A LETTER FROM OUR PRESIDENT



Brothers,

In 2002, when SWGP John Ciccarelli asked me to serve as his Director of Alumni Associations, my vision of Phi Kappa Psi was based almost entirely on my own, very positive, undergraduate experience and the relationships that had continued with my chapter brothers of that era. Since then, I have served on the Executive Council for nearly 10 years, and my vision has become even more positive with each succeeding Phi Psi encounter.

I've met 18-year-old pledges who already seem to "get it" about Phi Psi, and I've seen 80-year-old alumni come to their first-ever Phi Psi event since college and simply join right in where they left off. I know hundreds of dedicated alumni who serve the Fraternity because they want to, because they, like me, have a vision of what Phi Psi can do for boys becoming men.

On the other hand, I've met alumni whose only view of Phi Kappa Psi was their undergraduate years - it ended when they walked across the stage at commencement. I've also visited chapters where the vision of Phi Psi seems to have become distorted almost beyond recognition. Most often, such chapters do not have any significant hands-on alumni involvement.

My conclusion? It is the alumni who hold the vision in trust for the Fraternity. The active chapter is an ever-changing group, completely new every four years. It is nearly impossible for the vision to remain stable in such a shifting environment. The chapter advisor and other involved alumni are the sure means for re-infusing the vision into the chapter, over and over again, year after year.

Most of us, as alumni, do not have a hands-on role with a chapter. How do we help to keep the flame alive in those who do? That's where alumni associations and events like Founders Day, or my all-time favorite, the "Big Game" lunch, come into the picture. By showing up, by renewing those long personal relationships, by expressing our support for the brothers in the trenches, we can let them know how valuable they are in the process that is Phi Kappa Psi.

Brothers, I encourage you to participate at whatever level you are able, so that by your example and support, the vision continues on into the future. Start now; find your nearest Founders Day event, listed right here in this issue of *The Shield*, and plan to attend. Your presence could be the tipping point that builds enthusiasm and keeps the vision alive.

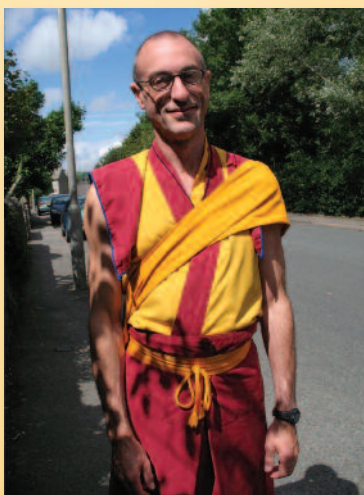

Kelsang Phunrab (Dan Orza) Oklahoma '86

In my twenties, I tried very hard to enjoy a successful life by attempting to acquire the right career, partner and possessions. But as we all know, life is hard, sometimes things go wrong and life takes unexpected turns. I found a self-interested approach did not serve me well. I was very frustrated from failing to find lasting satisfaction by manipulating the externals of my life. My heart was still not happy.

In my thirties, I began a new approach: to benefit others while I exercised. Balanced in what I considered a win-win scenario for everyone, I would get a good workout and others would be the beneficiaries of my workout. I participated in charity fundraising for various good causes throughout Oklahoma by bicycling. After each ride, there was a sense of accomplishment and some satisfaction. The culmination of this path peaked in the Washington DC AIDSride 7 fundraising tour in 2002. It was a four-day tour, stretching 330 miles from Norfolk, Virginia to the mall of Washington, D.C. When I had completed this event, I felt a keen sense that I still was not giving enough.

In my forties, I found a more profound way to benefit others: by becoming a Kadampa Buddhist monk. I had been practicing meditation with groups in Oklahoma, and I found that very helpful to relax and focus my mind. Over time, I discovered how to cultivate a more peaceful and altruistic mind. After a few years of meditation practice, I asked permission to become a monk. In 2007, I was ordained in England and given the name Kelsang Phunrab. Now I live at Kadampa Meditation Center Texas. The ordained lifestyle is a beautiful way to continue to hone my spiritual life and, at the same time, to create a place for others to develop peace in their lives. I have dedicated the entirety of my life to help others find happiness and meaning in their lives through the gentle practice of meditation and cherishing others.

As my teacher says, "Without inner peace, outer peace is impossible." By finding peace within, we can all enjoy peace in our homes and peace in the world. I have finally found a meaningful way to live in the great joy of serving others.

My only hope is to inspire my brothers and to fulfill my pledge of honor to the Phi Psi Creed, and to strive manfully for intellectual, moral and spiritual excellence. As a monk, it is only natural to give aid and sympathy to all who are less fortunate. I am deeply grateful that my life is in harmony with such lofty ideals.

INTRODUCTION

Phi Kappa Psi has experienced an “upswing” the past several years. The Fraternity’s undergraduate census number is at an all-time high, programming continues to improve and helps members be better students and leaders, the Grand Arch Council has doubled in attendance, Founders Day participation is steadily growing and there are nearly double the active alumni associations as there were 15 years ago.

With all this success, it is imperative that the Fraternity continues to strategically look at its operations to ensure that progress continues. To this end, the Headquarters Staff held their annual retreat this past fall to plan and prepare for the upcoming academic year. During the three-day retreat, staff spent considerable time strategically evaluating many aspects of the Fraternity. First, they strategically looked at the organization with intent to better define

what the purpose is of Phi Kappa Psi. After much deliberation and thought on what Phi Kappa Psi is, a new mission statement was created:

“The Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity engages men of integrity, further develops their intellect and enhances community involvement. With a legacy built on acceptance and trust, each brother realizes his highest potential through a lifelong experience of service and excellence.”

Moving forward the Executive Council and the staff will be using this mission statement as a guiding force on all programs and initiatives that take place. This will ensure that everything that is done in Phi Kappa Psi is in line with what the organization states it is.

for the coming year include the development and implementation of a model Fraternity Education program for new and initiated members, creating an affinity alumni program to continue to give alumni an opportunity to work with chapters and alumni associations, leveraging online technologies to better educate our members on necessary leadership skills, and utilizing the chapter excellence program more effectively as a roadmap for a chapter's success. Many of these initiatives you will be able to learn about in future issues of *The Shield*, and other Fraternity related social media outlets.

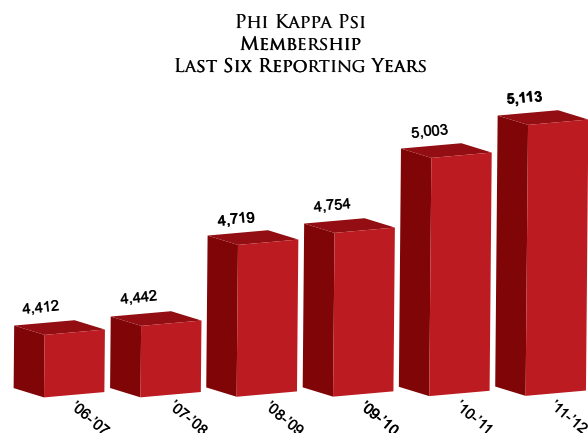
These are exciting times to be a member of Phi Kappa Psi. With all the success over the past several years comes the responsibility of those in "our strong band" to continue the leadership and forward thinking to continue the progress.

AVERAGE CHAPTER SIZE

An "average" chapter in Phi Kappa Psi had 48 members during the 2010-2011 academic school year. Though many chapters and campuses are different, this number is used as a benchmark for many of our chapters. The Fraternity asks that our chapters be above the average chapter size on their respective campus.

A survey conducted by the Fraternity Executives Association reported that the average chapter size for all men's fraternities was 40 in 2009-2010. Although the Fraternity's average chapter size is above the all Fraternity average, the Headquarters Staff and Executive Council continue to find ways to create programming to help chapters continue to grow our average chapter size.

From February 19, 1852, through May 31, 2011, the names of 116,999 men have been recorded on the Grand Membership Rolls.



CHAPTER SERVICES

During this report year, the Chapter Services team at Fraternity Headquarters, which includes the Executive Director, Assistant Executive Director, Director of Leadership Development, Director of Chapter Services, Director of Alumni Services, Director of Expansion and the five educational chapter consultants, worked very hard to provide the support and services chapters need to improve and excel. Every effort was made to ensure that each chapter was visited at least once, with most groups receiving multiple visits.

ALUMNI PROGRAMS

The Fraternity currently has a total of 51 active alumni associations across the country. February 19, 2012, will mark the 160th anniversary of the Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity. Providing resources, programming and best practices to house corporation board members, chapter advisors and alumni association officers remains a priority of the Fraternity. During the report year, the Fraternity again sponsored a New Volunteer Orientation, which was held in conjunction with the

Presidents Leadership Academy in Indianapolis, Indiana on January 28-30, 2011. The curriculum focused primarily on giving house corporation officers the training and resources for their individual roles. While at the conference, the attendees were able to learn about best practices, fraternal programs, policies, and paperwork that they will be able to take back and implement in their chapters and corporations.

Lastly, during the Woodrow Wilson Leadership School from June 22-26, 2011, at Ohio State University, members from various alumni associations took part in a special alumni-only track of educational programming, with a primary focus on alumni associations. Participants learned about the resources available to them and networked with other association officers to share best practices.

EXPANSION

Since the last annual report, the Muskingum Colony (located in New Concord, Ohio) was chartered. Also, January 21, 2012 has been set for the Rutgers Colony (New Jersey Gamma) chartering date.

The Fraternity continues to seek out institutions that would be good homes for chapters of Phi Kappa Psi. There are currently five other colonies that are working to become chartered chapters of Phi Kappa Psi. These colonies include: Ball State, Houston, Vanderbilt, Virginia Commonwealth and Wisconsin.

The Fraternity lost the California Epsilon Chapter since the last report.

LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT

The Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity continues to offer programming to its members for personal development and chapter operations. National programs that were offered the past report year include: the Presidents Leadership Academy (PLA), New Volunteer Orientation, Recruitment Bootcamp, Greek Life EDU, Woodrow Wilson Leadership School and the Leadership Experience.

The PLA is in its 17th year and was again held in Indianapolis, Indiana. The 2011 PLA hosted nearly 100 chapter presidents/leaders at the conference. As always, the Fraternity furnishes travel as well as room and board for each chapter president in attendance. The 2012 PLA will be held on January 27 – 29, at the



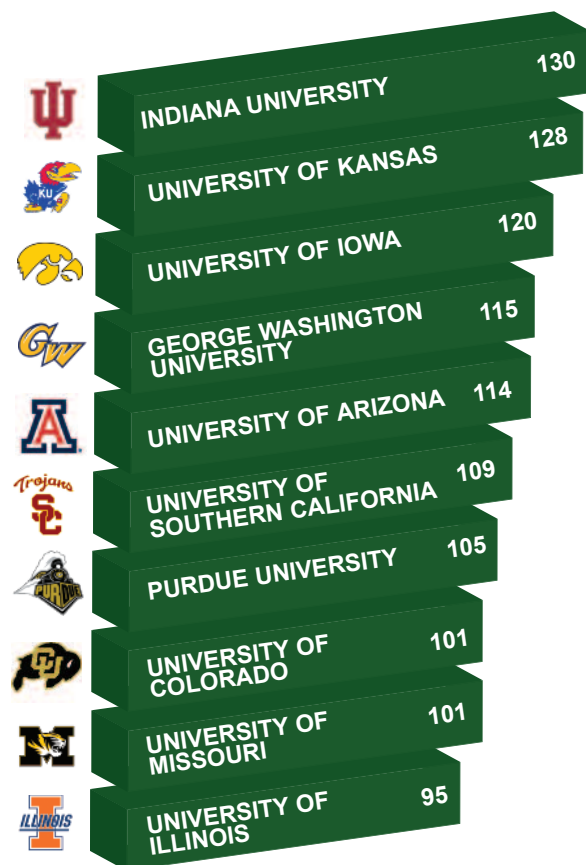
downtown Hilton in Indianapolis, Indiana. Its name has been changed to the Terrence G. Harper Presidents Leadership Academy, in honor of the Fraternity's fourth Executive Director, Terry Harper *Oklahoma State '85*, who left us too early in June of 2009. The PLA was his creation while on staff.



During the report year one of the most successful programs, Recruitment Bootcamp, completed its fifth year of existence. This program is an in-depth workshop that teaches undergraduate members specific ways to sell the organization and recruit the best students on their respective campuses. All chapters are invited to Recruitment Bootcamp, but chapters that are below the average chapter size on their respective campus are strongly encouraged to attend this program. This year's program was held in conjunction with the President's Leadership Academy in Indianapolis, Indiana.

The Woodrow Wilson Leadership School & District Council Meetings were held on the campus of The Ohio State University on June 22-26, 2011. Over 300 undergraduates and alumni participated in this four day leadership program.

INSURANCE AND RISK MANAGEMENT

Since 1997, Phi Kappa Psi has been a member of FRMT, Ltd., a United States-based mutual reinsurance company.

The cost for liability insurance during the report year was \$150 per man. For the 2010-2011 academic year, we are pleased to report that the rate was able to remain at \$150 per man even during some challenging insurance times. FRMT continues to be the best option for Phi Kappa Psi. Non-FRMT group rates are significantly higher than ours and those groups are unable to get into FRMT due to their loss record.

Phi Kappa Psi has instituted a variable rating schedule for chapters. Chapters with a risk management violation during an academic year will pay a higher premium than those chapters who do not have a violation. Furthermore, chapters may earn an extra discount if they have a history of no losses during a tracking period and complete risk management educational programming found in the back of the risk management guide. Phi Kappa Psi paid over \$800,000 in insurance premiums for both property and liability coverage during the report year. The Fraternity's coverage included a \$40 million property coverage policy for chapter houses, and liability coverage of \$6 million.

Phi Kappa Psi is also a member of FIPG, Inc., a risk management association made up of more than 45 men and women's fraternities. Phi Psi has adopted the FIPG, Inc., risk management policy as its minimum risk management standard.

EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

The Executive Council is the supreme governing body of the Fraternity between Grand Arch Councils. This 10-member board of directors is the policy-making arm of the Fraternity. Serving on the Executive Board during the report year were: President J. Tryon

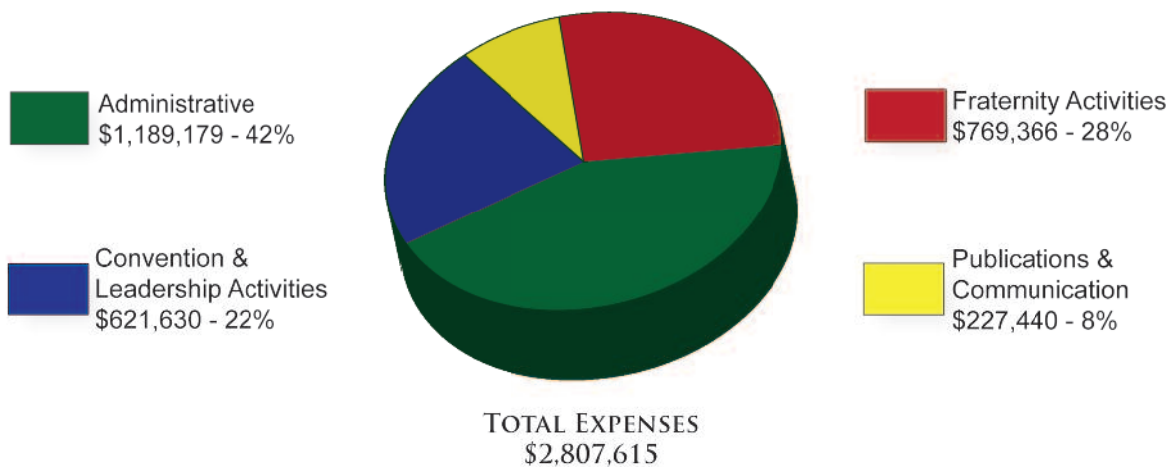
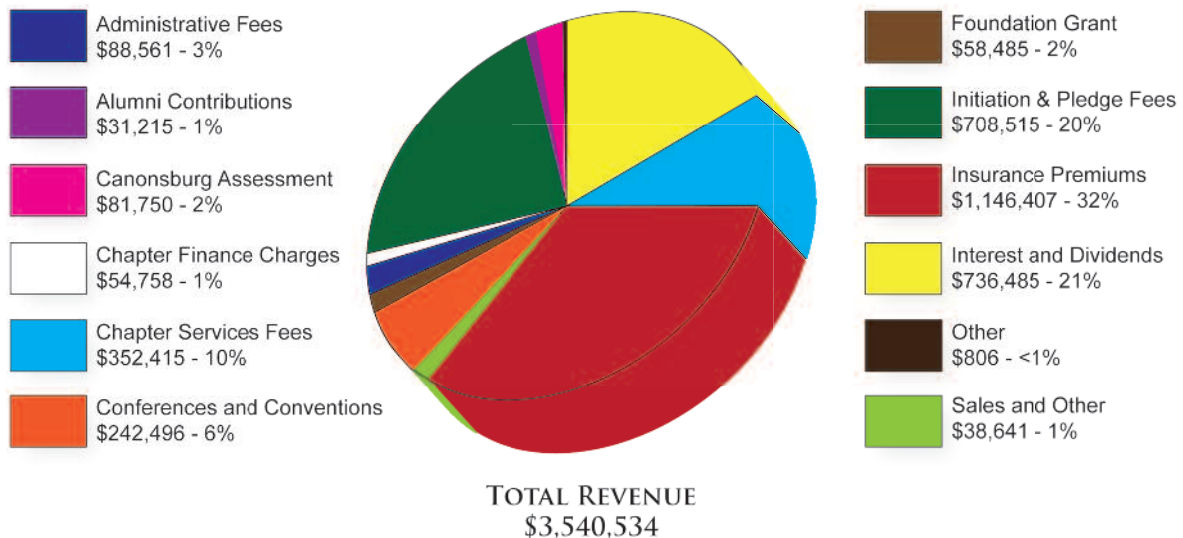

FINANCES

PHI KAPPA PSI 2010-11 TOTAL REVENUE & EXPENSES



The total assets of the Fraternity are determined by combining the totals of the various funds under the umbrella of Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity, Inc., an Indiana nonprofit corporation. The assets of three funds – the General Fund, the Insurance Fund and the Permanent Fund – make up the vast majority of the Fraternity's net worth. There exist a few smaller funds that have been created for specific purposes.

At the end of the report year, the net assets of the

Fraternity were \$5,964,881, compared to \$5,284,954 a year ago, an increase of \$679,927. Total liabilities and net assets were \$6,139,657 for the report year.

The graphs show the Fraternity's breakdown of income and expenses in the General Fund from June 1, 2010 to May 31, 2011.

That process began this past fall, as members of the expansion team from National Headquarters moved in to the chapter property and have helped build a group of 47 men.

The youngest of all of our colonies, early recruitment efforts on campus included a media onslaught. The publicity led to a first group of 20 fine men, and the colony was officially established on December 1st. Alumni support will be key for this group, with a location about an hour away from Indianapolis. Stay tuned for more progress reports.

BACK TO THE GAC

As many brothers of Phi Kappa Psi are getting ready for this year's biennial Grand Arch Council in San Antonio, TX, I would like to share a few thoughts about why we are there and, more to the point, why so many of us return every two years. As to the first issue, the GAC is, like most of our national gatherings, an opportunity to take care of the business of being an organization, making changes where necessary, electing officers, and reminding ourselves of the purpose for the Fraternity's existence.

For those of us who will be returning to the GAC, an ever-increasing number, this is an occasion for renewing old friendships and for meeting the young men who are leading the Fraternity into the future. Beyond the social activities of food and beverage, which are both bountiful and frequent, you can see, hopefully, the proper manner for conducting the business portion of organizational meetings, thus broadening your personal skills set in a friendly environment. The balance between work and pleasure is distributed, reinforcing the social aspect of our society, while still addressing needs and concerns of the moment.

For those who have sat through hours of boring committee work in the chapters, you may discover that such time need not be drudgery. Open discussion and reports from the committees can clarify our direction for subsequent action. Planned training in the execution of initiations is presented in the model initiation, and numerous workshops in all areas of the Fraternity operations are available. Most importantly, the resources from experienced leaders in specific areas, such as scholarship and

expansion, move beyond the written text of constitution and by-laws into individuals who have actually worked on matters ranging from membership and fraternity education to finances and the Ritual.

In addition to fraternal concerns and issues, we often find ourselves in venues that we would not otherwise find reason to visit. We will be in San Antonio, Texas, in 2012, which I am discovering is conveniently compact, with the hotel and many sightseeing attractions within a few blocks of each other. Besides the Alamo, the city offers a number of diversions for individual brothers and their families. GAC sessions are the focus of efforts, but ample time is provided for some personal recreation. You may expect some scheduled activities from the golf tournament to the community service project as well.

FOR THE FIRST TIME

What we often overlook is the opportunity in education by example. Alumni may set the tone for a successful GAC, and the response of the undergraduate brothers will prove our ability to share those values and ideals that separate Phi Kappa Psi from other houses.

I have asked, on this occasion, to address one particular event that has been a shortcoming of the more recent GACs – the election of officers to the Executive Council. This is not a commentary on those who currently serve, have recently served, or who intend to seek election, but rather an observation of where we may have not done our best as leaders. Many of the elections in recent years have been without any choice, which is not always an indication of a lack of available leadership, but a meeting of the right brother at the right time for the right job. I have often commented that the contested races provide a needed perspective on how to select those who will lead the Fraternity to future growth and success. In truth, I have advised that every position should be contested, with the single exception of when my own name might be on the ballot, of course! This should neither be a hurried nor mechanical process, but a serious consideration of the brother and his ability to serve. Eagerness to serve, ambition for the title, personal friendship, and empty promises of help for our respective chapters should have no place in our deliberations.

For those who seek to win our support with dinner and drinks, with endorsement of favorite projects, or with gestures of personal financial contribution to the Fraternity at large, we should look with caution to their motivation. The Fraternity needs and deserves those men who seek what is best for the entire brotherhood, not personal gain or status or development of chapter strength based on some obscure sense of geographic loyalty. The tasks that await us will provide many challenges, requiring the sacrifice of time and resources from those elected. Most of the work will be rewarded by personal satisfaction rather than public recognition. We can demonstrate the ability to choose such leaders, without rancor or political gamesmanship, not based on our personal preference or bias, but on our due care in selecting and supporting the best for us all.

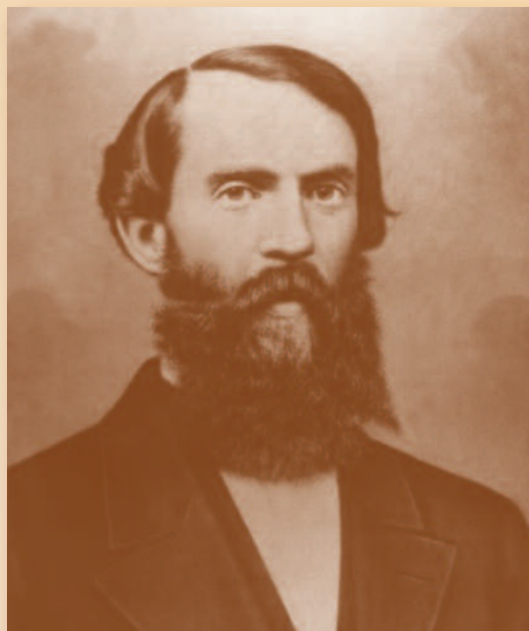

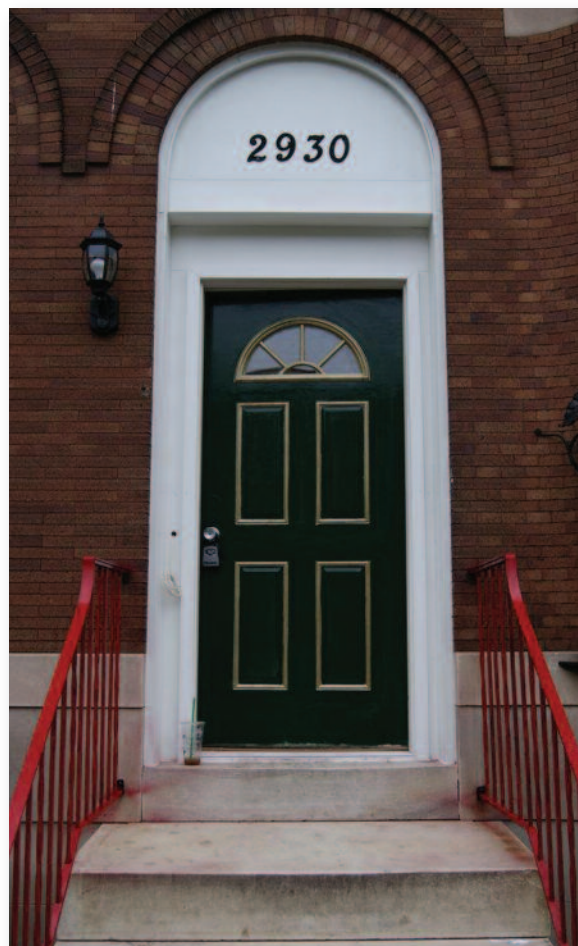

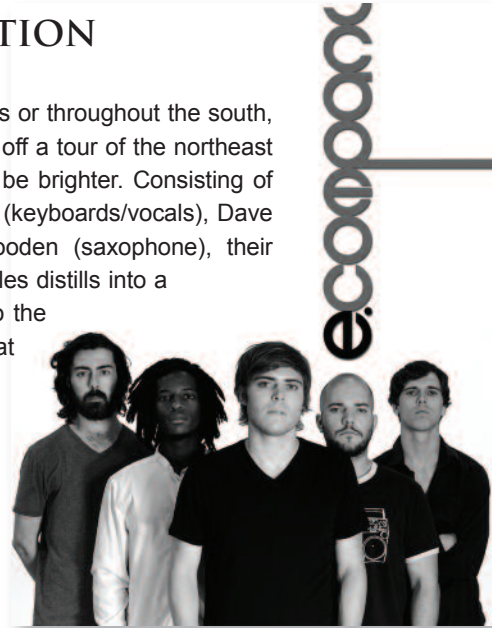

David M. Lyon **Illinois Beta '40**

David M. Lyon, son of Leverett S. Lyon *Beloit '06* (*Chicago '10*), the 25th president of Phi Kappa Psi, died peacefully on September 27, 2011 at the age of 93.

Dave was born on March 17, 1918 in Chicago to Leverett S. and Helen Lucille Lyon. During World War II, Dave worked for Dr. E. J. Workman and assisted in the development of the proximity fuse, cited by General George Patton as the decisive factor in the Allies' victory in the Battle of the Bulge. After the war, Dave completed his undergraduate studies in engineering at the University of New Mexico.
