This effort is long overdue, it is fully supported and endorsed by the Executive Council and the Endowment Fund Trustees, and it deserves your full support.

Brothers, the new Executive Council is off to a rousing start: we are here to serve you. Join us in our efforts to serve our Fraternity. Get involved; plan now to spend Founders Day with a chapter or alumni association in your area.



Grand Arch Council Summary

re-enactment of the 1849 Gold Rush took place July 29 through August 2 as hundreds of Phi Psis and their guests flocked to San Francisco to take part in the 66th Grand Arch Council. The Hyatt Regency San Francisco at Embarcadero Center was the setting for what proved to be one of Phi Psi's most active conventions in recent memory. In addition to numerous amendments to the Constitution, Bylaws, and Rules of the Fraternity, several mandates were adopted reflecting the desire of the members for better communication at all levels of the Fraternity. Capping the excitement was the election of a new Executive Board to guide the Executive Council and Fraternity at-large through the next biennium. When the convention closed, the Fraternity had a new look and new marching orders to lead the American College Fraternity movement into the 21st Century.

The 1992 Grand Arch Council got an early start on Wednesday, July 29 as nearly 400 Phi Psis and their guests boarded a Hornblower Yacht for a dinner cruise around the San Francisco Bay. Braving the chilly sea air and a flock of crazed seagulls, the passengers got breathtaking up-close views of such famous San Francisco landmarks as the Golden Gate Bridge and Alcatraz. As the yacht chugged back toward its port, Executive Director Terry Harper, Oklahoma State '85, and Director of Chapter Services Ron Richard, Minnesota '84, took to the stage and led the seafaring Phi Psis through several choruses of the Fraternity's best-





loved songs. The cruise set the overall tone of the GAC as one that would emphasize fraternal fun and fellowship as well as a commitment to completing the important task of evaluating and improving our beloved Fraternity.

FIRST DAY OF BUSINESS

On Thursday morning, the traditional opening breakfast satisfied the heartiest of appetites and got delegates focused on jumping into the "business" of the Grand Arch Council with both feet. The presentation of the colors and the Pledge of Allegiance were led by local Boy Scouts of America Troop 595. Mayor Frank Jordan issued a proclamation declaring July 29 through August 2 as San Francisco Phi Psi Days. Even Governor Pete Wilson sent greetings and salutations.

ith a mighty rap of the gavel, Fraternity President Robert E. Lazzell, West Virginia '42, called the 66th Grand Arch Council to order at 10:30 a.m. Following the performance of the opening ceremony, the following Phi Psis were installed as the permanent officers of the Grand Arch Council; in addition to SWGP Lazzell: J. West Virginia'61, SWAG; and Jeffrey H. Morgan, Rhode Island '91, Daniel J. Isaac, Akron '87, Joseph S. Lockett, Miami '90, Christopher R. Partin, Tennessee '91, Brian S. Crow, Texas '90, and Robert H. Sostman, Cal State Northridge'87, SW Hods. Educational Leadership Consultants James M. Acton, Valparaiso'88, Marc E. Bruffett, SUNY Buffalo'89, and James D. Boyle, Washington'88, were designated as SW Phus.

The twelve standing committees deliberated, in addition to five special, or ad hoc, committees and gave the Fraternity its marching orders for the next biennium. Michael Wallen, Wabash '87, Membership; Harry R. Rolfe, Arizona '60, and Haldon C. Dick, Bowling Green '55, Publications; John F. Buck, Indiana '75, Scholarship; Thomas C. Pennington, Texas '80, State of the Fraternity; Burns H. Davison III, Iowa State '79, Decennial Law Review Board; Craig B. Johnson, Ohio Wesleyan '84, Fund Raising Review; Robert H. George, Michigan State '54, House Corporations and Housing; Richard E. Ong, Oregon State '55, Planning Review; and Stephen R. O'Rourke, *Missouri* '74, Alumni Associations and Clubs.

One additional special committee completed all of its work prior to the GAC, and in a large part was responsible for the success of the convention. That merry band of Phi Psis was the GAC Host Committee, chaired by Brother Ong and Enrico A. Hernandez, *Stanford'78*. These two Brothers, along with several other Bay Area Phi Psis, planned all the social events and the spouses and guests program. Thanks to their efforts, Phi Psis were able to get the most out of their time in San Francisco.

SPECIAL PROGRAMS

Six special presentations educated and enlightened the delegates to the 66th Grand Arch Council. In addition to his normal invocation duties, the Reverend Stephen D. McWhorter, West Virginia '60, told us how our attitude can be our greatest asset or our greatest liability. Brother Goldman gave the undergraduates a presentation on rush from a marketing perspective. John D. Watt III, Duke '75, updated the membership on the results of the strategic planning summit that was held in Indianapolis in June. on the Campaign for Phi Kappa Psi, a capital campaign to raise \$7 million to fund many exciting and necessary programs for Phi Psi. Brother Goldman, who serves as chairman for the Campaign, reported that nearly \$4 million had already been pledged toward the \$7 million goal.

In addition to a general problem solving session, several advisors led the group through discussions on a wide variety of topics.

AWARDS LUNCHEON

Phi Psi's best and brightest were recognized and rewarded at the Awards Luncheon on Friday. Vice President Harrison served as Symposiarch and led the GAC through Phi Psi's version of the Academy Awards. One of the memorable mo-

ments came when four Phi Psis were presented with Golden Council pins, acknowledging 50 years of membership in Phi Kappa Psi. Brother Lazzell, David J. Evans Jr., Kansas '42, James E. Brooks, Mississippi '42, and Ernest H. Garbe, Columbia '40, representing 202 years of dedication to the Fraternity, received a standing ovation. Past President Walter Lee Sheppard Jr., Cornell '29, walked away with another Eddie Knight Award for Most GACs attended when he made it to his 31st convention. Eddie Knight, Wabash 1893, attended 38 straight GACs between 1894 and 1970.

The gala Grand Arch Council Banquet was held on Saturday evening with Mystagogue Kent C. Owen, *Indiana '58*, serving as Symposiarch. With his unique sense of humor, Brother Owen kept the banquet lively and entertaining. Highlights of the banquet included the presentation of the Ladies Silver Bowl to Phi Psi's first lady, Lucille



Lazzell; the reclamation of the Man Mile Award by West Virginia Alpha (given for most delegates from the farthest distance in attendance); and the awarding of Phi Psi's newest trophy, the Grand Chapter Prize, to Ohio Lambda as the best all-around chapter in the Fraternity.

Dr. Gordon S. Letterman, Missouri '38,

was recognized as the Fraternity's Distinguished Alumnus. Brother Letterman is the grandson of Founder William Henry Letterman and was recognized for his contributions to the field of medicine, as well as his dedication and love for Phi Kappa Psi.

His many accomplishments include a career on the teaching staff at George Washington University's medical school. In 1989, the honor of Professor Emeritus of Surgery was conferred upon him. He has authored or co-authored over 100 scientific publications as well as a number of chapters in medical textbooks.

In accepting his award, Brother Letterman reminisced about his grandfather, Founder Letterman, and how their lives paralleled in many ways. It was truly the most moving moment of the banquet. Brother Letterman's wife, Elma, and son, Gordon S. Letterman, West Virginia '72, were on hand for the presentation.

Cleveland's Man with a Mission

Former Nestlé CEO James Biggar, Case Institute of Technology '47, has lived the American dream.

im Biggar, Case '47, is a man with a mission: to make Cleveland a first-class visitor destination city. He sees it easily out-pacing Atlanta, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, and Cincinnati. But then again, he's been predicting such a success for more than fifteen years.

Biggar's fascination with Cleveland comes naturally. He was born and raised there, went to college there, and lives there still. He has built his business career there, and even landed several major corporate headquarters and manufacturing facilities there. In fact, when he was appointed chairman and chief executive officer of Nestlé USA Inc., he moved Nestlé to Cleveland from the east coast. Nestlé USA is the parent company for such recognizable brand names as Beach Nut, Libby's, Stouffer, Hills Bros., and Beringer Wines.

At age 63, Jim Biggar is one of Cleveland's best cheerleaders. He retired from Nestlé last year, but he prefers life in the fast lane. He now heads the New Cleveland Campaign and chairs the Gateway Economic Development Board, which is building two new sports venues downtown. Professionally, Biggar is developing more than 400 acres of commercial and residential land south of the city.

The story of how he made it to the top of a global giant like Nestlé, however, is forever intertwined with his Phi Psi experience.

THE UNDERGRADUATE YEARS

iggar attended his first class at Case Institute of Technology (then separate from Western Reserve University) in 1946, and like most freshmen, felt a bit lost and overwhelmed. "Phi Psi and Phi Delt were the two best fraternities on campus at the time," Biggar said in a recent interview, "and at 18, you're alone. The fraternity served a good need." He and his brother Hamilton joined Phi Psi in 1947, and found "a pretty diverse group" of activities represented by the members.

Two other Brothers joined him in competition on the wrestling mat, and four or five Phi Psis were on the football team. In fact, Biggar was a member of the first Case Tech football team in 22 years to beat then-rival Western Reserve. Each member of that winning team was given a gold football, despite the team's overall record of three wins and five losses. "I'd never heard of that before," Biggar laughed, "but it had been 22 years!"

Biggar's wrestling experience provides some

insight into his business acumen as well. In his years of competition, he often wrestled in the 'unlimited' classification, with opponents significantly heavier and more powerful than he was. "It taught me you can always take on a big guy," Biggar says. "They were stronger, but if I could be quicker or smarter, I'd still win." And win he did, enough to be inducted into the National Wrestling Hall of Fame last year.

"I once told a professor," Biggar continued, "that my best courses [at Case] were Fraternity and Wrestling. In the Fraternity, you can learn a lot from each other... and while they say experience is the best teacher, tuition's a lot cheaper if you learn from somebody else's experience."

INTO THE WORKFORCE

fter graduating in 1950 with two degrees — one in mechanical engineering and one in engineering administration — Biggar went to work for Reliance Electric selling electric motors to industry. By 1951 he had married Margery Stouffer and they had begun to plan a family.

Ten years later, Biggar had been named manager of the alternating current products department for Reliance, but another company needed his talents more. Stouffer Foods, founded by his wife's grandfather in 1924, was floundering, and then-CEO Vernon Stouffer asked for Biggar's help. "My father-in-law said 'You're in marketing, can't you help out?' I would never have done it," Biggar says, "if it hadn't been for another Fraternity Brother."

At the time, Biggar believed he wouldn't be able to make the switch from the industrial marketing he was doing with Reliance Electric to selling frozen dinners directly to consumers. "Plus," Biggar says, "then you've gone to work for your father-in-law. If the decision is wrong, you've drifted downstream without a paddle."

Harry E. Figgie, Case '43, changed Biggar's mind. Figgie offered Biggar two different jobs, one in the brewery industry and one with his firm, where Biggar's responsibilities would include marketing to both industry sources and to consumers. "Only because Figgie thought I could shift" from industrial to consumer,

Biggar says, "did I have the confidence to switch." Biggar accepted neither of Figgie's job offers but did agree to help out his wife's dad.

TO THE TOP

y February of 1968, Litton Industries had purchased Stouffer and named Biggar president of its new Stouffer Foods Division. There, he was responsible for every one of Stouffer's frozen prepared foods as well as its restaurants and hotels around the country. "To succeed," Biggar says, "your product must have a difference, real or perceived, from all the other products... and real is better than perceived."

Biggar worked tirelessly to make Stouffer's real difference more significant and more noticeable to consumers. "We used a special flour in our spinach soufflé," Biggar says, "and we aged the cheese in our macaroni and cheese for 10 to 12 months. Maybe only 10% of the people noticed, but was it worth it?" Biggar believes so, and cites one of his most ardently held business theories: "You can make money either by having the very best product or by being the lowest cost producer. In between, it's a mess, because your product costs more than someone else's and isn't as good."

Under Biggar's leadership, Stouffer Foods always aimed to offer the very best product: "We tried to put more detailed care into our products," Biggar says, "and make fewer compromises." When Nestlé purchased Stouffer from Litton in 1973, the division had yearly sales of approximately \$130 million. Today, sales exceed \$1.6 billion. From Nestlé's

perspective, Biggar jokes, "It wasn't a bad buy." By 1982, Biggar had been named chairman of Stouffer Foods' parent company in the US, Nestlé Enterprises Inc., a post he held until last year.

When Biggar joined Stouffer Foods at his father-in-law's request, it was a \$6.8 million company and was losing money. Biggar says his proudest achievement is converting that small company and others like it to the multi-billion dollar profit-makers they are today. "What I really enjoy is building a team and watching them win," Biggar says.

A NEW CHALLENGE

ut much like his shift from motors to food products in the '60s, Biggar has switched in recent months from hawking frozen pizza to selling and developing real estate. He is now president of Glencairn Corporation, a firm that owns more than 400 acres of woodland south of Cleveland. He hopes to turn that land into luxury estates and a profitable commercial center.


And, with his retirement from Nestlé comes more time to devote to the concerns of Cleveland. The Gateway Economic Development Board, which Biggar heads, is currently constructing a new 42,000 seat baseball stadium and a 22,000 seat basketball, hockey, and soccer arena downtown in the city's central market area. The new stadium is designed to be

very similar to the new Camden Yards, the Baltimore Orioles' ballpark. The Cleveland Indians will play in the new stadium at first, but if the Browns decide to move from their current venue as well, the new stadium is easily expandable to seat upwards of 70,000 fans.

Eventually, Biggar hopes to construct luxury condominiums and apartments at the water-front where the Browns' stadium now stands. "Our prime lakefront land should not be used for a sports stadium," Biggar said in a 1988 speech. "It's much too valuable."

Biggar's father was also a Case Phi Psi, initiated in 1922, and two of Biggar's sons joined Phi Psi while at Bucknell University — Bill in 1976 and David in 1979. Today, Biggar still plays golf with Phi Psi friends, including John Whitacre, Case '47.

LETTERS TO LOCKERBIE

TO THE EDITOR:

Saturday, June 14, 1992, our two sons graduated from the University of Oregon.

When our older son pledged the fraternity, we did not know what to expect. When his brother joined the next year, we felt more comfortable with fraternity life.

As we look back, we are thankful that our sons were members of Phi Kappa Psi. We have seen them develop into enthusiastic, well balanced, conscientious, confident leaders, attributes which we know the Fraternity has brought out in them.

We have been extremely impressed with the brotherhood and the concern the brothers have for one another. We know that is not always true of other fraternities.

Other parents feel the same way: two years ago we formed the Phi Kappa Psi Parents Club to help the fraternity financially and in any other ways we could. Jeff had a severe stroke on July 27, 1991, at his home near Marietta, Ohio. Jeff is not married and was alone at the time. It was approximately 45 minutes before his father and girlfriend found him. At the time Jeff was struggling to get his new construction business off the ground as well as managing his father's small oil and gas production business. From then until June 30, 1992, Jeff stayed in various hospitals. On June 30, we brought him back to Marietta to his parents' home where he'll live until we finish outfitting his house.

Jeff is mentally aware of his frail condition and is able to help us with questions regarding the business equipment, his home, etc., but he can communicate with us only by using his eyes. He is a quadraplegic and we have a staff of nurses and nursing assistants to take care of him at all times. We do not know what Jeff's future will be, but we all have hopes that someday he will be able to talk to us and possibly even develop enough movement to use a computer again within a few years.

If any of you remember Jeff, please send him a card or letter and state when you graduated, how and where you knew him, and possibly some event that you and he were involved in together to jog his memory. All his mail is read and shown to him by either the nurses or his parents and then we keep everything in hopes that someday he will be able to again read all his letters and cards on his own. 

GEORGE H. KINCAID

West Virginia '54

George passed away on Saturday, June 28, 1992. The burial took place in Oak Hill, West Virginia on July 1. George provided unselfish service to his own Chapter and the Fraternity at large. We knew him as Archon of the Old District III from 1959–61 and the second Brother to serve Phi Psi as a travelling field secretary from 1961–63.

George was inducted into the Ancient Order of the S.C. in 1980. He attended 10 Grand Arch Councils during his lifetime, the last being in 1990 at Mackinac Island. A stalwart volunteer, George last served the Executive Council as Director of Alumni Relations under Past President David F. Hull Jr. during the 1986–88 biennium.

Longtime friend Kent C. Owen, *Indiana* '58, describes George as "an extraordinarily loving and caring human being; a gentleman of the old school. Through the years, he endeared himself to hundreds of Brothers. George was generous and hospitable — an exemplary Brother. He thoroughly embodied the ideals and principles of the Fraternity."

AUGUST F. 'BUD' HOOK

Purdue '26

A former President of Hook Drugs Inc., Bud Hook died Monday, July 13, 1992. He was buried on July 17 in Indianapolis. Bud received his pharmacy degree from Purdue University in 1929 and then attended Harvard University's school of business. He started working at a local Hook Drugs store in 1930. By 1956 he had been appointed President; he was elected Chairman of the Board in 1972.

Bud was an active volunteer with the Boy Scouts of America, particularly assisting the Central Indiana Council. He served as its president in 1960. He also raised millions of dollars for local Scouting activities and personally donated \$1 million to set up an endowment fund that today supports Indiana Boy Scout programs.

His fund-raising skills were employed by other organizations as well — over the past 30 years he donated his time and energies to the Indianapolis Zoological Society and the Indiana Olympic Committee as well as numerous other organizations.

Scholarship & Award Winners

The best of the best, Phi Psi's scholars and award winners bring glory to their chapters.

Each year, The Endowment Fund of Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity grants nearly \$40,000 in scholarships and awards to deserving undergraduates across the country. These men, selected in the broadest sense for their committment to the ideals of the Fraternity, embody the best of the Phi Psi undergraduate experience.

This year, 62 members were elected by their chapters as Summerfield Scholars. We reported on those winners in our Summer 1992 issue. Now we pay tribute to eleven Phi Psis who excel in scholarship, community service, engineering, and the arts.

Outstanding Summerfield Scholar

The Summerfield Scholar program was created through a trust bequest to the Endowment Fund by the late Solon E. Summerfield, Kansas 1899. At the time of the gift, Brother Summerfield's donation was the largest ever made to an American college fraternity. Today, each of the Fraternity's chapters and colonies is given the opportunity to select one brother who exemplifies scholarship and leadership. The qualifications of the nominees are then reviewed by the Endowment Fund's Scholarship and Awards Committee; the Outstanding Summerfield Scholar is chosen out of that pool.

The honor of being Outstanding Summerfield Scholar is granted to the Phi Psi member determined to be the most outstanding student nationwide in scholastic achievement and leadership ability. The recipient of this honor receives a \$3,000 grant, the runner-up receives a \$2,500 grant.

Peter J. Huff

Despite being president of the SMU Student Union, three-term GP of his chapter, and a varsity cross country and track letterwinner, Peter J. Huff, SMU'89, still maintained a perfect 4.0 GPA through-



out his academic career. His involvement both in and outside the chapter have been exemplary, and he richly deserves the designation Outstanding Summerfield Scholar.

Huff's superb academic performance comes despite the difficult and complex schedule that resulted from juggling the requirements of *three* simultaneous majors: economics, philosophy, and political science. In addition to regular coursework, he also completed a departmental distinction thesis in political science.

During his three terms as president of Texas Delta, Huff helped to increase the chapter's membership by 75%, triple the number of community service hours donated by the chapter each year, and procure a new chapter home for the group at no cost to the fraternity. Other chapter-related accomplishments of his include completing two terms as the chapter's finance committee chair and serving on the executive board of SMU's Interfraternity Council.

In his senior year, Huff was elected president of the Student Union, the only SMU governing body to involve students, faculty, staff, and alumni. Plus, because of his achievements on the track and cross country teams, and because of his superior academic record, Huff was chosen for the GTE Academic All-America team. He also served as the only voting undergraduate on a Board of Trustees audit committee. Furthermore, Huff founded the *Stay in School* program at SMU which provides disadvantaged area youth with positive minority role models. Those role models

then encourage the children to continue their education as an escape from inner-city poverty.

Huff is currently studying as a Fulbright fellow at the National University of Singapore. He is concentrating on business and finance while doing high-level technical research on price spiking behavior in the Singapore stock market. When his fellowship ends in March of 1993, Huff plans to return to the States to accept an employment offer from an international consulting firm.

Richard D. Pancost

With a cumulative GPA of 3.9 and a multitude of leadership credits to his name, Richard D. Pancost, Case Western Reserve '88, is another sterling example of Phi Psi at its best, and well-qualified to be Outstanding Summerfield Scholar runner-up.



Pancost served as Ohio Epsilon's president for one year and as recording secretary for another term. He was also chairman of the scholarship, house, philanthropy, and public relations committees during his four years.

On campus, Pancost has made a name for himself as an Interfraternity Congress representative and as a liaison between the IFC and the school's Undergraduate Student Government. His IFC duties included formulating risk management policies in accordance with national guidelines and coordinating Case Western's Greek Week festivities.

His greatest achievements are in scholarship, however, where Pancost earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Geological Sciences earlier this year. After graduate school, he hopes to continue researching so-called global systems at the university level, "so that a better understanding of the elements that maintain life on our world can be developed."

The Founders Fellows

The Endowment Fund annually honors Brothers with plans to pursue graduate studies with the designation Founders Fellow to recognize superior scholarship and leadership in the Fraternity's chapters and colonies. Each Founders Fellow receives a \$2,000 grant and a certificate.

Recommended by a philosophy professor as "standing out by any comparison," Robert J. Parada Jr., Rochester Institute of Technology '92, has compiled a 3.93 GPA and an impressive list of other academic achievements. As a



founding member of the New York Theta colony and two-year chair of his chapter's scholarship committee, Parada led the RIT Phi Psis to the highest GPA of any campus Greek organization.

Now pursuing a Ph.D. in optical sciences at the University of Arizona, Parada hopes to conduct research on extra-planetary imaging systems with NASA or some similar private-sector counterpart.

John R. Moore

A chemistry major with a cumulative GPA of 3.92, John R. Moore, Wabash '89, is looking toward a career in medicine. Selected as a Summerfield Scholar by the members of his chapter, Moore has served as GP and VGP of Indiana



Gamma and was a delegate at the 1989 Woodrow Wilson Leadership School and at the 1990 and 1992 Grand Arch Councils.

Moore currently attends the Indiana University School of Medicine. He hopes to either practice or teach medicine upon graduation.

Jeffery C. Sharer

Jeffrey C. Sharer, Michigan'90, was twice named one of the University of Michigan's James B. Angell Scholars, signifying a perfect scholarship record for two or more consecutive terms. In all, his 3.79 GPA in psychology and



economics is testament to his academic performance. For ten of his courses, he received a grade

of A+, a mark of special distinction at the U of M. Sharer was also Michigan Alpha's GP during the winter of 1992 and its philanthropy committee chair for two terms.

Sharer is currently enrolled in a joint program in law and economics where he is earning a JD and a Ph.D. simultaneously.

David R. Buetow

A political science major at the University of Illinois, David R. Buetow, *Illinois* '88, earned a 4.9 (out of 5.0) GPA as well as the accolades of his teachers. "I would easily rank him in the top 1% among the entire student body,"



writes one of his professors, "His work in my class was nothing short of excellent."

Inside Illinois Delta, he distinguished himself as well, serving as the chapter's GP, rush committee chair, and scholarship committee chair—three positions requiring disparate leadership skills.

Already one of Illinois Delta's C. F. 'Dab' Williams Scholars, Buetow is now pursuing a law degree at a Chicago-area school. Upon graduation, he hopes to practice law in the midwest.

Ruddick C. Lawrence Public Service Award

The Fraternity's Public Service award honors Ruddick Lawrence, former chairman of the New York Stock Exchange and long-time philanthropist who joined Phi Kappa Psi in 1931 while attending the University of Washington. The winner of the award receives \$1,500; the runner-up receives \$1,000.

Breck C. McDaniel

Only a sophomore when he won the award, Breck C. McDaniel, Texas '92, has done more to help his community than most people many times his age. McDaniel is a member of the Turnbow fam-



ily and of Creek Indian descent. Only sixth-tenths of one percent of the student population at the University of Texas is American Indian, and McDaniel says he is proud of his heritage and looks forward to representing American Indians on campus.


Within his hometown community, McDaniel has worked to educate youngsters about the dangers of smoking. After receiving training from the American Heart and Lung Asociation, he visited fifth-grade classrooms around his area to give his presentation. He also worked to reduce the number of drunk driving crashes each year by volunteering with Students Against Drunk Driving, a national organization.

In Austin, McDaniel has volunteered for the Parks and Recreation Department's Plant a Tree project and for a local program which provides hot meals for homeless citizens. He has also been assigned as a mentor to local high school and elementary school students who are at risk of dropping out. McDaniel meets weekly with the students to provide support and guidance.

After graduation, McDaniel plans to attend graduate school and eventually work for the government in a foreign relations or national security capacity.

Stephen W. Gumm

He says he started volunteering after visiting a local hospital with his chapter. One of the patients was a young girl from Mexico who spoke no English. The hospital staff could barely communicate with her, yet when another Ken-



tucky Betan who was fluent in Spanish began to talk with the girl, Gumm says "the look of joy in her face was enough to hook me for life."

Stephen W. Gumm was initiated at the University of Kentucky in 1989 and graduated this spring with a major in communication. Required to submit only three letters of recommendation for the Lawrence award, Gumm sent *eight* from agencies as varied as the March of Dimes, the American Lung Association, and Mother to Mother, a local group. And his involvement is anything but superficial. Cumulatively, he raised

well over \$70,000 for charity while continuing to maintain a 3.85 GPA in his major.

Gumm is currently enrolled in graduate school at the University of Kentucky.

Mary Pickford - Rogers Memorial Scholarship

This \$1,500 scholarship is presented through the generosity of Mary Pickford-Rogers' husband, actor Charles 'Buddy' Rogers, *Kansas* '23.

The grant is intended to support the studies of a Phi Psi majoring in the performing arts, music, dance, television, or journalism. The student may be involved either as an undergraduate or as a graduate.

Evan C. Shea

This year's award winner is a music education major at Trenton State College. Initiated in 1990, Evan C. Shea plans to continue his studies through graduate school at Trenton State, eventually teaching music composition, theory, and performance. He plans to continue composing, however, and performing as much as possible.

A founding member of New Jersey Delta, Shea has been involved in the campus Greek system as well. He was his chapter's original Inter-Greek Council representative, helping to implement the school's first alcohol-free rush policy.

Musically, Shea performs in a variety of ensembles and on a variety of instruments. He has twice toured Europe with the New Jersey Youth Symphony and is also a soloist for the college's jazz band and percussion ensemble.

Ben King Scholarship

Designed specifically to benefit an undergraduate Phi Psi working his way through college, the King Scholarship also mandates that the recipient be majoring in engineering or a related field. The award carries with it a \$1,000 prize and is given in honor of Ben King, Brooklyn Polytechnic'06.

Donald G. Derrenbacher

This year's recipient was initiated at the New York Theta Chapter Installation in 1992. He plans to graduate from Rochester Institute of Technology at the end of this academic year with a BS in Electrical Engineering Technology.

Donald G. Derrenbacher's undergraduate career began at Monroe Community College where he not only took a full load of classes but also worked a job before school and another on evenings and weekends. When he trans-



ferred to RIT in 1990, his hectic pace continued, as he accepted a co-op position with a Rochester firm.

He has served his chapter as Fraternity Educator and philanthropy committee chair; the chapter advisor calls him "a genuinely exceptional and deserving candidate."

Upon graduation, Derrenbacher plans to make use of his training in either electrical or nuclear engineering.


George R. Hofmann Scholarship

Available only to members of New York Alpha, this scholarship is given in memory of George R. Hofmann, *Cornell '14*, to recognize superior achievement in scholarship and leadership within the chapter. Preference is given to seniors who will be attending graduate school.

Rod Peter S. Rezaee

After completing the medical school training in which he is now engaged, Rod P. Rezaee, Cornell'89, hopes to go into private practice near his family home in Cleveland, Ohio.

While still an undergraduate, Rezaee distin-



guished himself both academically and socially. He served for several years as a peer counselor at Cornell's Gannett Health Center counseling students with alcohol and other drug abuse problems. He also served his chapter as VGP and as scholarship and philanthropy committee chair.

Rezaee also maintained a 3.5 GPA in his psychology major. The best thing about attending Cornell, he says, is that is "allowed me to arrive at a more detailed picture of who I am and what it is that I desire."


Founders Day No. 91

Why all the fuss? It's only Founders Day...

ontrary to rumor, Willie Letterman and Charley Moore did not survey what they had set in motion on that late winter's evening in 1852 and call the date "Founders' Day." The immediate result of their resolve was, of course, the Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity, the Friends' Association of Honor. But significant as the event may have seemed to them at the time — upstairs in Willie's room at his family's home on College Street — they should be excused for not having declared it then and there a holiday ever after for all generations of Phi Psis to come.

In point of fact, the official designation of February 19 as Founders' Day did not come



until the Executive Council's last meeting of the year 1901. The purpose was to celebrate the Fraternity's semicentenary with special chapter meetings and alumni association banquets. And in that era a chapter meeting could be made special with commemorative orations, essays, and poems. And a banquet was indeed a banquet, what with seven courses' worth of toasts, speeches, and sumptuous victuals.

In the March 1902 issue of The Shield, George B. Lockwood, DePauw 1890, wrote "Founders' Day, February 19, was celebrated with a universality which accentuates the contrast between the Phi Kappa Psi today and the Phi Kappa Psi which, as a single isolated chapter, without an alumnus on its rolls, with only the brave spirit of the pioneers to sustain it, was seeking a foothold at Jefferson College. How well the Founders planned, with what devotion they labored, the present condition of the Fraternity is evidence, for whatever there is of good in Phi Kappa Psi today is the efflorescence of the seed seemingly planted in stony ground a half century ago, but protected and developed by such loving nurture that its flowers - the flowers of friendship, of comradeship, of brotherly affection - have made happier the lives of thousands of young men, and by the term 'young men' we mean not only those of younger years, but those who have carried into later life the sentiments of college days..."

owadays, ninety-one years later, it is hard to imagine, let alone recreate, the unaffected enthusiasm and sincerity that marked the Phi Psi gatherings of Lockwood's account. Yet even in the climate of cynicism and hip knowingness now pervading American society, there are still

those rare occasions that evoke the true spirit of fraternity, the Phi Psi of yore.

Within Phi Kappa Psi that occasion remains, first and foremost, Founders' Day. For elder Phi Psis there's the likely rediscovery of fellowship among congenial men who have in common like ideals, principles, and experiences. For younger Phi Psis there awaits a welcoming community that overcomes the barriers of generation and circumstance. Moreover, such agreeable possibilities come free of the distractions of drum-pounding, tree-hugging, primal-howling, or group-therapying. Among Phi Psis, male-bonding usually happens more naturally and spontaneously than either anthropologists or men's movement advocates are used to seeing.

While a long evening topheavy with formal speeches and weighty food is a thing of the past, the contemporary Founders' Day — now more often a luncheon than a dinner — features a Phi Psi speaker worthy of at least local renown, expurgated reports from chapters in the area, fitful outbursts of song, and, best of all, plenty of freestyle conversation, before and after the program. Doubtless, members of some other Greek-lettered tribes may expect comparable celebrations to include floor shows, rock concerts, bingo games, or mud-wrestling tournaments.

Given our discreet tastes and habits, Phi Psis traditionally make do with passable food and drink for the sake of the greater pleasures of good company. That applies in particular to Founders' Day. After all, what is being celebrated is the remarkably vital institution created by two young men who called each other Charley and Willie, and who knew from the very beginning that they had made something worth keeping.

Phi Psis do offer prayers as well as toasts in memory of Brothers Letterman and Moore. Both forms, spiritual and secular alike, affirm our gratitude for their "lofty idealism," moral imagination, and strength of purpose. (By the way, it's fitting the old Phi Psi cheer, "High, High, High," should echo the toast of German university students of earlier centuries, "Hoch, Hoch, Hoch," with the added meaning of elevated lives and purposes.)

ut in a broader sense, what Phi Psis remember and celebrate on February 19 goes well beyond the original inspiration of Letterman and Moore.


The day summons up the Fraternity's bright cavalcade: from the past of Tom Campbell and Will Keady and Sam Dodd and Bob Lowry down through fourteen decades to the present of Dud Daniel and Casey Jones and Webb Mize and Bob Meserve. And beyond those illustrious brothers one can see in the mind's eye the coming generations, chapter by chapter, who will enable our Noble Fraternity to live and to flourish.

The observance of Founders' Day isn't just another duty to be discharged. Like any lasting value in the whole Phi Psi experience, it's a time to rejoice in the goodly company of the assembled brothers. For all Phi Psis everywhere, it's a time once more to slip the friendly grip, that cordial expression of manly affection. Most of all, it's a time to come back to Phi Psi, to learn again that what began modestly so long ago retains its power to enrich our lives. If there be any shame at all in Founders' Day, putting aside senti-

mentality, it's that so few of us treat ourselves to its convivial pleasures. But that's happily remedied: just come toast Charley and Willie.




Hal Dick



GAC ACTION ITEMS

The Executive Council will

- provide all chapters, colonies, house corporations and alumni associations its long-term planning goals and objectives for the biennium.
- include status reports regarding the progress in accomplishing the specific goals and objectives of the Biennial Plan in semi-annual editions of *The Shield*.
- review and update the planning document to achieve continual evolution.
- distribute complete minutes of the Executive Council and Executive Board meetings, biennial budget, quarterly financial statements, and reports of the Risk Management program to all House Corporations and chapters automatically and to individual members upon request.
- include a breakdown of actual premium costs, administrative fees, and reserve fund fees in all

- liability and property insurance billings.
- furnish certificates of insurance to house corporations and chapters annually upon payment of premium at the anniversary date of the policy.
- maintain total asset value of reserve fund (excluding those held for deductibles) including cash on hand, funds invested in various financial instruments, and current accounts receivable (less interest) not exceeding 25% gross annual billing nor less than 20%. There shall be no combining of these funds with other Fraternity funds.
- reinstate reserve fund billing should the fund fall below 20% gross billing.
- maintain administrative costs not exceeding 7.5% gross billing.
- direct the Fraternity Headquarters to continue pursuing accounts receivable for the insurance program..

- solicit and submit at least three bids for insurance coverage prior to the anniversary date of the current policy... consult with Executive Council and Director of House Corporations before accepting any bid.
- incorporate The Manual of Phi Kappa Psi, Developing the Total Brother, The Fraternity Education Workbook, The Phi Psi Gentleman into one document.
- create a do-it-yourself newsletter kit to assist selected chapters in the publication of an alumni newsletters (Director of Alumni Relations and Director of Publications with support of Fraternity Staff).
- request a staff presentation at the 1993 WWLS on study of costs and feasibility of having the WWLS on a college or university campus.
- seek a centrally located and easily accessible college or university for the 1995 WWLS.
- instruct Fraternity staff to purchase and distribute the FIPG Risk Management Manual for each chapter and colony.
- distribute a list of appropriate Fraternity contacts for crisis management with the FIPG Manual.
- regularly distribute the Sentry Newsletter for Risk Management.
- recommend a follow-up study by ELC of chapters reviewed during academic year
- identify the role of fraternities in a changing college environment and present that study at the 67th GAC
- give full support to the Alumni Committee and provide a method by which to gauge its progress... the EC is accountable for alumni development and will report its progress at the 67th GAC.

Woodrow Wilson Leadership School

Thomas Woodrow Wilson, Brother in Phi Kappa Psi, served as Chapter President at both the University of Virginia and at Johns Hopkins University. President of Princeton University and Governor of New Jersey, this high-minded minister's son went on to capture the US Presidency. Viewed by many as the first American Chief Executive to take up the mantle for world affairs, Wilson's Fourteen Points and concept of the League of Nations were the precursors of today's United Nations.

Historically labeled as an idealist and an academic, the 223rd initiate of the Virginia Alpha Chapter is connected to the Fraternity through its Ritual and principles. A noted gentleman, Wilson was the product of his Presbyterian upbringing, the Reconstruction South, an ethereal engagement in the classics, and the celebration of his mind. The changing momentum of the 20th century perhaps enabled this man to become one of the most influential figures in recent time.

Chapter leader, University leader, National leader, and World leader... Woodrow Wilson embodied the spirit of Phi Kappa Psi. The Princeton professor died on February 23, 1924 — almost forty five years after his initiation. The Wilsonian leadership legacy lives on in Phi Kappa Psi.

Hazing Hurts Everybody

The Fraternity's future looks bright, but situations like the one at Rider bring dishonor to Phi Psi

Dear Brothers,

During the past several months I have had the opportunity to visit and meet with undergraduates and alumni from more than 50 chapters. During my visits I also make it a point to meet with house corporation officers and chapter advisors whenever possible. In addition, I have attended three regional conferences and two interfraternity meetings. Based on these experiences, my report to you is decidedly upbeat. The vast majority of our chapters and our two colonies are filled with dedicated, hard-working Phi Psis and are flourishing. Cal Epsilon at UCLA and Nebraska Beta at Creighton are once again recognized by their universities. The two colonies (at Loyola and DePaul) should soon receive their charters. Several weak chapters have turned around and are growing and improving.

Scholarship has improved in many chapters, although some still have a ways to go. I emphasize scholarship improvement as one of my top priorities in discussions with undergraduates. Many chapters show increasing pride in themselves and their fraternity, which is reflected in the care they show in maintaining their chapter houses. We have many new, energetic chapter advisors and chapter advisory committees helping the chapters and colonies, but we can always use more. I urge you alumni to contact nearby chapters, and get involved in helping those undergraduates.

The one practice that, more than anything else, continues to hurt our chapters and disgrace the Fraternity is the practice of hazing. It is often accomplished in the name of tradition and supported by well-meaning but misguided alumni. To date this school year, the practice has already resulted in the reorganization of one chapter, probation and university sanctions for two other chapters, and Fraternity suspension of New Jersey Alpha at Rider College—a situation picked up by the national media. I want to personally thank the many concerned brothers who contacted me and/or the Fraternity Headquarters to voice their concern and offer to help. We sincerely appreciate your offers. In sum, the one thing each and every alumnus can do to help Phi Kappa Psi grow is to *insist* that your chapter stop hazing its pledges.

The regional conferences started by Bob Goldman continue to grow and generate enthusiasm and ideas for chapters attending. Conferences have been held in Southern California, Rhode Island, and Ohio with over thirty chapters participating. We plan to expand these to provide opportunities for additional chapters to participate. Archon Chris Partin recently put together a highly successful District IV formal in Atlanta where over 350 Phi Psis and their dates from eight chapters enjoyed a great Phi Psi evening. District IV hopes to make this an annual event.

Executive Director Terry Harper and I have recently had the opportunity to attend two interfraternity meetings with Dud Daniel and I was again reminded how fortunate we are to have such a great Phi Psi, who is so well known and respected in the interfraternity world, acting as our ambassador. To the interfraternity world, Dud Daniel is Phi Kappa Psi and he continues to enhance our reputation and bring honor upon us.


I look forward to seeing many of you at the Woodrow Wilson Leadership School in Indianapolis on August 12–15, 1993.

He respects his brothers and looks up to many of them as role models. He continues to study hard and get excellent grades at a very tough school, and I know that although he has always done this, the fact that is chapter has the highest GPA on campus and expects this of its members is a big reason as well.

I wish you and Phi Kappa Psi the best for 1993. With the class act they have going at Miami University, it won't take much luck.

TO THE EDITOR:

The Alumnus Spotlight article concerning Jim Biggar, Case '47, and written by David R. Murray, Bucknell '91, which appeared in the December 1992 issue of The Shield [Vol. 113, No. 1] has prompted me to write this letter, Why? I am a Bucknell Phi Psi initiated in June of 1928 and subsequent events in my life instilled into my conscience and heart a very close feeling for the Case Institute of Technology chapter of Phi Kappa Psi.

I believe each and every Phi Psi is aware of the genuine brotherhood which exists between us but sometimes an event or demonstration of that brotherhood will strengthen our innermost feelings. That is what this letter is all about.

My son, Bill, an engineering student at the University of Illinois, was initiated in to the Illinois Delta Chapter of Phi Kappa Psi in 1959. During the summer break of that year he complained of chest pains and the diagnosis indicated Hodgkin's disease.

Radiation brought relief and he returned to school for the start of his sophomore year but in December the symptoms returned and an examination indicated acute leukemia. We had been informed of an experimental blood program being carried on by a well-known hematologist in Cleveland

and as last resort we placed Bill in that doctor's care. Bill enrolled in several courses at Western Reserve University but his studies were decimated by stays in the hospital. The treatment also required vast amounts of whole blood. One of my friends who knew Bill was a Phi Psi visited the chapter house at Case Institute, without my knowledge, and told the chapter of his plight. Bill had never visited the chapter but they immediately organized a chapter blood donor program, visited him in the hospital, and furnished the blood he required for his treatment until his death in April of 1961. A delegation also traveled to Chicago to attend his memorial service.

It has always been my feeling that the brothers of the Case chapter could not have demonstrated true brother-hood in a more positive manner. Bill in his last days was forever thankful to those men of Phi Kappa Psi and because of them he really never lost hope. As his father and as a brother Phi Psi, I too have been forever grateful and appreciative of the true brother-hood those men of Ohio Epsilon demonstrated.

My only wish in sharing this story is that it will aid all Phi Psis in remembering what it means to be a part of the great brotherhood of Phi Kappa Psi.

The Honorable Brother Coverdell

Georgia's new junior Senator owes a great deal to his Phi Psi experience and his Phi Psi friends

"As you honor yourself, you honor her..." wo days before Thanksgiving, November 24, 1992, Paul Douglas Coverdell, *Missouri* '59, was elected to the United States Senate from the State of Georgia. His victory marks the beginning of a new chapter in a Phi Psi brother's lifetime of public service.

Coverdell was born on a farm near Des Moines, Iowa. At age 8, he moved with his family to Atlanta, Georgia, in the heart of the New South. Upon finishing high school, young Coverdell headed back to the Midwest to study journalism at the University of Missouri.

Pledged to Phi Kappa Psi his freshman year, Coverdell was initiated in 1959. He quickly emerged as a chapter leader, serving two terms as GP.

"Phi Psi played an important role in my development as a leader," Coverdell said.
"Chapter life gave all of us an opportunity as college students to confront and solve real life problems: how to allocate resources, manage budgets, organize events, and live cooperatively with a diverse group of people."

Coverdell attended his first Grand Arch Council where Ralph D. "Dud" Daniel, Arizona' 47, then Executive Director of Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity, offered young Coverdell a job as field secretary (the predecessor to today's Educational Leadership Consultant), but Coverdell declined. He was an active Phi Psi alumnus, however, frequently mentioned in The Shield by the newsletter correspondents of both Missouri Alpha and the Atlanta Alumni Association.

After college, from 1962 to 1964, Coverdell served as an officer in the United States Army. He was stationed in Japan, Korea, and Taiwan.

Upon completion of his service, Coverdell returned to Atlanta and joined with his parents to form Coverdell & Company, a small Atlanta insurance agency. With hard work and forward thinking, Coverdell and his family built the small agency into a nationwide, multi-million dollar marketer of insurance and financial services.

Coverdell said building a business from scratch was "a challenge that made me understand how great it is to be an American."
Coverdell took charge of the business on his parents' retirement, becoming President of Coverdell & Company and, later, Chairman of the Board.

elieving strongly that "everyday working and business people owe a duty to their country to actively participate in the government," Coverdell entered politics. In 1968, at the young age of 29, Coverdell ran for the State Senate in Fulton County. He lost narrowly to an entrenched incumbent, Senator Jack Hardy, but took the loss in stride. Two years later, he re-mounted the same horse, outworking and defeating Senator Hardy to become one of the pioneering Republican members of the Georgia State Senate.

Just as he emerged as a leader at the University of Missouri, Coverdell quickly rose to leadership in the State Senate. His colleagues quickly elected him Senate Republican Leader in 1974. Known as a thoughtful and substantive legislator, even as a member of the minority Republican Party, Coverdell was acknowledged as a force in the General Assembly.

At home, he built a strong political organization which made him virtually invulnerable to challenge. He then turned his energy toward transforming the Democrat-dominated Georgia into a genuine two-party state—a labor that would not be fully realized until his election to the United States Senate just last year.

In the late 1970s, Coverdell became acquainted with George Bush and signed on to help in his first campaign for President. As Bush's state chairman, Coverdell vigorously campaigned for Bush in his unsuccessful 1980 bid for the Republican nomination. But when the GOP's eventual nominee, Ronald Reagan, tapped Bush as his running mate, Coverdell went to work for the Reagan-Bush ticket with equal enthusiasm. In the same year, Coverdell also helped elect United States Senator Mack Mattingly, Georgia's first Republican member of the Senate since Reconstruction.

In 1985, midway through Ronald Reagan's administration, Coverdell became State Chairman of the Georgia Republican Party. With Senator Mattingly facing a tough reelection challenge the next year, it was a crucial time in the fledgling state party's history.

Coverdell put his considerable organization skills to work. Under Coverdell's leadership, and while he amazingly juggled his many responsibilities as a State Senator and Senate Republican Leader, Georgia Republicans raised record amounts of money and added scores of local and state elected officials. Nationwide, however, the 1986 elections were a major setback for the Republican Party. The party lost control of the Senate and one of the unfortunate casualties was Georgia's Mattingly, narrowly defeated by a liberal Congressman from Atlanta named Wyche Fowler.

Stepping down as State Chairman when his term expired in 1987, Coverdell again went to work for his old friend, George Bush, who was then gearing up for a second Presidential campaign. Coverdell accepted the chairmanship of Bush's Southern Steering Committee and, still a State Senator, took the lead nationwide in


organizing "Republican Legislators for George Bush."

weeping Georgia in both the Presidential Primary and General Election, George Bush won the White House in 1988. On taking office, the new President turned to his old friend, Paul Coverdell, to help govern the country. He asked Coverdell to serve as Director of the Peace Corps and, after confirmation by the Senate, Coverdell took the helm of this Kennedy-era agency. His contributions to the Peace Corps were profiled in *The Shield* in 1991.

Coverdell became Peace Corps Director during a pivotal period of America's foreign

policy. With the worldwide collapse of communism, the lifting of the Iron Curtain and the eventual dissolution of the Soviet Union, new opportunities were created for America to advance the cause of democracy. Sensing this vacuum, Coverdell helped redefine the agency's mission to serve the emerging democracies of Eastern Europe. He also internally revitalized the agency,

instituting tough new financial management systems.

As much as he enjoyed his time at the Peace Corps, Coverdell was to grow disenchanted with Washington. Like many Americans, he became frustrated with the gridlock that seemed to dominate the city. He saw the President's policies thwarted by a hostile congress and became convinced that many in Congress were simply out of touch with everyday America. After three years in Washington, Coverdell decided to leave the Bush Cabinet and return home to Georgia. Never one to quit, however, Coverdell announced his intention to come back, this time as a United States Senator from Georgia.

Coverdell launched his campaign for the Senate in October 1991. Despite a lifetime of public service and tireless work on behalf of the Republican Party, many political observers openly doubted Coverdell's ability to win. Some of his loudest skeptics were members of his own party, and in all, a total of four other Republicans would enter the Senate primary.

While Coverdell would lead his nearest opponent by ten points in the July 1992 primary, he fell short of the majority required by state law and was forced into a run-off. Three weeks later, Coverdell defied the skeptics once again, prevailing over the second-place finisher Bob Barr, a well-known former United States Attorney.

overdell now had a shot at his former foe, Wyche Fowler, but in an unsettling repeat of 1986, the national tide seemed to be turning against the Republicans. In 1988, George Bush had taken Georgia by storm with 60% of the vote. Polling in the late summer of 1992 showed Bush trailing Democrat Bill Clinton by double-digit margins. Coverdell's skeptics predicted he would lose in a landslide, brought down by the President he had labored so hard to elect.

Coverdell, however, never stopped to listen to the skeptics. Instead, he poured his energy into the campaign. Fowler, with a multi-million dollar war chest, went on the airwaves with a massive television buy, including personal attacks on Coverdell's family. Soon the two candidates were dueling on the airwaves.

George Bush would lose Georgia on November 3, 1992, receiving a scant 42% of the vote. Coverdell, however, survived, winning enough votes to force Fowler into an historic general election run-off. Coverdell's strong finish and the presence of a third-party candidate on the ballot denied Fowler a majority of the votes. Under an unusual law passed by Georgia Democrats in 1967 to squelch the fledgling GOP, a run-off election was held three weeks later.

"Chapter life gave all of us an opportunity as college students to confront and solve real life problems: how to allocate resources, manage budgets, organize events, and live cooperatively with a diverse group of people."

On Tuesday, November 24, two days before Thanksgiving, Coverdell defeated Fowler with 51% of the vote. He took the oath of office on January 5, 1993. He serves now on the Senate's Agriculture and Foreign Policy Committees.

A number of Phi Psis played roles in

Coverdell's election. Young Jeff Chesser, Georgia Alpha '90, who worked as a campaign assistant in the Coverdell headquarters, organized Phi Psi students and alumni to work on Coverdell's behalf. In the tradition of their Phi Psi forbearers whose help of Democrat Woodrow Wilson is chronicled in Volume II of *The Centennial History*, they wrote letters and raised funds to help in their fraternity brother's campaign.

Coverdell refuses to claim his election as a personal triumph. Instead, he views his victory "as another opportunity to serve" and notes how Phi Psi's teachings and traditions helped mold his view of service.

"Phi Kappa Psi was founded on the principle of serving others," Coverdell said. "In ministering to their fellow Jefferson College students during the great typhoid epidemic of 1852, our founders, Letterman and Moore, learned the

great joy of serving others. That lesson has stayed with me through life."

Coverdell notes there are many ways that Phi Psi brothers can serve others. "Some of us serve by volunteering at a local homeless shelter, joining the Peace Corps, or making a career out of military service," Coverdell said. "Still others make their sacrifice by entering the arena of politics."

Coverdell advises young Phi Psis: "Whatever your field of endeavor, remain true to your principles in both success and failure and never give up."

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





CLARENCE "BUD" COLEMAN KANSAS '29

Bud Coleman probably wouldn't like this story. It's meant to draw attention to his seemingly endless list of businesses, civic, and charitable activities, and Mr. Coleman had little

use for such public attention.

In fact, some of the groups who benefited from his time, money, and expertise had to plead with him to accept an award, while others resorted to deception, keeping an honor a secret until the last minute so he would show up.

Mr. Coleman — banker, investment manager, philanthropist, and tireless Wichita promoter — died Sunday afternoon, December 13, 1992.

Mr. Coleman was often referred to as "the quiet Coleman." His father, W. C., founded the Coleman Co. in 1899, and that firm provided Clarence Coleman with the first of three careers.

But he was equally well-known behind the scenes for his civic and philanthropic endeavors. He was one of the charter members of the Wichita Crime Commission and received its "12 Apostles of Justice" award two years ago. He also was instrumental in completing the Kansas Alpha fund raising project in 1991.

Despite attempts by Mr. Coleman and his brother Sheldon to take the company private, Coleman Co. was purchased by a New York investment banker in 1989 and removed from family control.

ARTHUR T. "PETE" TUFTS ARIZONA '47 (COLUMBIA '43)

The founding member of Arizona Alpha, Pete Tufts will be missed in the Tuscon community where he made his home for nearly 50 years. Pete was initiated at Columbia University in 1943, but severe asthma brought him to Tuscon in 1944 to attend the University of Arizona. It was there that Arizona Alpha was born.

He enjoyed an extensive career in advertising, public relations, radio, and television, working both on-air and behind-the-scenes. He won the Broadcast Achievement Award and many other accolades during his tenure. Pete was 68 years old.

When Phi Psi fails, it does so only in the absence of alumni interest, support, and guidance

Dear Brothers,

As Phi Psis and as good citizens, we have an obligation and a responsibility to our Fraternity and our country to help instill in our undergraduate brothers the ethics and values in which we believe, and which are so clearly described in our Ritual. We can do this by providing counseling, guidance, and support to our chapters which will permit undergraduates to develop in a positive and wholesome environment, as gentlemen of strong moral character and future leaders in their fields of endeavor.

Alumni support and involvement is the key to chapter success. When a chapter gets into difficulty only the chapter alumni and local alumni from other chapters can turn a deteriorating situation around and help undergraduates to succeed. This past year, four chapters were suspended, two for disciplinary reasons, and two as a result of dwindling numbers and inability to meet financial obligations. I am convinced that each of these suspensions could have been prevented with active, hands-on alumni support. The National Fraternity and Headquarters staff will help in any way possible, as it did in the above cases, with multiple visits by Educational Leadership Consultants and others. But in the end, it takes a dedicated, involved alumni advisory committee, house corporation, or other group to help sustain a chapter's growth.

The Executive Council and staff have taken several steps to enhance this support. The alumni advisory committee system is growing and working well in many chapters providing the chapter advisor with much-needed help. The EC approved a new advisor outreach program which will identify experienced chapter advisors as resources that newer advisors may call on for advice. The new Chapter Advisory Committee Resource Manual has been published and distributed. An alumni induction ceremony has been adopted to formally recognize the transition of graduating seniors to alumni status and to further confirm Phi Psi as a lifetime commitment and experience.

More alumni are getting involved and the payoff in many cases has been remarkable. Many chapters that were weak and getting weaker have turned around, and although many of them are not out of the woods yet, they are headed in the right direction. These include chapters at UCLA, Creighton, Washington & Jefferson, Akron, Ashland, Oklahoma, Illinois State, Minnesota, Mankato State, Monmouth, Temple, and Georgia. Several chapters still need advisors, including Akron, Minnesota, Allegheny, Cornell, Dickinson, Eastern New Mexico, Arizona, Oregon, Lafayette, and Michigan. If you live in any of these areas, call the chapter and offer your assistance. You will enjoy the experience and at the same time be able to help and positively influence many very worthy undergraduate brothers.

Your efforts really can make a difference. Get involved with your chapter or a nearby chapter. Come and participate in the Woodrow Wilson Leadership School in Indianapolis August 12–15. For those alumni now involved, on behalf of your undergraduate brothers and the Fraternity, I wish to personally thank you for your interest, dedication, and hard work. For those not now involved, join us! Come back to Phi Psi!



Loyola's interfraternity policies initially prevented the colony from meeting its membership quota because of closed rush. However, the colony was granted open rush in the fall of 1992. That semester, the colony initiated nine members, whose energy and new blood revived Louisiana Gamma's momentum. In the spring of 1993, Phi Psi had its best rush season ever, initiating 16

\$4,000 Ralph D. Daniel Leadership Award

C. J. McClanahan

C. J. McClanahan, *Indiana* '90, is about to embark on his next challenge: Indiana University Law School in Indianapolis. But based on his past performance, it shouldn't be a problem for this son of a former Archon (Gary McClanahan, *Nebraska* '59). C. J. was chosen to receive the Ralph D. Daniel Leadership Award this year for his outstanding achievements at Indiana Beta and in the Bloomington, Indiana community.

McClanahan served Indiana Beta in many capacities, including president, bylaws committee chair, grievance committee chair, rush chair, and newsletter editor. He also volunteered interfraternally, directing the Indiana University rush program during 1991.

On campus, McClanahan was known for his involvement with the Volunteer Students Bureau and the IU Student Association. At the same time, McClanahan's presidency of the Order of Omega

brought many improvements including a seat for the organization on the President's Round Table. He also served on the United Way Steering Committee and volunteered at St. Paul's Catholic Church.

Throughout all of his endeavors, he managed to maintain a 3.5 GPA in his political science major at IU. McClanahan's long-term goals include working in the state's attorneys'

office with an eye toward becoming a district attorney.

McClanahan's admirers on campus include Jane Campaigne, IU's Interfra-

ternity Council and Order of Omega advisor, who writes "Mr. McClanahan is a strong, effective leader; positive and decisive in problem solving with foresight and depth of character beyond his birth years." And John Buck, *Indiana* '75, Indiana Beta's advisor and an Endow-

ment Fund Trustee, describes his work as "electrifying." Under McClanahan's leadership, Buck says the chapter has become "a concerned, thinking, considerate group of men who balance their academic, civic, & social activities..."

The Ralph D. Daniel Leadership Award is granted annually, thanks to the generosity of an anonymous donor, to an undergraduate Phi Psi who best displays outstanding lead-

ership skills in his chapter, on his campus, and in his community. The award is named for Mr. Phi Psi, Dud Daniel, *Arizona '47*, who has faithfully served the Fraternity for nearly 50 years.

Daniel was recruited right out of college to join the Fraternity Headquarters staff as assistant to the Fraternity's first executive, Dab Williams, *Illinois '06*. Daniel went on to become the Fraternity's second executive director, editor of *The Shield*, and a trustee of the Endowment Fund. Brother Daniel's theory of fraternity is simple: "Let us be what we say we are — a fraternity, not a club, run by men, not boys, and based on ideals, not expediency."



\$1,500 Maurice J. Warnock Scholarship

He has paid his own way through college, maintained a 3.3 GPA, served on numerous Oregon Alpha committees and in several elected offices, and even organized a weekly chapter Bible study group. But those are just some of the reasons Brian Gulka, *Oregon '91*, is this year's Maurice I. Warnock scholar.

Gulka also volunteers his time as a leader in Young Life, where he will have the option of working full-time upon graduation, and has considered a life in the ministry.

But he looks forward to attending graduate school in physical therapy so he can "continue serving people throughout [his] lifetime." He plans to receive a bachelor's degree in June of 1994 with two concentrations: exercise & movement science and political science.

In his second year as chapter advisor to Illinois Epsilon at Illinois State University in Normal, David McDonald, Beloit '82, values the

The Dangers of Drink

FOREWARNED

When I first came to RIT, I was very worried about how others would react to the fact that I do not drink. We go to school for one basic reason (an education... remember?) and some people are more adept at handling it than others. In the long run, observing others has helped me to feel more justified in my decision not to drink.

I still do not understand how college students (and a great many Americans in general) can surrender themselves to the lure of alcohol. Moreover, how can a person get behind the wheel of an automobile after "one too many" and put all that they have worked for in jeopardy, not to mention jeopardizing anyone else who might be on the road. Can there be such a thing as a 'situational alcoholic' whose behavior is resultant from a college environment conducive to drinking? Can a student overcome his or her 'temporary' alcoholic tendencies after graduation?


I come from a predominantly alcoholic family, which in large part is the reason I choose not to drink. I have never been drunk and do not understand the experience of being drunk. Since I like to observe, I thought my questions and curiositites were answerable through photography. To be honest, I don't know if my questions were answered by this collection of photographs. I hope they can help you answer some of your own questions about the basic philosophies behind the consumption of alcohol.

I believe this essay raises more questions for its subjects, society at large, and you, the reader, than it helps to answer. I only hope you can look these photographs in the eye and try to answer them.

"Sometimes when I think about [the possibility of becoming an alcoholic], I think 'ves' but in the past I've been able to refrain. It scares me and I don't want to look into it because I really don't want to know. If I know that I am then I will just accept that I am. When the time comes, I will make myself not accept the fact that I am an alcoholic because I have priorities."

"Alcohol relaxes me... it slows down the mind. It makes me laugh on the inside and that's something I don't do a lot of."



"If I'm really in a drunken state, l usually express what's on my mind at the time... good or bad. I haven't had a really close girlfriend in two years... sometimes I'll really put my foot in my mouth [when drunk]. You're always afraid of striking out but it usually works out. I'm not just out to score, my goal is to talk to girls. You're always searching."




"I've been so lucky, I don't know, it must be luck... there's a lot of tricks to [driving drunk]. You don't hold the wheel so tight and you know your reaction time is going to be slow; you've got to prepare yourself. Before I get behind the wheel, there's all sorts of little tests I do to find out how bad I

might be. I do the old 'check in the mirror to see how bad the eves are.' Most of the time they're barely open, but I try to see how white they are. I always carry eyedrops in the car. If I feel really bad I'll get rid of the beer that's in my hand... it takes away from the concentration that I'm able to have. ¶ You think about what

you did the day after going down I-390 blitzed at 80 miles an hour. chasing each other... no matter what anyone tells you, it doesn't seem to register. Me, I just want to get through my last year [of school]. I've made it this far and it's looking more and more stupid because I keep chancing ¶ I've had people in the car

with me while driving and said 'How's it feel to drive with a drunk person?' and they've flipped out. I usually show them the secret for driving with double vision... if you close one eye, there will always be one line that always stays there so you follow that

line. You don't always want to close one eye or you might fall asleep. With quadruple vision, you've got four lines, if you close one eye you'll find two lines and just driving so many times with double vision you can follow. It's not good."



gets trapped in my throat. It's hard to believe I was this same person one year ago. When the article first came out [in the RIT Reporter of March 27, 1992], it was a shock to everyone at school and in the chapter. 'Situational alcoholism' became the topic of discussion campus wide. ¶ What wasn't really considered a problem had suddenly become the center of one. People had to deal with it in their own ways. Letters poured into the editor describing me as selfish, inconsiderate, and a bastard. Harassment from local authorities became a major scare and a major sight into reality. ¶ Everyone in the room drinking has a different reason for doing so. For one person, it may be to relax, for another it may be to waste time. For some, it may be to escape how they feel inside (depression, rejection, or anxiety). Whatever the reason, any problems you have before you decide to drink will still be there when you sober up. It is important to realize that in the head of the moment, you may lose your integrity by unwilled actions which, sadly, you may not even become aware of until sobriety. ¶ Since the day these photos were taken, I've become afraid to drink excessively... to the point where I might lose control. I am afraid of my actions if I were to lose control. Waking up in my car six miles from my home in my underwear, not knowing how I got there, does not amuse me anymore. ¶ Changing your habits or patterns isn't always as easy as it seems. I am happy I can reflect back and compare. Today, I am glad to say, I can thank God and thank the brotherhood for opening my eyes and being supportive. I have a whole new life full of new goals and new challenges. I am happy to wake up in the morning and say "I'm proud to be a Phi Psi."

FPILOGUE

Early on the morning of Friday, October 25, 1991, 20 year-old RIT student Kevin Smith died in a one-car accident on Rush-Scottsville Road in Rush, New York, near Rochester. The Monroe County Sheriff's Office reported that the alcohol-related car crash occurred at about 2:30 a.m. when Smith, traveling west, lost control of his 1985 GMC truck.

He crossed the center line, ran between a tree and a telephone pole, and sped across four lawns before he slammed into the house located at 629 Rush-Scottsville Road. Smith made no attempt to slow down as his truck knocked the house three inches off its foundation.

Trapped in the truck, it took rescue workers 20 minutes to free Smith. He was taken to Strong Memorial Hospital and died shortly after 6 a.m. The Monroe County Medical Examiner's Office said he died of severe head trauma. Sheriff's deputies are continuing their investigation.

Kevin Smith was a sophomore majoring in food, hotel, and travel management and a member of Phi Delta Theta Fraternity.

FIPG RISK MANAGEMENT POLICY

The Risk Management Policy of the Fraternity Insurance Purchasing Group includes the provisions that follow and shall apply to all fraternity entities and all levels of fraternity membership.

ALCOHOL AND DRUGS

The possession, use, and/or consumption of alcoholic beverages while on chapter premises, during an official fraternity event, or in any situation sponsored or endorsed by the chapter, must be in compliance with any and all applicable laws of the state, county, city, and university.

No alcoholic beverages may be purchased through the chapter treasury nor may the purchase of same for members or guests be undertaken or coordinated by any member in the name of or on behalf of the chapter. The purchase and/or use of a bulk quantity of such alcoholic beverage (e.g., kegs) is prohibited.

No chapter members, collectively or individually, shall purchase for, serve to, or sell alcoholic beverages to any minor (*i.e.* those under the age of 21).

The possession, sale, and/or use of any illegal drugs or controlled

substances at any chapter house, sponsored event, or at any event that an observer would associate with the fraternity, is strictly prohibited.

No chapter may co-sponsor an event with an alcohol distributor, charitable organization, or tavern (tavern defined as an establishment generating more than half of annual gross sales from alcohol) where alcohol is given away, sold, or otherwise provided to those present.

No chapter may co-sponsor or co-finance a function where alcohol is purchased by any of the host chapters, groups, or organizations.

All rush activities associated with any chapter will be dry rush functions.

Open parties where alcohol is present, meaning those with unrestricted access by non-members of the fraternity, without specific invitation, shall be prohibited.

No member shall permit, tolerate, encourage, or participate in "drinking games."

No alcohol shall be present at any pledge program or activity of the chapter.

HAZING

No chapter shall conduct hazing

activities. Hazing activities are defined as: Any action taken or situation created, intentionally, whether on or off fraternity premises, to produce mental or physical discomfort, embarrassment, harassment, or ridicule.

Such activities may include but are not limited to the following: use of alcohol; paddling in any form; creation of excessive fatigue; physical and psychological shocks; quests, treasure hunts, scavenger hunts, road trips, or any other such activities carried on outside or inside of the confines of the chapter house; wearing of public apparel which is conspicuous and not normally in good taste; engaging in public stunts and buffoonery; morally degrading or humiliating games and activities; and any other activities which are not consistent with fraternal law, ritual, or policy, or the regulations and policies of the educational institution.

SEXUAL ABUSE

The Fraternity will not tolerate or condone any form of sexually abusive behavior on the part of its members, whether physical, mental, or emotional. This is to include any actions that are demeaning to

women, including but not limited to date rape, gang rape, or verbal harassment.

FIRE, HEALTH, AND SAFETY

All chapter houses shall, prior to, during, and following occupancy, meet all local fire and health codes and standards.

All chapters must have emergency numbers for fire, police, and ambulance posted by common phones. Also, all chapters must have evacuation routes from chapter house common areas posted in these areas and on the back of the door of each sleeping room.

All chapters shall comply with engineering recommendations as reported by the insurance company.

The possession and/or use of firearms or explosive devices of any kind within the confines and premises of the chapter house is expressly forbidden.

EDUCATION

Each student member and pledge shall be instructed annually on the Risk Management Policy of the Fraternity Insurance Purchasing Group.

The chapter charter of the Pennsylvania Eta Chapter at Franklin and Marshall College was suspended on April 27, 1993 for continued and repeated violations for the Fraternity's risk management policies. This followed on the heels of the chapter's appearance before the Executive Council at its March 20 meeting where representatives gave assurances that all Fraternity policies would be followed. The Executive Council mandated that further violations would result in immediate suspension of the chapter charter.

A special visit to the chapter was made on April 26 at the request of the chapter advisor. An investigation and interviews with members and pledges revealed that the chapter was continuing to violate Fraternity policies, specifically in the areas of Fraternity Education and alcohol use.

Pennsylvania Eta was the 14th chapter in Phi Kappa Psi having been granted a charter on April 2, 1860. The chapter had been in continuous existence since it was installed. In its 133-year history, Penn Eta initiated 1,172 men.

The Franklin and Marshall College administration withdrew recognition of the Greek system in 1988. Therefore, alumni support is crucial to the success of any chapter on the F & M campus. Chapter Advisor Harry Rolfe, Arizona'60, is organizing area alumni now to assist a reorganized Penn Eta. Reorganization efforts cannot commence until a core group of alumni have been identified to give ongoing support to the chapter. Alumni Associations and clubs that once involved hundreds of area alumni are having difficulty bringing more than a few together for social and special occasions, and involvement on house corporations and advisory committees for chapters is lagging. Our undergraduates list alumni affairs programming as one of their most serious concerns and challenges, and expansion to new undergraduate campuses has slowed without the active support of alumni in the areas of potential new campuses.

There are a number of reasons given for these changes, but most involve the fact that the world is a very different place these days. In the first hundred years of Phi Kappa Psi our members had a number of challenges to deal with; civil and world wars, the Great Depression, political upheavals, etc. Nonetheless, alumni and undergraduates stood proud and worked together to meet and conquer those events.

In the last 40 years, however, it seems that the challenges have been more divisive than incorporating. The student movement of the late 1960s and early 1970s sent a message that conservative organizations like fraternities were dead. During this decade, membership in fraternities dropped drastically and a number of groups closed. In the late 1970s and early 1980s, attitudes swung in the opposite extreme. Having a good time became the highest priority and the movie *Animal House* was seen as a model, rather than a parody, by too many students. Where are we now?...

A popular speaker to greeks at universities and colleges across the nation, asks students in his audience to raise their hands if they can answer "yes" to any one of a number of questions he reads out. The questions ask whether the students have experienced such things as the divorce or separation of parents, a sexual assault or rape, alcohol abuse by parent, physical or sexual abuse by parent, etc. Hands remain down until all questions are read and then the speaker says, "raise your hands." At that point almost three-fourths of those in attendance will normally raise their hands.

College students today have had more traumatic experiences during their formative years than almost any previous student population. They experience more crises, more violence, and more challenges to what many of us would consider a "normal" upbringing than ever before. College administrators know that this "excess baggage" makes it very difficult for students to relate to each other and to the world around them. What does all this have to do with Phi Kappa Psi? Plenty!

As with every challenge, there is an opportunity. Never has there been a time when college students more needed the kind of support fraternity can provide. Whether the nurturing environment of a chapter of brothers, the leadership and strength of an alumnus mentor, or the "safety net" of a fraternity experience which helps catch a man when he fails and helps him learn from his mistakes, Phi Psi can help young men to develop strong values. In fact, the Fraternity *is* a value system, espoused through our Ritual and modeled by our actions and it has never been more important than now.

The point is that now is the time for all alumni to rededicate themselves—to come back—to Phi Kappa Psi. We're doing great things to prepare for the 150th anniversary of our founding and we want you to be a part. No longer should you say, "I was a Phi Psi." You are a Phi Psi and we want you to be able to enjoy the Brotherhood once more. Here's what we're going to do to help...

Our goals for the year 2002 are as follows:

- 2000+ alumni active with our chapters as advisors and house corporation members and with the Fraternity as national and regional volunteers.
- An alumni association in every city/area where there are more than 400 members.
- An alumni club in every city/area where there are more than 200 members.
- Alumni groups who will help Phi Kappa Psi expand to new campuses in their areas.
- A network of leaders and authorities in various professions, as resources for chapters and alumni groups.
- A career network to help new graduates circulate their resumes and to help brothers relocate or find new and better positions.
- A network to welcome alumni new to communities and identify alumni and services which might be of use to them.
- The completion of a capital campaign which will result in a substantial growth of the Endowment Fund and allow a number of new services to chapters and alumni.

n preparation for reaching these goals, the first steps have been the purchase of a new membership management system for the national Head-quarters and the creation of a staff position to work with alumni services and support. Together these steps begin the creation of a new alumni support program which will make our goals attainable. Within a year we will have better information, which will be more easily accessed and shared than ever before. Chapters and alumni groups will be better able to communicate with their alumni.

Alumni support resources will be improved to offer our associations and clubs more and better options for events and activities. Instruction guides and "boilerplate" programs will be developed for alumni newsletters, Founders Day ceremonies, homecomings, and special chapter celebrations. We will also be considering programs which will be open to alumni all across the nation. Such events as cruises and special tours may be arranged, as well as interesting cultural or social evenings in various cities.

Most exciting is a focus to renew the concept that Phi Kappa Psi lasts a lifetime. Current materials will be updated and new ones are in process to educate pledges, undergraduate initiates and alumni. A keystone of this program is a new ceremony of the Fraternity. This ritual will mark the transition from undergraduate to alumni and underscore the fulfillment and reward of continuing activity in the Fraternity. To be used as a senior ceremony, or for alumni who wish to recommit themselves, the ceremony is meant to be private, but not secret, and can be attended by family, friends, and faculty.

What can you do? Contact your local alumni group or chapter (see the directory on page 39–40). Tell them that you wish to be involved. Answer requests for information as we update all our alumni files in our new membership management system, and call-in address and phone number changes so your chapter will know how you may be contacted. If there is not an alumni association or club near you, consider starting one. An alumni club requires only 5 individuals, an association only 15, and the Headquarters can provide you with a list of alumni in your area. It only takes one or two dedicated individuals to get a group up and running.

If there is no chapter near you, but there are some campuses where Phi Psi might make a positive impact on the greek system, contact the Headquarters and discuss the possibility of colonization. Phi Psi is always looking for good campuses at which to expand, but we also know that no colonization will be successful without an active alumni group in the area to advise and support the group once men are recruited and a colony established.

Attend local events or activities and renew old friendships—be the example to undergraduates that membership never ends. Make it a point to attend a Grand Arch Council or Woodrow Wilson Leadership School. They aren't just for undergraduates! Finally, whether or not you do anything else, take an hour on some quiet, contemplative day and consider how the Fraternity has affected your life. What were the lessons you learned? How were you enriched? Who are/were your closest friends? Then pick up the phone and call one of your brothers to say hello and recall some great memories.

Every generation of undergraduate is different from that before, but the continuity we have all enjoyed is the Brotherhood of Phi Kappa Psi. Our goal and mission is to support the strongest possible experience for our members. To the extent that we reach our potential as leaders, citizens, fathers, husbands and men, we honor the Fraternity and all fraternities. Toward that end, we invite you to "come back to Phi Psi" and help us to offer that experience to the generations to come! •

A former Fraternity president and the most recent past president of the Ancient Order of the S.C., Webb Mize will be mourned by many Phi Psis. He died Saturday, June 12, in Gulfport, Mississippi at the age of 83.

Webb was a charter member of Mississippi Alpha when the chapter was re-founded in 1930. He attended 23 Grand Arch Councils between 1938 and 1990 and was inducted into the Ancient Order of the S.C. in 1958.

He served the Fraternity nationally as attorney general and vice president, and was elected SWGP in 1960.

He is survived by his wife, Virginia, winner of the Ladies Silver Bowl at the 1972 GAC. He has a son, George, Ole Miss '85 (Florida State '62) and a daughter, Nancy, and two grandchildren. An attorney by profession, he was the senior partner in the Gulfport firm of Mize, Thompson, and Blass.

◆ National Happenings

Constitution, Bylaws, & Rules Updates

Find out the specifics of recent amendments to the Fraternity's chief governing documents.

t the 66th Grand Arch Council last August in San Francisco, more that sixty amendments to the Fraternity's Constitution, Bylaws, and Rules were proposed. The proposals ranged in scope from eliminating the Unit Rule to removing the requirement that undergraduates wear the Fraternity badge when attired in "street clothing," whatever that might be these days.

While the Unit Rule remained intact by an overwhelming majority, a number of changes were made. The amendments are described below; the exact language can be found in the updated copies of the Constitution, Bylaws, and Rules which were circulated last fall.

Article I, Section 3, Clause 4 of the Bylaws was amended to allow chapters to initiate pledges prior to the completion of one term's course work provided that have not received notice of any grade lower than a "C" or its equivalent. Candidates who have completed one term's work still must earn grades acceptable for graduation from his particular institution.

Section 4 of Article I was created and requires Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity, Inc. to hold an annual meeting in accordance with the Indiana Nonprofit Corporation Act.

Some language was cleaned up in the following areas to be more consistent: Article III, Section 1, Clauses 1, 2, and 3; Section 6, Clauses 9 and 10; and Article IV, Section 4, Clause 5, Paragraph C; Section 5, Clause 5. Other than the grammatical corrections, no substantive changes were made to these areas.

Article IV, Section 5, Clause 14 of the Bylaws had language added that limits colony status to two years with the option for a one-year extension if circumstances warrant such an exception.

Article VI, Section 7, Clause 7 was created and states that the Chapter Advisor shall receive

copies of all correspondence prepared for the Executive Council by Fraternity staff pertaining to the chapter he advises.

Article XI was renamed to create Fraternity Law with respect to colonies. Four sections addressing Terms, Support, Advisor, and Staff Recommendations were created. The "old" Article XI was renumbered as Article XII and so on through the "new" Article XVI.

Article XIV, formerly Article XIII, Section 2, Clauses 2 and 3, and Section 3 were amended to increase the initiation fee from \$185 to \$210. The increase went into effect on January 1, 1993 for all initiates pledged to the Fraternity after January 1, 1993.

The renumbered Article XV, Section 9, was created to prohibit the "slating" of candidates for elected office through the use of a "nominating committee." Any such appointed committee is limited in authority to compiling nominations and verifying the requisites of each candidate for office.

Article II, Section 1 of the Rules requiring undergraduates to wear the Fraternity badge when attired in street clothes was rescinded.

roposed amendments to the Constitution, Bylaws, and Rules must be submitted in writing to the Attorney General at least 60 days prior to any Grand Arch Council. An affirmative vote of at least two-thirds of the organizations present at the GAC and entitled to vote is required for a proposed amendment to become Fraternity Law.

Proposed amendments that are not filed by the 60-day cutoff require a unanimous affirmative vote for passage. The next sixty-seventh Grand Arch Council will convene at the Omni Hotel in Charleston, South Carolina on August 10–14, 1994.

President's Message



Dear Brothers.

It is a privilege and a pleasure to report to you in this Annual Report issue of *The Shield* that Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity is healthy and thriving. We have been very fortunate during this past year to have benefitted from the energy and enthusiasm of a very hard working and talented group of elected and appointed officers. They have made my job thoroughly enjoyable and accomplished a great deal. Many of these accomplishments are highlighted later in this issue of *The Shield*.

I am also delighted to report to you that Terry Harper, your Executive Director, and his entire staff have shown themselves to be totally devoted to improving and strengthening Phi Kappa Psi. They work long hours on behalf of the chapters and the Fraternity and deserve your support and gratitude. I assure you they have earned the unqualified confidence and respect of myself and the Executive Board. The addition of Tom Pennington to the staff as Coordinator of Alumni and Insurance Services has been particularly beneficial as we are now able to place more emphasis on these vital areas and plan on many initiatives to enhance the lifelong Phi Psi experience.

Financially, Phi Psi is operating on a sound business basis. Despite the one-year deficit (paper loss) shown in the General and Insurance Funds, both funds enjoy a strong, solid cash position. The one-time loss results from a carefully considered decision of the Executive Council to more accurately reflect Fraternity finances and to treat all chapters both equally and fairly by identifying those chapters with aged debts which are considered to be doubtful accounts. It is not our intent to forgive any past debts since many chapters have worked diligently and sacrificed a great deal to pay in full those past due obligations accrued by their alumni. The effect of this action, which was recommended by our independent auditors and is good accounting practice, is that it reduces the amount of accounts receivable which appear as current assets in the balance sheet to create a more accurate reflection of the Fraternity's net worth.

Despite the regrettable suspensions of three chapters during the report year, you should take pride, as I do, in the accomplishments of the 91 remaining chapters: two chapters have been removed from probation by their host institutions; several weak and faltering chapters have been revived through dedicated undergraduate effort and rejuvenated alumni support and are now growing stronger; on April 24, Louisiana Gamma was installed at Loyola University in New Orleans; overall membership is up, despite more difficult recruiting climates; scholarship continues to improve with 5 chapters enjoying first place on their campuses; alumni interest and support is growing. All in all it has been a great year for Phi Kappa Psi!

Securing the future of Phi Kappa Psi through strategic planning was a top priority during the 1990–92 biennium, and great progress was made toward that goal. The current Executive Council, under the leadership of President Richard E. Ong, *Oregon State* '55, has also adopted that philosophy and continues to build on the foundation that was laid for it.


You will be receiving periodic reports in *The Shield* on the progress of the Fraternity's strategic planning efforts; the first appeared in the July 1993 issue with the presentation the Fraternity's Mission and Vision Statements.

The Annual Report you are about to read will provide you with all the facts and figures of the Fraternity's 1993 fiscal year that ran from June 1, 1992 through May 31, 1993. Just as important as reporting what happened, we hope you will get a feel for the direction in which the Fraternity is headed.

We constantly put out the call for your support and involvement in Phi Kappa Psi... this year is no different. We have again listed the Homecoming dates for all our chapters on the back cover. Please plan a trip to your chapter this fall to see how it's doing and to offer your assistance. And remember, the continued success of Phi Kappa Psi depends on YOU!

CHAPTER SERVICES

To best serve its members, Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity dedicates a great deal of time and effort to its 91 undergraduate chapters and one colony. With the aim of meeting individual chapter needs through education and leadership development, chapter services takes many forms. These range from various on-site consultations and retreat facilitation, to furnishing various publications and information packets for the chapters.



Preparations for each Educational Leadership Consultant visit begin many weeks in advance of arrival. To evaluate the "bigger picture" of each undergraduate group, an ELC typically meets with chapter advisors, university administrators, house corporation officers as well as the chapter leaders. Through personal interaction and group presentations, Educational Leadership Consultants educate and inform. All told, Fraternity staff members made 141 chapter visits in the past year including attendance at three regional interfraternity conferences.

Undergraduate Membership

Membership reporting continues to be a challenge for Phi Psi's undergraduate chapters. While Fraternity law states that initiates must be properly reported with all fees remitted to the Headquarters immediately after initiation, many chapters pledge and initiate men without collecting the fees in advance or spend the fees to meet other chapter obligations. This breach of fiduciary duty causes long delays for new members to receive their badge, certificates, and life subscription to *The Shield*. The Fraternity staff has placed special emphasis on getting chapters "caught up" during this past year. While tremendous progress has been made, this area of chapter operations needs constant attention.

During the year under review, June 1, 1992 through May 31, 1993, 1,566 members were reported and entered onto the Grand Membership Roll representing a 25% increase over the previous year, a welcome success in light of the significant nationwide decline of the pool for traditional fraternity candi-



dates. Pledges to the Fraternity were down just 3%, totalling 1,664.

Our success can be attributed, in part, to a renewed emphasis on continuous member recruitment at all levels of the Fraternity. Chapter members know firsthand that their immediate survival is dependent on the ability to recruit honorable men. Some Phi Psi Districts have organized special conferences to exchange tactics on rush. The Fraternity staff, too, has directed additional attention toward rush. Visible assistance includes special Educational Leadership Consultant visits utilizing rush videos and publications developed by the National Interfraternity Conference.

The average size of a Phi Kappa Psi chapter in 1993 stood at 45 members. The "average" chapter pledged just over 18 men and initiated 17 of them for an impressive retention rate of 94%.

As we look to the future, our Fraternity plans for continued growth. As of May 31, 1993, the total number of initiates in the Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity since founding is 90,419.

Chapter Installations

Phi Kappa Psi granted its 132nd charter on April 24, 1993, with the installation of the Louisiana Gamma chapter at Loyola University in New Orleans. The 44 new initiates of Phi Kappa Psi have demonstrated the character and determination expected of Phi Psis. The Fraternity is proud of its newest chapter.

The men of the Illinois Zeta colony at DePaul University have recently submitted a petition to the Executive Council of Phi Kappa Psi in hopes of being installed this fall. At 28 men strong, the colony is ready to assume its place in Phi Kappa Psi. As its August 12, 1993 meeting, the Executive Council gave unanimous approval to the Illinois Zeta petition. An October 9 installation date has been set and all alumni and undergraduates, especially those in the Chicagoland area, are encouraged to attend.

Scholarship

The Fraternity's Bylaws stipulate that all chapters are required to maintain an average at least equal to the all—men's average at their institution of higher learning, or in excess of a 2.5 (on a 4.0 base), whichever is higher. Moreover, it is incumbent upon each chapter officer to personally achieve that average, thereby demonstrating a personal commitment to academic achievement.

Among all fraternities on their campus, five chapters have distinguished themselves by attaining the number one spot for chapter cumulative grade point average: Indiana Zeta at Butler, North Carolina Alpha at Duke, Ohio Beta at Wittenberg, Pennsylvania Beta at Allegheny, and Pennsylvania Gamma at Bucknell.

Chapters Closed

Three chapters were closed during the report year: Delaware Alpha, New Jersey Alpha, and Texas Gamma. Since May 31, one additional chapter, Pennsylvania Eta, was closed, but it was removed from suspension at the August 12 Executive Council meeting. For complete details on the suspension, please see the July 1993 issue of *The Shield*.

Expansion

As the first national fraternity founded with the idea of spreading to institutions of across the country, Phi Psi is ever seeking to expand her domain to outstanding colleges and universities. Immediate plans include the colonization of San Diego State University in September. At that time, Fraternity staff, in conjunction with the newly formed San Diego Alumni Association, will recruit the men to form our newest colony.

ALUMNI AFFAIRS

"Come back to Phi Psi" is the phrase that best describes the year in alumni relations. Phi Kappa Psi has truly committed itself to helping alumni become re-involved in the Fraternity and making that experience more rewarding. As it is our alumni who comprise the vast majority of membership, a new program of support and service to alumni is being created.

First and foremost among the components of this program is the creation of a new alumni ceremony. Created by an *ad hoc* committee of the Executive Council, the ceremony seeks to mark the transition into alumnus status while reaffirming the importance of continued support and involvement. The ceremony has already been used at several chapters, and has received a great deal of positive response. Plans call for the ceremony to be offered at regional and national events and conferences, to allow all alumni the chance to experience this new ceremony.

As further evidence of renewed interest in alumni, the Executive Council approved the creation of a Coordinator of Alumni and Insurance Services position as a resource and support person for alumni associations and clubs and to help coordinate the new alumni relations program components (see *The Shield*, July 1993). First to serve Phi Psi in this capacity is Tom Pennington, *Texas* '80.

Among services already available, the Chapter Advisory Committee Resource Manual was completed and mailed to all current chapter advisors. This manual is the culmination of over a year of effort by a number of experienced chapter advisors and volunteers and includes sections for each advisory committee position. Response to the manual has been very good and updates are planned for the future, to implement recommendations which have been submitted.

The advisory committee program itself is gaining in popularity. Several chapters adopted the committee structure this year and those who have used the committee approach for some time are enjoying the benefits. It is the goal of the Fraternity that every chapter will have such a committee within the next biennium and alumni are encouraged to contact the Fraternity Headquarters or their nearby chapters to offer their assistance.

Approved and in process is an outreach program for chapter advisors so that long-term, experienced advisors can serve as resources to other advisors in their areas. Helping groups to form and train Advisory Committees and acting as "mentors" so that younger advisors may benefit from their experience, these men will be a valuable resource. As further support, a directory has been created that will provide contact information for all alumni volunteers, as well as identify areas of expertise with regard to advising or housing duties.

An inventory is being done to document those alumni associations and clubs that exist, identify the programming they do, and gather information on the most successful programs. This information will help us to create a "model" program which will be avail-

able to all alumni groups. Such things as Founders Day "kits" and boilerplate alumni programs will be a priority and will benefit alumni groups as well as chapter alumni relations programs.

Finally, a new membership management system has been approved and has been installed at the Head-quarters. This system will allow us to keep larger and more accurate records of alumni and will assist us to better serve alumni groups and chapters with data. Further, demographics are being run to determine where our alumni are located. From such data, we will be able to target areas for alumni programming, match alumni groups and chapters, coordinate a career network, and set goals for expansion projects.

Alumni have never been more important to our chapters or our Fraternity. New services, new equipment, new programs, and new staff all will combine to give Phi Kappa Psi one of the best alumni relations programs in the fraternity world. If you have been supportive in the past, we thank you. If you have ceased any activity within the Fraternity, we invite you to "come back" to Phi Kappa Psi.

INSURANCE AND RISK MANAGEMENT

The goal of Phi Psi's insurance and risk management program continues to be that of preventing losses and reducing the risks to our members and friends. This is done through a combination of education, support resources, risk management policies, and insurance coverage which continues to grow. The health and safety of our members is the primary concern of the program. In addition, the program protects the loyal volunteers supporting the Fraternity in advisor, house corporation, and other elected and appointed offices, while they are acting within the scope of their duties.

Phi Kappa Psi was the first fraternity to form an insurance cooperative in the early '80s and we continue as a member of the Fraternity Insurance Purchasing Group (FIPG). This risk management consortium includes 37 men's and women's groups, with several other groups adopting the risk management policies of FIPG as their own. In total, over 60% of all men's and women's chapters in the nation are covered under the policies of this risk management association. Phi Psi's Executive Director, Terry Harper, currently serves as the Director of Monitoring and Enforcement on the FIPG board of directors.

Participation in Phi Psi's insurance program is mandatory for all chapters and house corporations. Through 100% participation, we have been able to guarantee the highest possible coverage with the lowest possible cost. Currently, the property program insures more than \$30 million in Phi Kappa Psi—owned land, buildings, and belongings. The liability insurance program has grown in coverage to offer a \$5 million aggregate (up from \$3 million a year ago).

Some highlights of the 1992–93 insurance program include:

- Liability coverage provided by Mt. Hawley Insurance Company, a subsidiary of RLI Corporation.
- Primary liability coverage of \$1 million per location per year, and excess coverage of \$4 million per location per year, for an aggregate of \$5 million per location.

- For the second year in a row, we have been able to self-insure the general policy's \$100,000 per year deductible amount.
- Property coverage underwritten by Ætna Life and Casualty.
- Risk management seminars were presented to all chapters and colonies during Educational Leadership Consultant visits.
- Phi Psi became a member of a new risk management consortium whose first project is a videotape for risk management workshops. Copies will be carried by Educational Leadership Consultants and will be sent to all chapters when classes resume in the fall.
- The Headquarters staff has grown to include a Coordinator of Alumni and Insurance Services.
 This individual will be a programming and support resource to all chapters and house corporations.
- Risk management manuals were distributed to every chapter President, Social Chair, Advisor and House Corporation President.
- Phi Psi's risk management newsletter, The Sentry, was published for the third year and continues to receive support and accolades as an outstanding risk management resource.

Our risk management program has become a major component of Phi Psi's focus to encourage a more positive experience within our chapters and to support concerns for the health and safety of our members. As with any such program, however, it is the members of our groups, both alumni and undergraduates, who are the factors critical to its success. Through their support and concern, we may have the good fortune not have to use the coverage we enjoy.

PUBLICATIONS

With this annual report issue, *The Shield of Phi Kappa Psi* begins a second year with its new look and its rededication to providing timely, interesting, and relevant information for the Fraternity's alumni. Publication of *The Shield* has now stabilized on a quarterly schedule which will continue for the foreseeable future. As the Fraternity's main vehicle for communication with alumni, *The Shield* has taken some new directions recently — publishing consolidated financial statements for the Fraternity and the Endowment Fund in last year's well–received Annual Report is one example. Indeed, the content of *The Shield* is constantly being re-evaluated to ensure that the most possible useful information is included among the magazine's pages.

More than just *The Shield*, though, Phi Psi's publications run the gamut from Educational Leadership

Consultant resource materials to holiday greeting cards. The next year promises some significant challenges as both the *Ritual and Ceremonies of Phi Kappa Psi* and *The Manual of Phi Kappa Psi* come due for revising and reprinting. Additionally, specialized newsletters will continue to appear periodically, including *The Roundtable* for chapter advisors and advisory committee members, *The Sentry* for risk management concerns, and *The Areopagus* for chapter officers and leaders.

FRATERNITY HEADQUARTERS

Heritage Hall is the name given to Phi Kappa Psi's Headquarters and Museum. Located at 510 Lockerbie Street in Historic Lockerbie Square in downtown Indianapolis, Heritage Hall boasts an impressive collection of Fraternity memorabilia, as well as arts and antiquities dating back to the Victorian era of the mid to late 1800s. The Headquarters has been at its current location since June 1, 1978. Prior to that time,

the Headquarters was located in Cleveland. Phi Kappa Psi established a central office in 1930.

During the report year, the Fraternity managed its information with the assistance of an IBM System/36 minicomputer. While not state-of-the-art, the system did an adequate job in providing for the Fraternity's data processing and information management needs. Since July, however, Phi Kappa Psi has entered a new era with the installation of a PC network and all new software to process membership information. The Fraternity Management System (FMS), developed by B. R. Blackmarr & Associates of Dallas, will enhance Phi Psi's ability to serve members exponentially. The new system will allow chapters, and any member for that matter, with a modem to link up with the database to access mailing lists of alumni, etc. Appropriate security measures are in place to prevent abuses of the system. Statistics and reports that once took days and numerous man-hours to generate will now be available within hours at the touch of a few but-

The Fraternity Headquarters is manned by eleven dedicated staff members. The Headquarters staff exists to meet the needs of the members. Terry Harper, Oklahoma State '85, is beginning his fourth year as Executive Director. Terry has been on the staff since November 1, 1986, serving two years as an Educational Leadership Consultant, and one-year assign-

ments each as Director of Publications and Director of Chapter Services before being tapped as the chief staff officer. As Executive Director, Terry is reponsible for the smooth day-to-day operation of the Headqurters and for implementing Fraternity policy as established by the Grand Arch Council and Executive Council. Terry also serves as editor of *The Shield of Phi Kappa Psi*.

Serving with the Executive Director this report year has been Doug Pszczolkowski, Allegheny '87, as Director of Chapter Services. Like Terry, Doug spent two years in the field as an Educational Leadership Consultant before accepting his current post. Doug's responsibilities include management of the Educational Leadership Consultant program, overseeing membership reporting, and coordinating the Woodrow Wilson Leadership School. Tom Pennington, Texas '80, rejoined the Fraternity staff on February 1, filling the newly created position of Coordinator of Alumni and Insurance Services. In this role, Tom will work to develop new programs and

services for Phi Psi's more than 50,000 alumni. He will also coordinate the administrative responsibilities of the Fraternity's national insurance program. Tom was an Educational Leadership Consultant from 1984-86 and worked the last six years as Coordinator of Greek Affairs at Southern Methodist University in Dallas. David R. Murray, Bucknell '91, is beginning his second year as Director of Publications. David is responsible for the content, layout, design, production, and distribution of the Fraternity's numerous publications, chief among them The Shield of Phi Kappa Psi. David's duties also include coordinating the annual scholarship and awards program of the Endowment Fund and maintaining the Headquarters' new computer network. Rounding out the management staff is Sandi Leddy, the Fraternity's staff accountant. Sandi is also in her second year on staff. Sandi is the staff's chief financial officer and oversees the annual, independent audit of the Fraternity's financial statements. New accounting software from American Fundware acquired with the new computer network will allow Sandi to make more efficient use of her time and generate more informative reports.

The support staff includes Joy Bump who is in her ninth year on the Headquarters staff. Joy serves as the System Administrator and, as such, is reponsible for coordinating all the Fraternity's data processing needs. Joy also tracks the Alumni Support Program donor records. Mary Ellen Agee, in her seventh year on staff, is Phi Psi's Membership Secretary and Receptionist. In addition to being the "voice of Phi Kappa Psi," Mary Ellen processes all the pledge and initiate reports and makes sure that each properly reported initiate gets his badge and certificate in a timely manner. Jody Scholl is the newest addition to the Fraternity staff. Joining the staff in late June, Jody serves as Administrative Assistant to the Executive Director and Director of Chapter Services.

Ellen King, Executive Secretary for the last two years, retired on June 30 after serving nearly nine years on the Headquarters staff. For most of those years, Ellen's primary responsibility was coordinating the chapter reports and handling administrative duties for the Educational Leadership Consultant staff. Ellen worked with 23 different ELCs during her tenure and will be dearly missed. We wish her well.

The field staff for Phi Kappa Psi during the year under review included second-year traveller Jamie Acton, Valparaiso '88, and first-year men Marc Bruffett, SUNY Buffalo '89, and Jim Boyle, Washington '88. The makeup of an Educational Leadership Consultant is one part educator, one part facilitator, and one part motivator. The ELCs' primary responsibility is to help chapters realize their full potential. They meet with officers and committees, as well as the chapter as a whole, to determine where the chapter is strong (and how to capitalize on that strength) and where improvements are needed. ELCs also conduct special workshops tailored to the needs of individual chapters and review and reinforce Fraternity policy. Since the program was begun in 1960, 69 dedicated brothers have ridden the "red and green highway." Jared Beeson, UC Irvine '91, came on board in June as the 70th Educational Leadership Consult-

FRATERNITY FINANCES

The Fraternity enjoyed another strong year in terms of its finances, despite showing a modest "loss." One significant non-cash expenditure accounted for this excess of expenses over revenues. At the urging of the Fraternity's independent auditors, Coopers & Lybrand, the Executive Council created an allowance for doubtful accounts to more accurately reflect the value of chapter accounts receivables and chapter loans. The creation of the allowance during the 1993 fiscal year totalled \$171,261 in non-cash expenses. Of this amount, \$55,510 was allocated to the General Fund and \$115,751 was allocated to the Insurance Fund. As aged debt is repaid by chapters, these amounts will decrease. Nearly all chapters with aged debt have signed agreements to pay their obligations in full.

Overall, the Fraternity's income was down 6% from 1992 to \$1,352.469; the Fraternity's asset base decreased 2% to \$3.297,294. The decrease in income was due primarily to a reduction in insurance revenues received from the chapters. The reduction was caused by a 17% decrease in insurance expense which was passed on to the chapters and house corporations. Regardless of these decreases, though, the Fraternity's financial outlook is healthy and strong.

General Fund

The General Fund is just that, the general operating fund of the Fraternity. The General Fund receives income from initiation and pledge fees, chapter service fees, grants from the Permanent and Endowment Funds, and conference registrations to name a few. These monies are used to publish *The Shield*, fund the Educational Leadership Consultant program and other chapter services, pay employee salaries, and run the Grand Arch Council or Woodrow Wilson Leadership School, among other things.

General Fund expenses exceeded revenues by \$19,946 in 1992–93. General Fund net income was down primarily because the 1992 Grand Arch Council expenses were recognized in this year. In addition, the aforementioned bad debt expense of \$55,510 was recognized. Revenue from undergraduate sources accounted for nearly half of the total General Fund revenue for 1993.

Insurance Fund

The Insurance Fund was created by the Executive Council to fund the necessary insurance and risk management programs of the Fraternity. The Fraternity's national program provides comprehensive, general liability coverage to all undergraduates and alumni volunteers while acting within the scope of their duties, directors and officers liability coverage for house corporation officers and volunteers, comprehensive property insurance for chapters with housing and/or significant contents exposure, and boiler and machinery coverage where necessary. Any income received in excess of premiums is used to fund the Fraternity's self–insured retention (deductible) and used as a reserve to offset any sudden increase in premiums that may occur during a given year.

Insurance program revenues for the year ending May 31, 1993, were \$471,236, a 21% decrease from 1992. The fund had an operating deficit of \$61,117 during the year under review, decreasing the Insurance Fund balance to \$215,558. As with the General Fund, the loss can be attributed to the recognized allowance for doubtful accounts.

PERMANENT FUND

The Permanent Fund was established as a trust in 1938 to provide an income source for lifetime subscriptions to *The Shield*, to which all members are entitled. The initial assets set aside for this purpose had a value of \$43,000. Today, the principal in the Fund has a value of nearly \$2,500,000. Due to an unfavorable ruling by the Internal Revenue Service, Permanent Fund income can no longer be used to fund the magazine, but it is used to support other educational programs of the Fraternity, such as the Educational Leadership Consultant Program and the Woodrow Wilson Leadership School.



A board of three Trustees, appointed by the President, is responsible for the safekeeping and investment of the Fund's assets. Day to day management is provided by a professional investment manager retained by the Trustees, currently Harris Investment Management in Chicago.

The investment assets consist almost entirely of marketable securities which have historically been split in roughly equal portions of equities and fixed-income issues. However, in recent years the Trustees have responded to the Fraternity's request for greater current income and have temporarily increased the fixed-income portion to about 70% of the total. The Trustees believe, however, that a prudent long-term investment strategy requires that the investment mix be restored to a more balanced position with a larger equity portion, in order that the principal can continue to grow at least in line with inflation.

Our Trustees serve without compensation and give generously of their time and professional expertise to help the Fraternity achieve its financial objectives. Currently serving are John R. Donnell Jr., Case Western Reserve '59, William M. Batten, Ohio State '29, and Dr. John W. Oswald, DePauw '35.

In fiscal year 1993, the Permanent Fund's investment account balance grew 4% after expenses and grants to the Fraternity. Total assets of the Permanent fund at May 31, 1993, increased to \$2,371,482 from \$2,289,732 last year.

ENDOWMENT FUND

by James W. Emison III DePauw '49 ENDOWMENT FUND TRUSTEE

The Endowment Fund of Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity was chartered in 1914 and incorporated in the State of Illinois in 1922 to help worthy, but needy brothers complete their collegiate studies. Although the purpose and scope of the Endowment Fund have evolved considerably since 1914, the Fund continues to exist for the benefit of the Fraternity by promoting academic excellence, leadership, and moral responsibility among her members. The Endowment Fund also supplements the Fraternity's educational programs by making a grant to the Fraternity each year in support of those activities.

The Endowment Fund showed improvement last year. Net assets increased over 1992–93 to \$1,111,442.

The affairs of the Endowment Fund are overseen by three Trustees, each serving a six-year term. One Trustee is elected at the biennial meeting of the Endowment Fund held concurrently with each Grand Arch Council. James W. Emison III, *DePauw* '49, is Chairman. His term runs through 1998. Jerry



Nelson, *UCLA '48*, is Vice Chairman and serves through 1996. John F. Buck, *Indiana '75*, is Secretary–Treasurer and serves through 1994. Like the Permanent Fund Trustees, these alumni generously donate their time and talents for the betterment of Phi Kappa Psi.

The assets of the Endowment Fund now total \$1,121,420. They are primarily cash, marketable securities, and real estate. The Endowment Fund owns Heritage Hall, the Fraternity's Headquarters and Museum, and collects rent from the Fraternity which occupies the office space within.

Gifts to the Endowment Fund are currently deductible to the extent that the law permits for those filing a U.S. tax return. The Endowment Fund is recognized under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code as an organization that operates exclusively for charitable and educational purposes.

In 1952, the Fraternity's centennial year, Phi Kappa Psi began the Alumni Support Program to provide alumni the opportunity to continue their support of the Fraternity beyond their college days. In 1988, the program came under the auspices of the Endowment Fund to allow donors the opportunity to take tax deductions for their gifts. Giving trends remained fairly stable through the 1950's and gradually began to increase in the early 1970's. 1977 saw the first six-figure giving year and, in 1984, the program topped \$200,000! Numbers have been down slightly in recent years due to the recession, among other things.

During the 1992 giving year that ended February 28, 1993, 3,024 gifts totaling \$162,010 were made to the Endowment Fund through the Alumni Support Program. The names of those generous benefactors were listed in the July 1993 issue of *The Shield*.

The Endowment Fund showed slight improvement in 1992–93. Net assets (assets minus liabilities) improved slightly over last year to \$1,111,442. This includes \$435,514 held in funds the income of which is restricted by the donor for specific uses.
