



The beginning of the new year brings new opportunity for our individual lives. For Phi Kappa Psi it brings heightened focus, for the first few months of each year offer some of our most exciting opportunities. While we encourage you to find a Founders Day event to celebrate our birthday in February, don't forget our National Day of Service. This year, we invite all of our members to find a way to give back on Saturday, April 13, 2013.

National Day of Service is meant to be a culmination, a celebration of a year's worth of work improving our communities and the lives of those who are less fortunate. Last semester, our men volunteered for over 29,000 hours, and raised more than \$107,000 for local and national charities. It's only fitting that we point that out in a magazine promoting the 161-year anniversary of our founding by two men who were united by the 'great joy of serving others.'

Much of that hard work has a common benefactor. We are thrilled to see continuous growth from our members when it comes to working with the Boys & Girls Clubs of America. With nearly 4,000 clubs nationwide, and a majority of the youth in those clubs being boys (potential Phi Psi members?), the opportunity for us to make a difference serves every intrinsic value of our Fraternity.

It has led to our work with local clubs in Orlando and San Antonio at the last two Grand Arch Councils. It has created immeasurable networks of support for clubs in Alabama, lowa, New York, California and Pennsylvania (to name a few), who rely on our student populations to staff weekly activities. It has even led to some tremendous awards, such as our New York Theta Chapter at RIT receiving the Community Appreciation Award from its local Boys & Girls Club for "tireless philanthropic efforts." 2012-13 NATIONAL ADOPTED CLUB

Building on that inspiration, the National Fraternity is continuing a program that was greatly successful in 2011-12. After exceeding our goal of raising \$4,600 for the tornadoravaged Boys & Girls Clubs of West Alabama, the community service committee has set its sights higher for this school year. And we need your help!

Our Goal: To raise \$6,200 for the Boys & Girls Clubs of Manatee (Fla.) County for increasing transportation needs

"Transporting children and youth to and from BGCMC after school, school break, and summer programs is a critical component of assuring that economically disadvantaged youngsters can take advantage of BGCMC comprehensive programming," said Valerie Nelson, Vice President of Development. "On any given day one or more of our buses is pulled off the road for repair thus impacting our ability to efficiently transport a portion of the nearly 1,600 children who utilize our programs and this service."

The need of this club was brought to our attention thanks to our brothers from the South Florida Gulf Coast Alumni Association. Led by the efforts of Bob Greene *Buffalo* '59, who

spearheaded the donation of earth boxes to the club (pictured) and a recent Christmas tree sale to raise money for the club, the association learned of the transportation needs.

The Manatee County club has been told that its current fleet of buses and vans will need to be replaced over the next few years. Every time a bus is unavailable for use, hundreds of students from 32 area schools can be left without an opportunity to use the club's resources.

"More children in our clubs mean fewer children without supervision," Nelson added. "By spending time with us after school, they're not alone. Instead of joining a gang, they're joining our clubs. Instead of listening to thugs or drug dealers on the street, they're listening to our staff. We steer children down the right path so they don't take the wrong road.

"Your financial support to address one of our budgets greatest expenses – Transportation Fuel and Repair – would make a major impact on our ability to safely and efficiently serve the children in our community who need us most."

So, how can you help? Individuals are invited to send checks to the Phi Kappa Psi National Headquarters made out to 'Boys & Girls Clubs of Manatee County.' They will be tallied

and sent in a batch to our friends in Florida.

PHILANTHROPY THROUGH ADVENTURE

Douglas Stoup West Virginia '83 has been to the North and South Poles more times than any person on the planet! He was the first American to ski to the South Pole and continues to lead daring individuals on ski expeditions to remote places around the globe with his company, Ice Axe Expeditions. The life of a professional adventurer is unpredictable and spontaneous, but the preparation and goals can be intricately planned and thought out.

That's why Brother Stoup uses his connections, sponsorships and notoriety to make a positive impact. Ice Axe Foundation was founded to afford young people the opportunity to reach their full potential and better understand the planet **they** live on. It



partners with schools, scientists and research organizations to bring interactive learning experiences to classrooms around the world. Adventurers visit students in their schools and bring them along on the expeditions via satellite; connecting students the surrounding environments and incorporating them in the mission at hand.

Each expedition itself can bring media exposure and a chance to bring awareness not just to the Ice Axe Foundation, but also to noble causes throughout the world....

This profile was meant to document Brother Stoup's most recent adventure, as he and a fellow Phi Psi adventurer, Frank Fumich *West Virginia '87*, were set to become the first men to ever stand-up paddle board (SUP) from Cuba to Key West, Florida in late September 2012. Sadly, after arriving in Cuba, Mother Nature did not cooperate enough to provide navigable seas for the 118-mile trip (they estimate it will take roughly 40 hours!), and the quest was postponed until July of this year. We will stay in touch with Brother Stoup to see if the seas will allow the attempt, also pointing out that they are using it to raise money for the Wounded Warriors Project.

Don't worry, the first few months of 2013 won't take place without a challenge. On Brother Stoup's to-do list: A skiing expedition in Greenland, SUP through the Amazon and guiding "60 Minutes" to the North Pole.



As a non-profit entity we are required to provide an annual report to our membership. This report has been the foundation of one quarterly issue of the magazine for decades, providing the requisite prose of success (or failures), while also detailing various facts and figures. How have we grown? Who has been a part of that work? How is our financial health?

This year, we wanted to provide a more introspective view of the Fraternity's business and operations. To be fair to our 100+ chapters that are consistently reporting progress and numbers, we decided to hold ourselves to the same excellence program our chapters have come to know on a biennial basis.

Phi Kappa Psi's Chapter Excellence Program is designed for our groups as a chapter self-evaluation. It provides a way to evaluate strengths, document successes and identify areas where improvement is needed. The National Fraternity leans on this program to help understand how our chapters operate, not compared to others, but rather within a system that aims to guide any chapter towards success.

The foundation of the Chapter Excellence Program is the 11 standards of operation adopted by the Executive Council in 1995. These standards provide the blueprint by which chapters may measure their performance and set goals for the future.

We know that if the chapter meets Phi Psi's standards, it has a very good chance of excelling among the other fraternities in its Greek community. Furthermore, we can tie all 11 areas directly to our Creed, the manifesto that guides our organization and the behaviors of our members.

As you read the chapter newsletters in this issue of *The Shield*, you will notice that several of them are identified to have a certain level of accreditation. This recognition is derived from how a chapter excelled in the Chapter Excellence Program. 2013 is another year for the completion of this program, and chapters have already been provided with the blueprint for succeeding in all 11 areas. Those complete results will be published in the summer issue of the magazine.

While we anxiously await the submissions from our chapters this semester, we thought it only fair to measure the National Fraternity in those 11 areas. The following pages offer our own self-assessment. How did we do? For our members, we will let you be the judge...





11 AREAS OF EXCELLENCE

RITUAL

In the past year, Phi Kappa Psi has taken steps to assure that our secrets and Ritual are both protected, but also accessible to our members. This will extend into 2013 and beyond. Our newly elected national president, Jim Miller *Ohio State '85*, made inclusion of the Creed and Ritual as one of his three lead priorities for his biennium. This work started in the 2011-12 fiscal year, as members of the National Headquarters staff began incorporating more of this language into the day-to-day operations and publications of the Fraternity.

As we alluded to in the introduction, and as you can see in the titling of these pages, relating the guiding axioms of our organization to our behaviors and requirements is a way of offering continuing education for our more treasured lessons and language. In 2011-12, every graduating senior received our Creed in a pocket-sized card. Those same cards were distributed to attendees at our annual conferences. They were also distributed to various members throughout the country by past President Tryon Hubbard *Alabama '64*. In total, the Fraternity gave away more than 4,000 cards.

Additionally, 2011-12 saw the rebranding of our vision and mission statements (consult the winter 2012 issue of this magazine) to align more closely with our history and our present.

Finally, the education of our members on our Ritual, ideals, secrets and values is an ongoing process. During the 2011-12 year, brothers were exposed to seminars on Ritual Review at the Woodrow Wilson Leadership School, and various charterings at the 2012 Terrence G. Harper Presidents Leadership Academy.

Making items essential to our Ritual available to our members has also been a priority. 2011-12 saw the completion of our online shop, where members can purchase certain pieces of Phi Psi jewelry, books, music and Ritual items. Protected by the members-only section of our site, it assures that only brothers can purchase and receive merchandise.








SCHOLARSHIP



Our members are all one thing before initiation: students. Phi Kappa Psi is a supplement to the undergraduate experience and a lifelong benefit. While we spend countless hours educating our members on chapter management, personal integrity, values and leadership, it should not take away time from the actual <u>education</u> of those undergraduates.

As a member of the North-American Interfraternity Conference, we are able to look at how fraternity improves the student experience.

During the report year, Phi Kappa Psi chapters reported a cumulative GPA of 2.93, one tick above the NIC's all-fraternity average of 2.92. Both of these numbers exceed the all-men's average around the country of 2.90. While not an extreme difference, factor it over hundreds of thousands of members and it shows how the fraternal experience heightens our students' pursuits of academic excellence.





Slightly more than half of our chapters are also excelling in the classroom at a rate higher than that of their Greek peers. While this is a modest accomplishment to be proud of, there is tremendous room for growth. If we are to be an organization of excellence, the first measurement of that would be to have all of our chapters setting the standard of classroom success on their campuses.

Our latest priorities have focused on strong initiatives surrounding our values, mentoring, community service and recruitment. Moving forward, expect higher standards for academic performance and ways to take our cumulative GPA even higher.









MEMBERSHIP RECRUITMENT



An "average" chapter in Phi Kappa Psi had around 51 members during the 2011-12 academic school year. Though many chapters and campuses are different, this number is used as a benchmark for many of our chapters. The Fraternity asks that our chapters be above the average chapter size on their respective campus.

Although the Fraternity's average chapter size is above the all-fraternity average, the Headquarters Staff and Executive Council continue to find ways to create programming to help chapters continue to grow our average chapter size.

From February 19, 1852, through May 31, 2012, the names of 119,339 men have been recorded on the Grand Membership Rolls.



EXPANSION

Since last year's annual report, three chapters were chartered in the Fraternity. Those chapters include New Jersey Gamma (Rutgers), Virginia Eta (VCU) and Indiana Iota (Ball State).

Expansion continues to be a top priority for the Fraternity as we continue to seek out institutions that would be good homes for chapters. There are currently five colonies that are working hard to become chartered chapters of Phi Kappa Psi. They are: Akron, Delaware, Houston, Vanderbilt and Wisconsin.

The Fraternity lost two chapters during the report year. Arizona Alpha (Arizona) was closed due to hazing and risk management violations, and Pennsylvania Epsilon (Gettysburg) was closed due to struggling membership. Hopefully we will be able to return to both schools in the near future.

CAMPUS & COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT



While the main focus is rightfully on our tradition of service, it is important to note that the Fraternity is proud to be represented interfraternally by a number of staff members and volunteers. Executive Director Shawn Collinsworth *Indiana State '91* presently serves on the board of the Fraternity Executives Association. Director of Communications Will Haskett *Butler '00* is vice president of the Fraternity Communications Association. Bob Marchesani *Butler '94 (IUP '79)* is a past chairman of the North-American Interfraternity Conference and is still heavily involved with NIC programs and as liaison for the Fraternity.





In an effort to advance the cause of ending hazing, Phi Kappa Psi entered into a partnership in 2012 with HazingPrevention.org, supporting the fight against hazing as a platinum sponsor.

In addition to Greek involvement, the past year saw an increased focus on philanthropy from the national level. Beyond the incredible giving of our undergraduate chapters, we

successfully launched

a national campaign for the Boys & Girls Clubs of West Alabama, raising funds to improve their educational facility. The 2012 Grand Arch Council also raised more than \$2,000 for the local clubs of San Antonio.

DID YOU KNOW?

Phi Kappa Psi members completed 27,000 hours of service and raised \$100,000 for the Boys and Girls Club of America.







CHAPTER SERVICES

The Consultant Program remains the most visible and important component in the chapter services arsenal. Phi Psi had five road warriors during nine months of the report year traveling the red and green highway. Each chapter had a visit that lasted at least three days, with the goal of helping every chapter reach its potential. Many chapters have taken advantage of the program and request additional visits during the year or ask for a recruitment visit prior to formal recruitment periods.

The purpose of the ELC program is to continue to assist chapters in leadership and scholarship programming, chapter management evaluations, officer training, risk management presentations, recruitment workshops and general troubleshooting. It is vital to have area alumni work with local chapters to help institute these best practices with follow-up from staff. The strongest chapters nationwide are those that have alumni attend chapter meetings and advise the chapter on a weekly basis. During this report year, the Chapter Services team at Fraternity Headquarters, which includes the Executive Director, Assistant Executive Director, Director of Leadership Development, Director of Chapter Services, Director of Alumni Services, Director of Expansion and the five chapter consultants, worked very hard to provide the support and services chapters need to improve and excel.



The Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity continues to have an arsenal of leadership programming for the undergraduate membership to utilize. These



programs include: The

The PLA is in its 18th year and was again held in Indianapolis, Indiana. The 2012 PLA hosted nearly 100 chapter presidents and leaders. As always, the Fraternity furnishes travel as well as room and board for each chapter president in attendance. The 2013 PLA will be held on February 8-10, 2013, at the downtown Sheraton in Indianapolis, Indiana.

One of the most successful programs in the Fraternity is Recruitment Boot Camp. This essential program just completed its sixth year of existence and included in-depth workshops that taught members specific ways to sell the organization and recruit the best students on their respective campuses.

All chapters are invited to Recruitment Boot Camp, but chapters that are below the average chapter size on their respective campus are strongly encouraged to attend this program. This year's program will be the first time in four years that it will not be held in conjunction with the PLA and will be held on January 25-27, 2013.

Phi Kappa Psi also partners with the North-American Interfraternity Conference (NIC) in its leadership programs. Ten fellowships are given from the Phi Kappa Psi Foundation to members to attend the Undergraduate Interfraternity Institute and the Futures Quest program.

The Woodrow Wilson Leadership School & District Council Meetings will be held on the campus of Butler University on June 26-30, 2013. Over 300 undergraduates and alumni participated in this four day leadership program in 2011.


FRMT group rates are significantly higher than ours and those groups are unable to participate in FRMT due to their loss record.

Phi Kappa Psi has instituted a variable rating schedule for chapters. Chapters with a risk management violation during an academic year will pay a higher premium than those chapters who do not have a violation. Furthermore, chapters may earn an extra discount if they have a history of no losses during a tracking period and complete risk management educational programming found in the back of the risk management guide. If you are interested in lowering your insurance premium, please contact Chad Stegemiller or Mark Lipka at Fraternity Headquarters.

Phi Kappa Psi paid over \$800,000 in insurance premiums for both property and liability coverage during the report year. The Fraternity's coverage included a \$40 million property coverage policy for chapter houses and liability coverage of \$6 million. Phi Kappa Psi is also a member of FIPG, Inc., a risk management association made up of more than 45 men and women's fraternities. Phi Psi has adopted the FIPG, Inc., risk management policy as its minimum risk management standard.

In addition to a set of employee standards for the National Headquarters Staff, sample code of conduct documents are routinely reviewed by staff and officers to make sure our membership standards are being upheld.














For almost our entire existence, housing was not a focus of the National Fraternity. Beyond the bounds of insurance, housing has predominantly fallen on the shoulders of our local house corporations. While there is nothing wrong with that form of management, Phi Kappa Psi recognized a need to take on more of a leadership role when it came to preserving our properties. Today, local housing entities own and operate more than \$90 million worth of Phi Kappa Psi property.





That's where the Canonsburg Corporation comes in. Having completed seven years of operation, Canonsburg now boasts more than \$1.2 million in total assets and has fulfilled/executed a dozen loans to help improve the housing situations of chapters from coast to coast. Those loans include some sort of assistance to improve the living situation for our brothers at Florida State, Illinois, Iowa, Michigan, Ohio, Penn State, Southern Cal, Washington and others.

Every housed chapter in Phi Kappa Psi contributes (per member) to the growth of the Canonsburg Corporation. The trustees are consistently looking for ways to have a larger, positive impact on the housing future of our Fraternity. What has started with resources, education and loans could grow one day into full-scale property management and nationally owned structures.









The total assets of the Fraternity are determined by combining the totals of the various funds under the umbrella of Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity, Inc., an Indiana nonprofit corporation. The assets of three funds – the General Fund, the Insurance Fund and the Permanent Fund – make up the vast majority of the Fraternity's net worth. There exists a few smaller funds that have been created for specific purposes.

At the end of the report year, the net assets of the Fraternity were \$6,156,136 compared to \$5,962,765 a year ago, an increase of \$193,371. Total liabilities and net assets were \$6,429,398 for the report year.

The following graphs show the Fraternity's breakdown of income and expenses in the General Fund from June 1, 2011 to May 31, 2012.



CHAPTER AT BALL STATE UNIVERSITY IS 159TH IN FRATERNITY HISTORY; 103RD ACTIVE

On Saturday, October 27, 2012, the Indiana lota Chapter of Phi Kappa Psi was officially chartered on the campus of Ball State University. The ceremony took place just over a year after the colony began, showing the incredible dedication the 45 founding fathers put in to establishing the ninth chapter in the state of Indiana, all currently active. Undergraduate brothers from Butler and Purdue made the trip to Muncie, Indiana to be a part of the special day.

"To complete the journey that we started feels surreal," said GP Chris Klein *Ball State '12*. "It's hard to picture our group on day one and look how far we have come. Tripling our numbers since then, and getting accredited in basically a semester."

The celebration began on Friday evening with a reception to kick off the weekend. Members of the National Fraternity Staff, Executive Council and several representatives from the Ball State administration and Greek life community attended to congratulate the new members. Saturday morning saw an early wake up call, but one the young men welcomed to begin the next chapter of their journey.

"Our sense of brotherhood has grown each day since the start of this group and continues to grow each and every day, and become more solidified as our membership grows," Klein said. "This Fraternity has changed my life. It's made me get better grades, organize my time, want to get more involved on campus, and given me a whole new group of guys to hang out with."

After the official ceremony, campus administrators, friends and family gathered for a banquet to celebrate the accomplishments of Indiana Iota. Executive Director Shawn Collinsworth *Indiana State '91* served as Symposiarch, and National President Jim Miller *Ohio State '85* was on hand to provide the first public presentation of the charter. And the colony's advisor Bob Goldman *Miami (OH) '72 (W&J '64)* was prominently seated at the head table.

Founding fathers will tell you the experience is a blur, but one that gains appreciation with each passing day. For Indiana lota, that appreciation is just beginning.

"I think originally we were just 15 random guys put together with not a whole lot of closeness, but through rush and other events we all started coming together to reach our goal. Then finally everything we went through on Friday and Saturday finally made it clear that we are all brothers and that we will always have something that ties us together. I already called everyone my brothers before Saturday, but it finally hit me that I actually have 44 brothers."

"I knew what I was going through but then finally, at the end of the banquet, when we started singing "Amici" and got into the chant, I couldn't stop myself from screaming at the top of my lungs and throwing my fist into the air," said VGP Adam Dunworth *Ball State '12*. "It was just a wave of excitement and relief to finally know that we did everything right."

As many young chapters know, the chartering is only the beginning. Looking to avoid the post-installation lull, the men at Ball State have already begun to use the momentum to increase public awareness of Phi Kappa Psi in Muncie. The chapter has already begun mentoring children at the local Boys & Girls Club. During the holidays, the men also worked with area non-profit organizations to find families to adopt. This work led to great media coverage for a group that is changing the perception of Ball State Greek life.

"We are back to business as usual working on our spring philanthropy and working on rushing 25 quality gentleman during spring rush," Dunworth said. "The bigger goals are soon to come."







EXPANSION UPDATE

As our annual report points out, expansion remains a huge priority for us. Heading into 2013, here are our next groups looking to join Indiana lota as new chapters....

UNIVERSITY OF AKRON COLONY (OHIO IOTA)

With an incredibly dedicated and excited alumni base working to bring its chapter back to active status, the first semester of the Fraternity's expansion effort at Akron was successful. As of the end of November, the colony had grown to over 20 members, including the initial 12 members who were colonized on September 29, 2012.





UNIVERSITY OF DELAWARE COLONY (DELAWARE ALPHA)

The newest group to the Phi Psi expansion portfolio, a whopping 33 young men were recruited early in the process. In addition, a resurrection of several alumni from the chapter have been reengaged with the Fraternity thanks to this effort. The National Staff is extremely excited about the potential of this group to bring Phi Kappa Psi back to "The First State."



UNIVERSITY OF HOUSTON COLONY

With recent recruitment efforts helping to grow this group to 23 men, the focus is now on academic success and reaching the colony's goals to move forward. Spurred on by the support of the Houston Alumni Association, there is a support network in place to help inspire progress towards our 160th chapter.



VANDERBILT UNIVERSITY COLONY (TENNESSEE DELTA)

The long road back to being an active chapter has actually been incredibly quick. Closed in 2009, recolonization at Vanderbilt took place in the fall of 2011 and the group has worked quickly to get ready for re-chartering this February. It should be noted that a tremendous group of alumni, who had the courage to enter into a capital campaign to refurbish the chapter house while closed, have been instrumental in helping to bring Tennessee Delta back.



UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN COLONY (WISCONSIN ALPHA)

It has been 73 years since the Madison, Wisconsin campus was home to a Phi Kappa Psi chapter. Given the strong work of a quickly growing young group of men, that streak may not reach 74. What started as a diverse and inspired group of students has grown into a visible representation of the new fraternity. With collaboration from alumni in the Wisconsin Alumni Association, we are extremely excited to see this colony petition for charter reinstatement.

FROM HERE & THERE

BROTHER SUCCESSFULLY CLIMBS THE SEVEN SUMMITS



On September 23, 2012 Kurt Wedberg *CSU-Northridge '84* stepped his toes on the very top of Carstensz Pyramid, perched above the island of Papua in Indonesia. At 16,024 feet, it is the highest peak in the Oceana continent, composed of Australia and several island nations at the intersection of the Pacific and Indian Oceans. The feat alone would seem impressive, but it is merely one of seven.

The climb of Carstensz Pyramid (also called Puncak Jaya) completed Brother Wedberg's assault on the record books. He has now successfully navigated his way to the top of the highest mountain on all seven continents. It took just over 20 years, dating back to his first climb of Mount McKinley (the highest mountain peak in North America at 20,320 feet) in July of 1992. Since that day as an assistant guide, Kurt has kept climbing.

After ten years of guiding, Kurt founded Sierra Mountaineering International in 1995. The company mission is to cultivate an atmosphere that allows for the best trips offered anywhere, to provide a climate for passing on and expanding mountaineering knowledge, and to create a healthy and positive working environment for professional mountain guides.

Having successfully guided over 70 major expeditions, including three times to the top of Mount Everest (sadly his last successful ascent on May 19, 2012 was to have a Phi Psi flag with him, but our attempt to mail one arrived just after the climb had begun), completing the Seven Summits is a major feather in the cap for Kurt, let alone any person associated with mountaineering.

"This was a truly rewarding experience for me," Kurt wrote on his blog. "As a professional mountain guide at SMI our goal is to keep our clients safe and help them achieve their intended goals. Along the way we continue to make many new and dear friends. All those missions were accomplished here."

While not the highest peak, the struggle to climb Carstensz Pyramid dealt more with access than anything else. Nestled deep in the jungle, Kurt and his three expedition mates (Esther, Vanessa and Andrea) had quite the hike. Flying deep into the jungle was just the start, with 62 miles of hiking through a varying maze of jungle, plateaus and

limestone rock. With almost no access to the outside world, negotiating and befriending members of the local Moni tribes is almost as essential as packing your ropes.

It took five days to reach base camp, fighting rain and the unpredictable elements that it presents. From there, the jagged mountain presented its own challenge, including a 98-foot Tyrolean Traverse that was only navigable via the ropes. All four would have to rappel back down the mountain and hike for four days back out through the muddy journey, but it was more than worth it.

Congratulations to Brother Wedberg on completing an incredible career journey, one that we know is simply continuing!



ATTENTION SHERLOCK HOLMES FANS: BROTHER PENS YOUR ULTIMATE GUIDE



Thomas Bruce Wheeler *Missouri '55* has been a lifelong fan of Sherlock Holmes. Over 30 years ago, he and his wife took their first trip to London, and since, have visited an average of once a year. In 2011, Tom combined these two interests with the publication of *The London of Sherlock Holmes*. The book identifies over 400 London sites mentioned in 60 Sherlock Holmes adventures. Roger Johnson, the editor of the Sherlock Holmes Society of London newsletter said of Tom's book, "As a step-by-step guide to the London of the Canon, it's unbeatable."

The book is also available as an e-book with a special, and perhaps unique, feature. Each of the 400 sites is identified by their GPS latitude & longitude. These GPS addresses are Internet hyperlinked to Google Maps, which generates a follow-on "Street View" photograph. This feature allows readers to "see" the London of Sherlock Holmes from their home computer, and once in London, get turn-by-turn directions with a GPS app.

The success of that interacting e-book prompted more in 2012, before the Summer Olympics. Tom published three new Kindle books for London visitors. They are: *The London GPS Pub Guide, The Black Book of London Secrets, and The GPS and Internet Guide to Famous Londoners and their Blue Plaques*. All three of the books feature Internet hyperlinks, and can be previewed on www.amazon.com.

Thomas Bruce Wheeler is a retired senior civil service executive, anglophile, and London enthusiast. Captain Wheeler is also a decorated military veteran, with a Silver Star for Army service, and an Air Medal for 26 combat missions with the U.S. Air Force.

Following his war service, Peter graduated from Northwestern with a Bachelor's of Business Administration degree. Peter relocated to Dallas, where his father had been transferred as the British Consul-General. In Dallas, Peter began his career as a realtor in 1949 and was honored to be a past president of the Greater Dallas Association of Realtors. Peter was not just a "gentleman"; he was truly a gentle man, a loving, jolly, optimistic soul who will be greatly missed by all who knew and loved him. He was preceded in death by his first wife, Lois. Peter is survived by his second wife of 31 years, Sally, four daughters, 13 granddaughters and six greatgrandchildren.



Don B. Earnhart Indiana Beta '43

Don B. Earnhart passed away Monday, October 2, 2012 at the age of 87. After graduating from Indiana University in 1949 with a degree in accounting, he was employed by Ernst & Ernst from 1949 to 1953, during which time he obtained his CPA certificate. Mr. Earnhart joined Inland Container Corporation in 1953 and was elected its Vice President and Treasurer in 1968. In 1972 he became Administrative Trustee of the Krannert Charitable Trust and was responsible for that Trust's major grants to organizations in the fields of education, arts and culture, community development, and medical research, primarily in Indianapolis and throughout the state of Indiana. Active in civic affairs, Mr. Earnhart had been a director of the Community

Service Council of Greater Indianapolis; the Greater Indianapolis Progress Committee; the Indianapolis Chamber of Commerce; the Indiana CPA Society; the Indianapolis Metropolitan YMCA; Junior Achievement of Indianapolis; the Indianapolis Zoo; and The Nature Conservancy. Mr. Earnhart was awarded honorary degrees by the University of Indianapolis and Indiana University. He was named a "Sagamore of the Wabash" by Indiana Governors Edgar Whitcomb and Robert Orr and received a "Diploma of Honor" from the Fine Arts Society. He was preceded in death by his wife, Suzanne, and is survived by three children, seven grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.



Prior to being house corporation president, you were involved with chapter scholarship funds. What prompted you to advance your involvement?

The reason I got involved was because of my father, Walter S. Henrion *Nebraska '31*. Almost everybody who was a Phi Psi for the past 50 years at Nebraska knew my dad. My brother and I started a scholarship to honor my father and mother, and through donating to that fund, I was invited to Cabo San Lucas to speak to the American Leadership Academy. That rekindled my interest in Phi Psi. I sensed that Nebraska Alpha needed more alumni support and, with the encouragement of pledge brother Denny Christianson *Nebraska '62*, I thought it would be a great opportunity for me to get re-involved. We organized a meeting to strengthen and expand our board and this got us started back to the top.

You took on a huge task, trying to raise over a million of dollars and overseeing the renovation of a wonderful but old (1917) facility that's on the National Historic Register. What attracted you to the challenge?

My wife, Trish, and Debbie Weisman (wife to chapter brother Mike Wiseman Nebraska '62) were the ones who prompted the work. I am a scholarship fanatic. The Henrion Scholarship has sent students to London, Moscow, Budapest, Turkey, Morocco, Prague and this summer to Ecuador. We were talking about the scholarships and Debbie said, "If you don't fix that house up, you won't have any Phi Psis to give those scholarships to." About this same time Brian Halla Nebraska '65 and Steve Goetz Nebraska '65 and their wives were visiting the house and were equally appalled by its condition. Brian became our campaign chair and also enlisted Patty Shefte to help and the rest is history - it would not have happened without them. The house renovation created a quantum leap for our chapter - greater than I ever expected. I now think we're the best house on campus.

Why should others volunteer?


I am really blessed. I have lived a great life and Phi Psi has been a part of that. I have found that chapters just don't do well without alumni. Undergraduates need guidance that sort of becomes a informal mentoring program. At the end of the day, we are forming and mentoring young men to become successful. Everybody overemphasizes leaders and leadership. I find that we are really helping to develop good people who are going to be happy with their lives. You get back what you give. It makes me feel good to volunteer and impact the lives of so many young men. I think people who aren't involved miss out on an experience that would surprise them. I am always blown away by how sharp and impressive our undergraduates are. I think if more of our alumni could see that, it would inspire them to get involved.

You live in Kentucky, yet so many responsibilities lie in Lincoln. How have you done it and can others overcome similar geographical hurdles?

We have 15 board members. How many board meetings do you really need? We meet about three times a year and work with individuals locally who have a more direct, obvious role. We've done a lot of virtual meetings and conference calls, and do work in committees. We also established three-year terms with a maximum of two terms to promote new involvement of PKP alumni. I go off the board in May. I think John Hogan *Nebraska '88* is going to do a better job, honestly, whether other people believe it or not.

Additionally, I would really like to see other alumni invest in undergraduates traveling to visit alumni. Each year, I have invited a few brothers to visit me in Kentucky. It's part of a larger mentoring benefit and a great way for me to stay engaged from a distance.

On a final note, I would like to thank all those who have helped Nebraska Alpha reemerge as one of the premier houses on campus, including Bob Goldman *Miami (OH) '72 (W&J '64)* from whom I learned so much while he was chapter advisor. It has been a pleasure to serve and as Mark Scudder *Nebraska '82* put it, "If I put in another 25 or 30 years, I might be able to match my father."
