

Message From the President



Dear Brothers:

Something is going on in the Greek world that could seriously affect Phi Kappa Psi and possibly your Chapter. For lack of better language, the activity is called "Greek Life Studies," and essentially it is a survey of the Greek system taken to determine if this system still has a place on a particular campus.

A formal "relationship statement" usually is a product of this study, which is intended at the University of Virginia to "classify the existing relationship, define responsibilities and promote University benefits of association."

You ask why undertake such a study? We believe the major proponents are people who join the university or college as defendants in legal actions taken against a campus Greek organization, together with the courts, which have in some instances imposed liability on the school for failure to properly police its recognized student living groups. Anti-Greeks see these studies as means to dismantle and eliminate fraternities and sororities on the campus. Remember, some of the so-called radical students of the '60s and '70s are now active in the faculty and administration of our institutions of higher learning.

What schools are affected, and what have these studies accomplished? Phi Psi recently received Greek Life Study reports from Gettysburg, Dickinson, Rider and Bucknell. As some of these reports are quite lengthy (Dickinson was over 100 pages), our Executive Director asked the Director of Publications, John Mead, to review and summarize them. As an example, John describes the changes proposed by the Greek Life Committee at Gettysburg as follows:

Gettysburg

- Establish written standards and expectations in areas such as leadership, membership, behavior, physical plant, etc.
- Increase fraternity room charges to provide for house maintenance; close kitchen for lunch.
- Leave rush system in effect through the 1989-90 year, during which they will investigate methods of revising this system.

I feel certain that the above proposals, particularly those concerning room and board, are less than satisfactory to many Gettysburg Brothers.

Let me share with you comments of our new Educational Leadership Consultants on their travels early this fall. After each visitation, a standardized report is prepared by the Consultant that, among other items, evaluates "Fraternity climate at College/University." At the University of Kentucky, the answer to this question was "under observation," at Lafayette, it was "faculty leaning toward phasing out single sex organizations by 1994," and at Wisconsin, the Consultant reports the campus mood "needs a boost."

The schools described in the paragraphs above are not the only ones where Greek Life Studies could adversely affect a Phi Psi Chapter. It might be threatened or underway at your Chapter.

What should you do? I strongly suggest you promptly contact your Chapter through the Chapter Advisor or House Corporation officer and determine if this could be a problem on your campus, and if it is, ask how you can help. Maybe you know a trustee of the university or a member of the Greek Life Committee. Keep in mind that on most campuses, the Greeks contribute to capital campaigns of the university at a much, much higher dollar amount than their number versus the non-Greeks. Yes, you alumni have clout, and I hope you use it. If your contact with your Chapter is unsatisfactory, please call Phi Psi's Headquarters in Indianapolis and ask for Director of Chapter Services Terry Harper, (317) 632-1852. Thank you for your time.

It is always great to be a Phi Psi.

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

Be assured that between the opening gavel and the closing ceremony, there will be an enjoyable and unforgettable mixture of business and pleasure for all in attendance.

Mackinac Island

When the oppressive heat of the summer wraps you up and the pressures of the world tie you down, it's difficult to imagine a more refreshing retreat than Mackinac Island and the Grand Hotel. Leave your automobiles and worries on the mainland—you can't bring the former, and you will forget the latter.

Mackinac's history and tone melds Indian, French and British traditions with those of the Victorian aristocracy. The Old Mill Creek Historic Park, Fort Michilimackinac, Fort Mackinac and the American Fur Company Trading Post are among the sites to take in on the island, along with countless fudge shops. Horse-drawn carriages and bicycles provide the only transportation shy of two feet in this scenic, peaceful retreat.

Statement of Position on Pledgeship

In recent months, fraternities have crept back into the nation's headlines. The publicity thus generated has been positive—to a certain extent.

During the summer, two fraternities announced they would no longer recruit and induct new members through a pledge program of fraternity education. Pledging, they said, created a two-stage hierarchy that promoted recklessness, servitude, mental and physical abuse—in other words, hazing.

The ensuing publicity was enormous. Newspaper editorials applauded the apparently progressive steps taken. Fraternity officials beamed the good news to millions of Americans through every news source available, from campus newspapers to network television.

The National Interfraternity Conference has asked all member organizations to evaluate their positions on this issue. Phi Kappa Psi surveyed participants at the Woodrow Wilson Leadership School on this very topic. Over 400 undergraduates and alumni attended the conference, but the major voice in the survey was that of the undergraduates. The results are as follows:

QUESTION 1: Do you believe that eliminating the pledge period would alleviate many of the problems facing fraternities (hazing, alcohol abuse,

The leadership of Phi Kappa Psi believes the pledge period serves a constructive and essential purpose in acclimation and education of both the neophyte and the fraternity chapter. The following statement was adopted by the Executive Council to address this topic.

The Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity is a voluntary association of men who are bound in honor to one another through like ideas, principles and standards. As such, it is neither a civil entitlement nor a public accommodation open to one and all. Membership in Phi Kappa Psi is offered to men of talent and integrity and is considered an earned privilege, not a right.

Therefore, an invitation to join Phi Kappa Psi is offered by a Chapter only after serious thought and consideration and is likewise accepted by a man determined to earn the privilege brotherhood bestows. A man seeking to join must have met Fraternity standards of scholarship and leadership before he will be accepted as a candidate for membership. The period of weeks after pledging, and up to the initiation day, is to be used for nurturing and growth and give both the

Chapter and the Pledge opportunities to assess each other's ability to continue a mutually beneficial association. If at any time during the pledge experience it becomes the desire of either the Pledge or the Chapter to end this association, it is the right and duty of each to inform the other.

Phi Kappa Psi is under no sentimental illusions about hazing. The Fraternity's policy has been vigilant and unyielding since 1868 when the Grand Arch Council denounced the "rough play" that had entered collegiate life following the Civil War. In 1922, Phi Kappa Psi adopted a policy forbidding any form of nonconstructive Fraternity Education, and published the first edition of our *Fraternity Manual* in 1931. Now in its 15th edition, this book, along with several hundred pages of other guides and manuals, forms the core of our well-planned pro-

gram to build good candidates for initiation into good Brothers. Successful performance on the Fraternity-wide final written examination, attainment of superior grades, and completion of school and Chapter history and tradition lessons signal the candidates' readiness for initiation. This process takes time and is designed to help the Pledge become acclimated not only to Phi Kappa Psi but to a new living and learning environment as well. Choices made that bring a man into the Brotherhood of Phi Kappa Psi affect one for a lifetime: consequently, expediency has no place in this process

Insofar as Phi Kappa Psi is concerned, traditional pledgeship—our tradition and our pledgeship—does not invariably result in hazing, and we find it simplistic to believe that ending pledgeship will eradicate hazing death and injury. It has been our observation that college student deaths, within and outside fraternities, are most often caused by alcohol abuse; to this end—the control, education and elimination of alcohol abuse—Phi Kappa Psi donates its time, energy and financial resources.

As our Fraternity approaches her 15th decade, new and exciting changes are contemplated in many areas. Phi Psi's Commission on Values, Standards and Ethics has just begun a process of on-going evaluation at the undergraduate level and promises dramatic improvements in how we impart to new members the essence of Phi Kappa Psi, and how we relate to one another, our interfraternity contemporaries, our host colleges and university campuses, and our campus communities. The expanding work of the Commission will be given broad review, and, in fact, we shall seek comments from our many audiences as the work unfolds.

Note: Phi Kappa Psi has been a member of the Fraternity Insurance Purchasing Group since its inception. As a service to all members of Phi Kappa Psi, and as a requirement for membership in FIPG, the following is the Risk Management Policy all member fraternities are bound to follow and enforce.

FRATERNITY INSURANCE PURCHASING GROUP

Risk Management Policy

The Risk Management Policy of the Fraternity Insurance Purchasing Group includes the provisions which follow and shall apply to all fraternity entities and all levels of fraternity membership.

ALCOHOL AND DRUGS

- The possession, use and/or consumption of ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES, while on Chapter premises, during an official
 fraternity event, or in any situation sponsored or endorsed by the Chapter, must be in compliance with any and all applicable laws of the state, province, county, city and university.
- 2. No alcoholic beverages may be purchased through the Chapter treasury nor may the purchase of same for members or guests be undertaken or coordinated by any member in the name of or on behalf of the Chapter.
- 3. No Chapter members, collectively or individually, shall purchase for, serve to, or sell alcoholic beverages to any minor (i.e., those under legal "drinking age").
- 4. The possession, sale and/or use of any ILLEGAL DRUGS or CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES at any Chapter house, sponsored event or at any event that an observer would associate with the fraternity, is strictly prohibited.
- 5. No Chapter may co-sponsor an event with an alcohol distributor, charitable organization or tavern (tavern defined as an establishment generating more than half of annual gross sales from alcohol) where alcohol is given away, sold or otherwise provided to those present.
- No Chapter may co-sponsor or co-finance a function where alcohol is purchased by any of the host chapters, groups or organizations.
- 7. All rush activities associated with any Chapter will be DRY rush functions.
- 8. OPEN PARTIES, meaning those with unrestricted access by non-members of the fraternity, without specific invitation, shall be prohibited.
- 9. No member shall permit, tolerate, encourage or participate in "drinking games."
- 10. No alcohol shall be present at any pledge/associate member/novice program or activity of the Chapter.

HAZING

No Chapter shall conduct hazing activities. Hazing activities are defined as:

"Any action taken or situation created, intentionally, whether on or off fraternity premises, to produce mental or physical discomfort, embarrassment, harassment, or ridicule. Such activities may include but are not limited to the following: use of alcohol; paddling in any form; creation of excessive fatigue; physical and psychological shocks; quests, treasure hunts, scavenger hunts, road trips or any other such activities carried on outside or inside of the confines of the Chapter house; wearing of public apparel which is conspicuous and not normally in good taste; engaging in public stunts and buffoonery; morally degrading or humiliating games and activities; and any other activities which are not consistent with fraternal law, ritual or policy or the regulations and policies of the educational institution."

SEXUAL ABUSE

The fraternity will not tolerate or condone any form of sexually abusive behavior on the part of its members, whether physical, mental or emotional. This is to include any actions which are demeaning to women including but not limited to date rape, gang rape or verbal harassment.

FIRE, HEALTH AND SAFETY

All Chapter houses shall, prior to, during, and following occupancy, meet all local fire and health codes and standards.

All Chapters must have posted by common phones, emergency numbers for fire, policy and ambulance and must have posted evacuation routes from Chapter house common areas as well as posted on the back of the door of each sleeping room.

All Chapters shall comply with engineering recommendations as reported by the insurance company.

EDUCATION

Each student member, associate member and pledge shall be instructed annually on the Risk Management Policy of the Fraternity Insurance Purchasing Group.

Facelift at Georgia

s students returned to the University of Georgia so did the Brothers of Georgia Alpha to a new chapter house. Well, not completely new, but the recipient of a major renovation over the summer.

Work began in the late spring when painters began the task of stripping away the old paint peeling off the nearly 100 year old Victorian home. Soon, the even brush strokes of a new coat of off-white covered the scars on the outside of the house. The roof was taken up and reshingled, and the parking lot was stripped and paved, providing much more room and parking convenience.

By June, many of the undergraduate and alumni members began to get in on the action. Brothers from all over the state came to Athens every weekend to work on the Chapter house in order to restore her beauty. By this time, the focus of the project shifted to the interior. The walls of the Chapter room and the television room received a fresh coat of paint. The beams on the ceiling were stripped down to their original condition, and the front porch was treated to new paint and light fixtures.

Undergraduates and alumni donated time and money to this renovation project, which encompassed all areas from the lawn up to the copper dome.

New grass was sown and shrubbery planted on the front lawn in July. The distinctive copper dome, turned a pale greenish-grey by time and the weather, was shined to its original metallic color. More house lights were installed, and the hardwood floors began to get sanded down. By August, the hardwood floors began to look brand new. Polyurethane covered the once-scarred floors in order to preserve the original shine. New sheetrock replaced the old in all the upstairs ceilings. New carpet arrived for the stairs. The newly painted front porch received four brand new oak rocking chairs. The painting outside was completed, and the interior was getting its final touches. New rugs and furniture arrived for the television room, foyer and Chapter room, and new lawn furniture was purchased for the upstairs porch.

By September, a new pool table graced the back room. Additional renovations were made in the personal rooms, and new stairs were placed outside the back door. The downstairs restrooms received new faucets, sinks and mirrors, as well.

The result is a beautiful Chapter house in which Brothers can take pride. The total cost of the renovation was \$50,000.



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The Story of a Dream Come True

California Theta celebrates the purchase of a permanent home



After years of bouncing from house to house, the Brothers of Cal Theta landed a home, but not without a fight.

ur story begins a little more than a year ago when the California Theta Chapter was forced to relocate for the sixth time in its 22-year history. Located near the Northridge campus of the University of California, the small, comfortable, rented single-family house that served as a Chapter home since 1985 had been placed for sale by the landlord. The Chapter was required to move, since the seller wanted the house unoccupied for prospective buyer inspections.

The latest move to another location, a couple of miles away from the University, was part of an all-too-familiar pattern of the pick-up-and-go existence of the relatively young Chapter. Since 1974, the Chapter House Corporation had prudently initiated a savings program for the eventuality of a house purchase. The recurring problem was the fact that the earmarked savings did not keep in pace with the accelerated appreciation of property values and down payment requirements. The Southern California real estate market was continuing in an incredible upward spiral with the average three bedroom, two bathroom single-family home selling in the range of two to three hundred thousand dollars!

The perennial discussion of purchasing a permanent home for the Chapter was, in the eyes of many alumni members, an unattainable goal. Many Chapter Brothers were becoming resigned to the sobering fact that the House Corporation would never be in the financial position to attempt a purchase for a permanent home. The alumni financial support was also limited to the Chapter's small alumni base. The average age of the Chapter's alumni was only 30.

The annual January meeting of the California Theta House Corporation proved to be a turning point in the effort to secure our very own home. It was also a wonderful lesson and reminder of the spirit of the Fraternity experience.

During the Board meeting, the discussion of a possible house purchase focused on the Chapter's immediate former residence at an outstanding location across the street from the University. Although it was a small house, capable of a live-in total of 8 members, it enjoyed a practical application as a central gathering place for Chapter meetings and social activities. The seller was asking \$229,000 for the residence and required a new loan for the transaction.

The obvious and most immediate problem involved the necessary funding of a 20 percent down payment and associated loan and closing costs, which far exceeded the House Corporation's assets of \$24,000. It seemed that one of the last

remaining housing options in the Northridge area would not be financially feasible.

It was at this point of the discussion that a past GP of the Chapter, David Deick, suggested that the Corporation organize an aggressive effort to purchase the residence. He then announced his commitment to pledge \$1,000 toward the house purchase and strongly believed the good will and support of fellow Chapter Brothers would be forthcoming. It was obvious that Dave's act of generosity reflected a desire to help his Chapter and perpetuate the Fraternity. Within minutes, each member of the Corporation Board made a personal pledge, and a nervous excitement and renewed sense of purpose started to grow. Well aware of the many obstacles that would be associated with any house purchase plan, the Corporation decided to make an attempt and take one step at a time.

Our group concluded the meeting with the request to have myself contact the seller of the property. Our only hope to have a realistic chance to purchase the residence was for an extended escrow, which would allow the Corporation the needed time to conduct a whirlwind

fund-raising drive. The seller was c

The seller was contacted within days, and the House Corporation negotiated a 90 day escrow on an agreed-upon purchase price of \$210,000. At risk was a non-refundable deposit of \$2,000 and the associated costs necessary for the planned fund-raising drive. As I drove home the night of the signing of the escrow documentation, I was thrilled with the fact that our group had overcome its first hurdle. The task of raising the same amount of money in 90 days as had been saved in the previous 22 years was indeed an overwhelming prospect, but there was no turning back.

On Friday, March 3, 1989, the escrow was recorded, and immediately the members of the Housing Corporation and the Chapter started working as a team around the clock. In essence, there were three months to organize a fundraising drive, contact and enlist the support of Chapter alumni members and obtain mortgage financing for the remaining balance of the loan.

March

The month of March witnessed a flurry of activity among the alumni vol-

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ALUMNI ORGANIZATIONS

Part 1—The Basics

hi Kappa Psi Fraternity was founded in 1852 at Jefferson College in Canonsburg, Pennsylvania. From that small beginning by Founders Letterman and Moore 137 years ago, the national Fraternity has grown to approximately 60,000 living members in all 50 of the United States plus territories and foreign countries.

From the beginning, the Fraternity was not developed as a social organization that a man joined during his college days and then ended his affiliation upon graduation. It was intended from the start that this membership would be a life-long commitment. According to The Centennial History of the Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity: 1852-1952 (volume I, page 7), Campbell states that the word Vivimus (we live) was adopted as a password and recorded in the Fraternity's constitution in August 1853. Later in the same year, the password was expanded to read "Vivimus Et Vivemus" (we live and we shall live). One interpretation is that since the Phi Kappa Psi whole is a greater sum than its parts, the members must continuously live and interact within the fraternal life in order for the Fraternity to be viable. Alumni organizations have long been a central element of Phi Kappa Psi. The first Graduate Chapter, the forerunner to Alumni Associations, was formed in Attica, Indiana, in 1880.

The organization of fraternal life for pledges and actives centers around the local Chapters and the network of district and national governance that binds the local Chapters together. The organization of fraternal activities after life within the Chapter has ended; then the focus shifts to the alumni groups of Alumni Associations and Alumni Clubs.

Definitions

— "Alumni Association" is an organization officially recognized by the national Fraternity of fifteen or more continuous, bona fide members of the Fraternity. The Association will do everything in its power to further and stimulate a feeling of Brotherly love among the members of the Fraternity in the district it serves. It will actively support all undertakings of the Fraternity, including The Shield,

- and it will actively support and cooperate with all nearby Chapters of the Fraternity. An Alumni Association is entitled to be represented and vote at a District Council and a Grand Arch Council after meeting certain minimum requirements.
- "Alumni Club" is an organization officially recognized by the national Fraternity of five or more, continuous, bona fide members of the Fraternity. The Club will actively support all undertakings of the Fraternity, and support and cooperate with all nearby Chapters of the Fraternity. A Club is not entitled to be represented or to vote at a District Council or a Grand Arch Council.

Factors for Success

In a recent survey of the national and local Fraternity leadership, several factors emerged that were perceived to affect the success of an alumni organization. The respondents felt that the Association/Club should be structured to help achieve one or more needs of the Fraternity, i.e. to have a raison d' etre. This gives a structure to the alumni organization for which goals can be established. The successful attainment of the goals not only furthers the work of the Fraternity but strengthens the commitment of the alumni. The following factors which are not mutually exclusive are:

- Membership Recruitment and Retention
 - The alumni organization may serve as a channel for recruiting new members and to provide a vehicle by which alumni remain active within the fraternal life.
- Steadying Influence Upon a Chapter Respondents to the survey were strong in their belief that troubled Chapters usually had an absence of alumni support and guidance in addition to other causes, although this was not necessarily true in all cases. The alumni help to pass on a set of fraternal values that have been successful. The alumni help to provide an environment of maturity and wise judgment for a group of young men who have only recently entered the world on their own. Of course, the Chapter advisor is the focal point of this effort, but the backdrop and reinforcement for this effort is the local alumni.

Communications

The alumni organization may serve as a medium for interaction between the Chapter and alumni in those instances where an alumni organization is near a Chapter. One of the weaknesses cited by multiple respondents to the survey was that the turnover of Chapter officers every six months make it difficult for the Chapter to provide continuity to an effective alumni communications program. Of course, newsletters are not the only means of communication to and from the alumni. The Shield is another way to communicate to all of the membership at the same time, for the alumni to receive news about their classmates, to know and understand the history and general mystical meaning of the Fraternity, and to become familiar with the activities of the Chapter. Alumni organizations also are able to publish news about their events.

Financial Support


By continuously bonding the alumni member to the Fraternity, the alumni organization can serve as a conduit for encouraging financial support both to the Chapter and to the national Fraternity. The contribution of money, as well as time and other resources, fosters a deepening commitment to the Fraternity and its ideals.

- The local alumni organization can serve as a source out of which local alumni leadership is developed for service to the Fraternity. There are seven different opportunities for an alumnus to work within the Brotherhood in addition to membership in an alumni organization: Chapter Advisor, Faculty Advisor, House Corporation board member, local Chapter loan fund trustee, newsletter editor, Alumni Association officer and national Fraternity, elected or appointed officer. This source serves as a form of self-generation of leadership.
- The alumni organization can serve as a vehicle to provide social contacts for its alumni member. It is this social interaction that alumni desire the most from alumni organizations.

Marketing Works for More Than Snake Oil Salesmen

Proper use of business skills bags better recruitment results

but it should be run in a business-like manner.

Membership recruitment—

"rush" in common parlance—is comparable to the sales and marketing functions of a company. Our Chapters could all market themselves better by examining and applying general principles followed by "real world" organizations.

fraternity is not a business,

This is yet another area in which fraternities offer the opportunity to practice business skills before entering the arena

following graduation.

In business firms nationwide, it is critical to understand the needs of the marketplace, how your product or service fills a certain need, what attributes and benefits your product possesses, what niche of the marketplace you are seeking to fill, who your customers are, how to reach them and what is important to them. All of these matters should be understood by the college fraternity chapter as well.

Following are several suggested exercises, which are best carried out at a full Chapter retreat where all the undergraduates members can participate, contribute and learn. They are designed to help the student Phi Psi analyze his Chapter and its rush procedures from a business-like perspective.

Analyze your product

Just as a company must fully grasp its product or service and how it meets the needs of customers, the undergraduates should discuss and come to an understanding of what your Chapter is all about. The discussion leader should ask and lead the group to a consensus answer: "What human needs does our particular Chapter at our particular campus meet?" Beyond that, "What is the product or service that we are offering our customers, the rushees?" And more yet, "What are the pluses and minuses of our Chapter right now?" In other words, what are the good and less good qualities of our product? The members need to be clear-eyed and honest about that last question. No Chapter is perfect, and also, every Chapter has at

least one good thing going for it!

The group leader should list the positive and negative attributes of the Chapter on a board or flipchart. The group should then figure out how best to sell, publicize, showcase, promote, if you will, the positive aspects of the group. As one small example, you were No. 1 in academics or IM's last year. How about taking out an ad in the student newspaper creatively and tastefully announcing that point? Have copies of the rankings available as handouts in rush sessions or highlight it in your rush brochure.

The negatives are tougher to handle. The challenge is how to deal with them properly. You do not ignore them and most certainly do not lie about them. You admit they exist and describe how the Chapter is working to correct them. Often, the solution is to be found in your membership recruitment itself. For instance, you were last in academics. The answer is two-fold—you consciously and actively recruit better students, and you implement study aid programs to boost the academic performance of the current members. The overall point is this—when dealing with a negative aspect of the Chapter in rush, you admit it exists and describe what proper, creative measures the members are taking to improve that element.

Analyze your customers

The Chapter should collectively come up with a profile of your customer. Be careful you don't end up with a Boy Scout decalogue of perfect qualities that you will never find together in one human. Rather, be realistic and focus on certain attributes the group feels are needed in the Chapter at this time. The exercise called "The Ultimate Session" makes the point, among others, that all rushees, as do all people, have positive and negative assets; no one will be your perfect ideal. (This exercise, as are the others mentioned in this article, are available from me or from the Fraternity Headquarters.) My point is that the Chapter must have some idea of what kind of young man is most likely to need and want the benefits offered by your Chapter—also, of where to find him and how to sell him.

How can we promote ourselves?

The Chapter should ask itself, what

are the media open to us on our campus through which we are able (legally, practically and monetarily) to promote our benefits and attributes to our target audience? What are the best ways to bring ourselves to the attention of the customers we want? The possibilities are endless. Function as your own ad/PR agency. Be as creative, tasteful and anpropriate as you can. Some possibilities include: flyers and brochures; sponsoring a philanthropic event; giving away items people will keep-football schedules, t-shirts, school holiday schedules, etc.; sponsoring a major speaker to come to the campus.

Analyze the competition

What are the pluses and minuses of the other chapters on your campus? After analyzing that, how can you best differentiate yourselves from them? Remember, all of you are offering the same general service: brotherhood, the chance to socialize, mature, learn organizational skills et. al. What specifically about the way your Chapter offers the benefits is different from the other chapters? In other words, how does your brand of Greekdom—Phi Psi—differ from the other brands of brotherhood on the shelf?

Sales materials

On most campuses you will need some type of sales literature, a printed piece that sells on your behalf when you are not there. This is an opportune place for your advertising, journalism or marketing majors to practice their ideas. Design it with a clear intent. What are the specific, strong sales points about your Chapter you want the piece to make for you?

Sales pitch

You will have to talk with your prospects face to face sooner or later. If you practice what to say ahead of time, you will do better. No one winging it can ever do it better than someone who has practiced it at least once. The exercise called "Rush Situations" presents you with most types of encounters you are likely to experience. Use it, have fun with role playing in front of the group and critique each other. You'll be better conversationalists for it. Becoming more adept at social interaction, small talk

and effective, persuasive conversation is one of the benefits of belonging to a fraternity. This is one place where you can hone those skills.

Closing that sale

As any salesman worth his commission knows, how you "close" a sale can make or break it. Here again, practice is important. Use the booklet on "Bidding," which gives you dos and don'ts on how to offer a bid properly. Practice your bid presentations carefully. No more than two or three members should be present when a bid is presented, and they should be selected to be the ones most persuasive to the rushee. Present your closing arguments succinctly, with

class and dignity. Keep in mind what you are doing—asking a man to become a Brother of Phi Kappa Psi. It should always be offered in a suitable setting, time and situation.

Answering objections

Salesmen must be ready to answer the objections that prevent people from buying their product. You, too, must be intelligently primed to discuss maturely with your prospects the reasons they say they cannot pledge. Is it parental objection? Offer to have the president or Chapter Advisor speak with them. Not enough time? Describe how a fraternity can assist a Brother to better budget his time. Money a problem? Bring in the

treasurer to help work out a payment schedule. You should know your top prospects well enough to anticipate what their barriers to membership might be and have well-prepared answers ready.

In summary, the Chapters that understand membership recruitment as the marketing function will experience better rush results than the Chapter that does not. Understand your product, its attributes and benefits, what particular positive and negative aspects you have and organize and practice what it is you are doing. The care you take with your preparations will be evident in your results, and the members will have improved their personal skills along the way.

unteers of the House Corporation. Rick Palzer, John Soukup, Paul Cohen, Roy Bronder, Mitch Cohen, Mark Morgan, Fred Berson, David Freidman and Robert Winston each assumed a large portion of the assigned work load. In the initial planning, the HC Board reviewed various options and agreed upon a game plan that would hopefully attract Chapter alumni support. The fund-raising plan was tailored to take in account the age group of our alumni so as to encourage small and large donations and repayable short term loans. By the end of March, a detailed prospectus outlining the proposed house purchase and a personalized cover letter was mailed to all Chapter alumni.

April

The second month of the fund-raising drive was devoted to individual and personal follow up. A series of four consecutive Sunday afternoon alumni receptions were organized in which a related group of Chapter alumni Brothers were invited. These groupings included charter members, past Chapter GPs and badge number initiation year designations. In addition, a concentrated nightly telephone campaign to contact each alumnus provided the needed momentum to help inform the membership.

Under the capable leadership of GPs Stephen Hirsch and Dan Philbin and Fund Raising Chairman Stephen Gilbert, the undergraduate members worked weekly in an ongoing series of car washes, ice tea booth sales and television game show audience participation, which raised \$3,500.

May

By the beginning of the month, over \$25,000 had been pledged by the alumni! The 20 percent down payment requirement was now within reach. However, the addition of loan closing costs, fees, as well as emergency contingencies prompted an expanded effort to raise

additional funds. A special mailing to Southern California Phi Psis helped to close this gap. Most notably, John Nootbar, *California Delta '61*, forwarded a check for \$2,500 to help us reach our goal.

At this point, the major stumbling block was obtaining the necessary mort-gage financing that would allow the House Corporation to hold legal title. The Corporation Board spent the previous weeks compiling loan documentation and making loan applications with no success. The tightening of local lending requirements and mortgage guidelines had become a primary obstacle.

With time running out, James Berson, Cal Theta '69, volunteered to enter a two year mortgage lease-purchase agreement with the House Corporation to keep the planned purchase on track before the lapse of escrow. Jim's personal involvement and obligation in the loan arrangements was a vital and important act of good faith. The short term solution allowed the House Corporation with the most immediate form of mortgage financing while providing additional time to secure primary financing at a later opportunity.

By the middle of the month, all pledged donations were collected, and the loan package documents were ready for a different bank committee review. It seemed that our long awaited dream was finally coming to realization, when I received a phone call from Brother Berson that I will never forget. The lending institution, it was explained, would approve the real estate transaction with one condition . . . that the 20 percent down payment requirement would be revised to 30 percent, a difference of ten to fifteen thousand dollars!

With less than 20 days before the lapse of escrow, the Housing Corporation apprised the Fraternity Headquarters of the immediate development. Within days, the Executive Council endorsed a short term second trust deed agreement with the House Corporation to keep the purchase plan alive. Thanks to the helpful assistance of SWGP J. Robert Meserve, SWVGP Paul J. Lapuzza, SWP J. Smitty Harrison, Executive Director Gary B. Angstadt, Deputy Attorney General Richard F. Nelson and Director of House Corporations John D. Watt, all the necessary requirements were met.

With less than one day prior to the lapse of the bank loan commitment, all escrow requirements were successfully completed. After renting on a month-tomonth basis for 22 years, the California Theta Chapter had become the newest homeowner in the Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity.


The Spirit of Brotherhood

A potpourri of thoughts from the Educational Leadership Consultants

Christopher A. Brown There's A Wabash '86 Change in the Weather In the last issue, you will recall, I began my thoughts with music. This time, in spite of the inevitable groans, I decided to use an example of the written word. You see, for the last year or so I have been trying to get through Irving Stone's lengthy novel The Origin, based on the voyages and discoveries of Charles Darwin. Darwin, the history books tell us, traveled around the world in pursuit of raw knowledge and arrived back in merry old England with his theory of natural selection.

Theory of what? Putting aside the ambiguous scientific name, Darwin's idea essentially says those species that are the strongest and can adapt their behavior to their surroundings will continue to exist in the long run. Contemporary science considers this theory to be practically unassailable, but it was not always that way. As is the case with most theories, natural selection was critiqued and dismissed before finally gaining acceptance by the scientific community.

Even though Darwin's theory finds its usual definition and applications within biology and similar disciplines, we in the fraternity world must also pay attention to its predictions. But perhaps I've shifted gears a little too quickly. What I

want to say is that in order for Phi Kappa Psi (indeed, fraternities in general) to continue into the future, we have to be able to demonstrate our strength in terms of values and standards and our willingness to change our behavior, particularly socially.

I realize that these ideas are not particularly welcome in the minds of many undergraduates. Yet the truth is societal norms have changed, and, unless we undertake to change ourselves and show that we are worth having around, other forces will do the changing. Even though we may not agree with the alterations in the laws, policies or customs of the country, nonetheless those are the things that are expected of us. If we, then, expect the benefits and support of society—in effect, if we want to continue to exist—we must be able to adapt.

Of course, we members of Phi Kappa Psi have pledged to uphold certain standards and ethics in our conduct. Part of what makes each of us a Phi Psi is that we are gentlemen, and by extension that means observing our ideals with regard to hazing, alcohol, behavior toward women in particular and so on. In order for us to adapt to our surroundings, we must always be mindful of these obligations. Another part of our Brotherhood, as you know, is service to

others. Therefore, we must take a more active role in assisting other fraternity chapters in their adaptation in addition to making sure our behavior does not ruin the experience for everyone.

The bottom line is this: the scientific notion that Darwin applied to plants and animals has become a social notion applied to Greek organizations. The current generation of Greek men and women is responsible for starting the move toward change. It isn't feasible to expect enormous differences overnight.

to the Treasurer

OK, so you are not the most popular

Brother in the Chapter. Yes, the treasurer's job is thankless and time consuming, but do you know what? It is the most important position in any Fraternity. The quickest way to dissolve a Chapter is through financial irresponsibility. First, take a deep breath. Second, sharpen your pencil, and finally, read on. These tips may help you become a better treasurer.

Have your local Alumni Association or House Corporation audit your books periodically. Hire an accountant if the Chapter can afford it. Seek the guidance of an accounting faculty member if the Chapter cannot afford a C.P.A.

Chapter finances are everyone's business. Post all house bills on the bulletin board and read off the names of Brothers in Chapter meetings who are neglecting their financial responsibilities. What do you say to those who think this is unbrotherly behavior? Brotherhood stops when bills go unpaid!

Set up an auxiliary account for all Headquarters payables. Talk about a mess, I have seen some Chapters that have collected initiation fees and have mistaken these funds for operating income. Oh, my!

Do you want to control committee chairmen's spending? You ask: "How for can I do this?" Prepare a budget and stick to it. Do not take money from one committee to finance another. Make it clear that any money spent over budget will be eaten by the committee chairmen: harsh, but fair and effective. Authorization for an expenditure should come only after a chairman has approached you with a budget request form. This form outlines the expense and indicates budget-to-date. Both the treasurer and

committee chairman should be responsible for keeping track of a committee's budget.

Only budget for 85 percent of the total expected revenue. Some accounts receivable will, unfortunately, be uncollectible.

Send a letter to parents that outlines Fraternity costs. Parents of the pledges should also be sent an outline soon after induction. Offer an incentive to parents who choose to pay semester bills up front.

Do you have Fraternity Brothers who are chronically late with their dues check? Make the bill a priority. The day after bills are due, have your finance committee interview Brothers with an outstanding balance. The finance committee should number three to five members and be comprised of those most respected in the Chapter.

Finally, do not pay for alcohol with Chapter funds. Never write a Chapter check for liquor or beer and do not keep an account with a liquor store or distributor. Our FIPG insurance guidelines do not allow it. Have a great year and remember that just because you have checks left does not mean there is money in the account!

Victor J. Napolitano I Is A College Arizona State '84 Student!

There is a big misconception among some of our Chapters that the reason we attend college is to postpone the "real world" for four or five or six years. Correction! The real reason you are attending college is to receive an education and prepare yourself for a career in your chosen field. The Fraternity was established to enhance your academic experience, not take away from it.

Now that you understand the purpose of associating with other upstanding undergraduates in our secret intercollegiate organization, what now? First, you have (elect) the scholarship chairman organize a committee consisting of a member of the Executive Board, the Social Chairman and a representative of each class (freshman, sophomore, etc.). The scholarship committee should develop academic resources that the Chapter may use to enhance its scholastic endeavors.

Although the scholarship committee is the organizational foundation for improving your Chapter's academic standing, good scholarship is everyone's responsibility. Without a good Chapter GPA, there is good potential for poor relations with alumni, the University and each other. Your grades are the Chapter's image. Poor grades can weaken the Chapter's foundation, create potential

for rapid membership losses, foster poor habits of time management and breed a growing sense of lack of purpose.

The scholarship committee needs to provide a good climate to study for the Chapter—create some type of quiet hours, or designate certain quiet/study hours in the Chapter house (e.g. the Chapter library). Teach the importance of scholarship to your pledges, but this will only be effective if the Brothers set a good example! Hold time management and study skills workshops for the entire Chapter (the University will often provide someone to do this). Establish a bulletin board where you may display pertinent information regarding Chapter scholarship.

The scholarship bulletin board should include the library and bookstore hours, every Chapter member and his major, scholarship and financial aid information, list of campus honoraries and entrance requirements, tutorial services available, internship and work study information, etc. Put individual GPA ranks (with no names) of all the Chapter members, so each member may see where he stands within the Chapter. Now that you have this abundance of scholastic information available to you, take advantage of it!

Promote academic achievement to the members of the Chapter. Plan and promote a Scholarship Dinner each term. Be sure to make it a respectable affair (coat and tie) so that everyone will take it seriously. Present certificates of achievement to those who deserve it (members with a GPA of 3.0 and above, highest GPA of each class, the member who crams for the most tests, the member who gets great grades and never seems to study, etc.). If you read this article in its entirety, you have taken your first step towards improving the Chapter's scholastic standing.

Where Are Michael O. Pitt the Pledges? Gettysburg '86 Have you ever walked into a Fraternity house and been accosted by a foul smell that reminds you of the socks you wore to play basketball a month ago that you had thrown in the corner? Or have you ever attempted to take a shower in the bathroom of a Fraternity and found that you cannot move because your feet are sticking to the floor. Well, I have only been on the road for two months, and this and much more has happened to me.

When I questioned the members of these Chapters about the condition of their houses, they replied that at the moment there were no pledges. And when I asked the Brothers of these Chapters why only the pledges performed cleanups, the most common response was that the pledges needed to learn to respect and take care of the house. While this is certainly a worthwhile objective, these Chapters are not using the correct means to obtain their goal. First of all, how will the pledges learn to take care of the house when the upperclassmen are not even lifting a finger to assist with the daily maintenance. Freshmen are going to follow the example set by the older members of the Fraternity. Therefore, when they see the mess that is left behind in the living room by a few Brothers, the pledges will think this is the norm, and they will copy that behavior. Furthermore, by making the pledges clean up after the Brothers, this is basically a form of slavery, and it reflects on the simple laziness of the members.

The only way that the pledges will learn to treat the house with respect is if they see the upperclassmen doing the same. And the most effective method is if a pledge and a Brother work together on a project. This form of leading by example will ensure that the pledges will learn the true meaning of respect for the Chapter house.

When there are no pledges, the Chapter house should look just as good as it did when there was a pledge class. This means that there has to be daily cleanups performed by the *Brothers*. Holding a cleanup once a week when only ten Brothers bother to roll out of bed will not be enough to keep a building which houses 40 young men looking acceptable.

Was that a groan I just heard from an undergraduate at the sheer thought of having daily cleanups? Relax, it is really not as bad as it sounds. Here is how it might work. First, you divide the house into ten or so areas. For example, the kitchen would be one area and the bathroom might be another. Then, in each of these areas there would be a cleanup performed daily by a Brother. A list could be posted for each area so that the person performing the cleanup would know exactly what he had to do. After the cleanup is completed, the person would then sign his name to the cleanup list so that the house manager would know that the cleanup was completed.

As I just mentioned, there would be approximately ten different cleanups a day. So on any normal day, there would be only 10 Brothers who would have cleanups. And since this program would only be in effect during the work week, that means that over the course of the week there would be 50 single cleanups. The average Chapter size is 64 members, so the average member would have a

cleanup less than once a week. So the time spent by a member cleaning the house would actually be less than if there was simply one big cleanup every Saturday. Yet the house would look and smell so much better because of the daily upkeep. And then the weekends could be saved for any major projects such as painting or furniture repair.

This system may not appeal to a Chapter at first, but if you really think about it, this plan is quite simple yet truly efficient. All of the beautiful Chapter houses use this method or something similar, and that is why they look so good. So if you are constantly bothered by that offending odor emanating from down the hall and you grow tired of the daily practice of tracking the growth of mold in the shower, I urge you to consider the above solution. I guarantee that not only will you notice the difference, but your alumni and any other visitors will also.

For a moment, imagine yourself attending the first day of a class and learning that it has no syllabus. The professor tells you he will still expect assignments but plans only to give you a week's warning. Sometimes, in fact, he might say nothing and expect you to guess what he wants. He adds that, although class begins at 9 a.m., all students must arrive at 7:30 and may only enter through the window. Finally, he doesn't care terribly much how well you learn because most faculty in his department don't remember the material; all that truly matters is that he still likes you when the semester is over. If you make it, you pass. How many of you would tolerate such absurdity?

Well, all too often that is the package we hand each pledge class. They don't know what they are doing or why and often gain nothing more out of the program than a simple sense of having "made it." There are many ways to rectify this and to reestablish the purpose of the whole period.

First, develop clear goals for the Fraternity Education program and get them approved by the Chapter. Examples are learning university history, performing community service, meeting all the Brothers, etc. In the end, all goals must lead to the ultimate goal of making each pledge a Phi Psi Brother, specifically one at your Chapter. Nonconstructive goals that teach him merely how to be a pledge are useless and wrong.

Once approved, these goals should be put in writing and distributed to all pledges and Brothers, along with a syllabus outlining the requirements to satisfy them. From that point on, NOTHING may be required of a pledge that does not *specifically* satisfy one or more of these goals.

Of course, even a constructive Fraternity Education program is meaningless if the pledge sees that the knowledge and behavior being taught is forsaken by those initiated. Do not expect of a pledge what you do not expect of yourself, nor should you require of him what you yourself avoid. Greater organization and experience may make these requirements less of a burden for the Brothers, but how can you require pledges to behave as perfect gentlemen and know the third verse of Amici while their Big Brothers don't clean the house and can't list the Greek alphabet?

I realize some of you are thinking, "Rick, you just don't understand. It is tradition not to let the pledges use silverware. We all had to do it!" Sadly, that emphasizes my point: think back to your own pledgeship and decide if such action made you a better Phi Psi, or if it simply made the Brothers laugh. There are many ways to teach the values of Phi Kappa Psi so that a man knows he has yet to prove himself worthy without treating him as some lesser human being. Educators are for fraternities; trainers are for zoos.

— Active alumni participation in District Councils and Grand Arch Councils can assist the Fraternity to develop sound programs vital to the success of the Fraternity. In some instances, alumni organizations underwrite all or part of the expenses of their delegates to these meetings to encourage participation.

Summary—Alumni desire social interaction with other alumni and view that as the most important reason for joining alumni organizations. There are other things that must be employed, however, to ensure that the alumni organizations continue to exist as the major means through which alumni can interact within the fraternal life. Phi Kappa Psi needs its alumni and their participation if the Fraternity is to remain viable. It takes a positive step by an alumnus to join a group or to form a new one.







GENERAL INFORMATION

Delegates

Each Chapter should immediately elect three Grand Arch Council delegates—two undergraduates and an alumnus. Alumni Associations in good standing* are entitled to three GAC delegates.

*An Alumni Association must have paid \$60 to the Fraternity Headquarters for each of the two years immediately preceding the GAC to be eligible to vote. The payment, due May 1 of each year, includes \$45 for the general expenses of the Fraternity and \$15 for the Endowment Fund.

Chapter and Faculty Advisors

Every Chapter should induce its Chapter Advisor and Faculty Advisor to attend the GAC and should contribute to their travel expense if possible. This investment will lead to valuable dividends in the way of counsel, advice and guidance.

Credentials

Delegates should present the original credentials form at the convention registration desk at the Grand Hotel upon arrival.

Attendance at Council Sessions

At least one delegate from each Chapter and Alumni Association entitled to representation must attend each session of the GAC. The fine for missing a roll call is \$10. Each delegation has one vote. According to the Fraternity's By-Laws, Chapters and Alumni Associations shall not instruct their delegates to vote in any specific way upon any matter. Every undergraduate, alumnus, pledge or Colony member, whether an accredited delegate or not, is cordially invited and sincerely urged to attend the 1990 GAC. All members are welcome to come to each session and are given the privileges of the floor.

Delegate Expenses

An allowance is provided each Chapter and Colony to help cover the travel expenses of delegates and advisors. The Fraternity does not reimburse expenses of Alumni Association delegates.

The allowance for delegates will be paid by crediting the Chapter/Colony account with the Fraternity at the conclusion

of the 1990 GAC. A delegate will be asked to sign on behalf of the Chapter/Colony evidencing attendance. Separate arrangements will be made for advisors.

Chapter and Colony Records

Delegates need only bring financial or other records to the 1990 GAC if specifically directed by the Executive Council. However, please be encouraged to bring any and all materials you wish to share with other Chapters and Colonies, such as well-done newsletters, Fraternity Education programs and the like. An area will be provided for their display.

Hotel Reservations and Rates

The Grand Hotel is a modified American plan hotel, thus breakfast and dinner each day are included in the room charge. Rates are per person. Suites and parlors as well as children's rates are available.

Registration Fee

Alumni and guest fees are \$110.00, and undergraduate fees are \$100.00. All fees increase \$10 if not received by July 1, 1990, and by an additional \$10 if not received by August 1, 1990.

Travel Arrangements

Mackinac Island is served by the Pellston, Michigan airport located 12 miles south of the Mackinaw City ferry docks. Commercial air service is available daily from Detroit and Chicago to the Pellston Airport. Air taxi service is also available from Pellston to the Mackinac Island Airport 24 hours a day. Ferry service to Mackinac Island is provided with Sheplar's through payment of the registration fee. Sheplar's provides both indoor and outdoor parking facilities.





Athletic Events

The 1990 GAC offers excellent opportunities for health and exercise. In addition to leisurely diversions like bicycle riding and walking, the GAC will conduct a golf tournament, a tennis tournament and a 5-k Fun Run. Fines

Any Chapter or Colony failing to register for and attend the 1990 GAC will be fined \$500. A GAC fine is non-appealable to the Executive Council.

Colonies are aware that "attendance to a Grand Arch Council by a substantial number of Colony members" is one of the Fraternity's chartering requirements.

Given the Fraternity-supplied travel reimbursement (see Delegate Expense above) and the substantial fine for not attending, it is assumed all Chapters and Colonies will be present at each Grand Arch Council. As the supreme legislative and judicial body of the Fraternity, there is no more important Phi Psi undergraduate responsibility than participation in the GAC once every two years. Chapters and Colonies should exercise great care in selecting GAC delegates and further insure representation by appointing alternate delegates who could attend at the last moment should travel or other problems prohibit attendance of originally selected delegates. Substitutions of this nature are easily made at the Grand Arch Council and insure that your Chapter or Colony takes its rightful place as the GAC roll is called.

Honors and Awards

Outstanding scholarship, leadership, publications and other awards will be recognized at the GAC Awards Breakfast. Please be certain your Chapter has submitted proper Awards proposals to the Fraternity Headquarters so they may be included in the competition. There are various GAC nominations and application forms deserving Chapter attention mailed throughout the spring.

Standing with the Fraternity

It will be embarrassing to both the officers of the Fraternity and the individual Chapter delegates if the GAC is told of any debt owed the Fraternity. When the Fraternity's fiscal year ends May 31, the books are audited for submission to the Grand Arch Council.

Chapter officers are requested to determine the exact financial position of their Chapters with the Fraternity and to make arrangements to pay any outstanding debts before August 5. Any Chapter whose account with the Fraternity is in arrears 90 days or more will not be entitled to vote upon any matter coming before the GAC. Each Chapter, however, must be represented at the GAC.

Rethinking Phi Kappa Psi

hi Kappa Psi considers itself conservative. That's what the Fraternity's usual expositors have insisted for more than a century. This has nothing to do with politics or ideology, no matter the partisan attitudes of its members. What makes Phi Psi conservative is the settled disposition to conduct its affairs with prudent regard for its own history and traditions. Phi Psi is not given to novelty for the sake of novelty.

In the past—and that past now spans 138 years and about 80,000 initiates the Chapters were supposed to exercise their best judgment about the men to whom they offered the privilege of membership. Thomas Jefferson's standards for a "natural aristocracy," talent and virtue, were to be used. "Good men or none," said Founder Charles Page Thomas Moore, and he meant just that. Likewise, the Fraternity as a whole was supposed to establish Chapters at only those institutions that were thoroughly sound and worthy of Phi Psi's patronage. Were such attitudes elitist? Yes, of course. Proudly and deliberately so.

Then there was the matter of style. Virtually from the beginning, Phi Psi's style was supposed to be reserved, even understated, without pretension or ostentation. As John Henry Frizzell put it, "Phi Kappa Psi is not a rah-rah Fraternity." There wasn't any need to make the whole world pay attention to the doings of a private association. No good reason for public displays of Greek letters or boisterous performances of the Fraternity's songs or silly-ass antics on campus and elsewhere. While a Phi Psi Chapter could hardly be mistaken for an outpost of Moral Re-armament, there was at least a certain discretion, even if honored in the breach.

Overall, the Brothers of Phi Kappa Psi shared an understanding, mostly unspoken, that they were gentlemen and, as such, expected to behave properly. In point of fact, until the late 1960s, the ideal of the gentleman set the norm for the conduct of almost all fraternity men. To nobody's surprise, some respected it more conscientiously than did others. Phi Psi was patently one of those fraternities of whom it could be said that its members were gentlemen. It did not advertise the fact because it did not have to do so. That condition was largely self-

evident. But of such takings for granted is smugness made, and smugness, like pride, goeth before a fall.

Nowadays, the gentleman in America seems nearly as rare as the three-toed sloth. Maybe irrecoverably so. Within the American fraternity movement, things have never really been the same since "Animal House" in 1979. All the zany loutishness and crazed puerility of bull-session fantasies congealed in an heroically mindless movie. To the chagrin of Greek-letter elders, life imitated art with a vengeance.

But the obliteration of the gentleman was hardly the most urgent problem. The destructive forces that beset American society at every level—drug and alcohol abuse, random violence, racial conflict, vandalism—also came to corrupt the fraternity experience with alarming frequency. Eventually, no chapter of any fraternity—regardless of its strength and stability—could remain blithely confident of its own invulnerability. There is no such thing as total immunity.

Even so, during the last 20 years, Phi Kappa Psi hasn't gone to hell in a handbasket. Whenever Chapters have gotten into trouble, the Fraternity has acted firmly and decisively. On balance, it is fair to say that Phi Psi has dealt with its problems in an exemplary way—certainly as well as any of its competitors, perhaps more effectively.

Clearly, the wise course of action can't be one that waits for problems to emerge and then tries to solve them. That approach is tactical and shortterm. What is called for is a more strategic, long-term conception of what Phi Psi should do to anticipate the development of harmful situations and, better yet, to prevent them altogether. To that end, the Fraternity's conservatism enables it to consider contemporary collegiate life from the perspective of Phi Psi's whole historical experience. No quick fixes, no miraculous panaceas, only the thoughtful examination of lives well lived and worth living.

During his term as the Fraternity's SWGP from 1986 to 1988, David F. Hull Jr., Louisiana State '66, proposed the creation of a commission on values, ethics and standards. The Executive Council approved the initiative, and Hull enticed a few prominent educators to participate: Sam A. Banks, Duke '47, professor of psychiatry and former president of Dickinson College and the Uni-

versity of Richmond; John W. Oswald DePauw '35, president emeritus of The Pennsylvania State University and past president of the University of Kentucky: C. Robert Pace, DePauw '30, professor emeritus of psychology and higher education, University of California Los Angeles; Robert F. Rodgers, Texas Tech '57, professor of psychology and higher education, The Ohio State University Brother Hull's successor as SWGP, J. Robert Meserve, Stanford '34, invited him to chair the commission (hereafter referred to as the Hull commission). Two members of the Executive Council. John F. Buck, Indiana '75, scholarship director and a computer scientist at Indiana University, and the Mystagogue. were also asked to serve; SWGP Meserve chose to take part as well.

Since its initial meeting in September 1988, the Hull commission has been trying to puzzle through an assortment of questions, all of them, more or less, related to what it means to be a fraternity member in the present day and, in particular, a Phi Psi. The point of these free-wheeling discussions is not to issue yet another position paper. There is no shortage of high-minded recommendations on the critical needs of American higher education. Rather, the aim is toward a comprehensive program that will deal directly with current concerns. To make the topics as concrete and timely as possible, a cadre of alumni carried out interviews with almost a hundred students at the Woodrow Wilson Leadership School in August 1989. The results indicated that alcohol and drug abuse, sexual abuse of women, hazing and financial irresponsibility are the common major problems, and that cheating and petty theft are matters of lesser concern.

In light of this information—which confirms, by the way, the commissioners' own observations—one immediate task is that of figuring out how to engage the Chapters as organizations as well as their members as individuals in confronting the problems. Direct engagement-taking matters seriously and paying sustained attention—will require the development of a set of instructional materials (e.g., computer programs, discussion guides, training kits, audio- and videocassettes, related tools). Actually, that may turn out to be the less difficult part of the job: the practical application of learning theory and technology to the fraternity experience. What may prove more difficult is how to make the connections between the Fraternity's Ritual —its moral and ethical expectations and the contemporary Phi Psi's actual circumstances—his own hopes and fears, needs and desires.

In a sense, the Fraternity must gain what the Quakers mean when it is said that something "speaks to my condition." For Phi Kappa Psi, it becomes a matter of translating Thomas Cochran Campbell's "eternal principles" into more vivid and compelling meanings that Phi Psis of the rising generations can readily understand. It becomes a matter of asking age-old questions and responding with durable answers, but in more engrossing, more imaginative ways.

To accomplish this, the Hull commission must be free to inspect Phi Kappa Psi from every angle. Possibilities abound: improved training of Chapter leaders as well as alumni advisors; restructuring of fraternity education beyond pledgeship; realignment of Chapters and colleges; intensive involvement of alumni in Chapter life; reorientation of Chapter activities and interests; reorganization of Chapter government; redefinition of membership obligations; development of management systems and evaluation methods. These do not, of course, exhaust the range of things under consideration. Nor do the phrases give much of a sense of what may finally come about.

All the same, it's improbable that the Hull commission will urge the Fraternity to admit women, abolish pledgeship or readopt pink and lavender as the colors. What it will do-if it gets its way-is make each Brother, student and alumnus alike, more keenly aware that Phi Kappa Psi is centered on moral responsibility and personal integrity. The commission may even get around to breathing new life into that moribund fellow, the gentleman. If it manages to do so, it will be restoring the work of John Henry Frizzell, who exercised his mystagogial prerogative at GACs in legendary talks on "manners and morals." He had a splendid gift for linking right conduct, good manners and common sensealways in droll remarks that never sounded preachy or moralizing.

The Hull commission is entitled to remind itself that, thanks to its namesake, it is also carrying on the work of the old-time GAC standing committee on scholarship, democracy, and morality. Gradually, the committee's activity focused almost entirely on academic proficiency—seldom a topic that inspired merriment—and the Fraternity's concerns about moral standards and democratic practices were allowed to go unattended.

In a larger sense, the commission is helping to restore what is most truly Greek in Phi Kappa Psi—the paideia, which was the tradition of moral education in ancient Athens. The ideals, precepts and values that ennobled the Athenians were transmitted not through formal instruction alone, but from elder men to younger by personal example. The experience of fraternity, especially in Phi Kappa Psi, depends on the active presence of good men who are willing to foster their Brothers' finest potentialities. Accordingly, the Hull commission is dedicated to reviewing the ethos of the Fraternity, the essential character that is the very foundation of its ethics.

Can all these lofty aspirations be realized? Can any group of fraternity men, no matter how resourceful and visionary, discover the remedies for what ails fraternity life and, indeed, American society? The odds are against it. Yet with its sense of history, Phi Kappa Psi remembers that its great Brother, Woodrow Wilson, called Americans to gain a transforming leadership that would lift them from the commonplace toward their better selves. His was never a counsel of complacency and mediocrity. Nor is his Fraternity's.

This May, the Hull commission will submit its first proposals to the Executive Council and in August present its work to the Grand Arch Council. If all goes well, it will have something of substance ready for the Chapters to use come next fall. For the time being, the project has to be described as work in progress. Whatever the outcome, it can be assumed that Phi Kappa Psi will be the healthier and the wiser, that "we live and we flourish."

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

Summer Rush: If You Have To, You Have To...

here is one sure fire way to conduct a successful summer rush program: work to abolish it. If you attend college at a campus that continues to allow this horrendously expensive, wasteful, archaic, counter-productive membership format, the best thing you can do is to work through your IFC and university administration to see that it is eliminated. For gosh sakes, let the poor incoming freshmen at least set foot on the campus and begin to get acclimated before you rush them-literally-into making an important lifelong decision. Schools that have no summer rush-and better yet, schools that have second semester freshman rush—see a far lower dropout rate among their pledges and a higher rate of continued activity by their members than schools where summer rush is practiced. Sadly, chapters that pursue freshmen before they reach the campus experience pledge dropout rates of 20-50%. That is unacceptably high.

Why do chapters that do not pursue summer rush achieve a lower dropout rate? Because both sides, rushees and members, make more informed choices based on seeing each other over a period of time on the campus, not on a few superficial summer rush parties.

Plus, summer rush budgets are notoriously easy to overspend. Some chapters become caught up in hosting elaborate all-expense paid trips or large come-one come-all pool parties. These amount to nothing more than the Chapter subsidizing summer entertainment for some of the Brothers. They are not membership recruitment vehicles. They are not opportunities for the actives to become well acquainted with potential Brothers.

So, as you can see, there are many major problems with summer rush and several compelling reasons why you should work to abolish it. But while you are lobbying diligently to get rid of it, you may have to conduct a summer recruitment program to remain competitive. What is the right way to conduct a summer rush program, if you have to have one?

Toward Freshmen

Summer membership recruitment not "rush"—directed toward incoming freshmen should focus on orientation. Run your own version of a campus orientation program. Offer freshmen help with scheduling, help with finding a place to live, advice on where to go and what to do on campus. In general, assist them to become acclimated to the school. Welcome them and answer their questions, just as you would a friend. If your university has a formal orientation program, be sure you are involved in it.

Remember, summer "rush"—darn that word—is friendmaking, as all good membership recruitment should be. Get to know the prospects as individuals through activities where one-on-one interaction is possible: go water skiing, sailing, swimming, play golf, tennis or go biking. Where do you obtain the names of freshmen whom you ask to join in these activities? From your high school, from friends and family back home, from alumni recommendations, from sororities.

Prospects whom you especially like and who are recs should be contacted in some manner at least once a month over the summer. All other freshmen should be contacted by letter or phone at least once prior to the start of school.

Follow strict budgetary procedures: limits on spending; guidelines as to what will and will not be reimbursed; receipts required for reimbursement. Forget the big summer rush parties. They cost way too much; all chapters are forbidden to serve alcohol to minors; and they have nothing to do with genuine membership recruitment anyway.

Toward Upperclassmen

Before you enter spring finals, accurate lists of upperclass prospects should be compiled from among those friends and acquaintances who have not already pledged elsewhere; from those who went through formal rush and dropped out; and from those transferring in to the university. Normally the Chapter should have met and begun a relationship with a prospect before the end of school. What you want to do over the summer is deepen that relationship and explain more of what fraternity life is all about so that both the prospect and the rusher can make more sound decisions.

You should find out where your prospects are going to be over the summer and how to reach them. Assign members to handle the prospects who will be in the same towns they will over the summer. What do they do with the pros-

pects? The same kinds of activities as mentioned above-miniature golf, baseball, going to a movie, and so on-any activity that allows for the two sides to get to know each other better. Prospects who do not live where any Brothers are located should be assigned to members who will write or call them about every three or four weeks. As with freshmen prospects, the Membership Chairman and his Committee should keep track of which Brothers are assigned to which prospects and should keep on top of the situation to make sure the contacts are being made. The Brothers should report to the Committee how their "friendmaking" is going. Of course, the same tight budgetary procedures should be in force here as well.

Whether the prospects are freshmen or upperclassmen, showcase the full range of your product, the 24-hour living experience that a true fraternity is. Don't be just a party club. Be friendly, sincere and genuine as you carry out one-on-one friendmaking, while, of course, you are working through proper channels to abolish summer rush.



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Getting the Ol' Gang Back Together How to establish an Alumni Organization

n this series of articles, an explanation was given about alumni associations and alumni clubs, their functions and how an alumnus can interact continuously with the Fraternity through these groups.

The point also was made that there are numerous opportunities for alumni to form an organization if one is not currently operating nearby. There are over 2.700 areas in this country where a concentration of Phi Psis exists in one zip code that can support an alumni organization. That number ignores the fact that there may be additional Phi Psis in adjacent codes. The question then arises as to how to form an alumni organization.

Determine the Market Area

Another way of phrasing this marketing term is that the organizers of the group must identify those zip codes from which they feel the organization can draw. Once that has been established, the Fraternity Headquarters can assist by providing a list of all Phi Psis residing in those zip codes. Remember, an alumni organization is for all Phi Psis, regardless of Chapter affiliation.

Determine the Organization's **Purpose**

As mentioned in the last issue, a survey was conducted of the national leadership early in 1989, and it was determined that most alumni felt social interaction with other alumni to be the most important reason for joining an alumni organization. It was also felt that the above would not be sufficient to sustain an organization. There are many opportunities in any community to interact socially if that is the only purpose for creating an organization. Therefore, other reasons for existence will have to be developed to ensure the success of an alumni organization.

In the last issue, it was pointed out that the survey respondent felt the organization also should help achieve one or more of the Fraternity's needs. This will give structure to the alumni organization for which goals can be established. The following potential objectives of the Fraternity could be included in the purpose(s) of the alumni organization:

- To promote an opportunity for alumni to interact continuously within the
- To recruit new members for the Fra-
- To provide a steadying influence upon a Chapter focused through the Chapter Advisor.
- To serve as a medium for interaction between the Chapter and the alumni in those instances where the organization is near a Chapter.
- To serve as a source out of which local alumni leadership is developed.
- To provide a means for active alumni participation in District Councils and Grand Arch Councils in order to assist the Fraternity to develop sound programs vital to the success of the Fraternity.
- To serve as a local foundation for supporting the establishment of a colony at a nearby college.

Delimit Scope of Services

A word of caution needs to be made

Where are the Phi Psis?

Today, Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity is alive and well. From an initial two members in Canonsburg, Pennsylvania in 1852, the membership has grown to just under 60,000 living Phi Psis residing in each of the 50 states, the District of Columbia, four territories and various foreign countries. Undergraduates comprise over 4,000 of this total. Only 2 percent of the membership's addresses are unknown-a very low number for such associations.

An analysis of their mailing addresses reveals that California has the highest concentration with around 12.7 percent at the end of Endowment Fund's fiscal year in February 1989. Pennsylvania is second in concentration with 6.9 percent, followed by Ohio (6.6 percent), New York (6.0 percent) and Texas (5.5 percent) rounding out the top five states.

As explained elsewhere in this series, an alumni association is composed of 15

concerning the breadth of the activities to be undertaken by an alumni organization. A properly delineated scope of activities can mean as much to the success of the alumni organization as any factor. One survey respondent states, "I think that the most successful alumni organizations are those that do not overdo it. Success seems to come from holding only a few events on an annual basis so that attendance is not burdensome and so that participation is anticipated.

Determine the Form of the Group

Interested alumni must decide whether an alumni association or alumni club is the suitable vehicle for organizing the local group. As it has been defined previously, an alumni association must have 15 continuous, bona fide members and is entitled to vote at a District Council and a Grand Arch Council. An alumni club may have 5 or more continuous, bona fide members and is entitled to be represented but cannot vote at District Councils and Grand Arch Councils.

Champions

As in every organization, it is the hard work of one or two individuals who make an organization successful.

or more continuous, bona fide members of the Fraternity, whereas an alumni club is composed of five or more continuous, bona fide members. There are 937 zip codes that have 15 or more Phi Psis residing within them, and 1,805 additional zip codes that have six to 14 Phi Psi resident members (not counting those listed for alumni associations).

The above data make good trivia answers, but the practical aspect is that there are numerous instances where Phi Psis have sufficient members to interact in an organized manner within the national Fraternity. Currently, there are 48 recognized alumni associations and 22 recognized alumni clubs. See the directory elsewhere in this issue for a list of alumni organizations.

Of course, success in organizing and sustaining an alumni organization does not mean that it can only occur in a zip code with the highest Phi Psi concentration. Of the 70 existing alumni organizations, around half are not in the top 50 zip codes.

Whether it is the PTA, the church or a fraternity organization, it requires the unswerving interest of a few to make it a success. It is important to the success of a new venture to identify a champion(s) for the new organization who will have the knowledge and interest in the organization and who will make the commitment to persevere until the organization is self-sustaining.

The location of a local or national Fraternity leader in the immediate area is one source of determining whether or not a local champion is available. This includes the national elected and appointed officers, members of the Order of S.C., former Educational Leadership Consultants, the Chapter Advisors and the house corporation presidents. This determination is merely a starting point for identifying the location of a champion. However, these people have a track record of support for and knowledge of Phi Kappa Psi. If they do not have the time to be a champion, they could be a source for identifying and obtaining a champion. The champion does not necessarily have to be an alumnus; local Chapters may serve as an organizing vehicle.

Determine the Organizational Structure

One of the key leadership survey re-

spondents stated that organizations in Columbus, Ohio, Orange County, California, Philadelphia, Dallas and Chicago were considered strong organizations due in part to their structure. They have elected, committed officers, a treasury, defined goals and minutes of their meetings.

Sources of Income

This does not have to be a major stumbling block to organization. Most of the existing groups basically self-fund their way as they operate. If a meal or refreshments are served at a meeting, the individual participants pay their costs. Dues can be used to offset the initial organizing expenses of the organization.

Promotion

The Fraternity Headquarters can be of assistance to the organizing attempt. Mailing labels can be provided for the kick-off mailing, and a draft letter of invitation for the inaugural meeting be drafted for the signature of the convening person.

The appearance of a national officer in your area can serve as a cause to hold a meeting out of which an organizing effort be accomplished. Founders Day also is a good social attraction. The Headquarters recorded about 150 observances of Founders Day in 1989.

One warning, however, about the organizational meeting. Fund raising should *not* be a part of this event. It should be billed as a "dropping back into Phi Psi" event.

The Headquarters is willing to assist any local effort to form an alumni group. Not only can it provide assistance as noted previously, but it can provide an informational kit on alumni relations. Inside it are tips on how to form an alumni association, the proper form to petition the Executive Council for recognition and a sample set of by-laws. Additionally, there is space in the newsletter section of THE SHIELD to alert visiting Brothers of the location and time of the organization's meetings.

In sum, Phi Kappa Psi is a life-long commitment and not just an organization that a student joins in his college days. It is a Brotherhood, and it is family. Phi Psi is part of each of our extended families, and alumni need to establish organizational networks that will allow the Fraternity and them to interact continuously.

As an FIPG member, Phi Kappa Psi supports this policy and expects full cooperation in its implementation from all Chapters.





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

Message From the President



Dear Brothers:

This is my last message as your President. I can't believe almost two years have passed since I was elected to this office. Its seems like only two months when you are surrounded by hardworking volunteer officers and staff.

At the beginning of this biennium, alcohol abuse was our largest disciplinary problem. Unfortunately, it remains in that same position today. If an alcohol problem arises, many times litigation follows. Unlike the court cases on television and in the movies, the effects of a judicial decision are not complete when a decision is handed down.

But alcohol abuse is the not the only factor that gives rise to a liability suit. In our litigious society, almost any accident, no matter how innocent, can result in multi-million dollar lawsuit.

In one recently resolved case involving a boating accident, several Chapter members accidentally ran over a downed water-skier and cut off the lower portion of one of the 14-year-old boy's legs. The out-of-court settlement tapped the Chapter's liability insurance for its maximum.

In many cases, the incident is not resolved at this point. After many months or even years of pre-trial preparation including grand jury investigations, depositions by the people involved and discovery requests, the decision is final, but the consequences are not. The people involved still live with the ghosts of the past, with the memory of the incident. And some parties may be haunted throughout their lives by a monetary damages award.

Phi Kappa Psi promotes the Risk Management Guidelines of the Fraternity Insurance Purchasing Group in order to reduce the possibility of an accident occurring. Our primary interest is not in protecting the monetary and physical assets of a Chapter or of the Fraternity; rather our interests are in protecting more valuable assets — the members. When the final count is made, the plaintiff in a liability suit is not the only injured party.

The entire fraternity community is beset with the problem of alcohol abuse. It is a campus-wide problem in many schools. The Greek system is generally unfairly treated by the media who love to put "animal house" into the headlines. Let's not give them the chance. It requires a co-operative effort of students and alumni, but it is an effort that must be made.

Please come to the Mackinac GAC this coming August 5 - 9. In addition to a top flight lecture/workshop on alcohol abuse, I promise you a Phi Psi golf tournament and many other entertainment items for the whole family at the famous Grand Hotel. We look forward to seeing you there.

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Introduction

A Matter of the Common Senses

y grandfather once told me, "Son, God gave you two eyes and two ears but only one mouth for a reason. If you keep your eyes and ears open and your mouth shut, you'll learn twice as much and tick off half as many people." These words carry a simple wisdom that cannot be denied, but perhaps the time has come to open the mouth and be counted.

We must open our eyes and see what is happening. College fraternities find themselves in a peculiar situation as they enter the '90s membership levels soar to new highs, yet criticism comes from every direction.

The headlines are filled with allegations of hazing, alcohol abuse, sexism, racism and anti-intellectualism. And not all the allegations are false. Fraternity, once at the forefront of progressivism, has been labelled a dinosaur, ignoring the present and future by keeping its head in its past.

The 1978 release of National Lampoon's Animal House possibly contributed to a resurgence of popularity for fraternities, but it definitely solidified the negative Greek stereotype that permeates our society. Articles on philanthropic endeavors are relegated to the inside pages whereas the mere scent of trouble is plastered across the front page.

We wage a war of education, and the first front is the home front. To survive in the changing world, new members must realize the difference between stereotype and reality; they must realize that "fraternity" is not Greek for "free-for-all." With this lesson learned, we must present a unified front to the world, sure of ourselves and of our purpose.

We must open our ears and hear what some college administrators are planning. There is a trend in higher education, limited primarily to private institutions in the Northeast, to ask a question of the Greek system — "Why?" Trinity, Middlebury, Bowdoin, Bucknell, Amherst, Brown and others are asking this question.

Some institutions are not allowing us to respond to that question. Rather, they answer it for themselves and take the initiative to correct the problem as they define it. Their answer ranges anywhere from mandating co-ed membership and ordering deferred rush to commandeering chapter-owned property. Often these decisions are made without serious consideration of input from the fraternities themselves.

We do not deny the existence of problems in the system. We do, however, deny that they rob the system of all merit. The Commission of Values, Ethics and Standards is working to define Phi Kappa Psi in a modern context and to establish its niche in higher education.

The immediate task before us is to make sure the universities and colleges do not shut us out in the interim. We must open our eyes and ears and learn, and we must open our mouths and get involved. As an alumnus of Phi Psi, you are also an alumnus of your college. If the faculty or administration starts asking why? Tell them why. It's a matter of common sense; it's also a matter of survival.

The issues addressed above are external problems, common to all fraternities. What follows are the annual membership statistics that illustrate the internal strength of Phi Psi. Please read on as we offer membership and other information for March 1, 1989 through February 28, 1990, for the 138th Annual Report.

Statistics

The "Average" Chapter

he concept on an average chapter creates for some the image of a national pecking order of Chapters. Those Chapters that record numbers above the average statistical membership figures receive the Fraternity's favor, while those that fall below the average levels are in danger of being cut off from the fold. Attaching such speculation to numbers that indicate the strength of the organization as a whole is senseless.

The average Chapter includes 64 undergraduates - 45 of whom are initiates. Of the 19 pledges, 15 will complete their pledge period and become initiated members.

The average Chapter experienced no net change in total membership compared to last year, although the number of initiates and pledges is down slightly. The retention rate for pledges has also dropped from 90 percent last year to 79 percent for this year. The typical undergraduate Chapter has initiated 834 men over the years and has been on its particular campus for 64 years.

Membership

The year under review posted an addition of 1,383 new initiates to Phi Psi's Grand Membership Roll, compared to 1,613 last year. The Chapters pledged an average of 19 men per Chapter, initiating 15 of them. The 1,720 pledges this year compares to the 1,829 last year and the 1,987 for the 1988 report year.

Continuous updating has significantly reduced the "lost" members on our address lists, and we now mail THE SHIELD to almost 54,000 Phi Psis. Keeping up with Brother Jones is a never-ending task, so if you have moved or if you know a Brother who is not receiving THE SHIELD and other Fraternity correspondence, please forward his name and address to: Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity, 510 Lockerbie Street, Indianapolis, Indiana 46202.

New Chapters

Phi Psi granted no new Chapter charters during the 1990 report year. On April 21, 1990, New Jersey Delta at Trenton State added its voice to the chorus, but this came after the end of the 1990 report year. The addition of New Jersey Delta will be reflected in next year's report.

Colonies

The Fratemity operated a total of seven Colonies this report year. District of Columbia Alpha at George Washington University marks the attempt to re-establish a Chapter first organized in 1868. The Chapter folded in 1899 and was re-colonized April 6, 1987. Another return to a Phi Psi campus listed previously as inactive took place on November 9, 1987, when the Fraternity organized the Wisconsin Alpha Colony at the University of Wisconsin. The old Wisconsin Alpha was chartered in 1875, subsequently closed in 1894, reopened in 1897 and again closed in 1939. As mentioned above, New Jersey Delta at Trenton State College received its charter on April 21, 1990. The Colony was organized on January 23, 1988. Massachusetts Beta at Brandeis University became an official Colony on March 11, 1988.

As the 1990 report year began, North Carolina Beta at East Carolina University was organized on April 16 through the efforts of a transfer Brother in Greenville. Fraternity staff recruited and organized the men of California Kappa at the University of California-Irvine on October 21, 1989 and of Louisiana Gamma at Loyola University-New Orleans on February 17, 1990.

Shortly after the end of this report year. Phi Psi recognized New York Theta at the Rochester Institute of Technology. Formed by a local interest group, New York Theta joins the Phi Psi Colonies in their efforts to complete the ten requirements for a Chapter charter.

Chapter Closings

During the report year, no Chapters or Colonies were closed or suspended. The Chapters at Bucknell, the University of Rhode Island and Wittenberg remain closed, but Fraternity staff, alumni and university administrators are working to effect the return of Phi Psi to these campuses.

Chapter Numbers

Since each Annual Report stays strictly within the time limits of March 1 to the end of February, it is possible for some Chapters and Colonies to experience artificially high or low member numbers. For example, if a new initiate report from a January or February initiation date is not received in Phi Psi's Headquarters until March or April one year but the following year the report comes in on time, the impact of two years' quantity of new members appears in one report year, the total of new Brothers joining appears unrealistically high; the opposite reporting practice results in artificially low total member numbers. The overall year-to-year figures Fraternity-wide do even out, but when viewing each Chapter alone, the picture given by any single report year may or may not accurately reflect exact member numbers.

Last year, 15 Chapters listed 100 or more men on their rosters, and this year 16 Chapters so report. Topping the list with 158 men involved in the Chapter during the report year was Texas Alpha at the

University of Texas. Following with 149 and 141 were Ohio Lambda at Miami University and Indiana Delta at Purdue University, respectively. Following these were Kansas Alpha at the University of Kansas with 132; California Delta at the University of Southern California with 127; and Nebraska Alpha at the University of Nebraska with 126. Also posting over 100 members were: Florida Alpha at Florida State with 122; West Virginia Alpha at the University of West Virginia with 121; Michigan Alpha at the University of Michigan with 112; California Epsilon at UCLA and Indiana Epsilon at Valparaiso with 111; New York Beta at Syracuse University with 106; Indiana Beta at Indiana University, Nebraska Beta at Creighton and Oregon Alpha at the University of Oregon with 104; and Illinois Delta at the University of Illinois with 103.

Five Chapters reported members in the 90s: California Zeta at UC-Santa Barbara and Illinois Epsilon at Illinois State with 96; the University of Missouri Chapter, Missouri Alpha with 94; Mississippi Alpha at Ole Miss with 93; and Rhode Island Alpha at Brown University with 92.

Coming in in the 80s are: New York Alpha at Cornell with 88; North Carolina Alpha at Duke and Tennessee Delta at Vanderbilt with 87; the Wabash College Chapter, Indiana Gamma, with 84; and Georgia Alpha at UGA with 82.

Nine Chapters posted in the 70s: Ohio Alpha at Ohio Wesleyan and Virginia Beta at Washington & Lee with 78; Arizona Beta at Arizona State and Maryland Alpha at Johns Hopkins with 74; a reorganized Texas Beta at Texas Tech with 73; California Beta at Stanford and Pennsylvania Epsilon at Gettysburg with 72; and Ohio Zeta at Bowling Green State with 71.

With member numbers in the 60s are: Iowa Alpha at Iowa, Iowa Beta at Iowa State and Pennsylvania Nu at Indiana University of Pennsylvania with 68; Washington Alpha at UW with 67; the Northwestern Chapter, Illinois Alpha, with 66; Minnesota Gamma at Mankato State with 65; Ohio Delta at Ohio State with 64; Kentucky Beta at UK with 63; the Southern Methodist Chapter, Texas Delta, with 62; and Oklahoma Alpha at Oklahoma with 61.

Rounding out this list are seven Chapters reporting members in the 50 to 59 range: Alabama Alpha at Alabama and Pennsylvania Theta at Lafayette with 59; Indiana Alpha at DePauw and Indiana Zeta at Butler with 58; Indiana Eta at Indiana State with 57; Colorado Alpha at Colorado with 54; and New Jersey Alpha at Rider with 52.

District III Has Largest Chapters

Phi Psi's Midwest District, stretching from Ohio to Wisconsin and including 18 Chapters, recorded the largest average size this report year with a 79 man average. District V followed with a 67 men average among its 14 Chapters. Next were District IV with 15 Chapters and last year's largest district, District VI, with 13 Chapters

both posting averages of 66. District II's 14 Chapters followed with 54; and District I with 17 Chapters posted a 51-men average.

2000 Club

The "2000 Club," Phi Psi's grouping that honors Chapters that have initiated 2,000 or more men over the years, remains exclusive to all but one. Indiana Beta, founded in 1869, became eligible for this distinction in 1983 and has initiated 2,261 men over the years.

1500 Club

The "1500 Club," open only to those Chapters claiming 1,500 to 1,999 initiated, gained one new member this year: Nebraska Alpha, founded in 1895 at the University of Nebraska, enters this group with 1,507 initiates. The Chapter nearest to gaining membership in the "2000 Club" is Kansas Alpha, founded in 1876 at the University of Kansas, with 1,816 initiates. Ohio Alpha at Ohio Wesleyan, founded in 1861, follows with 1,706. West Virginia Alpha closely trails Ohio Alpha with 1,702 initiates after 100 years of operation. Next in the 1,600 range are Ohio Delta at Ohio State with 1,696; New York Alpha at Cornell with 1,667; Indiana Delta at Purdue with 1,654; Texas Alpha at the University of Texas with 1,647; New York Beta at Syracuse with 1,644; Pennsylvania Beta at Allegheny with 1,626; and Illinois Alpha at Northwestern with 1,623. Rounding out the list are Indiana Alpha at DePauw with 1,570; California Delta at USC with 1,557; Illinois Delta at Illinois with 1,537; Iowa Alpha with 1,508; and Nebraska Alpha.

1000 Club

Illinois Beta at the University of Chicago adds its name to the "1000 Club" this report year. Founded in 1865, the Chapter has initiated

1,005 men into Phi Psi. In all, 41 Chapters have initiated 1,000 men or more since founding.

Initiates

The 94 active Chapters reported 1,383 initiates and transfers during 1989-1990, down from the record to date of 1,750 reported in the 1987-1988 year. The Texas Alpha Chapter at the University of Texas in Austin and Kansas Alpha at the University of Kansas in Lawrence led the nation in new initiates with 54 new men recorded on the membership rolls. They were followed by the newly reorganized Texas Beta at Texas Tech with a 50-man increase and Nebraska Alpha at the University of Nebraska with 45.

This year's 1,383 initiates came from 94 chapters reporting for an average of 15.02 new members per Chapter. Last year, 1,613 initiates were reported from 83 Chapters, for an average of 19.43 men per Chapter, and the year before that averaged 19.89 men per Chapter.

Pledges

This year, the Fraternity's 94 Chapters and 7 Colonies reported 1,867 men pledged to Phi Psi. This averages 18.86 per undergraduate group, compared to last year's 20.92 average, which did not include 5 active Chapters that failed to report.

Housing

The good news in Phi Psi housing again this year is that over \$32 million in House Corporation-owned property and contents is once again insured through the seventh year of the Phi Psi Insurance Program. Even better news is that insurance premiums did not increase over the previous year's premium, and that year even marked a decrease from past costs. One benefit of the nation-wide insurance program is the increased attention paid to the condition of undergraduate housing. Through the on-going inspections undertaken on all Phi Psi property, specific recommendations for physical plant improvements are being carried out. It is our hope that these preventive measures will provide Phi Psi with the safest housing in the men's interfraternity world.

The task of fully operating a Chapter house is too great for the undergraduates, whose membership and leadership turns over completely every four years. No, this task is best handled by volunteers serving on an alumni house corporation. And alumni are only willing to serve in such an advisory capacity if adequate liability insurance coverage exists. Phi Psi's insurance program is designed to protect students, Chapters, House Corporations, Advisors and general Fraternity volunteers and staff as well. As you well know, liability insurance has become a burden, but it is a burden that must be shouldered. A large loss at any Chapter without liability coverage would be devastating and could result in bankruptcy for both the Chapter and House Corporation.

The Fraternity Insurance Purchasing Group, of which Phi Psi is an active member, is the interfraternity insurance purchasing agent. This cooperative organization has not only kept insurance premiums reasonable but also has led the fight in risk management education. FIPG continues to grow and promises to provide Phi Psi Chapters and House Corporations with liability coverage that is so necessary in today's litigious society.

We could not address Chapter housing without offering a word of gratitude to the several hundred Phi Psi alumni who volunteer their time as House Corporation officers and directors. Were it not for this dedicated crew, Phi Kappa Psi simply could not exist on campuses where housing is not provided by the college itself. Well-functioning House Corporations make it possible for Phi Psi to provide safe, clean housing for our undergraduate Brothers, and we hope to achieve even greater heights in this area in the years to come.

Within Phi Kappa Psi today, a total of 55 Chapter houses are owned by Phi Psi House Corporations. Fourteen Chapters occupy houses owned by the college or university, and 20 rent space privately.

Membership Shifts

Of the 92 Chapters represented this year, 40 reported an increase in total Chapter strength over last year, 49 reported a decrease in membership and 3 listed no change. The greatest membership increase came from Kansas Alpha and Texas Alpha, both posting a 59 member increase over last year. The largest loss was reported by Indiana Beta, operating with 55 fewer men of record this year.

In overall demographic terms, Phi Psi's "farm belt" district, District III, surpassed District VI in average Chapter size. District III's host institutions are predominantly large, state universities in and around the Great Lakes. District V ranked second, spanning the "grain belt" from Minnesota down to New Mexico. Next came the West Coast Chapters, District VI. District IV continues its growth trend. Covering the South from Texas to Kentucky to Florida, these Chapters ranked third in average membership. District II, where Chapters surround Phi Psi's birth place in western Pennsylvania, posted the fifth highest average and was followed by the East Coast Chapters of District I. The average chapter size of 64 is considered quite strong in the interfraternity world.



Staff Appointments

Gary's duties officially ended with his resignation on December 6, 1989. A search committee, chaired by President J. Robert Meserve, *Stanford '34*, is in the process of securing a replacement. Dud served Phi Kappa Psi for 31 years, 23 as Executive Director, before retiring in 1979.

Originally, called "Field Secretaries" and not too long ago "Chapter Consultants," this band of dedicated Brothers is valuable by any name, and their current title more accurately reflects their role as educational adjuncts to the college experience. 

We appreciate so much the hard work put in by Michael, Victor and Rick, who will likewise be missed.

With these four enthusiastic riders of the red and green highway, the Fraternity is fully prepared to service well the 94 Chapters and 7 Colonies this upcoming academic year and to add additional Colonies as opportunities arise.

In the last Annual Report issue of The Shield, the Endowment Fund advertised for a Director of Development, a position new to Head-quarters operations. Kent H. Buell, *Northwestern '54*, reported to Heritage Hall on October 25, 1989, bringing with him over 20 years of professional fund raising experience. Serving as the Endowment Fund's Chief Operating Officer, Kent will be developing and implementing a major capital campaign, as well as administering the scholarship and awards program.

On June 1, 1990, Terrence G. Harper, Oklahoma State '85, begins his second year as the Fraternity's Director of Chapter Services and Risk Management, a position created in 1987 in direct response to

student requests for additional in-office Chapter services and requests from House Corporations to assist in the complex challenge of risk management as Chapter advisory support groups. Terry's employ with the Fraternity began on November 1, 1986, as an Educational Leadership Consultant. He then served from March 15, 1988, until May 31, 1989, as the Director of Publications.

John M. Mead, *Tennessee* '87, also begins his second year in his Heritage Hall post, succeeding Brother Harper as Director of Publications. John's primary responsibility is publishing *The Shield*, now made easier with the addition of desktop publishing. In addition to the quarterly magazine, John is also coordinating the publication of the 13th edition of the Grand Catalogue, as well as reviewing and revising other Phi Psi publications as necessary.

We would be remiss if we did not acknowledge the valuable contributions of the Headquarters staff, the people behind the scenes who keep the office running like a well-oiled machine. They are: Jean Nye, Office Manager; Shirley Toney, Bookkeeper; Jackie Fitzgerald, Systems Manager; Ellen King, Membership Secretary; Joy Bump, Data Entry Specialist; Mary Ellen Agee, Receptionist; Edward Hale, Dedicated Live-in Housekeeper; Susan Moriarty, Computer Programmer (part-time); and Chris Pugh, Endowment Fund Secretary.

Chapter Visits

During the 1989-1990 academic year, the Fraternity's Educational Leadership Consultants conducted 143 visits to Chapters and Colonies, ranging in length from three to four days on most campuses, to a total of almost four weeks at three locations where the Fraternity reorganized a Chapter and started two Colonies. In the academic year upcoming, plans are to spend considerable Consultant time reorganizing at least two Chapters where Phi Psi has been dormant for the last few years and visiting a number of other Chapters and Colonies more than one time.

The past academic year found Headquarters staff, including the Educational Leadership Consultants, making a total of 16 expansion prospecting visits on campuses with varying degrees of potential for Phi Psi growth. Three such visits resulted in recognition of Colonies at the University of California at Irvine, officially designated the California Kappa Colony; Louisiana Gamma at Loyola University in

New Orleans; and the Rochester Institute of Technology, host to New York Theta.

Meetings

In the year under review, March 1, 1989, through February 28, 1990, the most significant meeting occurred with the convening of the Woodrow Wilson Leadership School and District Councils, August 3-6, at the Hyatt Regency in Indianapolis. The WWLS/DC brought almost 300 undergraduates and alumni from across the nation together at one site for a learning experience second to none. (Please see the Fall 1989 issue of The Shield, pages 188-189, for more details.)

The Executive Council, composed of the four alumni Executive Board members and six undergraduate Archons, serves as the chief governing body of the Fraternity between meetings of the Grand Arch Council. The Executive Council had three meetings this report year, with one coincident with the Woodrow Wilson Leadership School on August 3, at the Hyatt Regency in Indianapolis. The other two meetings were also held in Indianapolis, at Heritage Hall, on April 1, 1989, and November 5, 1989. After this report year, on May 19, 1990, the Executive Council conducted a meeting at Heritage Hall in Indianapolis. Minutes of any Executive meeting are available to any Phi Psi, through the Fraternity Headquarters, at a cost of \$5.00 to help defray photocopying and postage expenses.

Sixty-Fifth Grand Arch Council

The most important and exciting meeting for Phi Kappa Psi in the current year will be the sixty-fifth convening of the Grand Arch Council, August 5-9, at the magnificent and historic Grand Hotel on Mackinac Island in Michigan. All undergraduate members, pledges, alumni, Colony members and Phi Psi ladies and guests are cordially invited to attend.

As detailed in the Spring 1990 issue of The Shield, pages 52-55, Phi Psis and friends of the Fraternity are guaranteed a wonderful experience at the GAC. 

The Founding of West Virginia Alpha

By Enoch H. Vickers, West Virginia 1890 Edited by David L. Woodrum, West Virginia '61

Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity has over 100 Chapters and colonies today with over 50,000 lining members. In today's fast-paced life, we often forget our abridged version of a talk given by Enoch Howard Vickers, West Virginia Alpha 1890, a Charter Member, on the events leading up to the founding of the Chapter On May 23, 1890. The talk was presented to the Chapter in March 1943. This is presented as a reminder of those ideals upon which Phi Kappa Psi was established and in salute to West Virginia Alpha's centennial.

hen West Virginia Alpha was established, the National Fraternity had existed 38 years. To me, that looked ancient and long ago. I thought I was joining something that had aged with its traditions, and in fact that was rather characteristic of the country as a whole.

There were two literary societies to which both the upperclassmen and the preparatory students were eligible. The literary society was really a very important feature of the students' life at the time — that is, of those who were serious. The societies met every Friday night and fought with each other to secure new members and for prestige. That rivalry was very much intensified by competition for prizes offered by the Board of Regents to encourage their work.

The literary society was something like a fraternity in its rushing season in the autumn or when the terms opened and brought new students. Both had an aggressive spirit in getting new students to join. The societies performed very valuable functions, they observed strictly all the rules of deliberative assembly. They tried to do it just as it was done in Congress, and those who took a serious interest learned the rules of procedure as a very valuable lesson. They had, every Friday evening, a recitation, essay, oration and debate; and on debate there were usually four - two affirmative and two negative. Once at least each year and sometimes twice a year each of the literary societies would have an open meeting. They would have a special program. They would get out their best representatives and expect them to get up a particularly good show, and then the others would invite their lady friends; so they would have a special meeting, and a good time in that way.

Such were the conditions of life, and such the routine in the Columbian Literary Society when I came here in 1887. I joined the Columbian Literary Society in the autumn on 1887, and in 1889 in November they held elections in the literary societies for the officers who were to take office a month later.

A very heated contest for the office of president occurred. It had been a tradition - rather a custom — that the president was always a senior — it was sort of an honor handed out to those who had successfully come through to the senior year; and three only could have the honor. In this particular year there was an effort to break down that custom. There were several upperclassmen who conceived the idea of getting power into their hands. But whether it was the desire to have the presidency before becoming a senior, or a desire for power, they had worked up a scheme and had a candidate who was not a senior and were pushing him and electioneering as early as the beginning of October. Some members came to me and told me about this scheme to elect a junior and break away from the custom. There was nothing else to do but for the upperclassmen to defeat it.

Later, it developed that society members wanted me to be a candidate for president — I was a senior. They wanted me, because I had won for the Columbian Society in the preceding June the Regents' prize for essay in competition against the Parthenon Literary Society in the annual prize competition.

They thought they could elect me because of what I had done for the society. There were members who would recognize that and would support me for president. The night of the election came and there are some things that are very important in order to understand this.

Of course, each society had its constitution and bylaws. The Columbian Society had as one of its provisions that no members may vote by ballot — all voting at elections had to be by voice — unless he had been at the time member in good standing in the society for at least two weeks prior to the election. Under these conditions we faced this situation. The opposing side had been very assiduously bringing in "preps" who had not been interesting in joining the literary society. They beat the bushes for members and brought them in

— but after the two weeks limit had passed. In other words, there were quite a number of these members who had not been members for two weeks, and consequently had no right to vote at the election by ballot. Now the men on our side realized that by that means the opponents had enough to get a majority on a voice vote, but we thought we were protected by the constitutional provisions that prevented them from voting by ballot. So when the election began, the trouble came.

When the name of the first unqualified voter on the list was called, one of our side challenged the vote. The president asked that the grounds of the challenge be stated. It was stated that this man had been a member for one week and was not entitled to vote. Then the other side appealed from the "decision of the chair." Well, an appeal from the "decision of the chair" is decided by voice vote, and so, if it came to a voice vote, they could override the decision. They could vote sustaining the appeal, and they would give this man a right to vote in contravention of the printed bylaw. We had foreseen that. So the president stated that he had not made the decision, but merely enforced the specific rule, and it would not be put to an appeal. A very hot and prolonged discussion followed. It seemed that the opposition had foreseen just such a situation, had been to the president of the University and told him there was going to be trouble and had induced him to be within call of his office. Since the chairman would not put the appeal from his ruling to vote, the opposing leader said, "I appeal to a higher power — the President of the University — outside the door."

The president of the University was ushered in. When the situation was explained, he said you had to put the appeal from the decision. Our opponents demanded that the president of the University take the Chair. We insisted that we had an official chairman. The president of the University took the chair. He did, and then the election began all over.

We got to the name of the unqualified voter again, and one of our men challenged the vote and was asked to state his grounds. The challenger cited the governing bylaw and handed it to the president of the University, who decided that this man had no right to vote. They appealed from the president's decision. The president was flabbergasted

that, having committed himself, he had to place the appeal to a vote. Having done so, they out-voted us. And so his vote was cast.

Straightway, I began to write my resignation. Of course, we were defeated and we knew it. There were a number of others who had no right to vote, but whom we had to let vote. When the election was over and they applauded and exulted in their triumph, I rose, asked a question of privilege. I stated that I had been a member of the society and tried to perform all the duties that were mine, but that I could not do so any more, and that I, therefore, wanted to resign. In the meantime there followed a whole series of resignations from our side to the secretary, and the opponents saw then what it meant.

The greater part of the upperclassmen went with me, because they felt as I did. We went straight from there to the old Commercial Hotel. On November 30, 1889, we had a meeting there. We decided that we, too, wanted to have the benefit of a society and decided to organize a literary society of our own. We organized the Athenian Literary Society of West Virginia University. I was elected president after all. I offered a motion (because we were all upperclassmen, I thought it would be a hopeless effort to try to maintain a literary society) which I quote:

"That it be the sense of this society that it be transformed into a fraternity as soon as necessary steps can be taken to accomplish this end."

The motion was adopted.

The meeting of this society on January 25 took important action. We of course had our meetings every week. But on January 25, 1890, the society, as it then was, after a long discussion, decided to establish a fraternity, Phi Kappa Psi preferably, and a committee was appointed to apply for a charter to establish a chapter at West Virginia University. I must say that the decision about Phi Kappa Psi was important. Of course, there always are certain things that seem to me just "happens," and sometimes we think they were foreordained. It so happened that I one had a teacher over at normal school from Carlisle who had been a member of the Chapter at Dickinson College. I admired him greatly. I had as a most intimate friend Willie Berkeley, whose father was professor of ancient languages. Professor Berkeley had two sons - Robert and Willie - who were members of Phi Kappa Psi at the University of Virginia. They had graduated here, but their father was a University of Virginia graduate, and they went there for graduate

study. I admired Willie very much. He was one of the finest fellows - a dignified and cultured man of superior intellect and manners, who later achieved quite enviable distinction in the profession of medicine in New York. Ernest M. Stires, Archon of this District of Phi Kappa Psi, was then a student at the Episcopal Theological Seminary in Alexandria, Virginia. He also was an intimate friend of Willie Berkeley, Rev. Buchanan was the pastor of the Presbyterian Church here at the time, and Dr. Turner, president of the University, was also a Presbyterian. Dr. Buchanan was a member of the "Mother" Chapter in Washington, Pennsylvania; and when he found this out, he was determined that we should apply for a charter of Phi Kappa Psi, and he just "Took off his coat and rolled up his sleeves." Because of my admiration for these men - men of the type I know as Phi

Kappa Psis — being al-around men and gentlemen — I wanted more than anything that if I joined a fraternity, I should be a member of their fraternity. There was some difficulty. We were told that Phi Kappa Psi had been rather unfortunate in its earlier establishment of one or two chapters rather hastily and had had to withdraw a few charters, and that a formal resolution had been adopted in the Grand Arch Council that they would follow a very conservative policy in the future. Well, West Virginia University was only 23 years old at the time. So that was a difficult hurdle.

There was another difficulty more immediate. A few years earlier, there was a fraternity on the campus, but it was evidently made up of the wrong kind of people. They got on a drunk and did disreputable things generally, and that did not go. The faculty then made them surrender their charter and passed a resolution that there should be no fraternities established on this campus. Mr. Stires, the Archon from District III, first came here to investigate us, and he ran across the same thing — the difficulty about establishing a fraternity here. He told

us that nothing could be done until he saw the president of the University. They would not think of establishing a chapter unless they had permission and cooperation of the university administration. When he went to President Turner and told him his mission. President Turner told him about this resolution. But he very promptly told Mr. Stires that if any fraternity were established here, he certainly could not get a better group of young men whose names were on the list of applicants for the charter. That was all achieved by the aid of Rev. Buchanan and of Mr. Stires. He and Mr. Buchanan made their part of arrangements for the formal establishment of the chapter. On the night of May 23, 1890, they initiated the charter members of West Virginia Alpha of Phi Kappa Psi in rooms on the third floor of the old Commercial Hotel.

On May 24, by request of Mr. Stires, we had another meeting in which he read stimulating and suggestive letters from George Smart, then secretary of the national Fraternity. I may say that we had received a number of letters besides Smart's from some of the Chapters. Stires read Smart's letter and then gave one of the most inspiring talks I have ever heard. I remember it until this day; and as I have told you, I cannot describe the man any better, but he had a most beautiful diction as well as attractive personal appearance and bright mind; and I always thought of him as the typical Phi Kappa Psi. You already know that the typical Phi Kappa Psi is an allaround man. First he is a gentleman. He is an honorable man. A gentleman is a man of honor. He is a man of integrity; a man wedded to truth. And truth is the eternal thing. Somehow or other he made me see all that and much more in the inspiring talk he gave us; not merely of the history of Phi Kappa Psi, of its hard struggles in the still earlier and harder days that preceded the Civil War. War was already casting dark shadows over the land when the national Fraternity came into being. There is something in common with West Virginia Alpha's birth and the birth of the national Fraternity itself. As you see, it was born out of turbulence and conflict. But for that discord in the Columbian Society, it is certain that it would not at that time have become a fraternity — the first to survive at West Virginia University.

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
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Humboldt school district and trustee of Allen County Hospital.

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

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

A House Divided...

Note: As attitudes toward fraternities change, so do the challenges that face them. Among these challenges is the maintenance of Chapter houses that are showing the signs of years of wear and tear. It is hoped that by describing the housing situation faced by Pennsylvania Gamma, House Corporations in similar situations will be more informed on all the available options.

he Executive Council of Phi Kappa Psi and the Pennsylvania Gamma House Corporation at Bucknell University are at loggerheads. The point of contention is the proposed sale of the Chapter house to Bucknell.

Under a proposed agreement, the House Corporation will transfer title of the house and land and an adjacent lot to the University for a cash payment that is roughly 4 percent of the house's replacement value. In exchange, the University will excuse the \$18,000 remaining mortgage owed to it, will perform most necessary renovations and will provide up to \$15,000 to the House Corporation for kitchen renovation. Under this

agreement, the University will operate the house as a residence hall, renting the rooms to the Chapter members on an individual basis. This agreement is similar to those concerning housing for the Bucknell chapters of Kappa Sigma, Sigma Alpha Epsilon and Sigma Alpha Mu fraternities.

Although the renovation of the house is essential to moving Phi Psis back in, certain stipulations in the proposal are not believed to be in the best interests of the Chapter. Primarily, Bucknell is permitted at any time to declare that the house is no longer to be used as a residence hall and could, thereby, evict all the members on four months' notice and never again make the house available to the Chapter. Nor does the proposal include a guaranteed option to renew after the initial 10-year term. In a strict interpretation, the proposed lease is for 10 years at best, four months at the worst. Also, the agreement would require the Chapter to reserve and rent the living room for official functions and would allow other organizations to do so as well.

Managing a Chapter house is an enormous task for alumni volunteers, but it is a vitally important one. By entering this agreement, the House Corporation would end its role in the day-to-day management of Chapter property. In remembering their college years, many alumni see the Chapter house as the heart of the Chapter that links the generations of Phi Psis together. To discharge the house is to dismiss the proud tradition of Penn Gamma fostered by such members as Warren S. "Speed" Reed, Bucknell '23, long-time Chapter Advisor, stalwart member of the House Corporation and Trustee of the Permanent Fund. Speed Reed and others raised the money to build this house in 1930 from alumni contributions and from the sale

of the previous house. Through the years, the replacement value of this property has appreciated from its original cost of \$65,000 to a level in the neighborhood of \$1 million. And now the House Corporation proposes, in essence, to give it to the University and reserve no guaranteed right to continued use.

Representatives from the headquarters of Kappa Sigma, Sigma Alpha Epsilon and Sigma Alpha Mu report no problems under their agreements with Bucknell at the present. But current conditions do not rule out changes in attitude in the future. Just this past year, the University trustees voted against abolishing the Greek system, despite a recommendation to do so by the faculty. On May 1, the University president released his plan for changes in residential life, which the trustees supported unanimously. Among

the proposed changes are deferring eligiblity to participate in rush until the sophomore year; raising the scholastic requirements to participate in rush from 2.0 to 2.5 on a 4.0 scale; and implementing a system whereby each student who wants to belong to a fraternity or sorority will have a place in the system. In an editorial in the May 14 issue of *The Bucknellian*, the University's student newspaper, the associate vice president for student life described the Greek system as playing a "continued but muted role" under this plan.

In the past, property transfer agreements that did not include explicit renewal options have caused housing turnover with Phi Psi Chapters at Dickinson College, Stanford University and Franklin & Marshall College, among others. In an article in *The Buck*-

"P.S.—Don't Sell the House"

n August 1989, the Fraternity Headquarters mailed a survey to all Penn Gamma alumni — approximately 921 members — asking if they supported selling the Chapter house to Bucknell and if they were interested in serving on a restructured House Corporation. Nearly 25 percent responded to the questionnaire, and the results speak for themselves.

Fully 97 percent of the Penn Gammans responding prefer to have a Phi Psi house corporation managing the Chapter house; only 3 percent supported Bucknell gaining control of the property. Ninety-six percent believed that if Bucknell were to end up owning the property, the agreement should include an exclusive use covenant, guaranteeing Penn Gamma's future use of the building. Furthermore, 29 percent — 51 members of the 180 who responded at the time the results were compiled — expressed willingness to serve on a new House Corporation in various capacities. Also, 77 percent expressed willingness to assist in a full renovation of the Chapter house by contributing money, guidance and other means.

Some of the respondents' comments included:

"Don't sell it! It is a key location; emotion and history are not for sale."

"It would be the demise of Phi Psi at Bucknell if the property were transferred to the University."

"My Phi Psi experience at Bucknell was one of the most rewarding in my life. The house has too many good memories to let it leave the family." "A strong controlling organization can put this house back on its feet. Let's do it!!"

"I have a very personal reason for wanting to see the house in the hands of a capable corporation. I stayed in Lewisburg during the summer of 1930 and worked with the contractor in building the Chapter house, and for the first semester of 1931 it was my home."

"I am very disappointed in the poor communication from the House Corporation and/or that of the Penn Gamma Chapter. I am very willing to help however I may to save the house from University ownership/control."

"Phi Psi at Bucknell has a great history with the exception of the last few years. What we need to save the Chapter is a solid plan to rejuvenate the Chapter coupled with an aggressive fund raising campaign."

"Let's pay off the mortgage, take a short term equity loan for repairs and solicit contributions to retire the equity. To give away a valuable piece of property as the Chapter house is ridiculous."

"The tradition of Phi Psi at Bucknell should not cease to exist. Phi Kappa Psi is of too much value as well as being too much a part of Bucknell University history for it to be simply disbanded."

"I gained a great deal from my fraternity experience and have friends and memories, which I wouldn't trade for anything. I prefer for the National Fraternity to assume control and ownership and perhaps bring ole Penn Gamma back. If that is not to be, I'd give the building and the land to the

university on the condition that it be used only by male students in a fraternity concept at least, i.e. where the students, not the university select who lives there and run the place with reasonable autonomy."

"The house is in a prime campus location and should only be sold to the University as a last resort."

"One of the first steps to take, I believe, is to retire the \$18,000 mortgage. I would be willing to provide \$1,000 toward this goal — I expect you might find 17 other Brothers to contribute a like amount."

"If Penn Gamma alumni want the rich tradition of their house to continue, they should want to directly control its destiny by organizing a housing corporation in concert with guidance from the Fraternity Headquarters."

"I think every effort should be made to keep Phi Psi ownership of the house. The university will not continue the character of the Fraternity."

"I feel strongly that ownership of the house should remain with the Fraternity. Most Brothers who remember the good years of the fifties will agree. The house and the Fraternity have very special memories and have contributed greatly to many."

"I can understand the problems that exist, but I feel it is imperative that we, as Phi Psis, should have the opportunity to correct them. Please, let's keep the Chapter house in the hands of those who deserve it — the Penn Gamma Brothers."

The respondents to this survey represent each decade of initiates from the 1930s to the 1980s.

Penn Gamma History

Pennsylvania Gamma was founded on the Bucknell campus on June 26, 1855, and was the first Greek-letter fraternity to place a Chapter there. In the years since its founding, undergraduate members of Penn Gamma have assumed many important roles of leadership on the campus.

Penn Gamma has also excelled in contributing its Brothers to the service of the Fraternity. Robert Lowry, *Bucknell 1856*, was the second national president of Phi Psi, serving from 1888-1890. Additionally, three other Penn Gammans have served as SWGP during Grand Arch Councils prior to adoption of our Constitution in 1886: Andrew A. Leiser, *Bucknell 1866*, during the 1876 GAC; Joseph K. Bogert, *Bucknell 1866*, during the 1878 GAC; and Martin Bell, *Bucknell 1866*, during the 1883 GAC.

Phi Psi's Bucknell Chapter claims eight Archons throughout its long history, three heading up District I and five for District II. Additionally, William C. Gretzinger, Bucknell 1884, served as editor of The Shield from 1896-1898, and Warren S. "Speed" Reed, *Bucknell'23*, was a Trustee of the Permanent Fund from 1968-1970.

In the mid-1980s, a lax attitude took over the Chapter, and the resulting behavior of a majority of the members was incongruent with Fraternity ideals. A concerted effort by local alumni and the Headquarters staff failed to produce positive results in the 1987-88 academic year. In 1988, two Educational Leadership Consultants, working with the alumni, recruited a new pledge class and alumni advisors, but the University stepped in and imposed a two-year suspension with August 31, 1990, being the first possible date for reorganization.

In the spring of 1990, two groups of students at Bucknell contacted the Fraternity Headquarters expressing interest in becoming a part of the new Pennsylvania Gamma Chapter. Under the current conditions, however, the University administration itself has decided to delay Phi Psi's return Bucknell.

nellian published this past spring, an administration official said the University planned to make the house a co-educational residence but would probably retain it as an all-male facility if Phi Psi moved back in. According to the article, another proposed use for the property being contemplated by the University included relocating the Craft Shop in the house,

The structure itself is in need of renovation. During the mid-'80s, the Chapter membership and House Corporation neglected the up-keep of the house. In 1988, the University suspended the Chapter from all activities for two years for disciplinary reasons, and the undergraduates were evicted from the house (See Penn Gamma History in box on this page). The current House Corporation now estimates the cost of renovation to be around \$350,000. The House Corporation has dismissed alternatives such as a capital campaign coupled with a home improvement loan in favor of University ownership. Such action is a gamble on a campus where the climate concerning the continued role of the Greek system is so uncertain.

Unable to convince the House Corporation to pursue other options more fully, to negotiate a contract more favorable to the Chapter or to step aside and allow a new board to take over, the Executive Council decided to support a member of Penn Gamma in a lawsuit seeking to dissolve the House Corporation. Under Pennsylvania law, a corporation charged with failing to pursue its objectives must show cause to avoid being dissolved. The Executive Council reasons that in attempting to give the house away with no hard guarantee of future use, the House Corporation would relinquish its charge of holding property for the Chapter and of promoting the Chapter's best interests. The decision in this suit, which went to trial June 18, 1990, is pending.

If the suit is decided in favor of the Penn Gamman petitioning for dissolution, the existing Corporation will be disbanded, and the Fraternity will hold its assets, including the house, in trust for the Chapter. The Fraternity, however, is not in the business of owning and managing Chapter houses — that is the responsibility of an alumni House Corporation. The Headquarters staff will immediately recruit a new Corporation board to resume management of the Chapter house. In fact, over 50 Penn Gamma alumni have already expressed an interest in serving on a new Board.

As for now, the status of Penn Gamma itself is now brought into question. Terms of the University suspension would have allowed reorganization this fall at the earliest, but the stalemate over the disposition of the house delays the effort. The University has declared its neutrality in this dispute officially, still two House Corporation Board members are University trustees and a third is an administrator in the office of residential life. Also, the Bucknell University president recently notified the Fraternity Headquarters that Phi Psi will not be allowed to reorganize until the academic year 1991-92. Citing the dispute between the Executive Council and the House Corporation as reason for the delay, he also stated that the current academic year would be one of change in the social/residential system and that it might create some uncertainties with regard to the details of the operation of the Greek System.Both the Executive Council and the Penn Gamma House Corporation Board agree - it is unfortunate that this situation has progressed beyond the realm of friendly negotiation and has been left to the judgment of the courts. The alternatives cited by the

Allowing university ownership of Chapter property is a gamble on a campus where the climate concerning the continued role of the Greek system is uncertain. Penn Gamma House Corporation, however, are not necessarily the limited options they claim. As explained more fully in the following article, Chapter Capital Campaigns, the Endowment Fund is both willing and able to assist in planning a capital campaign to raise the necessary funds. Also, the Executive Council is not inherently opposed to selling the house to Bucknell; its main concern is that the property is not transferred for a fraction of its value with no solid assurance of continued Phi Psi occupancy.

Editor's Note: On August 24, 1990, the judge in the suit to dissolve the Penn Gamma House Corporation handed down his decision. The Court dismissed the petition for dissolution but said that Pennsylvania law requires a vote of the Chapter membership before the house can be sold.

Chapter Capital Campaigns

The Path to Successful Fund Raising

Since I joined the staff of the Endowment Fund, the questions most often asked by alumni have been regarding raising money for the renovation, improvements or new construction for Chapter houses. To address this critical issue, The Endowment Fund sponsored a workshop at the 1990 Grand Arch Council. I called on the best resource I could by asking Dr. Ralph Silverio from the consulting firm of Sumner Rahr & Company to conduct the workshop. Sumner Rahr has worked for many years in developing and implementing successful capital campaigns for fraternities and sororities. The workshop was only a summary of the planning and principles necessary to raise these funds. The following are the materials prepared for the workshop and my comments.

Five Essential Elements for Fund Raising

1. The case for the Chapter must be relevant to those who identify with the Chapter and contain reasonable justification for support.

In fund raising terms "the case" is the emotional and factual statement of the campaign. It contains the mission of the group, short and long term goals, a statement as to what will be accomplished as a result of successfully raising the funds and what will be the result if the campaign is not undertaken

2. The Chapter must communicate its profile; a high degree of understanding and acceptance of the project (fund raising objectives) must exist throughout the constituency.

To raise funds successfully — whether it be \$50,000, \$500,000 or \$5,000,000, the communications must be done in person, with forethought and planning. Letters, a phone call or a single visit will not raise large amounts of money. Communication of the campaign case statement must be a series of information meetings, visits and finally asking for a financial commitment from the Brother.

3. The campaign organization must be made up of a sufficient number of well informed, well trained, interested and influen-

tial leaders who are willing to work and to give.

The building of a campaign organization is a spiraling process starting with the nucleus of the House Corporation and then reaching out to major prospects and Brothers who have been active in the past and/or who have kept in contact with their contemporaries, as well as Brothers who will be helpful to the completion of the project. The spiral progression involves initial contact, generating interest, involvement, emotional commitment, financial commitment and then working for the campaign.

4. The needed monies must be available within the logical constituency of the organization (alumni) and must be obtainable. The campaign must be timed not to conflict with other major fund raising projects involving the volunteer leadership or toward the same constituency in a campaign for the host college or university.

The Brothers initiated at your Chapter are the logical group to support the capital campaign, but do not overlook Brothers in your area who were initiated elsewhere. All of your Chapter's alumni need to be reviewed, looking at giving histories and talking with people who know them to determine an appropriate level of gift potential. The logical contact person also needs to be determined and a series of contacts planned.

5. Sufficient support systems must be in place to staff and fund a capital campaign.

To succeed, a major fund raising campaign needs at least one individual who is responsible for keeping records, coordinating prospect calls, setting meeting dates and keeping others on schedule and on task.

Ten Common Misconceptions About Chapter Fund Raising

1. A majority of the alumni body will participate financially in the capital campaign.

In every campaign of any size, 10 percent of the donors will contribute 80 to 90 percent of the funds. With an alumni base of 1000 and a \$500,000 goal, 100 individuals will donate a minimum of \$400,000 to the campaign.

2. The alumni body will easily be sold on the need for the capital campaign and will understand that the Chapter is deserving of their support.

With today's competition for contributions, the fact that the prospect was once an undergraduate at the Chapter is not enough incentive for a gift to the campaign. The prospect must be convinced that his funds will be used for a worthy and necessary purpose.

3. The undergraduates will have a major role in raising funds for the Chapter.

The undergraduates must be a part of the campaign and can be very helpful on visits or hosting prospect visits to the Chapter. Major fund raising campaigns, however, take two to three years to complete and regardless of how motivated the undergraduates may be, their primary responsibility is to get an education.

4. The financial goal of the capital campaign is the primary objective of the Chapter campaign organization.

The financial goal is the means to accomplish a goal and objectives. The goals of a campaign are safe housing, a pleasant living environment, spaces to promote educational excellence, a house to enhance the sense of Brotherhood, etc.

5. All alumni must be aware of the capital campaign at the same time.

A campaign will flow in a sequence. Identify the 10 percent who will donate the 90 percent of the funds, and concentrate all efforts on them with personal calls. Then look at the next level of gift potential, roughly the next 10 percent of the alumni base, and solicit the remaining alumni only when 95 percent of the funds have been pledged. Everyone should be given the opportunity to participate. If 35 to 40 percent of the alumni contribute, the campaign will be successful.

6. The mechanics of a Chapter capital campaign are radically different from the mechanics of a capital campaign for other organizations or institutions.

The only radically different campaigns are flops.

7. Big money is not available for Chapter capital campaign.

With 10 percent of the donors contributing 80-90 percent of the funds, look for the large donor prospects first. With a compelling case statement, the appropriate cultivation and involvement and the right person(s) asking, the large gift is attainable.

8. The campaign goal will be reached without solicitation of major gifts.

There is lateral thinking, and there is vertical thinking - this is backwards thinking. I have all too often heard "If everyone just gave \$100, we would reach our goal." That type of giving never has and never will happen. Go look for the big gift! The effort needed to get a \$5,000 gift will be the same effort necessary to get a \$100,000 gift, so go for the \$100,000.

9. It is not necessary to ask an individual for a specific amount of money.

People who are capable of giving significant gifts want and expect you to indicate what you are expecting of them. No fund raiser has ever been shot for asking for a large gift or for asking the donor to raise his sights.

10. The capital campaign will only take a short period of time and will not involve a lot of volunteer effort.

Plan on a minimum of two years for a major effort and longer if there has not been communication with the alumni of the Chapter for a long time.

Short term, crash campaign efforts usually crash. Plan well in advance and stick to the plan.

The Unique Strengths of Chapter Fund Raising

- 1. The ability to network the alumni body.
- 2. Prospects, the entire alumni body, share a common experience and background.

In most campaigns the contacts are peer to peer, within fraternity campaign younger Brothers can approach older Brothers with success because of the common bond of Phi Psi.

3. The ability to solicit Brother to Brother, friend to friend.

The Weaknesses of Chapter Fund Raising

- 1. Lack of knowledge on the part of the alumni body as to the needs of the Chapter house and the Chapter itself.
- 2. Separation of alumni by distance.
- 3. Alumni fallen away from the fraternity mind set.
- 4. Alumni turned off to the Chapter and/or the Fraternity.
- 5. Alumni siding with the college/university in dispute over the fraternity concept on campus.

Common Reasons Why Alumni Pledge to Capital Campaigns

- 1. MEMORIES AND FRIENDS.
- 2. Because of the person asking.
- 3. Because of the identified need.
- 4. Out of a sense of urgency.

- 5. Out of a sense of obligation.
- Because the needs of the Chapter are linked to the overall needs of the college or university.
- 7. Because of the current strength of the Chapter. This is not a high motivator, although it is a plus.

The Four "C"s

During the workshop, Dr. Silverio commented of the four C's — CREDIBILITY,

CONTINUITY, COMMUNICATION, and CULTIVATION — of a Chapter Capital Campaign which are necessary. Since this is important, I will comment on each.

Credibility

In order to attract funds, the donor must consider the organization, which usually is the House Corporation, to have credibility. Too many of our House Corporations are small organizations. I recently heard of a House Corporation which had dwindled to

A House Corporation Capital Campaign Outline

I. Organization and Planning

- A. Defining the need. There must be a balance between:
- 1. Realism what is obtainable in the life of the Chapter at this point and with the proper cultivation.
- 2. Necessity what is actually needed to get the Chapter through this particular point in time.
- 3. Vision what is needed to keep the Chapter in existence over the next 50 years.

The Case for Support — to be written from an emotional as well as rational point of view. The Chapter wants to tap the emotional energy of its alumni but not undersell the carefully planned nature (credibility) of the campaign.

- B. Leadership.
- 1. Recruit a campaign task force, if necessary, that will "study" the need for the campaign and determine the campaign goal.
- 2. Invite the participation of alumni who do not normally serve on the House Corporation including one or two key alumni from outside the immediate area. The task force will eventually provide the capital campaign leadership.
 - C. Communications Plan.
- 1. Devise a serious communications plan that spans the predetermined length of the campaign and concentrates on disseminating the campaign objectives in the following priority:
 - key donors/volunteers
 - major prospects
 - general alumni
 - D. Evaluate Potential Donors.
- Establish a system of screening and rating of alumni based on their ability to give.
- 2. Plan cultivation strategies for prospects identified.
- E. Implement the necessary strategy to achieve a 501(c)3 status for the Chapter to

insure at least some tax-deductibility for donors.

II. Implementation

- A. Solicit those closest to the campaign, i.e., the campaign steering committee and other loyal volunteers first.
- B. Solicit all cultivated major gifts prospects at the same time, or immediately after, the steering committee has been solicited.
- C. Target a small group of prospects for solicitation and slowly enlarge it. Do not let the solicitation process get out of hand. (Remember, once you have raised the expectation among alumni that they will be solicited, you must follow-up with appropriate action, otherwise credibility of the campaign is placed in question.)
- D. Ask for a specific amount based on the person's ability to give. Chapter capital campaigns will only be successful when those alumni who give to the campaign give to the best of their ability.
- E. Keep the general alumni body informed about the need of the Chapter house/Chapter.
- F. Announce the campaign only when 60 percent of the funds have been raised.
- G. Use events, such as homecoming, and local area events, to stimulate interest in the capital campaign.
- H. Hire or appoint an alumnus or undergraduate to coordinate the solicitation process.

III. Follow-up

- A. Appropriately recognize everyone who has been involved with the capital campaign.
 - B. Maintain communications.
 - C. Maintain an annual giving program.
- D. Increase the number and size of the House Corporation or advisory board to maintain alumni interest.

one recent graduate. A campaign is an excellent opportunity to involve more alumni and expand the House Corporation, thereby increasing the credibility.

Continuity

An expanded House Corporation will also insure the continuity of the campaign. Continuity will also prevent a campaign from the starts and stops in the effort that will kill a campaign. Here again, planning will help insure the continuity.

Communication

Plan on the most personal communication possible and be consistent with the message. Make sure all of the volunteers are informed of the message, the timing of the campaign and how to articulate the case statement.

Cultivation

Cultivation is the process of contacting prospects and drawing them closer or re-involving them with the Chapter. Have fun with cultivation. It is a real joy to become acquainted or re-acquainted with our Chapter Brothers.

Tax-Deductible Gifts

When starting a campaign, many people worry about the aspect of the tax-deductibility of the gift. Whether a gift is tax-deductible or not is not a prime motivator for a gift. Most of us benefitted from the generosity of Brothers who had gone before us and had built the Chapter houses we lived in. It is now time for us to return to that Chapter house what we received as undergraduates. As Jerry Nelson, UCLA '48, puts it, "If a Brother is not going to give unless he gets a discount (a tax-deduction), then it probably won't be much of a gift." Look for the Brothers who are willing to give back in proportion to what they received and are capable of giving regardless of the tax consequences.

There are, however, ways to give for gifts to house corporations to receive tax-deductible gifts. At the private colleges and universities, it is possible for the gifts to be received by the host institution on a restricted basis for the use of the House Corporation capital construction. There are often strings attached to this arrangement. The House Corporation will need to review the agreements carefully.

This process is more difficult at the public institutions, but investigation is worth the effort.

Some House Corporations have been successful in obtaining a tax-deductible classification of 501(c)3 from the Internal Revenue Service. This is sometimes a lengthy process and requires the assistance of a tax lawyer.

The Endowment Fund of the Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity is a 501(c)3 public foundation and can receive tax-deductible gifts. It is restricted in how these funds are distributed. The following is the policy established by the Endowment Fund Trustees for receiving gifts restricted for Chapter use:

The Endowment fund of the Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity, Inc. is a tax exempt 501(c)3 organization and can receive gifts that are tax-deductible. The Internal Revenue Service has very strict guidelines for the use of these funds, to provide scholarships and educational programs.

The Trustees of the Endowment Fund of the Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity, Inc., have agreed to accept tax-deductible gifts designated for the library, reading rooms, study rooms and educational computer rooms with associated furniture and equipment for Chapter house construction and renovation projects of duly constituted House Corporations.

The House Corporation of the Chapter desiring to participate in the Chapter House Construction or Renovation Program needs to submit a grant request to the Endowment Fund delineating the total cost of the construction project and specific descriptions for the educational portions of the renovation and the related construction costs.

Upon establishing the total dollar amount of the renovation or new construction and the percent of the educational portion, the Endowment Fund would receive gifts and allow a tax-deductible contribution to the donor for the educational percentage of the gift. The balance of the gift would not be tax-deducible for the donor. The disallowed portion of the gift would be returned to the House Corporation for the renovation or construction, which is not considered educational in nature.

For the portion of the renovation or construction deemed to be educational in nature the Endowment Fund would make an outright grant to the House Corporation from the funds raised.

For example, a renovation project with a total cost of \$200,000 with \$100,000 being library, computer and educationally related, a gift of \$10,000 would allow \$5,000 as tax-deductible and \$5,000 as not tax-deductible. The Endowment Fund would transfer to the House Corporation the non-tax-deduct-

ible \$5000 and make a grant of the tax-deductible \$5,000 portion.

The Endowment Fund charges a 5 percent service fee on the funds raised and an annual management fee of 10 percent on the income for funds held in trust.

Rhode Island Beta Prepares for Return

The Chapter charter at Rhode Island Beta at the University of Rhode Island was suspended in December of 1988 for behavioral problems in violation of Fraternity policy. The House Corporation there faced a situation similar to that of Penn Gamma — a house in need of repairs and no Chapter members living in the house to generate income.

In this case, however, the alumni banded together and refused to give in. They were set on one purpose — keeping the Chapter house "in the family."

Toward this goal, the House Corporation secured a loan from a local bank to perform all necessary repairs to the structure. After securing the necessary funds, they proceeded to return the house to its original condition. Subsequently, they re-opened the facility through an agreement with the University to supply overflow housing to students, satisfying their immediate fiscal demands and keeping up good relations with the University. Now, the House Corporation proudly boasts a full house that is also fully re-furnished.

The re-organization effort for Rhode Island Beta began in September. The Headquarters staff worked hand-in-hand with area alumni to recruit a new generation of Phi Psis, thereby guaranteeing Phi Kappa Psi's continued presence at the University of Rhode Island.

Dyslexia: The Hidden Disability

Note: Despite being tested for primary dyslexia since he was in the third grade, Brad was not diagnosed as having secondary dyslexia until 1989. Now a senior at Arizona State, Brad continues to take a battery tests before he enters a special learning program.

t is always frustrating when a pledge does not get initiated because of poor grades — especially when he seems to excel in every other aspect of the Fraternity Education program. Mostly, poor grades are attributed to a lack of trying or pursuing various collegiate endeavors other than one's studies.

But what about that unknown percentage of pledges, or Brothers for that matter, who do try and still can't seem to make the grade? Look at the number of Brothers in your Chapter whose GPA clearly does not represent their level of intelligence and the effort they put into their studies. An unusual gap between academic potential and academic performance could suggest a learning disability, possibly a form of dyslexia.

The severity of dyslexia can vary. Most of us are familiar with "Primary Dyslexia," where the eyes read letters backwards, nearly rendering a person illiterate. Yet it is the more subtle form of dyslexia of which most of us are unaware. This subtler form is called "Secondary Dyslexia," and some sources say it is common among 25 percent of the male population.

Normally, the information that goes into the brain from the eyes is supposed to go to either the right or left hemisphere. With people suffering from secondary dyslexia, bits and pieces of information go to both halves; the brain does not know where to send the information. This results in the incapacity to return the information, plus a variety of other problems. MacDonald Critchley, author of Dyslexia Defined, explains that people with secondary dyslexia can exhibit signs of clumsiness, poor coordination and speech problems. By impeding the organization of information in the brain, test questions may not seem fair or may make no sense at all. Even though the person thoroughly studies the material, the final grade does not reflect it.

Gone untreated, people learn to live with their disability or, out of frustration, abandon the desire to learn. It is very possible that there are Brothers who don't know they are dyslexic. This can be very unfortunate. Not knowing why you can't give back the information learned in class leads to frustration. In the case of freshmen, the difficult transition from home to college and the new experience of being a pledge, not to mention a heavy class load, are reasons for failure to earn high marks — at least that is what parents and Big Brothers hear. If there is a learning disability, it ends up going undiscovered, and the grades don't improve.

The gene for dyslexia affects males more frequently than females, and it can skip generations. On the average, one in three children of dyslexic fathers will develop dyslexia. Here are a few symptoms as described by Critchley and T.R. Miles and Dorothy Gilroy, authors of *Dyslexia at College* (keep in mind that any of these symptoms may have appeared early on in childhood): confusing lowercase "b" and

"d;" confusing right and left or east and west; being neither left- or right-handed; having a hard time memorizing items in sequence; misreading text; performing poorly on essays and exams yet knowing you knew the material; subtracting backwards; bad handwriting; and poor spelling. The list goes on and on. Ironically, people with dyslexia find it difficult to do easy mental tasks and easy to do complex mental tasks.

Dyslexia can also be the root of social problems by creating feelings of frustration, reclusiveness and low self esteem. Many dyslexics avoid sports where keeping score is somewhat complicated. Speech problems also make it difficult to communicate.

If you think dyslexia could be the reason a pledge or Brother is in poor academic standing, discuss it with them. To learn more about dyslexia, check out any number of books on the subject. They often describe more in-depth methods of identifying the problem and ways to overcome the obstacles

dyslexia presents. If there is reason to believe dyslexia is affecting your life, follow up on it. There is no cure for this disability: it is a complicated problem with the eyes and the brain. Most schools, however, offer a variety of programs through learning centers that can help students overcome many types of disabilities. Some of the options include: group counseling; financial assistance; unique test-taking options; and personal tutors. These centers can also tell you where to go to get tested in order to qualify for special services if they do not offer the tests themselves. If your school does not have such a program, consult an optometrist who can administer an eye exam and a qualified psychiatrist who can give the IQ and standardized tests.

Dyslexia is not a crippling disease, just a condition. People who grow up with it undetected usually learn how to overcome their disability just by the way they live their lives. Organization seems to be the best remedy for dyslexic people. Gilroy and Miles suggest using everyday office supplies such as cassette recorders, in/out trays, daily planners and up-to-date files to help keep better organized.

There is also a positive side to dyslexia. Many people with this problem tend to be good at games like chess and in artistic avenues like music, arts and crafts and creative writing. They will use these other methods of communication to express themselves better.

Of course, dyslexia is not an excuse for everything. Some people really don't care about the importance of a good academic standing; others simply cannot perform on the college level with the same success they experienced in high school. The possibility of having dyslexia, however, should not go ignored. College is a time of life where we prepare ourselves for the future. It would be extremely unfortunate to struggle harder needlessly or not to have the chance to become a Phi Psi because of a condition that can be overcome.

A 1990 graduate of the University of Illinois, Wilson plans on attending law school after graduation.

The Sion Bass Smith Founders Fellowship


A 1990 graduate of Miami University, Thomas plans to return to school for an M.B.A. in the fall.

dent government. He has served California Epsilon as Corresponding Secretary, Greek Week Chairman, GAC representative, Social Chairman and Rush Chairman.





Mark Spitz seeks another Olympic moment

R on Ballatore stood on the UCLA pool deck and stared at his watch, saying nothing.

One second passed. Then three. Then five. In the water, the silence pounded in Mark Spitz's ears like waves until he could stand it no longer.

Coach, Spitz said, panting from a justcompleted broken 100-meter butterfly sprint, what was my time?

Ballatore gazed at Spitz, then back down at his watch, then back at Spitz.

Uh, Mark, that was a 52.8, he said.

Their eyes locked.

Fifty-two eight?

Yeah.

Wow.

Not bad, Ballatore said, grinning.

Not bad? The world record in the event, set by American Pablo Morales at the 1986 World Championship Trials, is 52.84. The last time Spitz swam the race in competition, at the 1972 Olympics in Munich, he set a world record of 54.27 to win one of his seven gold medals.

Spitz was 22 then. Now 40 and in the tenth month of his comeback since a 17-year layoff, Spitz, whose stated intention is to secure one of the two available spots on the 1992 U.S. Olympic team in the 100-meter butterfly, isn't threatening any records - yet.

As of August, he still hasn't christened his reborn swimming life with an official dip at a sanctioned meet, and this clocking in mid-July, was the aggregate of four 25-meter sprints separated by 10 seconds rest.

Swum without pause, Ballatore said, that works out to roughly a 00:56:00, which, he added, is right about where we want to be right now.

Spitz beamed at Ballatore's words. Last summer, shortly after he watched Wade King win the 100 butterfly national long course title with a 53.72 to runner-up Mark Henderson's 54.44, Spitz decided to give swimming another go. Shortly thereafter, he took the plunge, fully expecting every day to be like this day.

I don't think that going faster than I did in 1972 is going to be a problem, he said last October. The question, as far as I'm concerned, is not can I go faster, because I feel fairly confident that I can, but will the time I do be fast enough to make the Olympic team? Or be fast enough to win an Olympic medal? That's the challenge for me.

Then came his foray into the water and as fast as Spitz could gasp, my aching limbs, a new question supplanted the old ones: What have I gotten myself into?

But recently, there have been signs, such as the one delivered on this day, that the greatest swimmer of this era or any other is starting to look and feel like his old young self.

That swim gets me psyched up, Spitz said as he bounded out of the pool after his timed swim.

Spitz had ample reason to be psyched out when he returned to the pool to train with Ballatore, the men's swim coach at UCLA since 1978.

"The question, as far as I'm concerned, is not can I go faster, because I feel fairly confident that I can, but will the time I do be fast enough to make the Olympic team? Or be fast enough to win an Olympic medal? That's the challenge for me."

All he had to do was listen to the backwash of negative sentiments. Typical of his detractors was a former Olympic teammate of Spitz who read the story of the 1972 Olympic hero's return to the pool and thought to himself, Get real!

Then there were the Australian national team members who were quoted saying Spitz was foolish to try to recapture his youth and would be a disgrace not only to himself but to all Olympians.



Rather than grow agitated, Spitz shook off such comments as if they were drops of chlorinated water on his grey-flecked hair.

The negative comments don't bother me, he said shortly before his first practice. I don't think I have anything to lose. What's the worst that could happen? I could not make the Olympic team, right? So what?

But once he resumed training, Spitz began to think maybe he had misread the situation.

The worst thing that could happen? His comeback could bellyflop before it got off the launching board.

I was definitely lagging behind everybody in the beginning, Spitz said.

Sometimes I'd get real depressed. I'd be doing a set and I'd have recollections of how fast I used to be able to swim the set, and I'd get really discouraged because it seemed I was going so much slower.

Spitz, never known to exude false modesty when he ruled the pool in the late 1960s and early 1970s, wasn't doing so now.

You should have seen him when he first came here. He looked *bad*, Ballatore confirmed with a chuckle.

And not just in the water. When Spitz won his seven gold medals in the Munich in 1972, he was a lean and mean swimming machine, carrying 174 pounds on his 6-1 frame.

When he began swimming again, Spitz weighed in at 190. Ballatore recognized that one of Spitz's greatest weapons from his past "his strength to body-weight ratio" was being sabotaged by extra baggage. Ballatore immediately placed Spitz on a strict diet.

Spitz's spirits soared as his weight started to drop, and his workout times followed suit.

Spitz, now 17 pounds lighter, said, "I found that what I eat is really critical to how I feel in the water. I feel faster at 173."

His butterfly, Spitz said, "feels the same" as it did when he was younger. Indeed, the trademark whippet kick and jet stream pull that propelled him to Olympic gold medals in the 100- and 200-butterfly races still paints an appealing watercolor that teases the senses. Is it real, or is it Munich videotape?

"It doesn't feel the same," said Spitz, who has a ready explanation: goggles.

"I didn't use goggles before. I think they're kind of messing me up," he said.

At first, swimming messed up Spitz's daily clock. But he has since settled into a comfortable routine. From the moment his alarm sounds at 7 a.m., his day is a whirlwind of compartmentalized activity: 8 to 10—swim practice; 10:30 to 12:30—telephone time as he conducts real-estate affairs from the Bel-Air home he shares with his wife of 17 years, the former Suzy Weiner, and the couple's 8-year-old son, Matt; 12:30—

lunch and a short nap; 3 to 4:15 — swim practice; 5:00 — dinner; 10:00 — lights out.

"I'm sort of into the routine now," Spitz said. "It doesn't bother me."

That doesn't mean it doesn't sometimes get to him.

"Sometimes Ron will ask me why I'm dragging and I'll say, 'Because I'm 40 years old!' "Spitz said, laughing.

Conspicuously absent from Spitz's schedule-at-a-glance is a meet. Originally, Spitz said, his plan was to compete somewhere sometime this summer. But he has since bagged his timetable.

"People are constantly asking Mark, 'when are you going to do such-and-such a time?' "Suzy Spitz said. "But Mark is very methodical. He really thinks things through. He isn't going to be swayed by other people. He really knows his body well, and he's just going to do what he personally thinks is right for him."

Spitz, no stranger to publicity, knows the eyes of the world will bore into him whenever and wherever he chooses to compete. He also knows anything less than a stellar showing will provide his critics with all the

ammunition they need to shoot down his 1992 Olympic dream.

"There is a certain amount of pressure because if I don't do well in that first race, it certainly isn't going to help me," Spitz said. "I really can't tell you when I'll be ready to compete because I'm going to give myself all the time I need to get myself in shape. But I'll be rested, I'll be tapered and I'll be ready."

And he'll have plenty of rooters, among them, Carl Robie, the last man to beat Spitz in Olympic competition. At the 1968 Olympics, Robie upset his more celebrated American teammate in the 200 butterfly to win the gold medal. Spitz, who had brashly predicted he'd collect six gold medals in Mexico City, finished eighth and settled for two golds, both in relays.

"What Mark is doing is pretty courageous," said Robie, now a lawyer in Sarasota, Fla. "I think that's really an admirable endeavor. I wish him good luck."

"He's been pretty impressive to me," Ballatore said. "I see him coming back and being as good as he used to be. And just to do that, to get back to where he was, would be a helluva accomplishment."


