has been on President Hackney's staff since 1982. He earned a BS in economics from the Wharton School and an MS in education in 1962. He served in the Army twice: once as a military writer/instructor in Army Signal Corps Schools during World War II, and again as a communications security and intelligence officer during the Korean War. From 1946-51 he worked for the Provident Mutual Life Insurance Company. In 1953, he resumed his association with Penn as assistant secretary of the university, and six years later he became assistant vice president in the Office of the President. He also held the post of dean of undergraduate admissions from 1961-68, then became secretary of the university from 1968-75. Prior to his position on President Hackney's staff, he was vice president for development and university relations from 1975-82.

EDMUND P. JENSEN, Washington, '56, is president of U.S. Bancorp, a bank holding company. It is the largest banking institution in the Pacific Northwest with assets of \$11

billion. U.S. Bancorp has acquired such banks as U.S. National Bank of Oregon, Heritage Bank of Camas (OR), Old National Bank of Washington, and Spokane's First National Bank, as well as credit, mortgage, financial services, leasing, securities, and life insurance companies.

WILLIAM T. BLAIR, Ohio Wesleyan '47, has announced his retirement from the Ohio Chamber of Commerce in Columbus after 30 years of service. After serving as the organization's chief executive officer for the past nine years, his retirement will be effective June 1, 1987. During his tenure, he served on various advisory councils for the state and was appointed to key consulting positions by three governors, including Gov. Richard F. Celeste who named him to the Labor/Management Committee. He was chairman of the board for three years of the Council of State Chambers of Commerce based in Washington, DC, and was past president of the Great Lakes Industrial Development Council, an organization of professional developers from five states. He is listed in Who's Who in the Midwest, Who's Who in America, and Who's Who in the World.

TOM JAMES, Texas '48, accepted the chairmanship of the Dallas County (TX) Republican Party in January. He replaced a local businessman who resigned to run for Dallas mayor. James switched political affiliation in the early 1960s to become a GOP precinct chairman. After serving in the Texas House from 1958-62, he then ran unsuccessfully for state attorney general.

DR. EDWARD B. DIETHRICH, Michigan '54, heart surgeon, has developed a computerized health evaluation program at his Arizona Heart Institute. Known as National Health Enhancement Systems Inc., it is now in the process of being franchised nationally. The firm will develop, license, and market health evaluation programs to healthcare providers, which includes hospitals, medical groups, clinics, and physicians. As of November, 1986, the company had sold 75 franchises for 92 sites for the use of its two computerbased programs which assess individual fitness and risk of heart disease. Diethrich came to Arizona from the heart surgery center of Dr. Michael DeBakey in Houston. He founded the Arizona Heart Institute in 1971.

FERD J. SAUEREISEN, Allegheny 54, had been promoted to President and Chief Executive Officer of Sauereisen Cements. He formerly held the position of Vice president of Finance, Operations, and International Sales. He joined the firm in 1962, and also holds a degree from Carnegie-Mellon University. He has worked primarily with coordinating foreign sales programs and developing the company's international network of manufacturing licensees.

RICHARD H. TOMEY, DePauw '57, accepted the position as head football coach at the University of Arizona. Former Wildcats Coach Larry Smith resigned January 1 to become coach at Southern California. Tomey, former coach for the University of Hawaii, compiled a 63-46-3 record during his 10-year career with the Rainbow Warriors.

WILLIAM NELSEN, Southern California '60, relived his memories of the playoff game between the Minnesota Vikings and the Cleveland Browns for the right to play in Superbowl IV in 1970. The interview in the Cleveland Plain Dealer reviewed Nelsen's toughest loss in his 10-year NFL career to the Minnesota Vikings. No longer in football but still interested in coaching, Nelsen lives in Detroit and is in paper sales.

THOMAS R. EVANS, Missouri '67, has been named senior vice president of Muzak, the environmental music company that recently moved its international headquarters from New York to Seattle. Evans is responsible for worldwide sales, marketing, and franchise relations. He began his career with the company in 1972 and most recently served as vice president of sales in the former New York headquarters.


TIMOTHY J. WEBB, Rider College '68, has been promoted to General Sales Manager for



Flying his A-6 Intruder aircraft based on the carrier USS America, Watkins fired the first Navy "Harpoon" anti-ship missle which sank a hostile Libyan patrol boat threatening U.S. Naval forces. Lieutenant Dan Mathis, IUP '73, was also on the carrier America during the operations. Haskins Of Harvard: Phi Psi's Prodigious Scholar

Harvard scarcely needs any help from Phi Kappa Psi in celebrating its 350th anniversary. The modest institution has done quite well, thank you, in getting along without a Chapter of the Fraternity. All the same, for a good deal of the 19th century and much of the 20th, Phi Psi graduate and professional students as well as a clutch of transferred undergrads banded together as a club, maintaining a discreet if lively presence in Cambridge.

Subculture though it may have been, the Phi Psi Club of Harvard was not surveilled as a subversive organization because, in addition to the students who kept it alive and well, there were usually a few members of the Harvard faculty who lent it distinction: among them were Frederick Jackson Turner, Wisconsin Alpha 1878, nearly the leading American historian; Alfred S. Romer, Massachusetts Alpha 1913, the Louis Agassiz professor of zoology; Reuben A. Brower, Mass Alpha 1928, literary critic and sometime chairman of the English department; Charles Homer Haskins, Pennsylvania Beta 1883, the Henry Charles Lea professor of medieval histo21, 1870, in Meadville, Pennsylvania, and inducted by Pennsylvania Beta of Phi Kappa Psi at Allegheny College in Meadville in the fall of 1883. Hence he became a member of the Fraternity at the age of 12, undoubtedly the youngest ever initiated. Was this a curious fluke? He was, after all, a legacy in good standing: his father, George W. Haskins, was a Penn Betan initiated in 1860, and his brother, Robert D. Haskins, was Penn Beta 1880.

No, the initiation was correct in every way because the precocious Master Haskins was a properly enrolled student at Allegheny College, not merely a pupil in the college's preparatory branch. Besides that, in the Chapter at the time was one Sion Bass Smith, an initiate of 1881, later to become the S.W.G.P. and the Mystagogue of the Fraternity, and not the sort of fellow easily chivvied into impetuous innovations. How socially mature Haskins was at 12 is hard to reckon. There is no doubt he was a bona fide prodigy whose father had taught him Latin when he was about five and Greek a little later when he could handle the comedies of Aristophanes. By the time

ry and, 1908 to 1924, dean of the graduate school of arts and sciences.

Although each deserves his own encomium, in this instance it is Haskins who stands out as a truly great teacher, scholar, and academic leader. His achievements helped Harvard gain its pre-eminence as a university, advanced the cause of education in America, and contributed mightily to the international community of scholars. In the world of higher learning, his works are still admired and consulted as models of able research, lucid writing, and sound thought. The story of his life is anything but drably academic.

Charles Haskins was a wonder in many ways. He was born on December

he was 15, Haskins hoped to transfer from Allegheny to Harvard, but a "majestic Dean" refused to admit him.


Snubbed but not downcast, he applied to Johns Hopkins, which was then gaining an outstanding reputation for fostering scholarship and scientific research along the lines of the German universities. The Hopkins was more receptive than Harvard to extraordinary youngsters; thus he was able to earn a bachelor's degree when he was 16. Although he did not formally transfer his membership to Maryland Alpha at Johns Hopkins, he did arrive there in the interval between Thomas Woodrow Wilson, Virginia Alpha 1879, who had come in 1883 to take a doctorate in political science,

and Frederick Jackson Turner, who arrived from Wisconsin in 1889, the year that Jesse W. Lazear, the notable physician and medical scientist, was inducted. Starting straight away on his doctoral studies, he took a research leave to pursue his studies in Paris (where he acquired a fascination for the ancient culture of Normandy) and at the University of Berlin. He returned to the Hopkins to complete his doctorate in 1890 when he was not yet 20.

He took a position there in the history department, presumably the youngest person ever to do so at Johns Hopkins. After a short time, Frederick Jackson Turner, who had gone back to the University of Wisconsin, persuaded him to migrate. For 12 years Haskins taught at Madison, during which time Wisconsin rose to the front rank of American universities, an eminence gained in large measure through the work of Turner and Haskins. In 1902 Haskins accepted a call to Harvard-one assumes that Harvard issues calls in the manner of divine summonses-and soon became one of the university's foremost faculty members and leaders. Later, one of his colleagues said of Haskins' ambition it was not that he wanted power, rather he was "aware of his ability and wanted to shoulder responsibility." In a kind of turnabout, Turner left Wisconsin in 1910 to join the Harvard faculty as a protest against the populist regents' opposition to scholarly research.

As an inspiring and beloved teacher, Haskins holds a niche in the Harvard pantheon with Agassiz, Norton, Kittredge, Copeland, and William James. As an administrator, he ranks with President Charles Eliot and Dean Roscoe Pound as a far-seeing and towering figure in Harvard's ivy-shaded history. In view of such deeds, one may well ask why Haskins did not become a university president. It was, after all, still possible when he was at the height of his powers to preside over an academic community as an intellectual leader, an advancer of standards, an inspirer of students and professors alike, even a culture hero to alumni and the public at large. Surely, he had all the makings. Still, despite invitations from some of the nation's superior universities, he did not want to give up teaching and scholarship to get involved in the drudgeries of moneycadging, faculty-pampering, alumnicoddling, and legislature-wheedling. From his point of view he had the best of all academic worlds at Harvard, and he was, when all else was said and done, loyal to Harvard first, last and always.

Throughout his career until early retirement in 1931, he took on a number of extracurricular assignments, which made

one of Harvard's finest resources available to the entire nation. In 1911, for instance, Haskins led a study of history teaching in secondary schools which brought about reforms for sounder teaching, improved textbooks, and broadened horizons. He urged the introduction of the social sciences—sociology, political science, economics, anthropology, which he styled "the newer humanities"—into the college curriculum with the expectation the scientific methods he applied in his own research would eventually counteract drill-by-rote, random-fact-ridden, tedium-producing practices.

For his own sake, it must be counted a blessing that Haskins did not live to see the invasion of "social studies" into American schools. Had he lived longer, he might have been able to prevent the misuse of scientific methods and the dilution of academic substance that educationists would hurry to accept. Haskins believed the study of history called for the vigorous exercise of intelligence across an expanse of human activities, that primary materials should be sought out and used resourcefully, that the interplay of persons, forces, and events should be brought to light with as much

imagination and vitality as one could muster. Nowhere is that demonstrated more vibrantly than in his own work.

An educator as well as a scholar, Haskins did his best to remove the barriers that the old guard had set up to keep their precious subjects from being contaminated by emerging modes of inquiry. "We must first of all disclaim any necessary antagonism between the newer humanities and the older, or between the humanities in general and science." This was his thesis at an all-star conference on the American college held in 1915 to celebrate the centenary of Allegheny College-whose president, William H. Crawford, was one of his generation's leaders in higher education and, by the way, an 1880 initiate of Illinois Alpha, a connection Haskins wouldn't have missed. (Another Illinois Alphan, Charles F. B. Thwing, president of Case, also took part, speaking on the practicality of liberal education. Of his orotund words, the less said, the better.) Haskins went on to say: "No single group of studies is sufficient to occupy the whole field of education for any individual, and each group shades into the other . . . Least of all is the college a place

for that intellectual arrogance and selfsufficiency which would limit the really significant in education to Greek or chemistry or economics or any other subject. All subjects are not of equal value, but no subject is of supreme or exclusive value, and none can be wisely studied in college or elsewhere apart from its relation to others."

While such views may not seem unusual today (come to think of it, they still may), to hear them asserted in 1915 by Harvard's Graduate Dean was almost tantamount to heresy. Where was the predictable defense of the sacred, unyielding tenets of liberal education as set forth in Jeremiah Day's Yale Report of 1827? Lo and behold, here was a cogent, plain-spoken recognition of subjects that deserved to be studied and taught in the colleges of modern America. Dean Haskins put it pointedly: "The real rivalry is not one between classics and sociology, between history and chemistry, but a struggle with ignorance, materialism, and superficiality for the development of the intellectual life We are wrestling against principalities and powers, against the rulers of darkness of this world, and we need help from every quarter."

Unlike the collegiate romantics of the '60s and '70s with their incessant demands of "relevance," Haskins understood the possibility of reconciling the traditional with the contemporary in a form both principled and reasonable: "The first business of the American college is to make its students intellectually keen about something; what that is, is a matter of less moment . . . many students are likely to be moved only by studies which have some immediate and obvious relation to their own time It is the part of wisdom to take advantage of this legitimate interest, to offer it food to feed upon and wise and competent guidance, to discipline it by thorough and exact methods, to broaden it by a wide and humane knowledge of other nations and other times, and to steady it by a sane appreciation of the best things that have been said and done in the world." That ought to be good enough to satisfy Matthew Arnold, Cardinal Newman, Mark Van Doren, Robert Hutchins, and maybe even Paul Goodman and Dr. Spock. Perhaps some colleges took heed, then as now.

With World War I already a year under way, Haskins' vision of higher education was prophetic, catholic, and sensible, shedding light on conflicts and controversies that still beset us more than 70 years later. It was for such unconventional, responsible thinking that President Wilson appointed him to the American delegation to the Versailles

Peace Conference. Chosen to serve as head of the delegation's division of Western Europe, he was charged with working out with his counterparts among the Allies territorial settlements of the Saar Valley, Alsace-Lorraine, Belgium, and Schleswig-Holstein. Following his highly praised work at Versailles, he returned to America to lecture and write on the issues raised by the treaties, especially to inform the public on the reasons why America should enter the League of Nations. Those efforts ended, of course, in failure when the Senate led by Henry Cabot Lodge, that redoubtable Harvard brahmin, rebuffed Woodrow Wilson. Shortly thereafter in a public address, "Some Problems of the Peace Conference," Haskins asserted with uncharacteristic sharpness that "... none of the expectations of the makers of that peace had been realized . . . (and that) the responsibility lay less with Peace Commission than with the failure of our country to ratify the treaties and to take part in carrying out their provisions."

Like Wilson who had left Princeton to enter politics and public life, Haskins trained the full force of his mind and skill on urgent public problems and so earned the respect of the American peofirst-rate scholars of his generation and later, he did not publish a large work until he was well along in his career. Despite his precocious feats, Haskins had the good sense to let his gifts ripen slowly and steadily, and the good luck not be be rushed into premature and promiscuous publication, the modern day menace of "publish or perish." (By the way, that also held true for Frederick Jackson Turner, who published little and that rather late.) Harvard can be thanked for treating scholars humanely, at least in some prominent instances.

His first book, Norman Institutions, came out in 1918 when he was almost 48, already noted for his teaching, decanal work, occasional essays, and articles. The book is written for scholars, dealing as it does with salient aspects of governmental, ecclesiastical, military, and judicial arrangements from William the Conqueror through Henry II. Drawing on primary materials to make an intricate network of resourceful connections, Haskins subjected Norman feudalism to an examination that considered such matters as taxation and fiscal administration, ducal and baronial jurisdictions, bureaucracy, foreign and military policy, and jurisprudence (e.g., the Norman origins of the English jury). De-

ple. If nothing else, Haskins and Wilson proved academic training and long residence in the ivory tower need not disable one for practical service in the world of affairs. Either could have said the campaigns of academic in-fighting were useful preparation for the struggles of both war and peace. Latterday commentators are not sure, however, Wilson was well fitted thereby for what went on at Versailles, but that is another story.

For all his accomplishments as a dutiful citizen, it is as a scholar that Haskins is best remembered. Although his enduring achievement in scholarship is a series of books on the Middle Ages in Europe from the 11th through the 13th centuries, the subject of his doctoral dissertation was "The Yazoo Land Companies," which led to his first publication in The Papers of the American Historical Association in 1891 when he was not yet 21. It was a far cry from speculations in Mississippi to the transmission of Latin literature 700 years earlier. Like many

spite the rather daunting but well-managed mass of details, the book is accessible to the general reader who will marvel at the quality of mind that could organize so much disparate material and make such clear sense of it. One soon comes to understand how a medieval historian could play an important role in the reorganization of Western Europe after WWI.

Those who want to discover Haskins for themselves are likely to take up the two books for which he remains most celebrated. The first, The Rise of Universities, is a collection of three lectures he gave at Brown in 1923 (and is still available in paperback from the Cornell University Press.) Only 93 pages of main text but fitted out with bibliographical note, index, and prefactory note on Haskins, it is a superb account of what the early European universities were like: physical conditions, students, professors, courses of study, degrees, lectures, textbooks, examinations, academic free-


dom, pastimes, vices and virtues, letters to parents, manuals, and, in sum, almost anything one craves to know about the origins of organized higher learning. Although it may scare off prospective readers to call the little book a classic—some classics are eminently readable, some aren't—that it assuredly is, for it covers the subject briskly, authoritatively, candidly, and entertainingly. The sole disappointment is that there isn't more of it, but that too, is part of its charm.

Throughout the three essays one hears the distinctive voice of Charles Haskins: kindly, amusing, even playful, gracefully learned in a way never pompous or patronizing. Here he is on a manual "designed for the students of Heidelberg about the year 1480": "When the young man arrives he registers from Ulm; his parents are in moderate circumstances; he has come to study. He is then duly hazed after the German fashion, which treats the candidate as an unclean beast with horns and tusks which must be removed by officious fellow students, who also hear his confession of sin and fix as the penance a good dinner for the crowd. He begins his studies by attending three lectures a day, and learns to champion nominalism against realism and the comedies of Terence against the law, and to discuss the advantages of various universities and the price of food and the quality of beer in university towns."

Haskins then describes the pleasures, distractions, and requirements of 15th century student life in Germany, and before long one senses that the nature of students may not be so very different from one age to another. From passage to passage there persists the dogged feeling—"the shock of recognition," if you will—that many, maybe most, of the customs, habits, foibles and follies of acacemic life in one form or another have been around from the very start. That is, after all, one of the unsettling twinges that history tends to stir in its readers.

Take, for instance, his comments on student letters, "shorn of most of their individuality but for that very reason reflecting the more faithfully the fundamental and universal phases of university." It should come as no surprise that "By far the largest element in the correspondence of medieval students consists of requests for money."

One may rely on Haskins' authority when he writes "... the university of the 20th century is the lineal descendent of medieval Paris and Bologna. They are the rock whence we were hewn; the hole of the pit whence we were digged. The fundamental organization is the same, the historic continuity is unbroken. They



created the university tradition of the modern world, that common tradition which belongs to all our institutions of higher learning, the newest as well as the oldest, and which all college and university men should know and cherish." Needless to say, that applies as much to Allegheny, Arizona State, and Central South Dakota A & M at Pitchfork as to Harvard.

The second book that presentday readers will relish is The Renaissance of the Twelfth Century, published in 1928 and still in print, thanks to the Harvard University Press. Recognized at the outset as a masterwork, it advances the thesis that the rebirth of Latin literature and learning began in Europe long before the conventionally accepted time of revival in Italy, " . . . that the continuity of history rejects such sharp and violent contrasts between successive periods, and that modern research shows us the Middle Ages less dark and less static, the Renaissance less bright and less sudden, than was once supposed." The case Haskins makes for a reordered view of the Middle Ages had a strong influence on the scholars of his day, which has lasted into the present, for on the 50th anniversary of its publication, the book was the subject of a conference at Harvard, which in turn produced a collection of papers extending, refining, and re-examining the dimensions of Haskins' thought. In point of fact, the book is comparable in importance to Frederick Jackson Turner's "Significance of the Frontier in American History," which, from its appearance as a lecture in 1891, revolutionized the ways America and the American people were studied and understood.

Sporadically, the Middle Ages work themselves back into public consciousness. Today Umberto Eco's The Name of the Rose has attracted attention both as a novel and a film, and a spate of imitations set in courts, monasteries, market towns, and universities will come tumbling after. There is a tendency to romaticize the period as a wholesome, life-affirming, well-ordered alternative to the terrors and confusions of the present. In some respects, however, a certain similarity does come to light, especially in the shifting balances among various possessors of authority and power: namely, kings and courts, nobles major and minor, churchmen and bureaucrats, universities and monasteries. Although it is usually a mistake to see such developments as close parallels, there are enough broad outlines to be found in the institutions, conditions, and conflicts of the Middle Ages so that features and

structures of contemporary society can be probed from revealing perspectives.

Whether Haskins was writing about science, philosophy, translations from the Greek and Arabic, or historiography, he never allowed his thoughts to become hermetically sealed in the abstruse language of technical scholarship. Always the reader is mindful that Haskins was a great teacher, a masterly expositor of men, ideas, and events. In an age when scholarly writing is often as clotted and crabbed, viscid and dense as a bad translation, it is sheer delight to come upon Haskins' artful and engaging prose. For instance, his characterization of Peter Abaelard, the legendary Sorbonne professor and lover of Héloise: "Abaelard, it is true, was a monk and an abbot, but he became such by force of circumstances and not from choice. Even when he retires into the forests of Champagne or the depths of Brittany, he has always one eye on Paris and his return thither; indeed, his Historia calamitatum seems to have been written to prepare the way for his coming back, to serve an immediate purpose rather than for posterity. It shows nothing of monastic humility or religious vocation, but, on the contrary, is full of arrogance of intellect and joy of combat, even of the lust of the flesh and the lust of the eyes and the pride of life. Its author was a vain man, vain of his penetrating mind and skill in debate, vain of his power to draw away others' students, vain even of his success with the fair sex . . . always sure of his own opinions and unsparing of his adversaries." One can almost bring to mind the very model of a modern major professor. Perhaps Haskins

All in all, The Renaissance of the Twelfth Century presents Haskins' thought and style at the top of his form. While it is a synthesis of topics rather than a chronological or dramatic narrative, the book moves with the steady pulse of superior historical fiction. Any writer would be proud to claim it as the grand achievement of his life's work. And that it is. Such a triumph came at a great cost. Haskins had long possessed an amazing singleness of purpose, an ability to concentrate his energies and talents on whatever work he had at hand. Although it would be an exaggeration to describe his manner as effortless, he was apparently able to manage a Herculean amount of work in a way that allowed him to devote himself to his friends and family. He married Clare Allen in London in 1914, and they had two sons and a daughter, well settled into a remarkably happy household. After the wearing experience of the peace negotiations and the disappointing aftermath,

Haskins started to push himself to the limit. Like Wilson whose health was fatally broken by strokes brought on by the ordeal, he was more worn down and at greater risk than he realized.

He carried out a demanding schedule of administrative tasks, professional commitments (he helped to found and then chaired the American Council of Learned Societies and the Medieval Society of America, was president of the American Historical Association, edited scholarly journals, and took a prominent role in

mind, the gay humor, the loyal friendship that they had known of yore... It was the triumph, not the defeat of Charles Haskins, and the best of his legacies to our age. For more notable even than his works in the world of scholars and of nations was the moulding of a noble soul through joys and pain."

Three long-time colleagues composed the official obituary, which appeared in 1939 in *Speculum*, the journal of medieval studies Haskins had helped to establish: "Vigorous and progressive in his


several foreign organizations), scholarship (Studies in the History of Science in 1924, The Normans in European History in 1925, The Renaissance of the Twelfth Century in 1928, Studies in Medieval Culture in 1929), public lectures, and civic endeavors as well as "ordinary" teaching and professorial duties (supervision of theses and dissertations, committees, committees, committees). Then in 1931 it came to a sudden, tragic halt when Haskins suffered a total collapse that forced him to retire from Harvard and withdraw from all other involvements. Until his death on May 14, 1937, he lived at home as an invalid.

His friend and former student F.M. Powicke, wrote that "Until his health gave way, Haskins had a full, strenuous, and happy life." As the British scholar knew at first hand, "Haskins was very generous to young men, had a kind, somewhat whimsical manner, and was blessed with a large capacity for affection. He endeared men to him." Powicke also noted that Haskins "disliked pretentious and slovenly-minded people just as he disliked pretentious and slovenly work," but refused to be drawn into academic squabbles and petty rivalries "by never indulging in historical controversy."


His Harvard colleague and fellow historian, E.K. Rand, wrote of his last years: "This lamentable breakdown of a great career was mastered by Haskins with the strength with which he mastered everything . . . his friends who were permitted brief visits saw within the prison of the body the will of iron, the keen

method of teaching history both as a liberal art and as an humane science, a sovereign influence on all advanced students of history . . . powerful in Faculty debates, unravelling Gordian knots as quickly as others could cut them, marked out for a college presidency from the start, though not tempted by several invitations . . . witty and gay in conversation, fond of long walks, a favorite at his clubs, best of friends, deeply reverential and religious at heart, he made himself immediately one of the indispensables in the life of Harvard and left a name to be recorded among its greatest."

Thus, while Fair Harvard celebrates its 350 years of seeking and dispensing "Veritas," Phi Kappa Psi should let its own light shine in memory of Charles Homer Haskins, Pennsylvania Beta 1883, that is to say, Haskins of Harvard and Phi Kappa Psi.

Chapters and Colonies of Phi Kappa Psi, whether established or new, should relish new challenges and try to view them as a great opportunity to grow and learn. We should strive to be the trend-setters in the interfraternity world (thank you, Bob). Because everyone else on fraternity row does "it" is just not good enough anymore.

I know everyone will be glad to hear I lost all my apprehensions when I walked through the Chapter house door on my first solo visit. I realized instantly that even though all the Brothers are different, we all subscribe to the same basic ideals and principles. It's an experience in Brotherhood I'll not soon forget.




Florida Excellence

FRANK B. HUBACHEK, Minnesota Beta '11, December 8, 1986, at age 92. He had been general counsel, director and chairman of the executive committee of Household International, formerly Household Finance, from 1937-67 when he became director emeritus. He studied law at Harvard before serving in World War I in an ambulance unit of the American Field Service, and was awarded a Croix de Guerre in 1917. Later that year he enlisted in the Navy and became a pilot. Resuming his career, he earned his law degree from the University of Minnesota in 1922 and practiced law in Minneapolis until 1929. He became a director of Household International when it was incorporated in 1925, and became general counsel in 1927, and chairman of the executive committee in 1934. He was an expert in consumer finance law and helped draft early legislation regulating the consumer loan industry. He had been active in both the American Association of Personal Finance Companies and the National Consumer Finance Association. A protector of wilderness areas in Minnesota and Ontario, he received the National Award of the Izaak Walton League of America in 1978 and a Presidential Commendation in 1971.

DAVID A. YOHE, Gettysburg '19, January 11, 1987, in Lancaster, PA. He was a retired chemist who worked for Dupont Paint Co. in Philadelphia. A veteran of World War I, he received a purple heart.

FREDERICK H. LEUSCHNER, Penn State '20, in State College, PA, November 27, 1986. He was 88. A professor emeritus of poultry science extension in the College of Agriculture at Penn State, he retired in 1963. He wrote and co-authored numerous poultry bulletins and publications. He had also served as assistant professor of poultry at the University of Maryland, superintendent of the Somerset County farms, and extension poultry specialist at the University of Delaware. He was a member of Omega Epsilon fraternity which later merged with Phi Kappa Psi. He was a charter director and treasurer of Pennsylvania Lambda Educational Foundation where the F.H. "Fritz" Leuschner Scholarship Award is named in his honor. Survivors include his son Frederick E. Leuschner, Penn State '49. of Harrisburg, PA.

ROBERT M. SMITH, Kansas '20, at age 85. He graduated the University of Kansas Law School in 1923. He had been treasurer of a dry

goods store and had built a drive-in theater in Osage Beach, MO. Instrumental in starting the Ozark Opry, he owned and operated a radio equipment business until his retirement in 1963. He was a life member of the American Radio Relay League.

CHARLES E. BODURTHA, Ohio Wesleyan '21, at age 84. He was a retired partner in a Cleveland law firm and had practiced corporate law until 1976 when he retired at age 74. After graduation from college, he enrolled in Harvard Business School, but transferred to the law school the following year. He was a member of the Harvard Law School Alumni Association and past president of the Cleveland Institute of Music, the Ohio Wesleyan Alumni Association, and the Cleveland Council on World Affairs.

F. CURTIS CANFIELD, Amherst '21, June 8, 1986. A former professor of dramatic arts at Amherst for 28 years, he was hired to serve as the first dean of the Yale School of Drama in 1955, a position he held for 11 years. From 1949-51 he worked for NBC television as producer-director for Masterpiece Playhouse while on sabbatical leave from Amherst. He had directed American plays at the historic Schoenbrunn Theater in Vienna at the invitation of the Austrian government. Canfield left Yale in 1967 to become university professor of theater arts at the University of Pittsburgh, from where he retired in 1973. He authored four books: Plays of the Irish Renaissance, Plays of Changing Ireland, The Seed and the Sowers: A Chronicle of the Founding of Amherst College, and The Craft of Play Directing. He was a past president of the National Theater Conference, past chairman of the Fulbright Fellowship Screening Committee, and past trustee of the American Shakespeare Festival Theater and Academy at Stratford, CT. Yale awarded him an honorary MA degree; Amherst awarded him an honorary doctorate of humane letters; and Emerson College awarded him an honorary doctorate of laws.

FRANCIS H. INSLEY, Amherst '21, in Indianapolis, at age 83. He had been an executive with Insley Manufacturing Company from 1925-40, and also had worked for Diamond Chain Company for 21 years. He retired as production supervisor in 1965.

CARL FREDERICK JOOS, Amherst '22, May 29, 1986. After moving to California in 1927, he began his career with the Pacific Tele-

phone Company. He retired in 1965 as Rate Engineer for the Southern California area.

EUGENE B. McKINNEY, Oregon '23, August 15, 1986, in La Mesa, CA. After attending Oregon for two years, he was appointed to the Naval Academy. After graduation, he served on the battleship Idaho then at the submarine school in New London, CT. He assumed command of the submarine S-27, and after various other assignments, was given command of an S-26. In 1943, he assumed command of the Skate, which earned the Navy Unit Commendation for "distinguished and heroic service." Other awards include the Navy Cross, two Gold Stars, the Silver Medal, two Legion of Merit Medals, and numerous area and campaign medals. After World War II, he completed a bachelor of laws degree at George Washington University. Later he was admitted to practice before the Supreme Court. In retirement, he lived in San Diego, CA.

HUBERT LEONARD PERRY, Amherst '26, June 6, 1986. After graduation he was with Credit and Trust Marine Midland Bank. During World War II, he was with Rigidized Metals Corporation, but left after the war to become a developer and home builder in Buffalo. He was a former president of the Buffalo Skating Club, and numerous local church and school organizations.

LESTER C. BOSLER JR., *Pennsylvania '27*, January 11, 1987, in Hilton Head Island, SC. He was 77. He is survived by his brother W.J. Bosler, *Pennsylvania '33*. His father, Lester C. Bosler, *Pennsylvania '02*, predeceased him.

MARVIN O. WALLACE, Iowa '28, August 1, 1986, at age 77. After attending the University of Iowa, he graduated from Harvard Business School. He was director of personnel at Clinton Corn Processing Company for 21 years, retiring after 41 years with Clinton Corn and Nabisco Brands.

ALDEN ROBERT WALLS, *Brown '28*, Barrington, RI, November 5, 1986. A well-known sailor and former Brown Hall of Fame hockey player, he began his career in the textile industry with the American Woolen Company in Lawrence, MA. He continued in the textile business with the Uxbridge Worsted Company in mill management, then joined J.P. Stevens in New York City as assistant manager in the woolens division. His knowledge of sailing and textiles combined into the formation of a new career in 1960 when he helped introduce fiberglass to New England boat builders. He retired in 1983.

BENNETT W. BUBB, Kansas '29, December 1986, in Topeka, KS. He was 78. He owned Bennie Bubb & Associates for 13 years, and later was co-owner and vice president of Bubb & Thompson, Inc., a construction materials firm in Topeka and Wichita. He was a commissioned Army officer during World War II, and was the recipient of the Bronze Star with an oak leaf cluster, the Purple Heart, the European Theatre of Operations Medal with four Battle Stars, two Croix de Guerre medals, and the American Theatre Medal. Later he served as assistant chief of staff in the Kansas National Guard.

CARNEY GRAHAM LASLIE, Washington & Lee '32, December 30, 1986, after a lengthy illness. He graduated from 'Ole Miss and earned a MA in International Relations from the American University in Washington, D.C. He also attended the University of Grenoble, France, and the Industrial College of the Armed Forces. During his 35 year career with the U.S. Government, he was with the U.S. Army and the State Department. He served as counselor of Commercial Affairs at the U.S. embassies in India and Japan from 1957-65. He was listed in both "Who's Who in the South" and "Who's Who in the Southwest." After retiring, he moved to Shreveport in 1971, where he served as adjunct professor of government at Centenary College.

FRANK A. ROBINSON, Amherst '35, December 24, 1986. He was 68. He was a retired assistant vice president in charge of sales for A.T.T. in Allendale, NJ.

EDGAR J. MURNEN JR., Washington '37, November 1, 1986, in Hoquiam, WA. He was 68. He was a forester for West Coast Plywood and director of the Poison Museum in Hoquiam. He was a Lieutenant Commander in the Navy during World War II.

CHARLES A. STEWART, Minnesota '40, in St. Paul, Minnesota, November 22, 1986. He was 65. During both World War II and the Korean conflict, he served in the paratroopers, and later retired as major. He was an officer in the St. Paul Book and Stationery Company.

WILLIAM HECTOR MARSH, UCLA '40, December 7, 1986. A retired Marine Corps colonel, he had worked for the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. Active in the Marine Corps for 27 years, he retired in 1968. He then served as a civilian employee of the government in the National Highway Safety Agency before it merged with the NHTSA. Marsh retired a second time in 1984. Born in Oregon and raised in Los Angeles, he also graduated the Army War college and the Marine Corps Staff and Command College. He served in the Pacific during World War II and in Japan during the Korean War. Marsh was a logistics specialist, had commanded a regiment, and had taught at the Marine Corps Staff and Command College. He served as acting chief of U.N. Truce Supervision Organization in Palestine in the 1960's. He was the recipient of the Legion of Merit Award and the transportation secretary's Meritorious Achievement Award.

DAN BRUCE KAHLE, MD, *Indiana '42*, August 28, 1986, in Atlanta, GA. He practiced obstetrics and gynecology in Atlanta for 30 years.

PAUL G. SANDERSON JR., Dartmouth '49, June 21, 1986. He was stricken after a brief illness following two business trips to the Federal Republic of Germany and the People's Republic of China. In 1968, he founded ASSIST-American Secondary Schools for International Students and Teachers-which was a new approach to student exchange programs. It was designed to bring together young people who were clearly destined for leadership in their country and who were not yet hindered by stereotypes. Due to his efforts, more than 750 young people from 18 countries and thousands of young Americans experienced life outside their native culture. Sanderson was also the founder/director of the annual Suffield (CT) Reader/ Writer Conference, now known as the Wesleyan Writer's Conference. He was also founder of the Center for Creative Youth at Wesleyan College and vice president of the National Soccer Coaches Association. A multi-talented person, he founded and was executive producer of Our Town Films, Ltd., which produced an award-winning documentary on the American sculptor Augustus St. Gaudens. A one-time faculty member of Lebanon (NH) College, he was active in both the Vermont and the New Hampshire Historical Societies, and was on the executive committee of the Association of Alumni of Dartmouth College.

WADE S. McCLUSKY, Stanford '50, August 26, 1986, in Costa Mesa, CA. He served as a fighter pilot in the U.S. Navy before receiving his MBA from Stanford. He was a senior accountant for Orange County (CA).

LEWIS W. SHOLLENBERGER, Allegheny '58, in Walnut Creek, CA, of pancreatic cancer. He was 46. After receiving his law degree from Rutgers, he served as attorney for various federal agencies. He served active duty in Viet Nam and Okinawa as a U.S. Air Force Judge Advocate. He remained active in his local reserve unit and served as its president before retiring as Lieutenant Colonel in 1985. He served as civilian attorney for NASA in Houston, and then served at NASA headquarters in Washington from 1972-77. He then joined the U.S. Energy Dept. as deputy general counsel from 1977-1983. He transferred to the Nuclear Regulatory Commission as Regional Counsel at Walnut Creek, California. He was the recipient of numerous awards which included the Department of Defense Joint Service Commendation Medal, NASA's Skylab Achievement Award, the Department of Energy Superior Achievement Award, and the Meritorious Service Medal from the U.S. Air Force.

MARK SCHNEIDER, Wabash '85, January 5, 1987. He was 21. His death resulted from injuries he sustained on the island of San Salvador in the Bahamas in a head-on collision with a truck. He had attended Wabash until May, 1986, when he left to work for Broad Ripple Music International in Indianapolis. He was also publicity coordinator for Rods and Cones, a popular Indianapolis rock band, and a member of the Society for a Sane Nuclear Policy.





with \$30,000 Gift to the Endowment Fund

Maurice J. Warnock, Oregon '23, former chairman of the board of Armstrong World Industries Inc. and Phi Kappa Psi's Distinguished Alumnus of 1986, has made a gift of \$30,000 to The Endowment Fund of the Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity, Inc.

He was elected company treasurer in 1943, vice president in 1950 and a member of the board of directors in 1959. In 1962, he became the president and chief executive officer of the firm.

Denison University, Franklin and Marshall College and the University of Oregon have benefited from Brother Warnock's

house terminals all the more attractive.

In addition to academics, computers can be of great assistance in many areas of chapter operations. With the help of a computer, financial records, correspondence, rush data, committee work and alumni relations become much more manageable tasks.

In order to encourage the use of computers by Phi Psi Chapters, the Endowment Fund sponsors a computer grant and loan program. For qualified Chapter house corporations, the Endowment Fund offers a \$500 grant and \$1,000 loan to purchase a mini or microcomputer.

The grant and loan of \$1,500 are adequate for Chapters to purchase a computer terminal, printer and modem, which can connect the Chapter with the college or university's main computer.

Many Chapters already have in-house computers or terminals. The Endowment Fund grant and loan program is available to these groups, but priority will be given to first-time purchasers of computer hardware.

The Endowment Fund Trustees have decided to offer six grant/loans in 1987. Interested Chapters and house corporations can receive an application through the Fraternity's Headquarters.

With the increased emphasis on the use of computers in the office, the home and, now, in schools, the Endowment Fund's computer grant and loan program is an important program. It already has proven to be popular.

Do you have a will? Is Phi Kappa Psi included in your estate planning? Read on to learn how you can help the Fraternity and yourself.

Why Do I Need a Will?

Amazing as it may seem, more than 80 percent of all Americans die without leaving a will. If you were to die without a will, the decisions on the distribution of your assets would be determined by the laws of your state.

This highly impersonal process may result in assets being distributed not in accordance with your wishes. The lack of a will may also subject your estate to maximum taxation.

It's important to remember that no one is too young or too old to ensure the proper distribution of property through a will. A will guarantees that your wishes will be carried out, plus the investment in a will today may prove to be less costly to your estate than if there were no will in place.

Keeping Your Will Updated

Like any business document, your will should be reviewed periodically. It is



probably not going to be adequate for the remainder of your life since changes occur over the years. For example, your will may have to be modified if you have moved to a different state; retired; bought or sold property; lost a beneficiary through death; been married or divorced; had children; acquired a second home; or incurred new obligations.

You and your legal counsel should review your will if any of these changes have occurred or if a period of five years has elapsed since your will was drawn.

In many cases, a simple codicil to your will allows you to make changes without the need for redrafting or re-execution of your will.

An up-to-date will is important. How important? An out-dated will is as bad in many cases as having no will in place at all, and potentially could result in the distribution of assets against your wishes, the alienation of relatives and, in some cases, costly litigation.

Minimize Estate Taxes

One important purpose of a will is to eliminate or reduce estate taxes. A gift to the Endowment Fund of the Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity, Inc., is one way to accomplish this.

The Fraternity's educational foundation is an IRS approved 501(c)(3) public foundation. It's federal tax identification number is 36 6130655.

There is no limit on federal estate tax deductions on gifts to the Endowment Fund. A bequest to Phi Psi's educational foundation will reduce the top amount of the estate, which is subject to the highest rate of taxation.

Make the Right Choices

It's vitally important to choose wisely the attorney who will prepare your will. He will be sought by your survivors for advice and guidance. Equally important is your choice of an executor of your estate who will see that your wishes are met.

Remembering Phi Psi in Your Will

After meeting the needs of your family members, the most meaningful bequest you can make is a gift to the Endowment Fund. Such a bequest will provide funds in perpetuity to help "Old Phi Psi" provide educational and leadership opportunities.

There are many ways to remember Phi Kappa Psi in your will:

*An Outright Bequest . . . allows you to designate a specific amount of funds or property. This ensures your heirs will receive their proportionate share of your estate. You may choose to use specific amounts or percentages of your estate, and you may choose to help one specific Chapter of the Fraternity.

*A Residual Interest Bequest . . . allows you to give your residuary estate to the Endowment Fund only after spe-

cific sums are distributed to your heirs. This protects bequests to family members from changing circumstances.

*A Contingent Bequest . . . offers you the opportunity to make a bequest to the Endowment Fund, but only if your specified beneficiaries do not survive you. This option allows you to provide for your family's security, which is the primary concern of most Phi Psis.

Examples of Bequest Clauses Unrestricted Outright Bequest

"I give and bequeath to the Endowment Fund of the Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity Inc., a non-profit Illinois corporation with principal offices in Indianapolis, Indiana, the sum of \(\) ______ (or the following described property) to be used in the discretion of




the Trustees for the purposes for which the Endowment Fund was created and is operated."

Restricted Outright Bequest

"I give and bequeath to the Endowment Fund of the Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity Inc., a non-profit Illinois corporation with principal offices in Indianapolis, Indiana, the sum of ______ (or following described property). The income and principal (or income but not the principal) shall be used for the following purposes: (insert the particular purposes for which the bequest is intended here)."

Examples: to help a particular Chapter; to establish a named scholarship; to establish a specific educational program; to provide books or equipment for an educational purpose; or to support research of a fraternal nature.



Gift of a Residuary Estate

"All the rest, residue and remainder of my estate, both real and personal property of whatever kind and wherever situated, which I may own or have the right to dispose of at my death, I give to the Endowment Fund of the Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity Inc., a non-profit Illinois corporation, with its principal office in Indianapolis, Indiana, to be used for the purposes for which the Endowment Fund was created and is operated.

Contingent Bequest

"If all the above-named beneficiaries shall pre-decease me, then I hereby give to the Endowment Fund of the Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity Inc., a non-profit Illinois corporation, with principal offices in Indianapolis, Indiana, (describe property given). This property shall be known as the ______ Fund, and the principal and income thereof (or the income but not the principal) shall be used in the discretion of the Trustees for the purposes for which the Endowment Fund was created and is operated."

Message From the President



Dear Brothers:

As we begin to make plans for our District Councils and Woodrow Wilson Leadership Schools this coming Fall, let us take time to think about and reflect on the role of the advisors in Phi Kappa Psi . . . particularly those who devote their time and energy at the undergraduate level, and to how we can get them involved in these important meetings. If we trace the history of the Chapters which have sustained success over a period of years, almost without exception we will see strong alumni advisorship somewhere in the picture. In fact, it may not be overstating the case too much to suggest that one solution can be offered to almost any Chapter problem, that solution being strong local alumni involvement, and in many instances, such strong advisorship could preclude most Chapter crises. How can the Fraternity ever thank our advisors enough for their contributions?

Who are these advisors? They are Brothers who live in proximity to the Chapter. They are faculty members (sometimes non-Phi Psis). They are "fraternity deans", housemothers, and wives of alums. They are those who care enough about the future of the fraternity system to offer advice and counsel, and they are those who have made a difference in the quality of our lives as college students. For you alumni Brothers who are not already involved, make yourself available. I remember, as though it were yesterday, the dramatic and positive influence of Jim Brasher, Prew Nelson, and Mimi Freeman, and I trust that many of you have your own names to plug in.

It is my belief that strong advisorship is so important to the development of the quality undergraduate Phi Kappa Psi experience that new and more emphases are being placed on it. In the past year two new offices have been created on the Executive Council: the Coordinator of Chapter Advisors and the Dean of Faculty Advisors. It is primarily

through these new positions that we will develop our commitment to strong advisorship by providing rich educational opportunities for our advisors, and I have asked our Director of Conferences to assist with this educational thrust by providing programs for advisors at the upcoming District Council/Woodrow Wilson Leadership Schools.

For you undergraduate Brothers particularly, consider the following perspective. Having good alumni advisors assumes having supportive and caring advisees. It is a two-way street—you student Brothers need to nurture strong advisorship to receive it. That is not to say that you will always listen to the advice rendered, but a sense of trust and mutual respect must be engendered, and there is a joint responsibility for its development.

So where do we start? All Chapters have formally nominated faculty and Chapter advisors to the Executive Council, and many of you have outstanding advisors now. We don't want merely "paper tigers." The Fraternity is already in gear to provide better support, but we have to get our advisors to these new programs. It is our goal to have at least one advisor representing every Chapter at the District Council/Woodrow Wilson Leadership Schools and also at the Grand Arch Council in New Orleans in August, 1988. Undergraduate Brothers, it is not too soon to invite them. Place the dates on their calendars now. Embrace them and help pay their way—your investment will be returned many fold.



Introduction

Are We Ready?

She was the wonder of her day. Built to surpass all earlier sea vessels, hers was a future of promise, and security. Her hull was of the most modern steel; her dimensions of such size that the oceans themselves no longer seemed quite so dangerous and threatening. Even her name evoked images such as "huge," and "of great strength." This ship, quite proudly, was proclaimed "unsinkable."

But on her very first voyage with paying passengers, from Liverpool to New York on April 15, 1912, the Titanic sank, carrying 1,635 persons to a watery grave. The newspaper headlines screamed . . . "How could this happen!?" and indeed, at least for a moment, all the "modern" world doubted man's ability to safeguard its citizens from nature's basest elements.

In today's modern fraternity operation, at the campus, District and National levels, we too must avoid a Titanic-like mind set. We pledge more people; we initiate more members; we construct new housing and refurbish older Chapter homes; and we do all this thinking "we are unsinkable." There is much in 1987 that Phi Psi can point to with great pride—we pledged more men than last year; we initiated more men than last year; Phi Psi's generous alumni gave more financial support than last year; we have many, many more Chapter housing improvement projects going on around the country than last year. So, all in all, the 1986–1987 year was a fantastic one for Phi Kappa Psi.

But can we simply sit back in smug satisfaction, and declare ourselves unsinkable? How foolish indeed would we be to do so! Instead, your Phi Psi leadership is attempting to identify our submerged icebergs, and even prepare enough lifeboats . . . just in case.

And identifying the "just in case" is part of the trick in working with fraternities today. In years past, antiestablishment student organizations, difficult college administrations, out-spoken neighborhood associations and other entities "outside" the fraternity movement were deemed our nemesis. It is therefore perhaps ironic that in the 1980s, when all of the above groups are often fraternity allies, we face one of our greatest challenges from within, and that is the liability insurance crises, caused by flagrant alcohol abuse among college students.

Part of the purpose of a well-run Phi Psi Chapter is to provide real, concrete leadership opportunities for students. And this includes encouragement of self-discipline procedures by peers, healthy social opportunities, financial responsibilities, and often property management experience. But what happens when the student concept of "fun" simply will not be tolerated? Certainly Phi Psi's greatest challenge, and that of all other student groups on the 1980's campus, is to educate our own student members (and alumni too!) on what is acceptable alcohol use.

Therefore, in addition to the work Phi Psi is doing by means of an insurance purchasing group to help contain liability insurance premium increases, we are also devoting much time and energy to assisting House Corporations and Chapters with effective loss control measures. It is simplistic to say we are our own worst enemy in the liability insurance crisis, but we do know more can be done to help our student Brothers devise more acceptable means of social and Fraternal activities.

Let me hasten to add that it is *much* too early to man the lifeboats on the good ship Phi Psi! As a matter of fact, the report year under review herewith was an excellent one. So please read on as we offer membership and other information for March 1, 1986 through February 28, 1987, in this, the Fraternity's 135th Annual Report.

Our Record

The Chapter roll, at 88 as of February 28, has never been larger in Phi Psi's history. Of these, 80 reported 1,469 initiates, and only in one other year have more new members joined our beloved Brotherhood. Three new Chapter installations since March 1 promise perhaps an all time record-breaking new member year for the current pledges awaiting initiation this next year.

Pledges number 1,847 for 1986-1987, as reported by 79 Chapters and 6 Colonies, an increase over 1,766 reported last year, and 1,630 the year before. The pledge numbers would have been even greater had the 9 Chapters reporting no pledges during the year been more

prompt in recording member recruitment success as appropriate.

The Fraternity's financial health remained sound this Annual Report year. A new \$5 per student Chapter Services Fee became active this past January 1, thus helping fund a new Director of Chapter Services and Risk Management position in Phi Psi's Headquarters. And, the Fraternity's generous alumnus Brothers made voluntary dollar gifts in excess of last year, also helping keep us financially more Hunter's Green than Cardinal Red . . . thank you, alumni!

Even with the new \$5/man/year Chapter Services Fee charged our student Brothers, it is interesting to note that Phi Psi's 4-year cost of membership is below the interfraternity average, compared to the 19 other men's fraternities that provide the same tangible benefits (member badge, certificate, wallet card, pledge Manual, and lifetime subscription to THE SHIELD). And, we still operate the Fraternity on student revenues of under 45%, with investment income, alumni gifts, and enthusiastic assistance from Phi Psi's educational foundation, the Endowment Fund, comprising a majority of operating funds. If it were not for these other sources of revenue, undergraduate pledge, initiation and conference fees would have to more than double if current programs were preserved. It's therefore prudent for Fraternity finances to look to the undergraduate member to boost the student income percentage a bit in the future.

Another project of considerable proportions completed this year was Phi Psi's first video, "A Proud Heritage," shepherded by John V. Ciccarelli, Cal State Northridge '72. Then serving Phi Psi as the volunteer Director of Membership, Brother Ciccarelli's 15 minute video is designed to help Chapters and Colonies in rush activities, and also would be appropriate for Fraternity Education with pledges and members, as well. We owe special thanks to last year's Educational Leadership Consultant Staff for their hard work writing the script, and other creative production assistance: Thomas C. Pennington, Texas '80; Kenneth L. Voise, Arkansas '80; John T Gerzema, Ohio State '81; and David L. Rickabaugh, California-Santa Barbara '83. "A Proud Tradition" was debuted at the 1986 Grand Arch Council last August and was enthusiasticially received. (Please contact the Fraternity Headquarters if interested in a copy of the video.)

If we envision ourselves as the good ship Phi Psi, plying the north Atlantic waters that April day in 1912, do we further envision any possible submerged icebergs? That is a difficult question to answer, but one your Fraternity leadership asks often, and loudly enough to be heard above all the compliments our healthy picture otherwise encourages. We have to be wise enough to enjoy success for its real worth, and not just for its value in the eyes of our beholders. For that is our true test of purpose . . . do we as an institution, a volunteer association of educated men; do we *truly* influence men for the

better, both while in college and after leaving it? If we do not, then there are other organizations that could easily take our place.

But the indicators are all here for your review . . . outstanding scholarship, campus leadership, healthy membership numbers, increased participation by alumni, larger Chapter roll, additional Colonies . . . today's Phi Kappa Psi does make a difference to not only her members, but to her host institutions. So, at least for another year, we will restore those lifeboats, and plan on yet another banner year upcoming. And as we hone in on the 1990s, Phi Psi's 14 decades, shall we all proudly proclaims as did our Founders cry: "We live, and we shall flourish!"

The "Average" Chapter

The average Chapter in Phi Kappa Psi had a good report year, representing activity from March 1, 1986-February 28, 1987. The model Chapter has the following statistics: 66 undergraduates, 22 of whom are pledges, of which 18 become initiated members. The typical undergraduate Chapter lives in a building owned by a Phi Psi alumni house-holding corporation; the property is most likely an aging 40 year-old (or older), with building, land and contents valued at over \$600,000.

The average Chapter had a net increase of 4 men compared to last year, including members and pledges, although the range varied greatly from a 44 man *increase*, to a 37 man *decrease* in membership. The typical active Chapter has initiated 854 men over the years, and has celebrated their 65th anniversary of founding on their campus.

Membership

The year in review added 1,469 new initiates to Phi Psi's Grand Membership Roll, bringing to a total 80,903 men who have joined the Fraternity since February 19, 1852. The Chapters pledged an average 22 men, initiating 18 of them. The 1,847 pledges reported this year compares to 1,766 last year.

Progress continues on decreasing our "lost" address list. A regular section of each issue of THE SHIELD is devoted to finding "lost" Brothers, but the job is of course never ending; if you know of any Brother not currently receiving Fraternity mail, please forward his name and address to: Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity, 510 Lockerbie Street, Indianapolis, IN 46202.

New Chapters

Phi Psi did not charter a new Chapter during this report year under review, March 1, 1986-February 28, 1987; however, three months into the current report year, the Fraternity proudly added three new Chapters to

Looking For Tom Campbell

Why should one care where an obscure Presbyterian minister who died 125 years ago is buried? It's the sort of thing amateur genealogists and local antiquarians bother about, but hardly the Fraternity's most pressing concern. After all, no one has yet determined where Mozart lies in Vienna. Why should it make any difference whether we know about an old Phi Psi named Tom Campbell?

Why, indeed? Those who have read the annals of Phi Kappa Psi know it was Thomas Cochran Campbell, *Pennsylva*nia Alpha 1853, who created the Fraternity's Ritual, devised its operating procedures, conducted most of the early correspondence, worked prodigiously to establish the Fraternity as a sturdy and growing presence, and above all inspired his Brothers to cherish the Fraternity. In fact, it was Tom Campbell, even more than the Founders, Letterman and Moore, who enabled Phi Kappa Psi to live and flourish.

Hence, at the very least, to find the grave of Tom Campbell is to pay a just debt long overdue. But, in a larger sense, to find Tom Campbell is to reclaim a heritage too precious to be lost or forgotten: the original meaning and purpose of Phi Kappa Psi. In effect, then,

the search for Tom Campbell was more than an act of piety; it was an expedition to explore the true sources of Phi Kappa Psi.

According to the Fraternity's Centennial History, Campbell died on June 8, 1862 at the age of 26 in Marion, Ohio. There he was buried, say the History and the alumni records of Washington and Jefferson College. He had been an interim minister for a few months at the Presbyterian Church in Marion. He left a widow, the former Jennie Gormley, whom he had married in January 1860. There is no mention of the cause of death.

Through the years, a few Chapters of

the Fraternity, notably Ohio Alpha, and individual Phi Psis, notably J. Duncan Campbell, Penn Epsilon, (a distinguished Phi Psi historian and journalist, but no kin to Tom) tried to find the grave, but without success and without leaving a trail of clues they had followed. Marion is neither so big nor complex a city as to baffle a hunter. Its most famous attraction is the mausoleum of Warren Gamaliel Harding, which rivals that of a Persian satrap or an imperial potentate. Marion is the kind of town that remembers who is buried there, and where. But there is little to go on as far as Campbell is concerned because the city's health records did not begin until 1867, and the newspaper files for 1861-65 are missing. The history of the First Presbyterian Church says: "The Rev. William Campbell, a young man, supplied the pulpit for a time during Pastor Fry's service as Chaplain of the 82nd Regiment in the Civil War, and died here." Inquiries to public officials turned up nothing, and a local historian checked the burial records of the city's cemeteries as well as those of Marion County and the surrounding counties. Neither the Columbus Presbytery nor the alumni office of W & J could provide an answer, although the latter did list Campbell's attendance from 1856 until 1859 at what was then the Western Theological seminary in Pittsburgh.

If no grave could be found in Marion nor record of a burial, what did that suggest? The Fraternity had, after all, made no great effort throughout the years to pay Tom Campbell more than ordinary respect. Was this a mystery almost as intriguing as that of the man himself? The authoritative source on Campbell is William Keady's "An Old Boy's Recollections", published in 1881 and reprinted in the Centennial History. Keady, probably Campbell's closest friend in the Fraternity, sketched a striking portrait of the Rev. James R. and Mary Campbell's eldest son, born at sea and reared in northern India, who was brought to the United States in 1847 for schooling in Philadelphia. Resistant to the stern discipline of the Presbyterians, he was placed in the House of Refuge, a combination orphanage, reform school, and settlement house. In 1853, Campbell was entrusted to the care of Will Keady, a printer's devil, who had earned enough money and gained enough support from local Presbyterians to enter college at Jefferson. Campbell went along with Keady as a ward, released, as it were, to his custody.

A colorful but inauspicious beginning: a poor, working boy, older than his classmates, and a much younger juvenile delinquent (at least in the eyes of the Presbyterians). According to Keady's account, Campbell cut a strange figure at Jefferson, set apart from other students by his speech, dress, manner, and temperament. Sons of foreign missionaries were no novelties at Jefferson, but Campbell assuredly was. Then as now, young men can be cruel to those markedly different from themselves, feeling their own conforming selves challenged by odd men out. From what Keady wrote of him, Campbell was not so much a self-conscious, rebellious nonconformist as he was simply different because of his background, upbringing, and peculiar endowment. That he should have been admitted to Phi Kappa Psi, or for that matter, to any fraternity at all, testifies to the Founders' judgment of his character as well as the tolerance of the other eight early members. Campbell was the eleventh initiate; subsequently, Keady was persuaded to join in 1854 as the seventeenth. It's fair to say any group that included Tom Campbell can be called oddly assorted.

From the very start, he thrust himself into the leadership of the Chapter, taking on chores and inventing projects the others were wise, perhaps relieved to have him pursue. It is also fair to say Campbell went at the work with missionary zeal. Just so. Keady recalls his quirks and crotchets candidly yet affectionately, as if to say "there was never anyone quite like Tom Campbell." And "we never knew quite what to make of him, but we loved him all the better."

Vivid as Keady's portrait is, much is left to the imagination. Given the suggestions of erratic, compulsive behavior, frequent melancholy, and surges of feverish energy, one is led to suspect that he was a manic-depressive. Psychobiography is notoriously tricky, especially in the hands of amateur psychologizers. Still, such conjecture can be plausibly advanced on the basis of what Keadv observed and what others seemed to corroborate. It allows for a tentative, partial interpretation of Campbell's personality and experiences, although it certainly cannot be said to "explain" the whole man. If it be true, manic-depressive illness (described in 19th century literature as melancholy of Romanticism characteristic) may indicate what in part Campbell's associates found strange and inaccessible in him. It may also help to account for the apparent difficulties he had in being ordained as a minister and called to a pastorate.


Whatever the whole truth, there was something about Campbell, something deeply embedded in his nature that fascinated those around him. If one reads Keady's lines, the inference is fairly plain: Campbell unsettled people. He

was unremarkable in appearance: short, slightly built, dark complexioned, not good-looking but not homely out of the ordinary. Despite that, his presence transmitted energy with such intensity that it made others take notice. It may have been the constant, penetrating look in his eyes, not quite a stare but still a probing, searching look that caught and held anyone he spoke to. His voice may have kept the echoes of a Celtic lilt, a rhapsodic fluency mixed with the languid accent of the Anglo-Indians, themselves more voluble than either the

English or the Americans of the day. And he may have been more impulsive of gesture and manner than the genteel standard considered proper.

Perhaps he was at once animated and withdrawn, charming and distant, hinting at a certain wildness, which, while by no means fierce or rude, was enough to put off respectable folk unused to enthusiasm. Indeed, Campbell may have been more vibrantly alive, more insistently present, more directly personal than nice young gentleman of the right sort. If he made some feel ill at ease, he

must have stirred others to sense a compelling sincerity, an authenticity of self that cut keenly through pretense and affectation. "Enthusiasm" is derived from the Greek words that mean "possessed by a god" which in his own way Tom Campbell surely was.

Hence, it was no wonder Campbell should pose a mystery to those who sought his grave. Had he died a suicide and thus been buried in an unmarked grave in unhallowed ground? Was his death the result of a scandal once known but now overlooked by the Fraternity? Would it be wiser not to inquire into his last days, to let the whole matter drop? Or had the Fraternity failed to recognize his achievement? Did Phi Kappa Psi owe him a debt of honor that obliged his Brothers to discover the truth and thus, in a sense relieve his name of any suspicion?

Accordingly, by the fall of 1985 it was high time to make a thorough and, one hoped, conclusive search. After inquiries in Marion and at W & J had brought in little, it was time to cast the net wider among the Presbyterians, a bookish people who keep good accounts. The First Presbyterian Church of Bloomington, Indiana (which Indiana University's first President Andrew Wylie and his wife Margaret, William Henry Letterman's older sister, joined when they moved to Hoosierland), suggested trying the Presbyterian Historical Society in Philadelphia. The Mystagogue Emeritus Walter Lee Sheppard, Jr., New York Alpha '29, and a Philadelphian, offered to help, and on about March 12, 1986, (the 150th anniversary of Campbell's birth on the Indian Ocean), he reported that one of his operatives had come across Campbell's obituary in The Presbyterian Historical Almanac for 1863, which, for the first time, provided a detailed account of Tom Campbell's life and career. One sentence in particular stood out: "His remains were taken to Allegheny city (sic) for interment." Reference librarians at Indiana University soon located Allegheny city on a mid-19th century map within the central section of what is now Pittsburgh. Letters to the coroner and the public health department of Pittsburgh went unanswered, as did a few other local inquiries. It became clear that the municipal bureaucracy could be penetrated only in person. On, then, to Pittsburgh.

When the subject of Tom Campbell came up at the Grand Arch Council in Scottsdale, Arizona, in August 1986, one young man seemed particularly interested. That, bless his heart, was Stephen Lasday of Pennsylvania Eta and Pittsburgh, who took note of Campbell's connections with Allegheny city

and the Presbyterians, both orthodox and reformed, and volunteered to take it from there. Calling on his familiarity with the vicinity, a liberal education at Franklin & Marshall, and the doggedness of a pre-med, Brother Lasday triangulated the evidence and arrived at a solution. On August 25, 1986, he called to announce that he had found the grave of Thomas Cochran Campbell in the Allegheny Cemetery on the edge of downtown Pittsburgh. His letter, written that day, expresses what he did and how he felt more poignantly than any paraphrase could do.

During the days that followed, he and another Penn Etan, Scott Leib, returned to the Gormley family plot to clear away the overgrowth from Campbell's tombstone, make rubbings of it, and take photographs of the site. Although Steve Lasday's discovery may not match Howard Carter's excavation of the tomb of Tutankhamen, it stands as a singular event in Phi Kappa Psi. Beyond that, it means even more because of what it symbolizes.

On the burial certificate issued on June 10, 1862 and in the *Presbyterian Almanac* obituary, the cause of death is given as "brain fever" and "affection of the brain." Translated from 19th-century medical parlance, this means a form of meningitis, probably tubercular, if the symptoms presented in the obituary are accurate. The finding thus puts to rest any untoward suspicion.

Thanks to Brother Sheppard's exertions, additional information about the Campbell family has come to light, again from the Presbyterian Almanac for 1863. The Reverend James Robert Campbell, father of Thomas, also died in 1862 on September 18 at Landour, India, and is included in the same edition of the Almanac that carries his son's. What was then northern India, the Punjab, where the Campbells carried our their missionary work, is now part of Pakistan. Despite efforts by Brother John Dallas Stempel, Indiana Beta '79, U.S. consul general in Madras, no further information about the Campbells has yet developed, although Brother Omar Qureshi of Penn Eta and Rawalpindi, Pakistan, intends to take up the search when he returns home in the summer of 1987. (By the way, the town formerly called Campbellpur in the Punjab, now known as Hasan Abdal, was not named for the Rev. Dr. Campbell, but for Sir Colin Campbell, a 19th century military hero, at least to the British.)

Does the discovery of the grave in Allegheny Cemetery provide a final answer? In the sense that the essential facts of his life and career are at last established, and that there is a satisfactory

Location of Gravesite

Steven D. Lasday, Franklin and Marshall, relays in this letter to Mystagogue Kent Owen the details of the actual location of Campbell's grave site.

25 August 1986

Dear Kent,

I am happy to report that the Great Search for Thomas Cochran Campbell has come to a successful end today. I have just returned from the Allegheny Cemetery, where lies Rev. Thomas C. Campbell, on the Gormley-Paulson plot. . . .

I sat down on the floor with my phone and prepared to spend several hours dedicated to making progress. Within fifteen minutes, I had got around to calling the right cemetery, and much to my surprise, our Ritualist was in their records. I asked them to check the plot owner and year of death, and it seemed that I found the right Thomas Campbell. After throwing my pile of research notes into the air, I ran upstairs, grabbed my camera, went to get new batteries (they died at the GAC), and proceeded to get lost in my own hometown.

I pulled into the AAA, got a map of my city, and asked directions to the Allegheny Cemetery. I found the cemetery down the street, and pulled in. While most would have gone to the main office to ask directions, I resolved that whatever mystical spirits that work for Phi Psi would lead me right to the grave, the heavens would part, and Willie and Chuck themselves would descend from on high, and grant me the Fraternity's Medal of Honor. After 30 minutes of driving through what is a very scenic place, I asked a groundskeeper where section 21 was. I was in the wrong place. After finding the proper section, I parked, and proceeded to search. Then I saw a worn "E-L-L" on a distant headstone. I ran over with camera poised, and saw the grave of a one Lula Bell. Last letters were right, but it wasn't him.

After a period of time, I found I had wandered off the section onto another. It was about then I realized that if we waited 124 years, we could wait a little longer, and Tom wasn't exactly waiting for me. If I took time, he wouldn't leave in a huff.

I decided it was ludicrous to rush; but I was filled with adrenaline. I considered enlisting all the Pittsburgh Phi Psi's and walking through the cemetery in a long line, but I sharpened my resolve, and started on another lap of the section. Then I saw, literally out of the corner of my eye, Somebody Gormley Paulson. Sure enough, there were a whole

slew of Gormley's. I found James Gormley, but nowhere on the lot was our man.

I rechecked the tombstones, and then I noticed some headstones in the ground near the perimeter of the lot. As the anticipation heightened. I ran the last several steps as I thought I could make out the letters OMAS. C. CAMP. I dropped to my knees beside the stone and cleared the grass away, which had encroached several inches onto the stone from all sides. I remember last week as I was making endless calls to various agencies, I honestly did not feel I would find Brother Campbell in the days remaining before I had to return to Franklin and Marshall. Most of the writing, and there is several lines worth, is worn. One of the few words that were clear was "INDIA."

I tried to take a rubbing, but the paper in my car was thick and the pencil didn't have much of a point. At this point, I was wondering who had been to visit the Gormley's and had ignored Tom. I felt something should be said, but I didn't know what, and I was the only upright person in the area anyway. I think I said the passwords and "We haven't forgotten you, Brother Campbell." It seemed appropriated, if only to appease my sense of decorum after scraping anxiously at his headstone trying to make out words...

I took some pictures of the stone and the area, and I remember noting that the simplicity of his stone compared to the towering obelisks across the road seemed appropriate for the man who put together the ceremony and moral order that I find so moving every time I read. My brothers sometimes joke when I get into bed and read the Ritual, but I really think they ought to go over it sometimes. I have been affectionately dubbed "Junior Mystagogue of Penn Eta". . .

P.S. Last night in bed I think it finally dawned on me what I've done. I did a lot of reflecting. If he died at 26, then he had to have written the Ritual when he was in my age group, if not as an undergraduate. In either case, he was my peer. All the import of the Ritual-was it written by a college student? If so, then the whole idea of undergraduate rule seems to become more special to me. And I think that an undergraduate found him-with the invaluable help and guidance of yourself, of course-has some sort of poetic justice to it all. I think the next time we initiate new Brothers, or the next time I read the Ritual, it will be very special and personal to me.

ending, it does. But in the larger sense of what Tom Campbell should mean to the Fraternity, it serves to raise more questions. And not only because there is so little information about his childhood in India, school days in Philadelphia and in the House of Refuge, years at Western Seminary and short periods as churches in Pennsylvania, Ohio, and Michigan,

and most of all, his wife Jennie and their marriage. There is always the possibility, however remote, that in some attic or cellar on old trunk contains diaries, journals, letters, notebooks, which could be of help. Even so, the basic facts, now set in order, outline a troubled, tragically brief life.

But the larger question that remains to

be answered lends itself only in part so such matters of fact. What is the real significance of Thomas Cochran Campbell's legacy to Phi Kappa Psi? How should he be properly remembered and honored? Apart from the emphatic testimony of Will Keady, the full extent of Campbell's work cannot be measured, largely because most of the materials he composed no longer exist. Consequently, one must take the word of early members that his creations and services formed the very foundation of the Fraternity. Although it is impossible to specify everything he made and did, Keady affirms that the elements central and essential to the Ritual are his work: these have remained the same through the revisions made by Keady himself, Samuel Niccolls, Robert Lowry, Henry Scudder, Walter Lee Sheppard Sr., Sion Bass Smith, Harlan Selby, John Henry Frizell, among the more prominent.

Despite the refinement of language and procedure, the root meaning of Phi Kappa Psi, its ideals, symbols, and principles have remained intact. In theory as in practice, "the eternal principles" can be presented in new settings and through precepts, admonitions, and forms of language and ceremony different from those of earlier generations. That is the strength of Campbells' vision.

From his religious backgrounds, Campbell derived the essence of the Judeo-Christian tradition and made it fit with what he had learned in India of the Hindu, Islamic, and Buddhist traditions. The Ritual he devised is remarkable and at the time of its creation, unique, for its non-sectarian openness to all men who love God and seek to do His will, no matter what their worship may assume. The Ritual owes much of its essential value to the moral philosophy of Plato as embodied in Socrates as he appears throughout the dialogues, although there remain no direct quotations from Plato's writings in the modern version. Moreover, there are resonant echoes of Aristotle's "Nichomachean Ethics" and Cicero's "On Duties."

Above all, the primacy of personal integrity and moral responsibility is charged with a conception of manly honor, which reconciles the ancient code of chivalry to the decency and lovingkindness of the true gentleman. What could have been a pretentious hodgepodge of conflicting doctrines and florid ideals is expressed with simplicity, dignity, and clarity. While less than universal, the Ritual is expansive enough to encompass good men of every condition. In its stress on a personal constitution of checks and balances, it takes both a classical and an American perspective on how one's life should be governed to the

1863 Obituary

What follows is the obituary from the Presbyterian Historical Almanac and Annual Remembrance of the Church dated 1863. It was written by a Mr. Joseph M. Nelson and is the only known obituary of Tom Campbell. CAMPBELL, THOMAS C.—The son of the late Rev. Dr. James R. and Mary Campbell, was born on board of an American vessel on the Indiana Ocean, March 12, 1836, whilst his parents were on their way to India as Foreign Missionaries of the Reformed Presbyterian Church.

In 1848 he came to this country and went to school in Philadelphia, Pa., and thence to Jefferson College, Canonsburgh, Pa., where he graduated in 1856. He entered the Western Theological Seminary, where after a full course of study he graduated in 1859. He was licensed by Ohio Presbytery in 1858, and preached a short time during that summer at Somerset, Pa. After finishing his Seminary course he preached at Constantine, Mich., Upper Sandusky, and also at Sandusky City, Ohio. At this last place he decided to accept the call which was placed in his hands, and he was ordained by Western Reserve Presbytery in the Westminster Church, Cleveland, Ohio, in the autumn of 1860; for various reasons he was not installed; he continued to preach until May, 1861, he then left for the purpose of supplying the pulpit of the Westminster Church at Cleveland, Ohio, during the absence of the pastor, Frederick T. Brown, D.D., as Chaplain of Col. Tyler's Regiment, Ohio Volunteer Infantry. On the return of Dr. Brown, in February, 1862, he removed to Marion, Ohio, to supply the pulpit of the church at that place during the absence of its pastor, Rev. H. B. Fry, who was Chaplain of the 82nd Regiment, Ohio Volunteer Infantry. During this period he was taken sick, and after an illness of two weeks he died June 8, 1862. His disease was somewhat obscure but it was doubtless an affection of the brain. His articulation became indistinct, and for the last week of his sickness it was only at rare intervals that anything like intelligible conversation could be held with him; his constitution was of an East India type, delicate and nervous.

During his short pilgrimage as a preacher he had greatly endeared himself to many of God's people.

He was quite popular, owing to the beauty of his style as well as the ease and gracefulness of his delivery. The congregations visibly increased under his ministrations, and his earnestness and zeal, sustained as it was by very pleasing and genial manners in private intercourse, would have made him eminently successful. His extemporaneous addresses on Wednesday evening lectures and at prayer meetings were exceedingly interesting, scriptural and spiritual. He was greatly loved and greatly mourned by the members of the congregation in Marion.

He married Miss Jane Gormley, January, 1860, of Allegheny city (sic), Pa., (a daughter of James Gormley Esq., an Elder of the Reformed Presbyterian Church in that city,) who survives him. His remains were taken to Allegheny city for interment.

REV. PHILIPH MOWRY of Philadelphia, speaks of him as follows: "Mr. Campbell was a man of ardent temperament; though small of stature, his well knit frame and sparkling eye gave evidence not only of an active mind, but also of a physical constitution, capable of sustaining prolonged mental effort. With an exuberance of vitality, he was of a restless disposition, quick in his movements, and enthusiastic in all he undertook. His mind was rather of the imaginative cast. His feelings were strong and somewhat impulsive. By all he was confessed to be a man of no ordinary talent; but his reflective faculty was not always as rapid as his perceptive and creative powers. His impulsiveness, however, was more the result of youthful fervor, exhaustless and impassioned energy of great nervous vitality, than a radical defect of judgment. For a judgment, keen and decisive, was manifest when the first rush of feeling had expended itself. He was of a very social turn, and his remarkable vivacity made him a cheerful companion. Though somewhat reserved in general intercourse, to his intimate friends, he was like a child, candid, trustful, communicative. In whatever circle he mingled, if he did not impress, he was always regarded with interest. There was something peculiarly animating in his presence; lively in voice and manner his earnestness was contagious.

best effect.

In its adherence to moral obligations, the Ritual implicity affirms "the great joy of serving others" as the necessary concomitant for the attainment of selfrespect, the "peace and harmony" that come to the good man who lives a wellmeasured life. Campbell distilled the essence from the Judeo-Christian religious tradition, and combining that with the essence of the Greco-Roman moral tradition. Thus, he expressed what he believed to be the moral condition of the good man, the gentleman who strives to advance human dignity, who conducts his life with a constant vision of noble ideals, principles, and purposes. Campbell was also thoroughly Celtic and Protestant, and it may be no coincidence that the Fraternity's first badge, the monogram of Phi and Psi, resembles the Celtic cross.

That he accomplished this work during his 18th through his 20th years is all the more astonishing, no matter to what extent he may have understood his own intentions or the implications of what he had created. Although it is again impossible to identify the exact passages in the texts Campbell studied, it is fair to say that the spirit of such classical works informs the whole of the Ritual, even if the letter is not precisely stated. Perhaps that is the right way to express what Campbell gave to the Fraternity: it is his spirit in which Phi Kappa Psi lives and moves and has its being. Hence, what we possess is not the mere letter of his work, but its larger spirit, which, like brotherly love, should animate our every thought.

At his death Charles Page Thomas Moore was 73, a wise judge in the fullness of his years. William Henry Letterman died at 48, a compassionate physician in the prime of his maturity. But Thomas Cochran Campbell was 26, barely grown to manhood, a bridegroom, still struggling to find himself as a minister and as a man. Their lives, careers, and destinies were decidedly different one from another; yet in the ideals, principles, and purposes their lives manifested, these three expressed all that is noble and generous in man. In any account of what Phi Kappa Psi represents, these three belong together—as the Phi, the Kappa, and the Psi belong together.

Allegheny Cemetery is magnificent, fine lawns, stately trees, an array of tombs, monuments, and mausoleums. It is a great city of the dead, where the once rich, powerful, and prominent of Pittsburgh are buried. Here lie Stephen Foster, the foremost American composer of the mid-19th century, and Lillian Russell, a celebrated beauty and

actress of the turn of the century. Steel, aluminum, coal and oil magnates, political, cultural, and social figures, the builders and leaders of Pittsburgh—many Phi Psis among them. Here, too, is the family plot of James Gormley, and behind it, set apart from the others, in death as in life, is the flat, white stone of the Rev. Thomas Cochran Campbell. Overshadowed by the upright headstone of the Gormleys, the grave is plain, modest, almost lost to the eye, its carved words worn away by 125 years of natural elements, pollution, and inattention.

To find Tom Campbell, you must know where to look and, then, how to see. It is an inward as much as an outward act of vision. Even during the long years that passed before a young Phi Psi went out to look for him, the presence of Tom Campbell was ever in the midst of the Fraternity. He once persuaded his Brothers to accept "vivemus et vigemus" as their pass word and rallying cry, for he was convinced that the Fraternity he had brought to life would

inevitably grow to become a strong, steady force for the good. Call it a matter of faith, if you will. It was his conviction that Phi Kappa Psi would live and flourish. To that end his life as well as his work was an act of faith.

There should be no new stone to replace the one that has marked his grave since his young widow put it there in 1862, and there can be no other marker. Let there be in our memories:

Florida Alpha Chartering

The day had finally come. Since fall 1985, the Florida Alpha Colony of Phi Kappa Psi had been anxiously awaiting their chartering. Sixty-one young men were about to experience the day for which they had long been waiting and working. Saturday, March 7, was the climax of the week of preparation and the culmination of two years of diligent work.

The house was cleaned thoroughly and all of the soon-to-be Brothers were studying zealously in anticipation of the national pledge exam. Educational Leadership Consultant Joe Siebert arrived Wednesday, March 4. He and fellow consultant Terry Harper proctered the exam Thursday.

The installation team arrived on Friday, March 6, and included SWGP Dr. David F. Hull Jr.; SWVGP J. Robert Meserve; SWP Col. Robert E. Lazzell; SWAG Paul J. LaPuzza; Executive Director Gary B. Angstadt; Attorney General Bayard M. Graf; Chaplain Stephen D. McWhorter, SJ; Mystagogue Kent C. Owen; Scholarship Director John F. Buck; Director of Alumni Relations, George H. Kincaid; and Director of Fraternity Education, Timothy P. McCourt. Also in attendance were all six Archons: Kevin R. Meehan, Robert E. Lazzell II, Thomas R. Goodwin, Stephen A. Jones, William J. Blanke, and Richard K. Clark.

The reception for officers, alumni and guests was held on Friday, March 6, at the Chapter home from 5:00 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. Initiation took place on Saturday, March 7, at the Church of St. John's at 9:00 a.m. The Tallahassee Hilton was the site of the Installation Banquet on Saturday evening. Symposiarch for the occasion was Executive Director Emeritus Ralph D. Daniel. Dr. David F. Hull, Jr., was the banquet speaker, and gifts were presented by Executive Director Gary B. Angstadt.

History of Florida Alpha

In March 1961, the Faculty Fraternity

Committee decided to allow Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity to establish a Colony at FSU. The Fraternity was informed it could begin in the fall. After a year of hard work and an excellent colonization program, the Florida Alpha Chapter was established. In the following years, the Greek system at FSU had grown and was solidifying its purpose and goals. The year 1968 marked the peak year of participation in Greek life on the FSU campus. Nearly 3,000 members belonged to 23 fraternities and 20 sororities. Not until 1984 would those figures be equalled again. The 1970's marked the fourth decade that the influence of fraternities was felt at Florida State University. It was, however, a troubled time for the nation, and fraternity enrollment had declined across the nation. On May 27, 1971, the university received notice of the suspension of the Phi Kappa Psi charter for various reasons. During its first charter period, the Chapter initiated only 88 Brothers.

In October 1985, a small group of

men set out to re-establish the Florida Alpha Chapter. Phi Psi was chosen by these students because of its strong national organization and its dedication to the noble ideals and principles which have helped it maintain a unique and reputable position among the nation's fraternities.

After some early growing pains and poor decision-making, the Colony was re-organized with new leaders in February 1986. Upon their return after the summer, the Colony had 16 members who lived in a six bedroom house near campus. The fall semester saw the Colony undertake an ambitious program of involvement in the Greek community as well as a continual rush program. By the end of the semester, a total of 41 men had been initiated into the Colony and a larger house on Park Avenue was secured. The Colony was able to pledge 25 men during spring rush 1987, and immediately began to take on a visible and viable role in Greek life at Florida State University. At the IFC Leadership Awards ceremony, Florida Alpha President Louis Bode was awarded the Fraternity President of the Year Award.

History of the Florida State University

The Florida Legislature passed an act in 1851 authorizing the establishment of two state colleges: one east of the Suwannee River and one west. It wasn't until 1857 that the school, then known as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, enrolled its first student. The institution was known as West Florida Seminary and later as Florida University in the late 1800's. In the early 1900's it was known as Florida State College, but from 1909-1947 it was called the Florida State College for Women. In 1947 the Florida State Legislature made the institution coeducational again and designated its current title of the Florida State University. Since that time the university has experienced a four-fold increase in student enrollment to a total of 23,000 students with rapid expansion of its graduate programs.

He was district manager for the American Appraisal Company, and was named "Author of the Year" by the St. Louis chapter of the National Association of Accountants in 1960. He retired from the Lloyd Thomas Company in 1961 and moved to Fort Myers, Florida.

EVAN B. LLOYD, Kansas '19, Bradenton, FL, March 15. He was the former executive director of the Greater Johnstown (PA) Chamber of Commerce; the Cleveland Commission on Higher Education; and director of development at Columbia University. During World War II he was assistant director of the Pennsylvania War Fund. He moved from the Cleveland area to Bradenton in 1973.

CHESTER K. HAYES, Wittenberg '22, Arlington Heights, IL, May 9, 1986. He was a pioneer in consumer education and helped develop the suburban newspaper industry. He served as vice president of Hayes, Loeb & Company, a public relations firm which introduced domestic air-conditioning and pressure cooking. He started a public relations service for Sears, Roebuck & Company and expanded into

organized research and consumer education programs sponsored by manufacturers and retailers, then authored "The Art of Buying Carefully." Serving as executive director of the Household Science Institute, he organized and directed the first Midwest Conference on Homemaking and the American Homemaking Conference. He helped the National Better Business Bureau organize the first business-consumer conference. He coordinated programs between industry and the War Food Administration during World War II, and received a special citation for his work. He formed a publicity service and distribution firm in 1950 called Associated Release Service, Inc., and sold it in 1963. In 1960 he established the Suburban Press Foundation and served as its executive director until its merger into Suburban Newspapers of America in 1971. Hayes was president of Suburban Market Communications, Inc., from 1963 to 1979.

MYRON E. SHANNON, Oregon '23, Klamath Falls, OR, December 13, 1986. He began his business career in 1925 to work for a bank in Klamath Falls which later became the First National Bank of Oregon, now the First Interstate Bank. He retired as branch manager in 1967.

ROBERT ALFRED JUNG, Wisconsin '26, Sheboygan, WI, February 23, 1987. In 1927, Jung and his father formed the Alfred Jung Co. He operated Jung Jewelry Store in Sheboygan from 1952 to 1955. He served as president of Jung Building, Inc., and Jungs, Inc. Clothing which began in 1964.

HAROLD MANSFIELD HAUSER, Kansas '26, Marion, KS, February 9. After graduation he attended Harvard Law School one year and then graduated from Washburn Law School in Topeka in 1933. He practiced law in Wichita for one year, then became assistant attorney general. He practiced law in Marion, KS, and was Republican County Chairman and was elected county attorney. Before World War II he entered the oil business and developed production over a broad area in Kansas. During the war he enlisted in the Navy and held the rank of Lieutenant and was a gunnery training officer. After the war he became active in farming and was a Hereford cattle breeder. He was elected president of the Kansas Hereford Association and was active in the affairs of that organization. He was a leading KU fan who helped recruit athletes and provide scholarships for talented students.

WILLIAM H. NIMS, *Illinois Alpha '27*, New York City, February 20, 1987. He had been with the Ford Foundation until his retirement several years ago. Prior to that time, he had served as assistant dean of men at Northwestern. He was a member of Phi Beta Kappa.

BRUCE W. HACKSTAFF, Cornell '28, Huntington, NY, July 23, 1986. He had retired as senior consultant and former vice president of Schwarz Services International, Ltd., in Mt. Vernon. He was also the former vice president of the F & M Schaefer Brewing Company in Brooklyn.

HUGH BENNETT RUCKMAN, JR., Texas '29, Karnes City, TX, September 5, 1986. Born in Austin, he served in the Navy during World War II. He began his career with the Karnes County National Bank and retired as president in 1985. He last served as chairman of the board. Active in civic affairs, he was on the board of the Karnes City Chamber of Commerce, the Boy Scouts, and served as secretary of the local Red Cross. In 1955 he received the Karnes City Man of the Year Citizenship Award. His father was a founding member of Texas Alpha. Survivors include two sons: Hugh Bennett Ruckman III, Texas '64, and Robert Dalton Ruckman, Texas '68.

THOMAS E. REILLY, Colorado '31, Indianapolis, March 2. He was board chairman emeritus and director of Reilly Tar and Chemical Corporation, and had retired in 1977 after 40 years with the firm which his father founded. He earned a BS in civil engineering and also did graduate work at Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He joined the family firm in 1937 and was promoted to vice president in 1942. He held that position until 1959 when he was named vice president and treasurer. He was president from 1973 to 1975 and then he became board chairman. As president he was instrumental in the corporation's expansion to Belgium where its wholly-owned subsidiary was opened in 1974. The business grew to include 19 plants nationwide. Besides facilities in Indianapolis and Belgium, Reilly Tar has plants in Illinois, Ohio, Texas, and Utah. EMERY EUGENE MAY JR., Penn State '33, St. Louis, December 20, 1986. He retired in 1977 from the H.C. Cole Milling Company where he was vice president and general manager.

ROBERT C. VALLERY, Ohio State '34, Waverly, OH, January 21, 1987. Before and after serving in the army during World War II, he was co-owner of Vallery Ford and Vallery Farms. He had also served as director of the First National Bank of Waverly. Active in harness racing, he was part owner of numerous harness horses which included two world champions. He was actively associated with

Scioto Downs, the United States Trotting Association, The Ohio Horsemen's Association, and many other local organizations. Survivors include his brother, Harry T. Vallery, *Ohio State '37*.

DR. ELMER K. JONES, Texas '35, Amarillo, TX, March 18. He received his doctor of medicine degree in 1941 from the University Medical branch in Galveston. During World War II, he served as a captain with the 56th evacuation hospital in North Africa and Italy, and received a citation for care of patients while under fire at Anzio. After the Army he completed his specialty training in internal medicine at Tulane University. He was a member and past president of the County Medical Society, a member of the American Board of Internal Medicine and a Fellow of the American College of Physicians. He was a charter member and past president of Texas Society of Internal Medicine. He was a life member of Panhandle Heritage Foundation and Panhandle Plains Historical Society. He had also served on the board of trustees of the College of Santa Fe in Santa Fe, NM.

BRYDON H. LIDLE SR., Dickinson '35, Middletown, PA, April 23. He was with the Pennsylvania State Health Department and had previously served as deputy secretary, personnel director and office of Medicare director. He had been personnel director for the Department of Public Welfare and executive assistant with the American Public Health Association. He was also a research analyst for the Pennsylvania Economy League Inc. and administrative officer of the state Civil Service Commission. He created publications for the U.S. Supply Depot and Civil Service Commission employee handbooks. He also played baseball for eight years in the Eastern Illinois Baseball League. Survivors include his brother Timothy, *Illinois '82*.



All the Brothers of Kansas Alpha congratulate Indiana Eta on their recent installation as a new Chapter, and we send our best wishes to all our other Chapters.



the membership roster. Starting the installation season out in outstanding fashion in Tallahassee, Florida, was the chartering of Florida Alpha on March 7, 1987. It is always rewarding for Phi Psi to regain an "inactive" Chapter, and we are always examining opportunities to do so, thus this Florida State University installation was especially meaningful; Florida Alpha was originally founded in 1962, and lost in 1971, during which time 88 men joined Phi Kappa Psi. Installation day this year initiated 61 new Brothers, thus giving Florida Alpha an outstanding second start. Florida Alpha was recognized officially as a Colony October 7, 1985.

Next Phi Psi's installation team gathered in Terre Haute, Indiana, where on March 28, 1987, Phi Psi planted her banner for the very first time at Indiana State University. Founded originally by a Phi Psi attending graduate school at Indiana State, Indiana Eta was granted Colony status February 3, 1985. Installation brought 46 new Brothers to create Indiana Eta this year.

Spring installations for 1987 were completed when on May 2, 38 men bound themselves to the ideals of Phi Kappa Psi at Rutgers University, in New Brunswick, New Jersey. Recognized as a Colony on April 21, 1986, New Jersey Gamma holds great promise for Phi Psi on this famous campus. The installation of Florida Alpha, Indiana Eta, and New Jersey Gamma results in an active Chapter membership roll of 91, the most Phi Psi has ever experienced in her 135 year history.

Colonies

The Fraternity operated a total of eight Colonies during this report year, three of which were installed as Chapters after the report year ended: Florida Alpha at Florida State University, installed March 7, 1987; the Indiana State University Chapter, chartered March 20, 1987; and New Jersey Gamma, at Rutgers University, installed May 2, 1987 (see above).

Other Colony activity included the ongoing develop-

ment of Kentucky Beta, at the University of Kentucky, in Lexington, organized originally November 8, 1982. Progress continues in Dallas with the Southern Methodist University Colony, Texas Delta, organized on September 22, 1985. Phi Psi's Maryland Beta Colony, at the University of Maryland, Baltimore County, continues its upward climb; the Fraternity's second undergraduate group in this great state was recognized officially as a Colony on September 11, 1986. The Temple University Colony, Pennsylvania Pi, is making outstanding progress, and has, as of this writing, petitioned for a Chapter charter. Recognized officially as a Colony on March 17, 1986, Penn Pi, like all other Colonies, would receive its charter only after meeting all ten of the Fraternity's installation requirements.

Also after this report year, on April 6, 1987, Phi Psi recognized an interest group of petitioning students at George Washington University, the District of Columbia, and designated the Colony District of Columbia Alpha. All Phi Psi history buffs will recall that District of Columbia Alpha was founded at Columbian University in 1868, and lost in 1899 when the entire undergraduate Chapter membership enlisted in the Spanish-American War. Columbian University was reorganized under the direction of Congress as The George Washington University, so even though the institution's name has changed, it is still the same school and, therefore, maintains the claim to our original Chapter designation. District of Columbia Alpha initiated a total of 189 men over its 31 years of activity.

No Chapters Lost

In the year under review, March 1, 1986-February 1987, no Chapter charters were suspended or revoked.

Numbers In Chapters

Since each annual report stays strictly within the time limits of March 1 to end-of February, it is possible for

some Chapters and Colonies to experience artifically high or low member numbers. For example, if a new initiate report is not received in Phi Psi's Headquarters until March or April (from a January or February initiation date) one year, but the following year the report comes in on time or early, the impact of two years' quantity of new members appears in one "report year," thus unrealistically high; the opposite reporting practice results in artificially low total member numbers. The overall, year to year figures Fraternity-wide do even out, but when viewing each Chapter total individually, the picture given by any single report year may or may not accurately reflect exact member numbers.

Last year 15 Chapters listed 100 or more men on their roster, and this year 19 Chapters are so on record. Heading the way are two Chapters tied, at 142 men each; Oklahoma Alpha at the University of Oklahoma, and Indiana Beta, at Indiana University. Next comes Cal Delta, at the University of Southern California with 126, followed close behind by the University of Kansas Chapter, Kansas Alpha, with 125. The following two on the list are both outstanding California schools, registering 123, and 121 men on their rolls, and these are Cal Epsilon, at U.C.L.A., followed by the Chapter at the University of California, Santa Barbara, Cal Zeta. Others with more than 100 Brothers and pledges are Ohio Delta, at Ohio State University, with 114; Nebraska Beta, with 113, at Creighton University; the University of Oregon Chapter, Oregon Alpha, with 111; Tennessee Delta, with 109, at Vanderbilt University; Indiana Delta at Purdue, with 108 men; Nebraska Alpha at the University of Nebraska, also with 108; followed by 105 Phi Psis at the University of Illinois, Illinois Delta; New York Beta, 105, at Syracuse University; followed closely by three Chapters, all with 102 men . . . Illinois Epsilon at Illinois State University, New York Alpha at Cornell, and Texas Alpha, at the University of Texas; the Duke Chapter, North Carolina Alpha registered 101 men, while Indiana Epsilon at Valparaiso showed 100 men.

The Bucknell Chapter, Penn Gamma, reported 99 men on their rolls as of Founders Day 1987. Other Chapters with membership in the 90's were California Eta with 97; West Virginia Alpha, at the University of West Virginia, also with 97; Ohio Alpha, Ohio Wesleyan, at 94; DePauw's Chapter, Indiana Alpha, 92; and New Jersey Alpha, at Rider College, with 91 men on their roster.

Chapters in the 80's were Illinois Alpha at Northwestern, 88; Rhode Island Beta at Rhode Island, also 88; Delaware Alpha at Delaware, 87; Iowa Alpha at Iowa, 86; Cal Beta at Stanford, 85; Iowa Beta at Iowa State, 83; and the Brown University Chapter, Rhode Island Alpha, with 82 members and pledges.

Seven Chapters reported membership in the 70's this year, compared to eight last year: Missouri Alpha, Missouri (78); Mississippi Alpha, 'Ole Miss (77); Pennsylvania Epsilon, Gettysburg (77); Pennsylvania Nu, Indiana University of Pennsylvania (77); Maryland Alpha, Johns Hopkins (73); Pennsylvania Zeta, Dickinson (73); and Alabama Alpha at the University of Alabama, with 72.

There were seven Chapters reporting membership in the 60's this year, which compares to six last year: Ohio Theta, Ashland (68); Washington Alpha, Washington (67); Virginia Beta, Washington & Lee (65); Indiana Zeta, Butler (64); Ohio Lambda, Miami (64); Arizona Beta, Arizona State (62); and Penn Beta, at Allegheny College, with 61.

There were seven Chapters reporting 50-59 members and pledges this year; 14 Chapters with a roster of 40-49 members and pledges recorded, and 7 Chapters with membership in the 30's. Refer to pages 125 and 152 for complete statistics on the membership of each Chapter and Colony.

District VI Has Largest Chapters

Phi Psi's far west District, comprised of 13 Chapters, recorded the largest average size this report year, with an amazing 75 man average. Next ranked District III's 18 Chapters at 72 men, who for six out of the last eight years lead all other Districts in this area. Following close behind with 14 Chapters was District II's 70 man average, District V's 65 man average from 14 Chapters, and District I's 51 man average from 16 Chapters. District IV ended up with 55 men on average for their 13 Chapters, up from 53 last year, 50 the year before, and 46 the year before that.

2000 Club

Phi Psi's most exclusive membership grouping honoring Chapters who have initiated 2,000 or more men over the years, the "2000 Club," still has but one member, Indiana Beta, who became eligible in 1983. Founded in 1869, the Indiana University Chapter has a total of 2,147 initiates.

1500 Club

The "1500 Club," opened only to those Chapters claiming 1,500-1,999 initiates, gained one new member this year, Indiana Alpha, founded at DePauw University in 1865, now with a total of 1,507 initiates. That Chapter nearest to gaining membership in the "2000 Club" is Kansas Alpha, founded in 1876 at the University of Kansas with 1,740 initiates. Kansas Alpha joined the "1500 Club" in 1976. Penn Gamma follows next, and has initiated 1,688 men since their founding at Bucknell in 1855, and joined the Club in 1981, as did West Virginia Alpha at West Virginia University and Penn Beta at Allegheny College. West Virginia Alpha, founded in 1890, now has 1,647 initiates, and Penn Beta, founded in 1855, now has a total of 1,571 initiates and transfers. The Ohio State Chapter, Ohio Delta, now totals 1,628 initiates, and first joined the Club in 1983, as did New York Alpha at Cornell and Indiana Delta at Purdue. New York Alpha, founded in 1869, totals now 1,599 Brothers on their roll, and Indiana Delta, with a total initiate roster of 1,591 Brothers, was first chartered in 1901. The Ohio Alpha Chapter, founded at Ohio Wesleyan in 1861, joined the "1500 Club" in 1980, and now has 1,612 initiates and transfers total. The New York Beta Chapter, founded in 1884 at Syracuse University, has initiated 1,569 Brothers. The other two members of the Club joined in 1985: Illinois Alpha, founded in 1864 at Northwestern University, now with 1,561 initiates, and the University of Texas Chapter, Texas Alpha, founded in 1904, with 1.561 initiates.

1000 Club

There were no additions to the "1000 Club" this year, honoring Chapters who have initiated 1,000-1,499 men.

It's an amazing fact, though, that of Phi Psi's 88 active Chapters as of Founders Day 1987, 42 of them, nearly one-half, have initiated 1,000 or more men since founding.

Initiates

As reported above, 80 of our 88 Chapters reported 1,469 initiates and transfers during 1986-1987, up slightly from last year's 1,455 reported. The Oregon Alpha Chapter at the University of Oregon reported the largest number of new initiates with 50, followed by Cal Zeta's 46 new Brothers at the University of California, Santa Barbara. The next two ranking Chapters in terms of new initiates were Indiana Gamma, 42, at Wabash College, and New York Beta, 41, at Syracuse University. This year's 1,469 initiates came from 80 Chapters reporting, for an average of 18.36 new members per Chapter. Last year, the 1,455 initiates were reported from 82 Chapters, for an average of 17.74 new members per Chapter, so our initiation numbers per Chapter increased 3.5%.

Pledges

This year, 79 of the Fraternity's 88 Chapters, and six Colonies, reported 1,847 pledges, a 5% increase, for an average 21.73 men per Chapter/Colony. This compares to 1,766 men last year, 1,630 men the year before, and 1,709 men the year before that. Fraternity law provides that pledgeship terminates: 1) upon initiation into the Fraternity; or 2) upon expiration of two academic semesters or three quarters grade reporting periods from date of pledging.

Housing

The good news in Phi Psi housing again this year is that several million dollars in House Corporation owned property and contents is once again insured adequately through year number four of the Phi Psi Insurance Program; the bad news comes in everyone's trying to pay for it! House Corporation insurance premiums went up an average of 75% over last year, although some premiums

actually went down if life/safety improvements were made in physical plants. One benefit of the nationwide Phi Psi Insurance Program we are seeing now is that more attention is being given to Chapter housing. As part of the Phi Psi program, all houses have been inspected, with specific recommendations made for required or suggested physical plant improvements. It is the Fraternity's plan that, by the year 1990, Phi Psi housing will be considered the safest in the interfraternity world, and we are already seeing dramatic improvement.

Such campus by campus work can only be carried out by well organized, dedicated House Corporations. And alumni are only willing to serve in such advisory capacities if adequate directors'/officers' and other liability coverages exist. So the Phi Psi Insurance Program's liability coverage is designed to protect students, Chapters, House Corporations, Advisors, and general Fraternity volunteers and professionals as well. In the current report year, the liability premium in the Phi Psi Insurance Program increased over 200%, and it is an unbelievable fact that we were indeed fortunate to experience "just" this increase. As those readers of THE SHIELD who are attorneys, doctors and other professionals know, liability insurance has become nearly unaffordable, but a large loss at any one Chapter without liability coverage would be devastating, and could result in bankrupting the Chapter and House Corporation out of existence.

We are told by interfraternity contemporaries that, in those fraternities without nationwide coverage, those Chapters able to buy liability insurance on their own are paying as much as \$25,000! Phi Psi's largest House Corporation premium was ½ that amount, and we have the knowledge that all Chapters and Colonies are protected.

In an effort to help contain future escalating liability insurance premiums, Psi Phi has joined with three other fraternities in forming an insurance purchasing group, under the Federal government's Risk Retention Act. The purchasing group will help set underwriting standards and formulate risk management guidelines for House Corporations and Chapters, which should result in

greater loss control, further reducing insurance premiums. This new interfraternity cooperative effort, coupled with state and Federal attempts to legislate upper limit claims settlements, should help alleviate the insurance crisis in which Phi Psi and all other fraternities find themselves.

It is appropriate here to thank the several hundred Phi Psi alumni who volunteer their time as House Corporation officers and directors. Were it not for this dedicated crew, Phi Kappa Psi could simply not exist on campuses where housing is not provided by the school itself . . . thank you Brothers! Well functioning House Corporations make it possible for Phi Psi to provide safe, clean housing for our undergraduate Brothers, and we hope to achieve even greater heights in this area in the years to come.

Within today's Phi Kappa Psi, a total of 50 Chapter homes are owned by Phi Psi House Corporations.

Twenty Chapters occupy houses owned by the college or university, 13 rent privately, 2 are provided residence hall sections, and 3 occupy lodges.

Membership Shifts

Of the 88 Chapters represented this year, 53 reported an increase in total undergraduate strength over last year, 30 reported a decrease in membership, while 5 listed a Chapter roster with numbers unchanged from last year. The greatest membership increase was Cal Delta's 44 more men than reported at the University of Southern California last year, while the largest loss of membership was reported by Colorado Alpha, which is being reorganized this Fall at the University of Colorado.

If Fraternity undergraduate membership followed the general population demographic trends, we would expect the sun belt District IV and far west District VI to be



edging up in the ranking of average student member listings. However, even as the decline of the student enrollment continues, the more outstanding educational institutions will recruit undergraduates successfully nationwide, and are somewhat impervious to population trends in their immediate surroundings.

This year, Fraternity student numbers did follow the general population somewhat, in that Phi Psi's far-West Chapters, in District VI, did rank number one in average Chapter size. Next, however, came District III's "farm

belt" Chapters, where host institutions are predominantly large, state universities in and around the Great Lakes States. Next came District II, where Chapters surround Phi Psi's birth place in western Pennsylvania. District V ranked next, made up of "grain belt" Chapters, from Minnesota down through New Mexico, followed by District I's east coast Chapters. District IV remains the smallest in terms of average size, but it is noted their average has increased steadily over the last 5 years, while certain other Districts have fluctuated up and down.

Heritage Hall

Phi Psi's Headquarters marked its ninth anniversary June 1, 1987, in Historic Lockerbie Square, Indianapolis, Indiana. The Headquarters and Museum at 510 Lockerbie Street continues to provide an outstanding home office from which to operate, and the neighborhood development of business and residential buildings surrounding has provided for healthy increased property values. The Fraternity's permanent Headquarters and Museum have helped contain operating costs, thus allowing distribution of funds for other purposes.

We've mentioned in previous annual reports the successful installation of Phi Psi's in-house computer, an IBM System 34. And one year ago this past January, we added a personal computer to the system which matched with portable computers used by the Educational Leadership Consultants allow reports to be typed in the field, mailed to the Headquarters on computer diskette, and processed more quickly and efficiently.

As a by-product of Phi Psi's computer installation, the Fraternity has developed a very attractive membership, fund raising, and financial software package suitable for any association which attempts to store information on and keep accurate addresses of its members. This software is offered for lease jointly with the company who helped Phi Psi develop it. We've made one additional installation, in a sorority also headquartered in Indianapolis, and

the software is able to be modified easily and economically so it could serve the needs of most other membership organizations. (Those Phi Psis or friends of the Fraternity who may be interested in more information are encouraged to write to: Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity, 510 Lockerbie Street, Indianapolis, IN 46202.) We are pleased to report that the advent of Phi Psi's computer age has been quite satisfactory.

Heritage Hall draws many Phi Psi visitors, who are always welcome! The unique combination of a modern central office in a Victorian museum setting is intriguing to all visitors, both Phi Psi and our many other friends. Heritage Hall has now hosted over 7,700 visitors since opening in 1978, and as a member of the American Association of Museums, welcomes tour groups of all sizes, with advance arrangements.

Staff Appointments

Phi Psi has been very fortunate over the years to attract competent, enthusiastic Brothers to the ranks of the Educational Leadership Consultants. Originally called "Field Secretaries," and not too many years ago "Chapter Consultants," this band of dedicated Phi Psis is valuable by any name, and their current title more accurately reflects their role as educational adjuncts to the Fraternity experience. The Consultants traveling this academic year were: David L. Rickabaugh, California-Santa Barbara '83; Joseph L. Siebert, Indiana '83; Ronald A. Richard, Minnesota '84; Tane R. Abbott, California-Santa Barbara '82; and Terrence G. Harper, Oklahoma State '85.

The Consultant position with Phi Psi's Headquarters team is a one year commitment, and often opportunities arise to serve a second year. The Fraternity was fortunate to have Dave Rickabaugh begin a second year on the field staff this past Fall; Brother Rickabaugh served through the end of October, 1986, having reported for duty June 24, 1985. Picking up where Dave left off is Terry Harper, who began his Consultant work November 1, 1986.

Along with Consultant Harper, others returning to "the road" for a second year are Joe Siebert and Ron

Richard, both mentioned above. Joining these three is David T. Boersma, *Kansas '84*, who began his Heritage Hall tenure June 22. With these four enthusiastic riders of the red and green, the Fraternity is fully prepared to service well the 91 Chapters and 5 Colonies this academic year upcoming, and to add additional Colonies as opportunities arise.

Another staff appointment made this calendar year, effective June 1, 1987, was the promotion of Tane R. Abbott, California-Santa Barbara '82, to the position of Director of Chapter Services and Risk Management. In response to student requests for additional in-office Chapter Services at Phi Psi's Headquarters, and requests from House Corporations to assist in the complex challenge of risk management as Chapter advisory support groups, this new permanent position was created. We are confident Brother Abbott will be of great service to Phi Psi in his new role.

One additional appointment made this report year at 510 Lockerbie Street was announced in the last issue of THE SHIELD, and that was the advent of the Endowment Fund's first full time Administrator. On September 1, 1986, Robert F. Marchesani Jr., *Indiana University of Pennsylvania '79*, began his work with Phi Psi's educational foundation. Endowment Fund activities have increased significantly in recent years, and as the Fund continues to grow through the generosity of Phi Psi giving, its Scholarship and other programs likewise will increase in measure. Brother Marchesani's work with the Endowment Fund is most welcome.

Chapter Visits

During the 1986-1987 academic year, the Fraternity's Educational Leadership Consultants conducted 176 visits

to Chapters and Colonies ranging from 3-4 days in most cases, to a total of 3 weeks on one campus where the Chapter was having a particularly difficult time. In the academic year upcoming, plans are to spend considerable Consultant time reorganizing the Chapters at the University of Colorado and Southwestern Louisiana, more than the usual time at Bucknell, and provide even more guidance to all Phi Psi Colonies.

The past academic year found Educational Leadership Consultants, and others, making a total of 12 extension prospecting visits on campuses with varying degrees of potential for Phi Psi growth. Two such visits resulted in recognition of Colonies, at the University of Maryland in Baltimore County, designated Maryland Beta, and George Washington University which as mentioned above would return the District of Columbia Alpha Chapter upon rechartering.

Meetings

In the year under review, March 1, 1986-February 28, 1987, Phi Psi's grandest meeting was the 1986 Grand Arch Council, held August 13-17, at the magnificent Camelback Inn, in Scottsdale, Arizona. The 63rd biennial GAC drew 409 participants (including 36 ladies and guests), representing 81 Chapters, 6 Colonies, and 22 Alumni Associations. (See the winter, 1986 issue of THE SHIELD, pages 4-13, for other details.)

The Executive Board of the Fraternity, composed of the four senior officers—the President, Vice President, Treasurer, and Secretary—met once officially separate from the full Executive Council this report year, on April 25, 1986, at the Sheraton-Universal Hotel, Universal City, California.

The Executive Council, composed of the four alumni Executive Board members and six undergraduate Archons, serves as the chief governing body of the Fraternity between meetings of the Grand Arch Council. The E.C. had three meetings this report year, all at the site of the '86 Grand Arch Council, the Camelback Inn, Scottsdale, Arizona: June 7, 1986, and August 13 and August 17, 1986, immediately prior to and after the 63rd GAC. The E.C. has met once since, on May 16, 1987, at Phi Psi's Headquarters, Heritage Hall, in Indianapolis, Indiana. (Space limitations in THE SHIELD do not allow for printing of Executive Council Meeting minutes, but copies are available to any Phi Psi, through the Fraternity Headquarters, at a cost of \$5 to help defray photocopying and postage expense.)

Meetings Upcoming

The Fall Schedule above will find Chapters, Colonies, Alumni Associations, and Chapter and Faculty Advisors gathered in each of Phi Psi's Districts for the purpose of electing an Archon and enjoying the educational experience of the Woodrow Wilson Leadership Schools. All are urged to attend these important meetings!

1986 Alumni Support Program

Recognizing gifts received March 1, 1986-February 28, 1987

THANK YOU BROTHERS!

The loyal alumni of Phi Kappa Psi have once again expressed their willingness to financially assist the Fraternity, and the 1986 Alumni Support Program this year, with gifts received March 1, 1986-February 28, 1987 totaled the second greatest dollar amount in 34 years . . . thank you Brothers! The final roster lists 4,642 gifts received from 3,907 alumni (we thank the 735 Brothers who gave more than once!). The total contributed this year was \$194,393, and compares to \$193,501 donated last year. The average gift for the year just completed was a generous \$49.76, down a bit from \$50.05 donated last year.

The Alumni Support Program honors those who make gifts directly to the general Fraternity proper, and does not include those made to the Endowment Fund, to Phi Psi Alumni Associations, or directly to Chapters and Colonies. Our request for contributions went out this year to 49,993 alumni with good addresses, and the 7.82% participation this year is up from that of 7.73% last support year. In addition, we did have 475 "first time" donors, to whom we issue an especially warm "welcome to the club!"

1987 Alumni Support Program

The current 1987 Alumni Support Program began March 1, 1987, and will run through February 29, 1988. Therefore gifts received since this past March 1 and on through the end of next February will be recognized in the Summer 1988 issue of THE SHIELD. Like the 1986 Program under review, next year's will recognize total

gifts made to the general Fraternity since 1971. Unfortunately, due to a change in the record keeping system at that time, we are not able to accurately tabulate gifts made prior to 1971. The Fraternity is fortunate to have many loyal Brothers who have given each year! In addition, we are not able to include at this point in time gifts made directly to the Endowment Fund, or Phi Psi Alumni Associations, or directly to Chapters or Colonies. Eventually our ability to record all such giving may become sophisticated enough to produce a true picture of just how generous Phi Psis are to our various constituencies!

A review of the total Alumni Support Program given to date is interesting, for contributions from 1952 (the first year Phi Psi asked for volunteer gifts) to 1970 yielded \$399,507.47 in alumni gifts; while contributions from 1971 (the first year of our current accumulative program) to 1985 total \$1,958,650.39. Therefore, the current accumulative campaign includes 83% of all gifts made to the Alumni Support Program, even though it represents only 50% of the 35 total years the Fraternity has asked for volunteer gifts.

Alumni Support Vital

Phi Kappa Psi is indeed fortunate to have the financial support of a generous brotherhood... no fraternity in the land exceeds ours in loyal donors. The overall grand total of contributions received through the Alumni

Support Program since 1952 stands at \$2,358,157.89. Alumnus generosity this year alone resulted in a dollar amount that surpasses the first 12 years of alumni gifts, 1952-1968, combined.

The positive impact of the Alumni Support Program on Phi Psi is difficult to overstate: the 30 Chapters reorganized and returned to their campus strongholds just within the last 13 years most likely would have become more permanent on our list of "inactive" Chapters were it not for alumni giving.

And we depend on your support today! The Fraternity's finances operate to minimize the expense borne by our undergraduate Brothers. For even though a great majority of Phi Psi's resources in terms of time and funds are devoted to services rendered to Chapters and Colonies, the undergraduates fund less than one-half of the Fraternity's operating budget. Had we not this generous level of alumni giving, undergraduate pledge, initiation and conference fees would more than double if we were to maintain current services. Alumni support money helps sustain such ongoing programs as the Educational Leadership Consultant work with Chapters and Colonies, Fraternity publications including THE SHIELD, and undergraduate seminars such as the Woodrow Wilson Leadership School.

All Brothers are encouraged to give as the Phi Psi spirit moves! And all contributions are gratefully received at Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity, 510 Lockerbie St., Indianapolis, IN 46202.

Based on accumulative giving since 1971 (and of these who participated in the '86 Program), 2 loyal Brothers have given more than \$5,000, 21 have given more than \$2,500, 142 have contributed \$1,000 or more, and 485 Brothers have given \$500 or more.

Each of the Fraternity's Chapters and Colonies are annually given the opportunity to select from among their peers one Phi Psi who exemplifies scholarship and leadership. The qualifications of the nominees are reviewed by the Endowment Fund Trustees and Scholarship Awards Committee.

In addition to the honor of being selected by one's peers, Summerfield Scholars receive a \$100 check and a handsome certificate. The Brother's name is also added to the Chapter's permanent Summerfield Scholar plaque.

From the pool of Summerfield Scholars, three Outstanding Summerfield Scholars are selected. These awards carry grants of \$3,000 for first place, \$2,000 for second place and \$1,000 for third place.

The 1986-87 Outstanding Summerfield Scholars, as well as the six Founders Fellows and other Endowment Fund scholarship recipients, will be introduced in the next issue of THE SHIELD.

The Summerfield Scholarship program was created through a trust bequest to the Endowment Fund by the late Solon E. Summerfield, Kansas '99. At the time of the gift, Brother Summerfield's donation was the largest ever made to an American college fraternity.

All Phi Psis are encouraged to consider supporting the Endowment Fund, the Fraternity's educational foundation. Tax-deductible gifts and bequests allow Phi Kappa Psi to recognize and encourage outstanding scholarship and leadership among its members.







The History of Indiana Eta

The first informational meetings attracted about 15 people, most of whom were from the same floor of Rhodes Hall, another on-campus residence hall.

Brian stressed the qualities and values that make Phi Psi so special. In January 1985, Brian and Educational Leadership Consultant Paul Mason conducted interviews for potential Colony members. A Colony was formed with 22 men on February 3, 1985.

Over the past two years, Indiana Eta has participated in a variety of campus activities including Homecoming, Tandemonia and Winter Wonderland. Indiana Eta was awarded \$1,150 by the ISU Student Government Association for winning the Winter Wonderland campus decorating contest. Indiana Eta has also worked with a number of charitable or-

ganizations which include the Salvation Army and the Arthritis Foundation.

Grade point average has also been an area of achievement as Indiana Eta has been in the top five for the last three semesters. It was also named the "Most Improved Fraternity" at ISU for the 1986 school year.

During its two years of existence, the men of Indiana Eta have impressed the qualities of scholarship, gentlemanly behavior and social poise. These virtues will be instilled in the men of Indiana Eta for the rest of their lives.

The History of Indiana State University

Since its inception in 1865, Indiana State University has been one of the finest institutions for higher education in the country. ISU currently has eight colleges within the university which are among the top-ranked in the nation.

The ISU School of Business is accredited by the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business, a distinction earned by only 10 percent of the business schools in the country. ISU's School of Education has one of the best teacher preparation programs available. This program has existed at ISU for more than 120 years. The Athletic Training Program at ISU is second to none. It is one of only six colleges and universities in the nation with undergraduate and graduate programs in athletic training. ISU is one of only three institutions in the nation whose School of Technology has been continuously accredited by the National Association of Industrial Technology since 1967.

With approximately 11,000 students, Indiana State can also claim to have the world's first university owned and operated astroturf playing surface which was installed in Memorial Stadium in 1967.

The 90 acre campus is currently going through a master plan renovation project which will change the look of ISU over the next years.

Joseph L. Siebert Indiana '83 Let's Hear It for Our Alumni

I was recently leafing through several of our latest publications of THE SHIELD when it dawned on me that much of our magazine is geared to the undergraduate. So you say, "What's wrong with this?" Nothing, but I would like to write about what I believe to be Phi Psi's greatest asset and resource: its alumni. Phi Kappa Psi has over 50,000 living members of which 6,500 are enrolled in 96 college campuses all over the nation. Another pertinent question may be, "In what condition would many of our Chapters be without the dedicated alumni support?"

Many of our alumni volunteers give countless hours and resources to undergraduate Chapters. Without our chapter advisors, housing board members, faculty advisors, and others who give their time and resources, where would our undergrads obtain these vital necessities? Who would see to it that our properties are well maintained? Who would bear the responsibility for a major renovation? Who could we turn to if a Chapter encountered a problem? Who would ensure a means of continuity in the years to come? I hope that this is making sense to someone out there.

With all these questions, who has the right answers? Probably not me, but I believe that it is up to each individual Chapter to both organize and utilize their own group of alumni supporters. It should be the undergraduate Chapter that initiates the effort to bring back many of the alumni from their respective Chapters. If you are a newer Chapter, then you can gain support from local alumni that are from other Chapters. They can be both helpful and excited about getting involved with a young and growing Chapter.

I have recommendations for Chapters and alumni alike.

- 1) That Chapters organize an alumni function at least once a year. Alumni functions can be very rewarding and don't have to be a burden on the Chapter's budget. Remember to send invitations at least four weeks ahead to give ample time for alumni to schedule ahead.
- 2) That Chapters remember to recognize those alumni that contribute time and resources to the Chapter. A simple card or invitation to dinner would be very much appreciated. Everyone deserves recognition for extra effort.
- 3) That Chapters remember the advisors efforts are in its best interest. Sometimes the Chapter thinks the advisor is trying to make life harder. But our advisors are there to help the Chapter in any way possible. If that weren't true, I'm sure they could find better ways to spend their free time.
- 4) Alumni, when you go back to the Chapter houses, remember what it was like when you were in school. Think about the things that you wish you had. The men today wish for the same things. Better guidance, furnishings, housing, alumni support, organization, stability, etc. Each and every alumni member of Phi Kappa Psi can give something back to the Fraternity in one way or another. Time, support, guidance, resources, and so on.
- 5) Alumni, if you receive a letter from a Chapter, please respond to their letter. If it's a commitment that you are not able to meet, just write and tell them so. They will be happy just receiving correspondence. They are often just trying to gain support, not just money. It is a good feeling to know an alumni can take the time to mail back a letter in support of the Chapter.
- 6) Alumni, Phi Kappa Psi is very alive and well we wish to thank you for your past support. If you have been active we appreciate it; if not, now is an excellent time to get involved with your local Chapter. Remember, whatever time you can contribute will be in the best interest of the Fraternity and our undergraduate Brothers. Everyone have a great summer! See you on the road next year.

The Value of Ceremonial Officers

As a rule, Phi Kappa Psi is not a lot of Pomp and Circumstance. Our Fraternity has existed for 135 years without benefit of buffalo-horned hats, incense, gremlins or gongs. Instead, ritualist Thomas Cochran Campbell left us a legacy of a much richer foundation. Unfortunately, our ceremonial officers—more specifically the Phu, Hod, Hi, and the Secretaries—are no longer held in the high regard originally intended in the 1853 drafting.

Their unimportance is apparent. Chapters often delegate these positions to recent initiates or the "full moon" Brothers who drop by once a month. I have even encountered situations in which officers had no idea who served in these positions. And why? The number one Phi Kappa Psi undergraduate survey says: BECAUSE THEY DON'T DO ANYTHING. To this I say, "Road apples!". Ceremonial officers offer very real and practical purposes in our Chapters.

GPs agree that it can be extremely difficult running an orderly weekly meeting of 50 college-age friends. But if ceremonial officers perform their roles, a certain tone can be established for Chapter nights allowing for more efficient, quicker meetings. The Phu formally greets each member as he is admitted to the room reminding him that the focus of this meeting is Phi Kappa Psi. He is not chewing the fat in the TV room or hanging out with some guys. He is present for the welfare of his Fraternity. The BG calls the role acknowledging everyone's presence and their equal importance. The Hi offers the appropriate remarks. All factors contributing to a more formal atmosphere and setting a tone that will help you to get things done.

By definition, these offices promote other benefits as well. The BG's minutes are the written history of the Fraternity. It is what he records that will be remembered in the future. The SG brings history to life by documenting the accomplishments of the Brotherhood with photographs and news articles. Some Chapters have expanded the duties of the ceremonial officers to include coordinating phone lists, planning activities and the like. Although necessary for Chapter operations, these tasks should not overshadow the true significance of the positions within the Fraternity.

I wish to encourage each Chapter to evaluate the importance it puts on these positions. Examine the tone and effectiveness of your meetings. The benefits of our officer system are there if you choose to take advantage of them.

Chapter presidents comment on "Legacies" feature

The most recent SHIELD carried Mystagogue Kent Owen's article entitled "Legacies", a discussion of various attitudes toward legacies during rush. A feature article such as this usually generates feelings and opinions that span the spectrum.

Since the last SHIELD, all Chapter and Colony presidents were asked to respond to the article as it related to their policy or experiences with legacies, those potential rush guests who are in some way related to one or more members of Phi Kappa Psi. We received numerous responses representing Chapters from coast to coast and border to border. They related their experiences which seem to reinforce the very ideas that Brother Owen enumerated.

The comments were divided into three categories. In the first, Chapters address the question of what any legacy can expect as he goes through rush. The second category deals with the reasons why legacies are not automatically pledged. A very unique third category is reserved for the comments of undergraduate legacy John Maxwell who addressed the issue from both sides.

Now from the front lines of the Phi Psi experience come the following comments from the Chapter presidents.

What Can A Legacy Expect?


"The fact that a young man is a legacy seems to make the Chapter 'take a closer look' at this man . . . the Brothers evaluate, perhaps more leniently, the personality and potential of the legacy . . ."

Minnesota Beta

"If a man attending Virginia Tech is recommended to us . . . we will make an extra effort to rush that man . . . Virginia Zeta treats legacies as if they had received an alumnus recommendation. That is, we will make a point of contacting and rushing the man . . ."

Virginia Zeta

"We treat legacies in the same manner as we treat the entire pledge class. We acknowledge his relationship, but we try not to make special exceptions for him.



'Legacy' is just a title and it does not describe anything about the individual to which it is given."

New Mexico Alpha

"Although there is usually a fair amount of 'salesmanship' surrounding the chaos of rush, we are probably more honest with legacies than with any other type of rushee. Even if it is clear that (he is) more suited toward another (fraternity), the Brotherhood still usually stands by to advise him on rush."

New York Alpha

"As a general courtesy . . . we devote our careful attention to them."

New Jersey Alpha

"A special effort would be made to contact the legacy and meet him."

Penn Omicron

"We do not feel obliged to pledge a man for simple reasons of legacy. We do, however, offer special attention to legacies so that we are sure a true and complete evaluation of the individual is found before passing judgment. If there is any doubt, we are more prone to giving a legacy the benefit of the doubt than the normal individual . . . Penn Epsilon tends to be even more lenient and liberal in evaluating a legacy of a past Penn Epsilon Brother. Although, once again, if the individual is found to be unworthy, then we feel the responsibility to our Brothers to deny him membership . . . "

Why Legacies Are Not Automatically Pledged

"I have seen too many membership disasters in sororities with 'mandatory bidding' of legacies. Sure, the policy often helps with the development of endowments (dynastic families usually give more), but mandatory bidding weakens the organizations those endowments supposedly support."

New York Alpha

"... he must earn the right to be pledged to Phi Kappa Psi as any other candidate."

Virginia Zeta

"We most certainly do not offer an automatic bid to a legacy. If we feel a

person is wrong for our Chapter, if we feel he lacks the potential to fit into our group and make contributions to our Chapter, he will not receive a bid regardless of his heritage. It would be wrong for the Chapter to offer membership solely on this basis. It would be unfair to the young man in question as he would surely sense the bitterness felt by Brothers who were 'obligated' to extend him a bid, and it would be unfair to the Chapter because the future success and vitality of the Chapter will be directly in the hands of those whom are pledged each year."

Indiana Zeta

"A legacy would get the benefit of the doubt when it came to receiving a bid if he was on the borderline, as a way of giving him extra time to prove himself to us . . . (but he receives) no benefit of different treatment when it comes to the vote for Brotherhood."

Penn Omicron

"The fact is, every individual must find their personal 'niche', where and who they feel most comfortable with. Trying to fit a square peg into a round hole and 'just live with it' can cause problems for both sides. When rush is over and the dust settles, the problems of pledging a legacy just for namesake evolve . . . The key, as the article states, is to value and affirm the 'whole man' and not a

single aspect of him. This attitude is sure to produce the best Brother possible with the least amount of problems . . . "

Comments From A Legacy

"I myself am a legacy through my older brother . . . Of Course, there are the usual stigmas attached to (legacies), and the usual chiding as to whether they are worthy, or what they are worth to us! But, overall I'm proud of our Chapter and its actions in rushing legacies. I think that my Brothers and I look wholly at the person. This is the only way for us to have the quality men that we seek . . . In being a legacy of Phi Kappa Psi I enjoy great pride and pleasure of sharing our Fraternal secrets with my older brother. I also see this shared among (other legacies) and their fathers. But even at our Chapter we have passed up bidding legacies after much discussion. I don't think it's fair to the (Chapter) or to the legacy to accept them if they or the (undergraduates) feel they truly don't belong . . . I strongly agree with Charles P.T. Moore's philosophy on quality control: 'Good men or none' . . . "




Charles "Buddy" Rogers (in white suit) and members of Kansas Alpha.

CHARLES "BUDDY" ROGERS, Kansas '23, was one of four recipients of Distinguished Service Citations during Commencement exercises May 17 at the University of Kansas. The recipients were selected for their outstanding achievements for the betterment of society and in behalf of mankind. It is the highest award given by the university and its alumni association. Rogers endowed a \$100,000 scholarship fund for KU's Department of Communication and Theatre in 1982 and was honored in 1984 as the first winner of the Kansas Film Institute's Lifetime Achievement Award. He is known for the 53 movies he made in Hollywood beginning in the late 1920's, one of which won him an Oscar in 1928. He has also served as a daily radio host and weekly television host. Mary Pickford, "America's Sweetheart" of the silent screen days, was his wife of 42 years before she died in 1979. Rogers opened their

Beverly Hills estate, Pickfair, to the public for selected fundraising parties in the late 1970's. Rogers was honored last year when Hollywood awarded him the Jean Hersholt Humanitarian Award "for a character actor who makes a special contribution to community and country and whose good example benefits society."

JAMES E. NOLAND, Indiana '39, was honored in March at a dinner of his legal peers and friends sponsored by Indianapolis and Indiana lawyers associations. Noland has served as Federal judge in the Southern District of Indiana for 20 years and earlier had served as a representative in Congress.



DARYL ARNOLD, Southern California '43, was nominated United States ambassador to Singapore on February 26, 1987. This will be his third post during the Reagan administration. He previously served on the Board of International Food and Agriculture Development and was also with the U.S.-Japan Advisory Commission. Arnold must appear before the U.S. Senate Foreign Relations Committee and then be confirmed by the entire Senate. He resigned his post as president and chief executive officer of Western Growers Association, a trade association for growers, packers, and shippers of fresh fruit and vegetables in California and Arizona. Arnold accumulated more than 40 years experience as a grower, shipper, and manager for a large publicly-owned corporation in addition to his recent position with WGA. In 1978 he was named "Produce Man of the Year," a prestigious award in the fresh produce industry, by The Packer, a leading industry trade journal.

Dr. CHARLES A. WEST, DePauw '46, was named the Percy L. Julian Memorial Lecturer at DePauw University. Dr. West gave the memorial address on April 16 on the topic "De-Pauw Chemistry: Successes and Challenges." As an undergraduate at DePauw, he was a member of numerous campus activities which included Phi Beta Kappa, and he was a Rector Scholar. In 1952 Dr. West joined the faculty of the University of California at Los Angeles (UCLA); and except for one year of service with the U.S. Army's Clinical Chemistry Section at Fort Baker, his entire academic career has been at UCLA. He was elevated to the rank of Professor of Chemistry in 1967 and served as Chair of the Department of Chemistry from 1981-1984. His teaching duties have included courses in Biochemistry; Enzymes, Metabolism, and Regulation; and Bioorganic Structures and Reactions. His success as a teacher was recognized in 1972 when the UCLA Alumni Association presented him with a Distinguished Teaching Award. An Alumni Citation by DePauw in 1974 was also a recognition of his outstanding record as a teacher. Dr. West has conducted his research program in the study of natural products. His research interests have been and are at present in the areas of growth regulation of higher plants, natural plant hormones, and fungi infections. Dr. West has been the recipient of a number of research awards including a John Simon Guggenheim Fellowship, a U.S. Public Health Service Special Postdoctoral Fellowship, and the National Science Foundation Faculty Fellowship. In November 1985, he served as consultant to the Department of Chemistry of Zhongshau University in Guangzhou, the Peoples Republic of China, where he assisted in planning for a new biochemistry teaching and research program. Dr. West is a member of the American Chemical Society, the American Society of Biological Chemistry, the American Society of Plant Physiologists, and Sigma Xi. He is the 1986-1987 president of the UCLA Chapter of Phi Beta Kappa. At present he is a member of the Board of Editors for the Archives of Biochemistry and Biophysics and for the journal Plant Physiology.

JAMES F. MERCER DDS, Wittenberg '48, received the Distinguished Dentist Award, the highest award given by the Ohio Dental Association. He has held every office in the Akron Dental Society and is past president of the



Ohio Dental Association. He has also served on various committees of the American Dental Association, and was the subject of a feature article in the fall issue of the Ohio Dental Journal.

JOHN BIBB, Vanderbilt '48, was named to the Tennessee Sports Hall of Fame. Sports editor of The Tennessean since 1970, Bibb began his career with the paper in 1942 as a copy boy. He has served as correspondent for Sports Illustrated and USA Today. Previously he has headed various national sports organizations and helped select All-America football and basketball teams. He also served as president of the Tennessee Sports Hall of Fame.

LACY B. HERRMANN, Brown '50, was awarded the coveted Brown Bear Award



"Hoosiers" Was More Than a Movie to MeI was there!!

Introduction by Dr. David F. Hull, Jr.

Lawrence J. "Jay" McCreary, Indiana '38, is a Brother who has had a truly remarkable basketball career. As a high school basketball phenom in Frankfort, Indiana, his coach was the great Everett Case, who went on to fame as the Head Coach of the North Carolina State University Wolfpack. In his junior year in high school, Jay played on one of the State final 16 teams, and in his senior year he led his team to the Indiana State Championship. As a player at Indiana University, he played on Indiana's first great National Championship team in 1940 under the tutelage of the renowned

coach, Branch McCracken. As an Indiana high school coach himself, his teams at Muncie Central went to the state semi finals five times, the state finals twice, winning the State Championship in 1952. Following his initial success as a high school basketball coach in Indiana, he moved on to LSU where he was the Head Coach for nine years from 1957 through 1965.

Jay is recognized in the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame twice, both as a player and as a coach, and in past years has been actively involved in developing the history of schoolboy basketball in the State of Indiana. I have known him since the early 1960s, and even while he

was under tremendous demands as a head basketball coach of a major university, he somehow found time to participate in Phi Psi functions. In the last 15 years he has been a colleague in Student Affairs at LSU as the Head of our Club Sports Department. "Coach Jay," as he is affectionately known by LSU students, is a remarkably modest and gentle man. One would never sense his basketball fame, and it is only fitting and proper that the movie "Hoosiers" helps to bring attention to Brother Jay's incredible, basketball accomplishments in the twilight of his career. What follows here is his story about "the real Hoosiers."

My family and I decided to go see "Hoosiers" on the first night it opened in Baton Rouge, and upon leaving the theatre we made several observations. The story's central theme is Hickory (really Milan, Indiana), a high school of less than 100 students, winning the 1952 (really 1954) Indiana High School Basketball Championship by defeating South Bend Central (really Muncie Central, a school of around 3,000 students). In every state except Delaware. Kentucky and Indiana, this type of showdown could never happen, but these three still have open classification in basketball and refuse to classify teams according to size of enrollment.

Actually the movie was a case of rags to riches; however, the rags weren't quite as raggedy as the movie portrayed. Milan had a big team for its size, averaging around 6'4" across the front line. Milan was big, but not quite as big as we

were. Marvin Wood, the Milan coach, was 24 and just the opposite of the role portrayed by Hackman. And his assistant coach was not the town drunk—he was a great guy.

Last year, the Indiana High School Athletic Association commissioned a video-cassette called "Indiana's Game." It's a retrospective only a Hoosier could love, covering championship after championship, and the real Milan-Muncie Central game was of course among the collection of memorable finals. I am amazed that I can smile when reminiscing about when Milan beat me, but of course I still think we should have won—they held the ball for 8 minutes before the famous shot by Bobby Plump.

However, I believe the Milan win in 1954 by the final score of 32-30 was instrumental in securing the unstratified tournament that still remains in Indiana.

Scholarshipes ist kein Fuchs!

What then is this thing for which we are all supposed to be striving? Why is it that you can look at a person and say, either aloud or to yourself, "There is a scholar"? What were the identifying characteristics? Did he wear a tweed coat, smoke a pipe, wear glasses and have a bunch of books under his arm? Was it, perhaps, that the aroma of his tobacco surrounded him with an aura of mystique which we interpreted as the



result of learning?

At our last Grand Arch Council, the committee I chaired discussed the question of scholarship and determined that it cannot be mandated. You cannot command excellence, or for that matter, mediocrity. But, like the pipe, there is an aura about scholarship. It thrives in a particular atmosphere. Our job, if we intend to see our scholarship grow, is to learn to identify that atmosphere and to find ways to provide it. The old timeworn techniques still work: the study table, the reward meal, etc. But how many of you really think about that steak as an incentive to excel? Be honest now, is one steak worth the effort? A tuition grant, sure, but a steak—no way. But carrots are not the only answer, and are, in reality, the answer for only a few.

In the months to come, I want to explore with you this elusive aura of scholarship. To examine its nature and source. Please share your ideas with me. I look forward to hearing from you. Let's work together on this question so that all our Chapters can emit auras of Brotherhood, joy, fellowship, awareness, and certainly, scholarship.

Biographical note: Our new Director of Scholarship, John Frederic Buck, is an Indiana University faculty member in the computer science department. He earned his B.S. from the Virginia Polytechnic Institute in 1957 majoring in business administration. He received an honorary Ph.D. from Rochdale College in 1970 and The Society of Data Educators awarded him its C.D.E. certification in 1972. While working on a degree in educational research at Indiana, he served as faculty advisor to the Indiana Beta Chapter. After a few years they pledged him, and he was initiated into their Chapter in 1975. He has since served in a number of capacities including Chapter Advisor, member of their house corporation board, and chairman of the house corporation's house maintenance committee. He is a church organist, pianist, and carillonneur. He enjoys golf, raquetball, wrestling, chess and bridge.

Nearby Jean Lafitte National Historical Park encompasses the French Quarter, a coastal marsh wetland called Barataria, and Chalmette National His-






A father's open letter to his son

Note: Fraternity Headquarters received this poignant letter from a Phi Psi explaining that his son was beginning his first year at college and was contemplating which fraternity to join. He also enclosed the letter he wrote to his son which described his feelings on fraternity life, pledgeship, and alcohol abuse. Written from the perspective of 20/20 hindsight, Michael Carlsen-Jones, Cornell '64, presents a unique view of fraternity life, hazing, and alcohol use from college years into adulthood. Sensing that this letter held meaning for all fraternity members, he has allowed us to share its value and has specifically requested that he be identified by name and Chapter in order not to do "a disservice to other recovering alcoholics who have been willing to openly acknowledge their disease". We extend our sincere gratitude to him for sharing his deepest feelings with readers of The Shield. Carole Wiebke, Director of Publications.

Author's Note:

"In spite of my own good experiences as a Fraternity member, I had over the years become cynical of fraternities . . . and would have preferred that my son remain an 'independent'. He knew what my view was but nonetheless 'gave rush a try' and found what he believes to be a group of young men with whom he would like to spend his college years. His well-thought-out decision to join a fraternity, in spite of his knowing my fellings about that, made me think more carefully about what concerned me about fraternity life for him . . . the concerns I express in the letter are no doubt the concerns of many parents, and likely concerns of some of our present Brotherhood and Brothers-to-be. I do not think that my concerns are unique or that they are those of a small minority, though I wish it were otherwise. If there is any merit in what I write, it is that it is an honest concern for the well-being of my son, and an honest concern for the well-being of all young men these days who seek to find a place, and a group of other young men who will enable and encourage them to be the best that they



can be. Fraternity life can bring out the best in us. Unfortunately, it sometimes brings out the worst..."

Dear Son

I very much appreciated your letter regarding your thoughts and feelings about joining a fraternity and your phone call on Sunday to talk about all of that. It was clear to me that you had given the whole matter very careful thought and had reached a decision in a reasonable, well-thought-out manner. It

pleases me to no end to know that you handled what is a very important decision in such a mature, sensitive way. Having made the decision, I hope that it turns out to be the best one for you; if not, you can always change your mind. No matter what the situation, there is no good reason to persist in living with a bad decision.

There are three things I would like to comment on regarding your decision to join a fraternity: drinking, time commitments, and hazing. I do not do this in

the spirit of a lecture but as sharing with you some of my thoughts based on some of my experience in the hope that you can profit from those experiences.

As you know, one of the features of any fraternity is the social life and the opportunity to party. Those opportunities typically involve alcohol (and often a lot of it) and there can be a certain amount of subtle, and not-so-subtle, pressure to join in. Even when there is no pressure from outside, there can be a lot of internal pressure to be one

of the group to do what the others are doing and to "enjoy" what others are "enjoying."

I share a short story with you in this regard which came up during our recent trip. During the whole of that trip I refrained from having any alcohol: none at Mom and Dad's and none when we stayed with our friends from junior high days. On Saturday evening when we were with our friends, everyone else had a few drinks while dinner was being prepared and everyone else had wine with dinner. At one point our hostess said to me, "You really ought to take up liquor" or something to that effect. Though her comment was innocent enough, it was an example of how some people have expectations about us and are perhaps a bit uncomfortable as well in situations where drinking "is a natural thing to do." I would have liked very much to be a 'part of the group', to have a couple of drinks before dinner and to drink wine with dinner. There was an internal desire quite apart from whatever external expectations there might have been. For me, giving in to that internal desire would have been the wrong decision. It would have been the wrong decision because once made, it is likely that I would no longer have had control over my drinking or not drinking that night. Once started, I likely would not have wanted to stop.

And where does this fit for you? Given the drinking problems on my side of the family and what people have been able to determine about the likelihood of such problems being passed from one generation to the next, I am concerned that if you begin to drink, that you may end up having problems with alcohol in the same way that I do. You have lived with me long enough to know what these problems are, how serious they are, and how disruptive they can be in one's life and those one lives with. I don't want you-and those you ultimately live with and love-to deal with those problems. When I was growing up and saw my mom and dad drunk more times than I ever want to remember, I swore to myself that I would never "be like them". Perhaps I'm not, but I'm more like them regarding my drinking problem than I would ever have liked to be. For me, merely not wanting to be like them was not enough. Regarding drinking, I want you not to be like me and I'm concerned that your not wanting to be like me regarding alcohol will not be enough to keep you from someday having a drinking problem. The best way is not to start drinking at all. I wasn't able to do that-I hope you can.

I think it is important to acknowledge that there are many people who drink

who do not have a drinking problem. I am not opposed to drinking and I am not opposed to your associating with people who do. I would not even be opposed to your drinking if I had good reason to believe that it would not eventually be a problem for you, too. You, like many others, can be with people who drink but not have a drink yourself. I had a wonderful time at our friends' home, and I have had other wonderful times where others have been drinking and I have not, in spite of some of the external and internal pressures to do otherwise. Part of what made these wonderful times was being sober so that I could enjoy them and remember them.

I gather from part of your letter (which said your fraternity president doesn't drink) that you are aware of the concerns I am trying to express in this letter and that you believe that your decision not to drink will be respected and supported by your fraternity brothers. I hope this is so. If pressured, I think it is appropriate for you to say that your father is an alcoholic and you don't want to be like him. I would also hope that the primary source of friends and support that you have chosen during your years at college would be a group of young men who would understand and support you in this decision. If they don't, you need to reconsider very seriously the decision to associate with them.

The above has not been very easy for me to write. Still I feel that it is something that must be said between us and something we both need to be up front about. Forgive me if it sounds like I'm on your case or telling you how to live your life—I'm not. I also want my remarks to be understood in a caring, loving way and not taken as the remarks of a hypocrite. Please don't respond with a "Who the hell is he, of all people, to tell me I ought not start drinking". I'm a person who wished I hadn't, and a father who doesn't want his son to have the same problem. Enough.

My concerns regarding the other two items, time commitments and hazing, are not so strong as the above. Briefly, as regards time, I just want you to be aware of the fact that being a member of a fraternity will put demands on your time that you might not otherwise have. Many of these demands are reasonable and will reward you many times over in shared happy times, wonderful memories of college life, and lifelong friendships. What I ask is that you always keep in mind that while your four years in college are ones in which you have the freedom and opportunity to learn and grow as an individual and in your relationships with other people, your coursework, and the grades you receive, are also important. I understand your desire and need, so well put in your letter, to develop friendships (be a "team member") and to be with people you care about and who care about you. You can do these things and do well in school at the same time.

Sometimes there will be conflicts. Helping someone else might require that some studying time be sacrificed, for example. When there are conflicts, choose carefully and choose well. Other people are important, but so are you and so are your needs, your life. You can best help others by being a model for them-like being chosen as captain of your wrestling team—not by trying to solve their problems. Do yourself proud and you will do others proud. Demonstrate through your own life and example that you can do well and others will likewise do well. Be a good fraternity brother in the best sense of "brother" and others will be good fraternity brothers as well.

Regarding hazing, my position is straightforward: there ought not be any. The point of view that "in order to be my equal you must first be treated as an inferior" or "in order to be worthy of membership in this organization you must first be shown how lowly you are" is a point of view that should have been eliminated years ago. Unfortunately, in many fraternities and sororities, this misguided point of view still remains. I do not know what the practice is at your chapter, but I would hope that they have realized that humiliation is not the way to instill such important values as friendship, equality, and the value of persons.

I would ask that if you are put in a position of being a "lowly person", are

asked to do things that you know you ought not do, or are in any other way humiliated, shamed, or ridiculed, that you think very seriously about whether you want to be associated with men who continue to think that this is the way to build relationships or that this is the way to be men. It's not. Relationships are built on caring about others. Being a man requires, first of all, that one be a decent person. Being a decent person minimally requires that one treat other people with respect.

Perhaps the following might help you to see what I'm trying to say. You already know what it is to be a brother you are a brother to your two sisters. Suppose someone asks you to show that you are a good brother or are worthy of being a brother. Anything that you would not want done to your sisters ought not be done to you. Anything you would not want your sisters to know that you did is likely something you ought not do. The way that you should treat your sisters is the way that you should be treated. Being a brother means being a brother. Don't accept less than being treated like a brother from the brotherhood.

I am pleased that you received and accepted a bid from what appears to be a very good fraternity on your campus. I look forward to seeing you and having an opportunity to see the house and to meet the men who will over time become some of your best lifelong friends. I have many fond memories of my own experiences of fraternity life and I know that this can be an exciting, fun-filled, and rewarding time for you.

When I sat down to write this letter I did not expect it to be so long—just a bit of catching up, a bit of sharing some feelings. Oh well, it's been nice spending this time with you. Whenever I write I feel you are here, and it feels good because I miss you. I send you my love and several hugs. Collect one of the hugs when you read this letter and use the others when they would feel especially good. Take care of yourself, son. I'm proud of the man you are and I miss having you here with me.

Silently, solemnly, six men approached a gravesite to attend a memorial service for one who had passed away 125 years ago. The plot where they gathered was covered with a cloth. The one who rests there still receives the grateful admiration and respect of those still living unlike those who lie forgotten nearby in grander resting places.


Representatives of Phi Kappa Psi gathered on Sunday, August 2 to dedicate a new bronze marker next to the timeworn headstone of Thomas Cochran Campbell at the memorial service for the author of the Fraternity Ritual.

The ceremony was attended by Fraternity President Dr. David F. Hull Jr., Executive Director Gary B. Angstadt, Mystagogue Kent C. Owen, Endowment Fund Trustee Ralph D. Daniel, Archon Robert E. Lazzell II, and Penn Etan Stephen Lasday who discovered Campbell's

resting place in August 1986. Several other members of Penn Eta attended the ceremony.

Dr. Hull expressed the Fraternity's gratitude to Campbell and reminded those attending that "by Campbell's example and the example of his life, he has inspired us to know the great joy of serving others".

Each of the officers offered comments and the group sang "Noble Fraternity" and "Amici". Dr. Hull and Robert Lazzell pulled back the cloth to unveil the new bronze marker which now adorns the gravesite of the Fraternity's Ritualist. As a final tribute, each man dropped rose petals over Campbell's resting place and the group departed as silently as it had arrived, knowing that Campbell had been given the long-overdue recognition he deserved.

"The new marker that adorns Tom's grave reflects his work in the Ritual. Like our Ritual, it is simple and dignified...

When my pledge class and I were pledged, we joined a group of friends that made us feel welcome and at home . . . In trying to figure out how to improve Penn Eta, we tried everything . . . We finally decided to believe in ourselves and disregard the popular programs of other fraternities . . . Since then we often turned to the Ritual for guidelines. We organized charity programs where the emphasis was service . . . We closed our social events to the public . . .

Our image at Franklin & Marshall has drastically improved. Penn Eta has changed from an unorganized Chapter of less than 10 men to a strong, organized campus leader, a Chapter popular for its members and their actions—not for its parties. All this is due in great part to the Ritual. We rushed by demonstrating the Ritual through action, not through rush parties. The Ritual of Phi Kappa Psi is truly practical and meaningful: it speaks Truth and it works...



The Birth of Pennsylvania Pi

While America was busy celebrating the birth of the Constitution, Phi Kappa Psi was busy celebrating the birth of its new Chapter, Pennsylvania Pi. On Saturday morning, the 12th of September, 1987, the final installation was completed. There were then 92 Chapters, and the first ever named Pi.

Charter Weekend began on Friday September 11th with a reception at the recently renovated Pennsylvania Pi Chapter House. In attendance were the Colony members and their honored guests. Visitors included esteemed members from Fraternity Headquarters, representatives from area Chapters, and various administrators from Temple University including the Dean of Students.

The following morning, the candidates assembled at the Church of The Holy Trinity on beautiful Rittenhouse Square. There the induction ceremony took place, and the Brothers of Pennsylvania Pi were introduced to the secrets of Phi Kappa Psi. The years of work had finally come to fruition: Pennsylvania Pi was now a Chapter. Not a face in the church was without smile or watery eye.

That evening the newly initiated Brothers along with their families, dates, and shining Chapter badges gathered at the Philadelphia Hershey Hotel for the Installation Banquet. After dinner, Symposiarch Ralph "Dud" Daniel introduced the delegation from Headquarters. Speeches included a reading from Temple University Greek Advisor Ronald A. Wilson and a memorable address by SWGP Dr. David F. Hull, Jr.

Following the presentations, the initiates danced with their dates for the first time ever as Brothers of Phi Kappa Psi. It was a night no Brother or guest will soon forget.

The History of Temple University

Founded in 1884 and now with an enrollment of more than 31,000 students in 14 schools and colleges, Temple University is one of the nation's major centers of teaching, research, and service. Located midway between New York City

and the nation's capital, in the heart of the northeast corridor, Temple offers a broad range of high-quality academic programs that attract students from all over the United States and from more than 60 foreign nations.

The university had a distinguished fac-

ulty, many of whom possess national and international reputations. Temple is one of the top 100 institutions in the U.S. doing research for the federal government and has one of only three university-based national survey-research facilities in the nation.

At Temple, students can earn bachelor's degrees in 84 fields, master's degrees in 87, and doctoral degrees in 60. Eleven schools and colleges provide baccalaureate degree programs. The graduate school offers master's and doctoral programs in cooperation with other schools and colleges within the university. Professional degrees are offered in law, medicine, dentistry, and pharmacy.

History of Pennsylvania Pi Colony

In the early fall of 1985 in response to a growing need for fraternities with progressive philosophies, the local fraternity called Phi Phi Phi (Tri-Phi) was created. Its purpose was to bring about a balance of academics, charity work, and social activities, promoting the "well rounded" man. After an extensive search for a suitable national fraternity, Phi Kappa

Psi was chosen, and on March 17, 1986, Tri-Phi became the Pennsylvania Pi Colony of Phi Kappa Psi.

The young Colony immediately became involved in all areas of the university greek system, joining the Interfraternity Council, and participating in a wide spectrum of campus events. Working diligently, the members began to lay down a foundation upon which the fraternity would boom over the following semesters. To crown the first six months, a house was acquired on Diamond Street. With a new central headquarters, the Colony was ready to begin its first full semester at Temple.

The 1986-87 school year proved to be a period of enormous growth for the Colony. Doubling its size in the fall and adding 10 more men in the spring, Pennsylvania Pi became much more visible. Desiring their national Charter, the Colony advanced rapidly. Today, Phi Kappa Psi is recognized as one of the leading fraternities at Temple University.



Terrence G. Harper Oklahoma State '85 **Brotherhood or Business?**

During this Fall's tour, one particular comment from a Brother really stuck out in my mind. I was in the middle of a rather heated discussion concerning financial responsibility with the Chapter when the Brother exclaimed, "I joined Phi Kappa Psi, not IBM!" This statement got me to thinking: When you join Phi Kappa Psi, are you committing yourself to a Brotherhood or a business? I think the answer is: both.

Being a member of a fraternity—any fraternity—brings with it much responsibility, not only in moral and scholastic obligations but also a financial obligation. The typical fraternity Chapter has its own housing and, obviously, it takes money to pay the bills. The typical Chapter also has financial obligations to its headquarters, obligations that must be borne by the undergraduates.

Nothing can take away from the lifelong friendships you make during your undergraduate days in your local Phi Psi Chapter, but you must realize that in order for the Chapter to continue to operate, there has to be adequate income to meet expenses. Too often I have visited Chapters whose accounts receivable, both undergraduate and alumni, total upwards of \$15,000. That's a lot of bones that could go toward paying a Chapter's insurance premium or making a few mortgage pay-

When I ask what steps they are taking to collect these monies, the most common response is, "Well, he's a Brother and we can't force him to pay." And yet, these guys are still living and eating in the Chapter house, as well as taking part in all the other benefits of the Fraternity, namely the privilege of voting in Chapter meetings and making it to all the parties. I find this to be ridiculous. How are these men ever supposed to learn any financial responsibility if the Chapter is going to continue to let them freeload? And what about those Brothers who do pay promptly? Is it their responsibility to cover the missing income with their own dollars? I should think not.

I have heard the expression "Brotherhood ends where the checkbook begins," and I find this to be somewhat realistic. You are not being a good Brother if you refuse to support your Chapter by meeting your basic financial obligations. There are cases of true financial hardships that sprout up occasionally and these should be handled on an individual basis—and should involve the signing of some sort of promissory note guaranteeing payment. But those delinquent Brothers who always find enough money for going out on the weekends should be treated with swift and decisive sanctions.

In this age of rising interest rates and skyrocketing insurance premiums, it is important, now more than ever, to start to enforce strict collection policies. And if you currently don't have any, get together with your House Corporation and develop some right away. I can assure you the Chapter will be much better off and those members who are in arrears may learn a valuable lesson about financial responsibility and the Chapter will get a better Brother in return.

Phi Kappa Psi has so much to offer all its members, especially the undergraduates. An adequately detailed budget and set of Chapter bylaws, coupled with dedicated alumni advisory support can help to insure a Chapter's success, but it all boils down to the caliber and character of the undergraduates. Let us continually strive to live up to the obligations we accepted as a pledge and reaffirmed upon initiation and realize the best that lies in each and every one of us.

I have always tried to end my "potpourri of thoughts" on an upbeat note and this article is no exception. I have just one tidbit of information to all Chapters who might be wondering:

CONSULTANTS DON'T DO COUCHES!! Have a happy Holiday Season and until next time, take care.

Are the ideals of the Fraternity reflected in your campus reputation? Could someone paraphrase what Phi Psi stands for by knowing you?

In a nutshell, be true to your school and Phi Kappa Psi will continue its long and healthy relationship with our nation's great institutions. 1988 marks the 100th anniversary of my own Chapter at the University of Minnesota. Allegheny College and Penn Beta—our oldest Chapter in continuous existence, have been colleagues for 132 years. Let's be protective of these treasured friendships.

Is anyone trying to make a difference?

Could I be getting more out of my membership at Phi Psi?

I think these questions are not being asked enough in our Chapters and pertinent issues are being passed over. Before handling these problems effectively, people first need to know how to best focus their attention. Chapter elections are right around the corner for many of our groups. If you are one who is interested in being an officer, these questions can be very helpful in formulating your own ideas. This could be helpful in getting your campaign speech together and will enable you to better organize your goals for the Chapter.

After 13 months, the Colony we had worked so hard to establish was receiving its Charter.



History of Rutgers University


Rutgers University was chartered in 1766 as Oueens College, making it the eighth oldest school of higher education in the nation. In 1825 the name of the school was changed to Rutgers College in honor of Revolutionary War veteran, Colonel Henry Rutgers. Rutgers College achieved university status in 1924, and in 1956 it was designated as the State University of New Jersey. The university has developed an incredible diversity of programs, ranging from psychology to agriculture and from fine arts to engineering. Rutgers has grown to include 47,000 students on three major campuses across the state.



Yount is the son of William and Mary Yount of Chapel Hill, NC.



He has taught accounting at the University of Mississippi and Millsaps College, and plans to concentrate on management consulting while teaching at a university after completing his doctorate.




Craig Drake Zollars, Michigan State '84, is the recipient of the 1987 Mary Pickford Rogers Memorial Scholarship.

He is the son of Phillip and Evelyn Hartley of Vestal, NY.






Timothy Patrick McCourt, Washington '78, has been named a Tutor-in-Residence at the University of Pennsylvania for the 1987-88 academic year.

FREDERIC B. SADTLER, Lafayette '18, Philadelphia, PA, November 14, 1986. He was an investment broker with Thompson McKinnon Securities for the past 24 years, and was a member of the Philadelphia Union League.

ORLO W. BOND, Missouri '20, Rockport, MA, September 18. He served as an ensign in the Navy during World War I and in Essential Services for the Allied Air Force during World War II. From 1922 to 1945 he served with Standard Oil Company where he was stationed in India. In 1948 he and his family returned to the U.S. and he spent a year of study at the Harvard Graduate School of Education. From 1950 to 1955 he was director of admissions at Rockford College in Rockford, IL. He retired in 1955. He and his wife Marjorie moved to Rockport, MA, where he was a member of the Cape Ann Historical Association, the American Red Cross, and the Rockport Art Association. He and his wife celebrated their 59th wedding anniversary on Sept. 12.

FREDERIC S. KLEIN, Franklin & Marshall '20, Lancaster, PA, March 10. Prior to joining F&M's faculty in 1928, he taught at New York University. During World War II, Klein helped to organize a naval aviation war training program. Two of his enduring interests were the Civil War and aviation. In 1947, he was a founder of the Lancaster Symphony and was its first president. He played cello in the orchestra until 1970. After his retirement he was active in historical circles by serving as editor of Historical Times and as secretary of the National Historical Society, besides other professional organizations.

MILTON J. JACKSON, Vanderbilt '21, Greensboro, NC, September 12. He retired as vice president of Jefferson Standard Insurance Company. He served as major in Marine Corps during World War II.

VINCENT MUIR ROGERS, Kansas '23, Sewell's Point, FL, June 22. While attending the University of Kansas, he achieved national standing and became the first tennis player to win the Missouri Valley Championship in both singles and doubles. After college he began his career in industrial finishes with Jones Dabney in Louisville. Later he became an officer and member of the board of American Marietta in Chicago. He retired in 1968 but retained a directorship in William Tell Woodcrafters in Tell City, IN.

FRANK WILLIS MAYBORN, Colorado '23, Temple, TX, May 16. His achievements include civic, service, philanthropic, communications, and military areas. As president of the Temple (TX) Chamber of Commerce, he organized and chaired a committee which was responsible for the establishment of Fort Hood. Mayborn enlisted in the Army as a private after turning down a commission in the Army Air Corps. He received a commission through Officer Candidate School at age 39, and served under General Marshall in Washington and General Eisen-

In the area of communications, Mayborn organized Bell Broadcasting in 1936 which owned and operated numerous radio and television stations. He was past president of the Texas Daily Newspaper Association (TDNA) and the Southern Newspaper Publishers Association. He originated internship programs for journalism students through the TDNA and in 1982 received an award from them for his 50 years of contributions to the newspaper industry. Upon his passing, tributes came from many national figures, including Lady Bird Johnson, former Texas Gov. John Connally, and U.S. Rep. Marvin Leath.

JOHN E. CANADAY, DePauw '24, Anderson, IN, July 27. He was a retired vice president of Lockheed and helped to establish the California Epsilon Chapter at UCLA. He had formerly served as UCLA Director of Alumni.

BENJAMIN V. dilORIO, Colgate '24, Utica, NY, August 13, 1986. He earned his MD degree at Cornell Medical College and served in the medical corps during World War II. He was senior anesthesiologist at Utica's St. Luke's Memorial Hospital for more than 30 years.

JERRY G. CHAMBERS, California '25, Northfield, IL, May 25. He was founder and chairman of the board of Clipper Express and founder and general partner in the Jerry Chambers Exploration Company.

STEPEHN DEAN HOLLOWAY, Oklahoma '25, Oklahoma City, OK, July 2. He received his BS, LLB, and JD degrees from the University of Oklahoma. After graduation he became assistant county attorney and was assistant state attorney general. During World War II, he served with distinction in the Army as Lt. Colonel and was a member of the judge advocate general corps in the European theater. After the war, he joined Stanolind Oil and Gas Co. as attorney. Later it was purchased by Amoco Production Co., from where he retired in 1971. He had been active in the Army Reserve and Phi Delta Phi.

He retired in 1976 and served as chairman emeritus and consultant for the agency. Van Riper was a Phi Beta Kappa and earned a masters degree from Harvard. He was a former member of the board of directors of the Indiana Bass Chapter Federation; former president of the Speedway 500 Golf Club; and was past secretary-treasurer of the Indiana State Senior Golf Association.

JOHN H. YOST, Bucknell '39, Riverton, NJ, July 1st. He served as a Navy lieutenant during World War II and the Korean Conflict. High winds, rain, sleet, snow, and ice hampered rescue attempts to find Keyes, who apparently fell and injured his leg. Keyes came to Louisville in 1961 as a Ford Foundation Young Composer and was resident composer for the city schools. He taught briefly in Kansas from 1965 to 1969, but returned to U of L. He contributed music reviews for The Courier Journal from 1971 to 1979 and had composed numerous works, including a ballet and works for the Louisville Children's Theater, Louisville Chorus, Campbell University, and the Muir String Quartet. He was executive secretary of the U of L Grawemeyer Award for Music Composition—a \$150,000 annual prize. Expressions of sympathy may be made to the Nelson Keyes Memorial Scholarship Fund at the U of L School of Music.

R. MARLIN SMITH, Chicago '52, Evanston, IL, June 15. He was an expert in municipal and land use law, and was a partner in the firm of Ross & Hardies. He served as legal counsel to several Chicago area municipalities. He taught land use and historic preservation law courses at the University of Illinois at Chicago, Northwestern University School of Law, and Chicago-Kent College of Law.

So unyielding is Ned Fritz that one environmentalist called him the "stubbornest man who ever lived."

Marooned in a million-dollar North Dallas neighborhood, environmentalist Ned Fritz gives nature her way. She takes it and emerges in his three-acre yard, messy, erratic and wild.

In payment, cedar elms cool his house. A tufted titmouse entertains him. Tree squirrels do his gardening.

The pulse of nature beats around him unchecked, fluttering, but fragile. Fritz hears it. Day and night, night and day, he works to keep nature working.

Genie, his wife of 43 years, often awakens after midnight to see his place in bed empty. She finds him in the living room scribbling some note that may go out tomorrow in one of the five to six dozen personal letters he sends each month to members of Congress, naturalists and bureaucrats around the country.

Most days the 71-year-old retired lawyer sits, bird watcher's binoculars beside him, in front of the windows at the back of his house, laboring over a half-dozen piles of papers that represent his current projects.

Without Ned's activism, no Texas environmental legislation would have passed the state Legislature or the U.S. Congress in the last two decades, says Rep. John Bryant, D-Dallas, who supports many of the bills Fritz likes.

"He's the most significant environmental figure in our state's history and will remain that, most likely. I doubt that we're going to see his equal," Bryant says.

Ask an East Texas forestry director about him, and you get a message from the secretary. "He said to tell you he has

no comment."

Ned is less reticent.

"They think everybody ought to take their word as experts and let them go on," he says in a tone that indicates that's about as likely as the rebirth of the dodo bird.

For more than 20 years, Fritz has been working his way into the forestry service's territory as slowly and surely as an oak root pushing through a concrete sidewalk.

Just as Fritz has won more and more territory in his battle against the destruction of the nature, so has nature won more and more of his life. "I guess you could say that nature just took over my law practice," he says.

The founder of the Texas Committee on Natural Resources, Fritz worked eight years to get 34,000 acres of wilderness in East Texas set aside. He helped save the Big Thicket. Twice, he helped defeat the Trinity River Canal, which would have run from Dallas to the Gulf.

Even Fritz's own yard was once a battleground. His house can't be seen from the road. But everyone knows it's there. The neighbors used to protest that his high grasses bred chiggers and his weeds gave off undesirable pollens.

"They'll still complain about it," says longtime neighbor Steve Condos, "but we've all kind of just decided to put up with Ned."

In 1972, the city tried to make Fritz mow his weeds. He went to court.

A Cameo of Phi Psi Days in Old Chicago

My days at Chicago, (Illinois Beta '35) in old Phi Psi involved more time relating to humans than to nature, but that is when I learned the most about writing. Four years on the staff of the Daily Maroon were inspirational, with Brothers Ralph Nicholson and Chuck O'Donnell encouraging me from their posts as editor-in-chief and managing editor, and Brother Emmett Dedman coming along right behind me as a future editor-in-chief (and later, managing editor of the Chicago Sun.) Most of the other Brothers seemed to appreciate my progress, even the guys who never wrote more than a love letter to some girl back home.

If one of my old buddies would like a deep insight into what Red Ned has gotten into as a lawyer and writer, read one of my books. Sterile Forest (Eakin Press) tells the true story of a lawsuit against the U.S. Forest Service, with plenty of excitement, suspense, and sheer stress. Realms of Beauty (University of Texas Press) is more of a coffee table book about five wilderness areas that I helped to save. The book has 50 professional color photographs.

Fritz's defense was that weeds are plants no one values, but he values every single plant in his yard.

He won.

To him, this yard is the "web of life," a small patch of "natural diversity," two words Fritz invokes like a Christian conjuring up the cross for a congregation of sinners.

Without natural diversity, humanity will lose the flexibility it needs to survive, he says. His desire to preserve nature goes beyond aesthetics. He considers himself a fighter in a desperate cause: the cause of human survival.

Move through the wall of woods around his driveway. Step around the pile of newspapers waiting to go to the recycling plant. Skirt the two brush piles that belong to the white-throated sparrows. Pull the string under the woodpecker doorknocker's tail, and the bird's head will knock loud enough to announce you.

The man who answers is the "stubbornest man who ever lived in the history of this world," according to environmental activist Pat Paralies.

Fit, slightly built, Fritz doesn't look stubborn at all. He's obliging, good natured, dryly humorous.

"I'm learning to get along with people," he says.

Fritz admits that he likes to argue. There's no point in always talking to people who agree, he says.

Some of his old opponents are so tired of his arguments that they won't pub-

licly debate him anymore, he says. They call him an environmental extremist.

Fritz's short beard and the wiry eyebrows behind his gold-rimmed glasses have gone white.

But the strands of hair left on his head still have a color that newspaper reporters never failed to mention in any story written during his time as a fiery young Jaycee and lawyer who specialized in consumer-related cases. Rising in a few errant waves, sometimes sprouting in their own independent directions, the hair on Fritz's head still holds a bit of red.

Pat Paralies first became acquainted with Fritz and his volunteer efforts when she called to ask if she could be of any help in saving natural environments.


"He laughed and said he thought he could find me something do do," she says. Eleven years later, she says, "He will work you into the ground."

No inconvenience is too great for Fritz to endure.

"I can remember back to the wilderness effort," says Ms. Paralies, referring to the eight years when Fritz and allies worked for passage of the East Texas Wilderness Act, which almost doubled the wilderness areas in Texas.


"We would be sitting in the camp with an inch of ice on our tents, and Ned thought that was perfectly ordinary behavior because this was important and we needed to know where a given tree was."

Fritz's next campaign will be a nation-

al movement against clear cutting, a widespread forestry practice in which all the trees in an area are cut and the land is replanted with one type of tree. The technique, Fritz says, destroys the natural diversity of an area.

But as much as he opposes clear cutting, Fritz won't chain himself to trees to stop it. He works in the system, no matter how long it takes.

He lives his principles every day, Ms. Paralies says.

In the summer, anybody invited to the Fritz houses had better wear something cool. Ned and Genie haven't used the air conditioner in years.

In the winter, wear a down coat, Ms. Paralies says. She recalls coming to the house one winter day to find Ned hosting a reporter from the *Christian Science Monitor*. The temperature inside was so cold that Ned was wearing a stocking cap, muffler and great coat and the reporter was freezing, she says.

As Fritz walks through the woods that surround his house, he's a modern Adam calling the plants by their names, telling their stories to his visitor.

Here, the fighter has no fight in him. He's quiet, almost reverent.

After 20 years, he still mourns the loss of the golden cheeked warbler's last nesting place in Dallas. He recalls with pride the fox that lived in his woods 10 years ago. A neighbor trapped it, then strangled it to get its fur, he says. He

can't say why a wealthy man would need a fox coat so desperately.

"Perhaps it's the human being's desire to compete with and utilize nature," he says mildly.

"Human beings survived for millions of years doing just that. Some learned to balance and exist with nature, and some have forgotten this long coexistence, forgotten that it's vital to our survival."


Wife Genie has been with Ned all the way. She willingly takes his impromptu quizzes on bushes and birds and berries. When he gives an environmental speech, she's in the audience. If no on else will, she responds to his prompting.

But when they moved to their house on Cochran Chapel Road in the '50s, Genie had one demand. The creek could rise the way nature intended, the bushes could cover the mail boxes unless God himself cut them back, and the Indian grass could grow head high, but on one small area in front of the house, she would have a lawn of St. Augustine.


She waters and mows her little lawn. Wild plants that propagate on her territory must be pretty or they will be rooted up.

"Her part of the yard is bigger than the whole lawns that most people have," Ned grouses good-naturedly.

But he's grown used to it. Like he said, he's learning to get along with people.
