Military Shield of Honor HONOR THOSE WHO HAVE SERVED

The Phi Kappa Psi Military Shield of Honor is now available for any Brother who has entered into military service. This medal is made to recognize our Brothers' willingness to sacrifice and serve our country.



Phi Kappa Psi was founded on the "Great Joy of Serving Others." In the course of the Fraternity's history, many Brothers have taken that oath a step further and chose to enter the armed services.

Like the Order of the S.C., these Brothers are a revered group of men in Phi Kappa Psi. While they did not choose to serve for medals, these Brothers


have gone years without a symbol recognizing the respect our Fraternity has for them.

The design committee, chaired by veteran and Brother Brenton Monteleone (*Texas* '84), chose a design similar to those awarded by the United States Military. The solid medal, which contains an eagle with wings spread, also features two stars to serve as symbols for the United States of America and the Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity. The red, green, red ribbon reflects the flag of Phi Kappa Psi.

This is a medal we encourage our service members to wear on the front of their jacket anytime they are joined in the bond of Fraternity. Although it can be worn outside of the jacket when not at a Phi Kappa Psi function, the symbols and what they best represent are intended for an audience among Brothers.

Alumni Associations are encouraged to host a military recognition banquet, honoring our brothers who have served.

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IN PURSUIT OF AN "A" LEVEL ORGANIZATION


A favorite inspirer of mine, the late Steve Jobs, once said, "Building a very strong company and a very strong foundation of talent and culture in a company is essential to making great products." So it is true for Phi Kappa Psi. As our organization significantly overhauls its core operations, strategies and deliverables, it is imperative that we have a solid base of talent and culture so we can deliver great "products" and build an "A" level organization.

Let me illustrate the point. We are all aware of the inspirational directives which define us as Brothers: honesty; personal integrity; service to others; academic excellence; moral and spiritual excellence; respect for the dignity of others. These reflect our common values and purpose. They unite our Brotherhood as central tenets to our Ritual, The Creed, and The Idea of Phi Kappa Psi. But how do we actually implement these tenets? And how do we measure and analyze the implementation? Answering those questions is central to building an "A" level organization.

A candid evaluation of how we implement these tenets, and an objective measuring of data reflecting the implementation, reveals real gaps and opportunities to improve. For example:

 Because academic excellence is a core value, Phi Psi must do a better job of coaching our students to academic success and provide the right guidance and programming for a higher standard of implementation of this value. Currently, 17% of our chapters have a cumulative GPA in the top quartile on their campus; fewer than 26% fall in the bottom quartile. The loss or hamstringing of new members due to academic underperformance is too high. Moreover, the Fraternity does not currently provide targeted programming or development tools to our members to drive academic improvement and success.

Phi Kappa Psi Academic Rank



- Though Phi Psi was founded on the principle of "The Great Joy of Serving Others", at an execution level our chapters are contributing an average of only 4 hours per member each month of true community service.
- While we speak to respecting the dignity of others as a cornerstone value, Phi Psi has far too many disciplinary issues involving conduct by individual members that defy this value. Over the past few years, the Fraternity has suspended 11 chapters with the concomitant loss of 891 members for conduct that was inconsistent with this value.
- The Fraternity has not established a set of clear standards and expectations for the operation of our chapters and the conduct of our individual members. While the Fraternity has engaged in a comprehensive plan to accredit high-performing chapters, the critical need for establishing a baseline—particularly one that can be adjusted upward over time—has remained unaddressed.
- Investment in the education and training of our undergraduates, as well as the Chapter Advisory Teams that work with them, has not been sufficient to the need. Fundamental improvement dictates that the Fraternity invests in this training.
- The bottom line: the measurement of our performance is often counter to our espoused core values. Still, we have amazing opportunities to bring our performance in line with our rhetoric. Those opportunities are precisely the issues that your leadership will be addressing with full-force during this biennium. I believe that course is in keeping with the admonition of Dud Daniel, who said, "Let us be what we say we are." Let's start there.

In this issue of *The Shield,* you will read of several initiatives already underway in pursuit of the opportunities before us. I am incredibly excited for the expansion efforts on calendar and the approach of our expansion team to recruit topnotch undergraduates. Likewise, the incredible focus of staff to deliver services in a highly customer-oriented culture is a great source of pride. As we build programming and training for our members and advisors, we will ensure it is anchored to the foundational tenets. We will

construct a solid level of standards and values, credential our leaders and establish high expectations for success. At all stages, we will strive to communicate our successes and challenges, publish critical data to measure our growth, identify our shortcomings and share our efforts thoroughly and transparently.

I am humbled to serve as SWGP during such an exciting evolutionary time for the Fraternity. It is an honor to be part of an enduring Fraternity where people are motivated and passionate to deliver great products and services, and a Fraternity that will stand for something relevant for generations to come. That is the fascinating landscape in which we are building an "A" level organization.

GRAND ARCH COUNCIL

NEW YORK CITY | JULY 6-10, 2016

The 2016 Grand Arch Council (GAC) was the largest GAC to date, with registration falling just shy of 800. Many amendments were submitted, a new Executive Council was elected, brothers were recognized for their service, and after much tension, the Fraternity and Foundation laid out a path to work together in the best interests of all brothers, current and future.

Business

A total of 74 amendments were proposed. 16 amendments passed bringing a number of changes to how Phi Kappa Psi operates. Some of these changes include:

- General clean-up of language
- Matching language in the bylaws to reflect actual practices by the Fraternity
- A review of district lines every ten years was established
- An increase in Alumni Association chapter dues from \$100 to \$250 per year
- Archons cannot accept employment of compensation from members of the Executive Council
- Provides more notice of Executive Council meetings and a prompt publication of minutes
- Requires the creation of a Fraternity Education committee by all undergraduate chapters
- Requires Archons to report to their districts quarterly
- Requires National Fraternity Headquarters to operate
 on a balanced budget
- Ensures all colony members are aware of and ready to pay for membership fees
- Establishes additional rules for Phi Kappa Psi's intellectual property

These changes will take time to implement, but will happen as directed.

An important aspect of GAC is always the election of a new Executive Council. A mix of new and familiar faces make up the council for the 2016-2018 biennium. Brother Jim Boyle (*Washington '88*,) former SWVGP succeeded outgoing Scott Noble (*Texas '81*) as National President. Former treasurer Shannon Price (*Alabama '88*) won his bid for Vice President (SWVGP), and Brother Mike Flechas (*Mississippi '99*) was elected National Treasurer. Rounding out the new Executive Council is the new Secretary (SWAG), former Attorney General David Moyer (*Alabama '91*.) These brothers will serve until the 2018 GAC.

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Recognition

GAC is also a time to recognize brothers for their contributions, both in Phi Kappa Psi and outside of it. This GAC introduced two special recognitions: the GP Society Pin and the Phi Kappa Psi Military Shield of Honor.

The GP Society Pin recognizes brothers who served their chapters as leaders while juggling the demands of college. These few members ensure their Brothers and chapter live up to the Creed and values of Phi Kappa Psi. Former GPs are eligible to receive this distinct pin. Much like the Alumni Recognition Button, this is a pin that is to be worn on a lapel jacket, and can be worn to any event or occasion. The Phi Kappa Psi GP Society Pins can be ordered on the Phi Kappa Psi website.

The Phi Kappa Psi Military Shield of Honor recognizes any Brother who has entered into military service. This medal is made to recognize our Brothers' willingness to sacrifice and serve our country. These Brothers are a revered group of men in Phi Kappa Psi. 


Day two of GAC saw a majority of the committee work being completed. These committees are where a majority of the Fraternity's work is accomplished.



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PHI KAPPA PSI MODELING A NEW STANDARD OF SERVICE

As an organization, Phi Kappa Psi spends much time talking about community service. It's a value the Fraternity has espoused since its inception in 1852 when William Henry Letterman and Charles Page Thomas Moore healed the sick in an attic. The primary reason why it exists is this act of service on the part of the two founders. It only makes sense that 164 years later, Phi Kappa Psi stands firm behind the timeless value of serving the local community.

In an effort to raise efficacy and standards, the Fraternity is embracing the servant leadership model from Robert K. Greenleaf. In his first essay, published in 1970, Greenleaf said:

"The servant-leader is servant first... It begins with the natural feeling that one wants to serve, to serve first. Then conscious choice brings one to aspire to lead. That person is sharply different from one who is leader first, perhaps because of the need to assuage an unusual power drive or to acquire material possessions...The leader-first and the servant-first are two extreme types. Between them there are shadings and blends that are part of the infinite variety of human nature."



- CHAPTER SERVICE FEATURE -INDIANA IOTA

Being a member of Phi Kappa Psi comes with a unique set of responsibilities and privileges. Some of our chapters accomplish extraordinary things and they can certainly learn from one another. This past year, former President Logan Bagby (*Ball State* '14) and current president Kevin Meyer (*Ball State* '14) have been working hard with their brothers to set the Phi Psi standard high at Ball State University.

Community service and philanthropy have always been the main focal points of the chapter's efforts each year, but this time around, the men stepped up their game and aimed to accomplish even more. This past fall, the men had their most successful philanthropy since their time at Ball State. Island Wars was an idea Bagby learned about from the President's Leadership Academy in February of 2014. He took time to build upon the idea and the end result was a multi-stationed event where teams competed in challenges reminiscent of the television show Survivor. The event created enough success to now be the chapter's annual philanthropy event in the fall. Indiana lota was dependent upon other organizations helping them with the success of their philanthropic events this year and the men returned the favor. The chapter also participated in other organizations' events to help with their philanthropic needs.

"Our success was highly reliant on how determined all of the brothers were to succeed," said Cody Richards (*Ball State* '13.)

The chapter also took Phi Kappa Psi's Maxim, *The Great Joy of Serving Others*, to heart this past year. As an effort to serve more people in the local community, the chapter found new opportunities in the Muncie area. Indiana lota paired with other organizations for community service and hosted an overnight event at the local Boys and Girls Club. One brother, Jason Shively, took it upon himself to work personally with the Boys and Girls Club on a daily basis. He created friendships with the staff and many of the kids at the club.

"I think each of our members really took initiative to try and make a difference by applying themselves in different parts of our community," said Bagby.

Indiana lota set its standards high for their members and each brother held himself and his brothers accountable for meeting those standards. The Boys and Girls Club of Muncie awarded the chapter "Volunteer

Group of the Year" for 2015 and the chapter was in the running to win 2015 Chapter of the Year at Ball State. The chapter did not win the award, but their efforts did not go unnoticed when President Bagby was named IFC president of the year. On top of the service work, award winnings, and philanthropy events the chapter increased their overall GPA by .3 and ended the school year with a 3.212 chapter average GPA.

Their success has led the men to adopt the phrase, Do Better, as a motto for their upcoming school year. With an impressive 2015-2016, it will be interesting to see how Indiana lota will surpass their accomplishments this coming year.

- CHAPTER SERVICE FEATURE - MARYLAND GAMMA

The men of the University of Maryland Chapter went above and beyond in 2015-2016 in their duty of serving others and are deserving of a service highlight. They believe in helping the community they live in because it's fundamental to the Phi Psi experience. Maryland Gamma credits their chapter's success to each brother's dedication to fulfilling that obligation.

This past school year, the chapter collectively completed 1,595 hours of service. Through the Phi Psi Friends community outreach program, they were able to service the greater College Park community through projects including lawn maintenance, general home repairs and snow shoveling.

"Phi Psi Friends started off as nothing more than handing out flyers to people hoping they would let us know if they needed help," said James Mulholland (*Maryland* '13). "Over time, our small initiative turned into something much bigger when we realized service could be asking a few neighbors if they need help. All it takes is that first step to make a world of difference."

The actions of the chapter were so noteworthy, the College Park community sent multiple messages thanking the members for all their hard work. Most of these thank you letters came from the elderly and their families in College Park.

"The community continues to express thoughts of well wishes and appreciation for the actions of these young men," said Lakeland Civic Association Secretary, Anita Wolley.

When a winter storm hit the East Coast last winter, students at the University of Maryland were given a few unexpected days off. The brothers of Maryland Gamma took advantage of the days off to shovel a few feet of snow off of drive ways in College Park.

"Many thanks to you and your wonderful fraternity brothers for your hours of snow shoveling last week during the blizzard," said Karla Fahey. "I am very thankful that your fraternity shares their talents and skills and

downright physical labor so generously with others in your community."

The brothers also raised money for Terpthon. Terpthon is a dance marathon where proceeds benefit Children's Miracle Network. The event is held annually in March, and after working all year to raise money, Maryand Gamma was able to donate \$4,800 to the cause. In April, they hosted their second annual bubble soccer event with Kappa Delta and raised \$4,800 to benefit Prevent Child Abuse America and their local affiliate in Baltimore, The Family Tree.

On April 1, 2016, Mayor Patrick Wojahn wrote a letter of recommendation encouraging the University of Maryland to award Phi Kappa Psi with the Greek Award for Community Service Programming. In the middle of a significant crisis, the brothers engaged in hours of backbreaking work while other students were enjoying their day off from classes.

"...the men of Phi Kappa Psi exemplified community service, and provided a model for what role University of Maryland students can play in the College park community," said Mayor Wojahn.

The brothers of Maryland Gamma insists they don't need to be reimbursed for their time and service; it is done out of the goodness of their hearts. The next step for the chapter is to get the rest of the Greek and campus organizations involved in the same efforts.

"If we can instill the values that the fraternity has taught us in other organizations, then we are truly living those values," said Timothy Deedy (*Maryland* '15).

HAVANA GOOD TIME IN CUBA: PHI PSI BROTHERS GIVE BACK

For many college students, the concept of spring break is a time to get away from all of the stresses that come with school and instead, travel with friends for a week of various social activities. After attending the 2015 American Leadership Academy in Cabo San Lucas, Mexico, Zach Hawtof (*Cal* '12), Nathan Aminpour (*Cal* '13) and Andy Frey (*Cal* '14), three brothers from California Gamma decided they wanted to take a trip to Cuba during next year's spring break. They decided to participate in a spring break opportunity different from most and it certainly aligned with Phi Kappa Psi's values.

"We saw that Cuba had a lot of restrictions, especially as far as US travel," said Hawtof. "But we were looking at ways to get involved in the Cuban community."

As they pursued how to get involved, Zach's mother fortunately knew of someone who had recently came back from Cuba. By virtue of that connection, the men connected

them with a local orphanage and began planning their international service trip.Despite its close proximity to the United States, many residents are not well-versed in the full cultural scope in Cuba.

"In class you sort of learn that it's a communist country and that it's not well-developed. But then when you go there, it's really different. We would go to some cities that had these gigantic biomedical buildings, but then across the street you would have a run-down hut of a house," said Aminpour.

Needless to say, their perspective certainly changed with each step they took in Cuba. Their 10-day adventure was filled with many highs and lows. Although the trip to Cuba seemed to go rather smoothly, travel and accommodations tended to become an issue. Not to mention, all week they were attempting to contact the orphanage with little success. More specifically, the Cuban government provides the children with all of their basic necessities but they require a long process in order for others to donate. With the assistance of a friendly local couple, the men were able to successfully deliver the items to the children. To their surprise, most of the items were completely new to the children—the hot wheels being the fastest item to disappear. Zach and Nate also made it a point to bring an American football, which created a fun environment for the kids.

"They were super excited to play games with us. They brought their own games. The second we got into the house, all of them went to the window to see who we were," said Nate.

Their trip coincided with three other major events: a visit by President Obama, a huge international baseball match-up between the Tampa Bay Rays and the Cuban National Team, and a Rolling Stones concert. Although they didn't plan the trip with the intention of experiencing these events, it certainly made for a memorable visit.

On their way out of the country, their trip turned into an additional two-day struggle at the Cuban airport when their early morning flight was cancelled. They had no money, food, water, internet, or their Visa's, on top of finding themselves in the middle of airport riots. The riots were so intense that the Mexican embassy had to be called upon. Thankfully, they ultimately made it out in one piece and learned quite a bit about international travel guidelines and regulations.

Learning from the Experience

In a world where many people feel like they can't make an impact without scheduling a large group initiative or mission trip, the guys proved you can make a difference by taking the initiative and planning ahead of time. They traveled to a country where very few Americans visit and made a direct impact on the local children of Havana, while having a great time enjoying the local scene. The local culture really set the experience apart from a traditional spring break experience.

"Maybe Phi Psis Nationally (if they do see this) start to go and volunteer abroad whenever they do travel during spring break and during the summer," said Nate.

Service is all about finding a cause that's important to you and helping others in need. The CA Gamma chapter made a

big impact last fall by leading Phi Psi chapters across the country in the first annual Movember campaign. The men were able to raise almost \$3500 alone, making up about 30% of the overall donations to the Movember Foundation. Numerous members are also involved in service-oriented clubs and organizations on campus. This trip to Cuba is another example of how the men in the chapter demonstrate our values in more than just words on paper.

The men of CA Gamma recognize their shared appreciation for service is what bonds them as members of Phi Kappa Psi. Shared service experiences bring them closer to each other and to their peers.

STRENGTHSQUEST A PATHWAY TO ACADEMIC, PERSONAL AND CAREER SUCCESS

StrengthsQuest is a 30-minute online assessment which helps the user identify their natural talents. It was developed by Gallup after a decade of studying how organizations function. After completion of the assessment, it provides the user with a customized report, listing their top five talent themes and suggestions for how to use the talents. It is used at more than 600 schools and universities in North America. More than two million people and over 4,000 Phi Psis have used StrengthsQuest to gain insights into how to use their talents to achieve success in academics, careers and leadership roles.

Phi Psi's recognize their true potential when they use their strengths. For the past two years, new members of the Fraternity have been taking the assessment. Our goal is to ensure every undergraduate Phi Psi gets the opportunity to take the StrengthsQuest assessment, equipping them with the tools to be successful in all personal or professional endeavors.

"It's thrilling we are actually making it a priority to incorporate StrengthsQuest into all of our programs. This is something we have asked new members to take for several years, but there is so much more opportunity for growth," said Associate Director of Leadership & Programming, Elise Bradshaw. "We believe this program offers resources that will benefit the members beyond their undergraduate years."

The StrengthsQuest philosophy is not about ignoring weaknesses. Instead, it's about focusing on natural talents and not allowing weaknesses to prevent success. By learning how strengths can be harnessed, it allows our members to fulfill their deepest potential.

Here is how StrengthsQuest will be integrated into all of Phi Kappa Psi's programs:

New Member Education

New members will get their first introduction to StrengthsQuest by taking the assessment and talking about it briefly during their education process.

Chapter Leadership Retreats

As a new component of our leadership development structure, a Chapter Leadership Retreat is a (minimum) six-hour workshop facilitated by members of the Member Development team and other staff or volunteers. The retreat focuses on significant areas of need for each chapter, including a StrengthsQuest presentation to assist the chapter in understanding each other's strengths.

Woodrow Wilson Leadership School & Regional Officer Trainings

There will be a Strengths session incorporated into both programs to help participants understand and utilize their strengths more effectively as a leader.

Strengths Workshop at Washington Alpha



On Wednesday, May 18, 2016, several staff members traveled to the University of Washington in Seattle to conduct a Strengths workshop with the chapter. Presented by Senior Director of Communications, Kyle Hickman, the program gave an introduction into the StrengthsQuest philosophy and allowed participants to discover their strengths, learn more about their chapter brothers' strengths, explore how they work in teams, and how their talents apply to chapter, academic and career success.

Participants overwhelmingly stated they became more self-aware, learned more about their chapter brothers and became a better leader in the process.

People especially talented in the Harmony theme look for consensus. They don't enjoy conflict; rather, they seek areas of agreement.

Ideation

People especially talented in the Ideation theme are fascinated by ideas.

They are able to find connections between seemingly disparate phenomena.

Includer

People especially talented in the Includer theme are accepting of others. They show awareness of those who feel left out, and make an effort to include them.

He discusses how knowing your strengths can make a significant difference.

As an undergraduate being introduced to the StrengthFinder concepts, you may wonder how it can be applied and beneficial

The StrengthsFinder assessment is designed to uncover certain key talents—patterns of thought, feeling, and behavior that can be productively applied. These patterns are categorized into 34 broad themes—such as Achiever, Ideation, and Relator—and those themes indicate and predict your innate and unique talents.

Those talents, when multiplied by the investment of time spent practicing, developing skills, and building knowledge, can become strengths.

If you first break the common mindset of "I can do anything", a process challenged by StrengthsQuest, and focus on your natural talents, it will help you pursue your most productive and, ultimately, personally satisfying path.

Your Job May Change. Your Talents Remain.

LinkedIn recently sent me a note highlighting that 600+ members of my network changed positions last year.

The "new jobs" are not all fully new. They may represent an actual job change by someone to a different company or a change in job title or role within an existing company.

Still, the pace of job changes, within an existing employer, a new company or via temporary or contract roles, has increased dramatically due to the economic pressures since the advent of the Great Recession in 2008 and due to restructuring of business operations accelerated by technological efficiencies.

In a more positive light, a recent news story noted that, due to more optimism in the economy by workers, the pace of "voluntary termination"—those who quit a job has increased. This is indicative of better opportunities being perceived in other places.

So more moves are being made, but are they the right moves? Will your next move be right for you? How do you identify where an opportunity best allows you to apply the strengths you can contribute for greater individual and organizational success?

In 2001 *Now, Discover Your Strengths* was published by Donald O. Clifton, founder of Gallup and Marcus Buckingham, and introduced *34 talent themes* that can be developed into strengths when identified, refined and applied in the right role and environment. The concept evolved into a latter book, *Strengthsfinder 2.0*, authored by Tom Rath, the grandson of Clifton (who died in 2003), which is a more compact book overviewing the idea behind the 34 themes, then outlining them individually for examples of application. The book has an individual code in it for the reader to take the online assessment to get feedback on their five dominant talent themes.

Strengthsfinder 2.0 has been an ongoing best seller for business books since 2005 and was, once again, the top seller for business or professional development books in *USA Today* sales rankings for 2015.

Gallup has published many additional books using their research to focus on sales, leadership, customer service and other areas showing how strengths can be applied in different roles professionally.

Personally, I used Gallup tools in assisting in the hiring process in a previous position and had the opportunity to participate in the Gallup High Impact Management program, as it was called at the time, when I worked with American City Business Journals.

I encourage readers, if unfamiliar with Gallup's strengths concepts, to reference the resources offered by the Fraternity and explore a different way—perhaps a clearer way—of seeing yourself, others and how a new perspective can enhance your success.

Individualization

People especially talented in the Individualization theme are intrigued with the unique qualities of each person. They have a gift for figuring out how people who are different can work together productively.

Input

People especially talented in the Input theme have a need to collect and archive. They may collect information, ideas, history, or even relationships.

Intellection

People especially talented in the Intellection theme are characterized by their intellectual activity. They are introspective and appreciate intellectual discussions.

Learner

People especially talented in the Learner theme have a great desire to learn and want to continuously improve. In particular, the process of learning, rather than the outcome, excites them.

Maximizer

People especially talented in the Maximizer theme focus on strengths as a way to stimulate personal and group excellence. They seek to transform something strong into something superb.

Positivity

People especially talented in the Positivity theme have an enthusiasm that is contagious. They are upbeat and can get others excited about what they are going to do.

Relator

People especially talented in the Relator theme enjoy close relationships with others. They find deep satisfaction in working hard with friends to achieve a goal.

Responsibility

People especially talented in the Responsibility theme take psychological ownership of what they say they will do. They are committed to stable values such as honesty and loyalty.

Restorative

People especially talented in the Restorative theme are adept at dealing with problems. They are good at figuring out what is wrong and resolving it.

Self-Assurance

People especially talented in the Self-Assurance theme feel confident in their ability to manage their own lives. They possess an inner compass that gives them confidence that their decisions are right.

Significance

People especially talented in the Significance theme want to make a big impact. They are independent and sort projects based on the level of influence it will have on their organization and others around them.

Strategic

People especially talented in the Strategic theme create alternative ways to proceed. Faced with any given scenario, they can quickly spot the relevant patterns and issues.

Woo People especially talented in the Woo theme love the challenge of meeting new people and winning them over. They derive satisfaction from breaking the ice and making a connection with another person.

Lifelong Brotherhood The New Philosophy of Alumni Engagement

It just goes to show the strength of those relationships can withstand the test of time and are the connections we hold near to our hearts.

In keeping with the spirit of those relationships and the impact they have on our lives, it is just as important now for us to ensure the Fraternity is here for future generations of brothers to experience and enjoy. So the question becomes: what can you (as alumnus) do to help? This alumni engagement feature will give you an in-depth look at some of the initiatives in the Alumni Engagement area of our Fraternity and how we're working to ensure long-term success in building lifelong brotherhood.

Over the next biennium, we have **six** main priorities:

- Fill remaining vacancies for the Advisory Teams and provide resources and certification for Advisory Team members to be successful in working with undergraduate chapters.
- Increase the number of events and engagement opportunities for Alumni Associations to recruit and retain more alumni.
- Provide resources and support to House Corporations and opportunities for loans (if needed) from the Canonsburg Corporation. The Fraternity has invested significant staff resources into making this a reality.
- Work to increase the number of Founders Day events for both Alumni Associations and undergraduate chapters.
- Introduce a new Alumni Starter Kit program to help new graduates network in areas and provide them with resources as an alumnus.
- Update the contact information of our 80,000+ members to ensure we have accurate touch points.

Considering the progress we have made, 2016 has been an amazing year in the realm of alumni engagement. As we look back on our accomplishments and take an opportunity to examine where we're currently positioned, the future looks bright for our alumni engagement efforts.

There was a total attendance of 2,817 brothers and guests at 43 Alumni Association Founders Day events and a total attendance of 800 brothers and guests at 20 undergraduate chapter events. 2016 Chapter Advisor Retreat





Cabo San Lucas, Mexico March 1st - March 26th

Could anyone possibly think of a better place in the world to hold a retreat for Chapter Advisors? While preparing for the inaugural Chapter Advisor Retreat run by the Phi Kappa Psi National Fraternity (in a partnership with the American Leadership Academy) there were several ideas, topics, and activities discussed to benefit the advisors coming from across the country.

The American Leadership Academy's program to help develop and grow emerging leaders seemed to fit perfectly with the concept of building a retreat around opportunities for advisors to share best practices, advisor experiences and identify areas of improvement. 43 total advisors joined us in over the 4-week span in March.

"The retreat confirmed for me that headquarters now has open ears and an open heart attitude. The candor by which advisors, officers and staff speak to work through issues together is very needed and refreshing," said Gene Wilk (*Cal State, Northridge* '90), Rutgers Chapter Advisor.

Having the Chapter Advisor Retreat coincide with the weeks of the ALA sessions during March provided an immense benefit: it gave advisors the opportunity to interact with undergraduate members from across the country through speaker presentations and the occasional meal. Critical relationships were built between our undergraduates and alumni.

There were several critical outcomes from the retreat—most notably the formation of two brand new national advisory committees tasked with the formation, development and structure of future advisor training programs. These committees will help guide future advisory training resources, rather than a one-size-fits-all approach to programming and education.

The second committee is tasked with the formation and development of a best practice depository where advisors can "click to cart" based on a variety of required or recommended resources. This will allow advisors to create their own chapter specific advisory team strategy guide they can utilize as a roadmap and resource for success.

ALABAMA ALPHA

A \$7.8 million dollar housing project is wrapping up and the undergraduates are set to move in this fall. The new chapter house is located on the Greek row and features stunning colonial pillars and houses over 30 men.



TEXAS ALPHA

As an \$8.4 million dollar housing relocation and building project, it will feature a chapter house, courtyard and townhouse, all located on one property. The new chapter house will be 26,000 total square feet and will house 38 undergraduate men, while the townhomes will hold an additional 20 undergraduates.



GEORGIA ALPHA

The chapter has started a capital campaign phase of building a new chapter house. The new house was recently approved for zoning and construction will begin soon. With the gracious donation of over two acres for the new property from the close friend of a Phi Kappa Psi alumnus, the local group is now planning to break ground and start building the new facility.



ALABAMA ALPHA - BIERCHEN'S STORY

The Phi Psis of the Alabama Alpha chapter (Alabama) have spent their last year in the house they called home for over 50 years. Built in the 1920s, the house was demolished in June. Its location was outside the north endzone of the Bryant-Denny stadium and the space was needed by the athletic department.

The Chapter hosted a farewell function on May 14 for current members, alumni and their families to visit the house before it was demolished. The function included a BBQ lunch, alumni speakers and a tour of the house.

John Bierchen, now head coach of men's hockey at Alabama, attended the farewell function with his father. Bierchen drove from Columbus, Ga., while his father, John Bierchen, flew in from the Tampa area to attend the event. While Bierchen was at the event he learned his father's pin number was 169. He was shocked at the low number, until he met other brothers who had much lower pin numbers than his father. Bierchen even met John Tyron Hubbard; pin number one.

Bierchen's father attended the University of Alabama in 1976 and pledged Phi Psi, as one of his best friends from high school was a member. After receiving his Bachelor's and M.B.A from Alabama, he began his business career and worked his way up to the vice president levels of various companies. Eventually, he became a senior consultant for Paradigm Learning. He travels the world with Paradigm and trains major companies providing skills to be more profitable and effective.

While working, his father had also been a stage performer and has performed everything from dinner theatre, opera, children's theatre and has managed a theatre company all of Bierchen's life. "He always attributes his success in life, as well as his ability to juggle family and many different interests, to his experiences at Alabama and in Phi Psi." Bierchen says. (pull quote)

Bierchen played hockey at the University of Alabama his senior year. The year following after graduating he coached an NCAA D3 team at SUNY Canton in Canton, NY and for the last three years he has been the Assistant Coach for the Columbus Cottonmouths of the Southern Professional Hockey League.

Although they are from the Tampa area, Bierchen and his father have had Alabama season football tickets for years. On April 11 of this year he was asked to come back and head the hockey program at the University of Alabama. Bierchen says he would love nothing more than to continue to grow the hockey program at Alabama.

The good news for the men of Alabama Alpha is the school has completed construction of a new Phi Psi house. It is now occupied by Phi Psi undergraduates, just in time for the new school year. AL.com reports the project for the construction of the new house is estimated to cost \$6.2 million, the University has offered to loan \$4.6 million, and the athletic department has also agreed to pay \$1.2 million. The University said the reasoning behind their contribution is because of Phi Psi's cooperation with this process.

Bierchen says he has current players who are Phi Psis, along with many ex-teammates and he will spend a good deal of time at the new house. His hope for the new house is it will lead to Phi Psi to the predominant fraternity on campus.

Phi Psi is not the only Greek organization facing this struggle. Eight other sororities and fraternities are also having their houses their houses torn down and rebuilt. The school has offered loans to these organizations as well.

What I'll always remember best about Phi Kappa Psi was how the brotherhood was something that spoke more than words ever could. It helped us in times that we could never have prepared for, like when one of our very recent alumni, Paul Troupe, passed away in 2014. We had an emergency brotherhood meeting that night to break the news to the chapter, and while we were grieving, everyone was sharing their memories and thoughts about him. And as more people shared stories about him, it became very apparent how the world was robbed of a brother who was the epitome of community service. His enthusiasm for his work was apparent to anyone that even had an inkling of a friendship with him, and his dedication towards improving the lives of others was immeasurable.

One of the most inspiring traits I learned from Paul Troupe was to serve silently. Not as in keeping it a secret, but being humble. I learned not to bring it up in every other conversation, or make it known to all of my friends that I volunteer, or brag about it to future employers. It was more rewarding to help people without expecting praise or compensation, because it helps amplify *why* serving is important. Improving your community should never be about you, it's about them. And subsequently, doing it for the sake of the community had a way of helping me grow personally.

Dedicating time to give back to the community helped me know that I was making a positive impact, and it felt more rewarding than any college grade ever would be. Volunteering bolstered my work ethic and willingness to help others, and it helped me to become a better person for the world. The Men's Trip Jason Maynard (SMU'89)

In 1993, a group of six Texas Deltans from SMU agreed to take a road trip. A simple premise: fulfilling a request of one member of the group to have a "Bachelor Trip" instead of a bachelor party. No one knew it would lead to a multi-decade tradition. The six original members of "The Coterie" as they deemed themselves, were joined by two others after a decade of trips. These eight men have, every single year, gathered together at some point in the country to enjoy new adventures, recall old exploits, and make new memories. We call it the Men's Trip.

The (expanded) eight members of The Coterie have never all lived in the same state since college; life and loves make moves to new cities necessary. Since the trip began, they have been spread out over the following states: California, Arizona, Texas, Wisconsin, Arkansas, Tennessee, Illinois, North Carolina, Massachusetts, and New York. And the trip destinations have included some staples (New Orleans, Las Vegas), some out of the way destinations (Deadwood, South Dakota and Dewey Beach, Delaware), and a few simple and relaxing ones (Frio River, Texas; Greers Ferry Lake, Arkansas).

Trips have been arranged around wedding anniversaries, family birthdays, and pregnant wives. When one of our original six was incapacitated with a brain tumor, we arranged a simple trip (with the blessing of his wife) to take him with us. Our time was simple and quiet, but precious. When his health deteriorated the next year, all members cleared their schedule and flew to Dallas where he lived on short notice. The Men's Trip that year may not have left the city limits, but it proved the strength of our bonds of love and brotherhood. It was an important reminder of what we mean to each other, especially as we lost Brother Bruce the following month.

75 Marathons in 75 Days

Driven by the experience of being a single parent raising three children, Terry Hitchcock did the impossible: run from St. Paul to Atlanta in only 75 days. In order to reach this goal, Terry had to run a complete marathon each one of the 75 days. Terry was 57 years old and was suffering from a weak heart, bad knees and fragile ankles. Terry made it to the finish line right in time for the opening ceremonies of the 1996 summer Olympics. In all, Terry traveled more than 2,000 miles to bring awareness to the financial and emotional hardships faced by single parents and their children.

Hitchcock is a 1966 initiate of our chapter at Bowling Green State University. In 2015, he reached out to the National Fraternity and asked us if there was a way to partner to tell his story and simultaneously benefit the brothers of Phi Kappa Psi.

27 Years of Brotherhood at McSorley's

In 1989, the brothers of the New Jersey Gamma chapter at Rutgers University decided to board a train to New York City for some fun on a Saturday morning. They didn't realize they would be back in the same place, at the same time, every Saturday before Thanksgiving for the next 27 years.

The brothers heard of a historic pub located in the East Village neighborhood of Manhattan. McSorley's Old Ale House is the oldest Irish pub in NYC and the last "Men Only" pubs to exist. They were legally forced to allow women inside in 1970. No piece of wall décor has been removed from the walls since 1910. Houdini's handcuffs are connected to the bar rail, and wishbones hang above the bar. The wishbones were placed above the bar by soldiers who were heading off to World War I. When they returned they were told to remove the wishbone. The remaining wishbones are those of soldiers who never returned.

Since the first visit in 1989, the brothers have "never cancelled and will never cancel", said Gian Russo (*Rutgers* '88). There are usually 17 brothers who show up each year, but they have had as few as 12 and as many as 22. The brothers have also had the same waiter for the past 27 visits to McSorley's.

"The beauty is that you don't need to be invited and even if you haven't spoken to a brother in years, you know you can always come there and you will be home. No matter how far your life's journey has taken you away," said Russo.

Their bond and friendship does not stop at meeting at an old pub once a year. The brothers are also together for weddings, funerals, children's birthdays, and vacations. They have taken family trips with one another to the Florida Keys, the Bahamas and Virginia Beach. According to Russo, there are no judgements, jealousies, issues, drama or fights. It is pure love, support and friendship.

Recently, Russo and his family spent the weekend at a brother's home, minutes from where his daughter was playing in a tournament. They were welcomed with open arms and the so-called cousins were extremely happy to see each other.

The brothers still live relatively close together; all within a three-hour radius of the city. Since there has never been a cancellation, the plan is still to meet at noon, at McSorley's, the Saturday before Thanksgiving in 2016.

Not a Minute to Waste: Tennessee Brother Saves a Life

After closing and leaving work on a Saturday night, Brother Chance Bennett (*Tennessee*) walked back inside to grab his keys. When he returned outside he found a co-worker on the ground, with blood rushing out of his leg. Another coworker was already on the phone with a 911 dispatcher. "Jacob just shot himself," yelled the coworker.

In the short time Bennett was inside getting his keys, Jacob Brumbaugh had accidentally shot himself in the leg with a handgun. Bennett did not hear the gunshot while he was inside. The bullet entered his leg above the left kneecap and exited below to the left. Bennett began to inspect the wound and immediately noticed the severity of the situation.

Brumbaugh's leg was extensively bleeding a bright red color—not the usual darker shade of red. Bennett's knowledge of anatomy led him to conclude Brumbaugh's femoral artery had been damaged. The femoral artery is the largest vessel in the body; Brumbaugh could bleed out and die at any minute. Acting swiftly, Bennett instructed his manager to apply as much pressure as he could on the wound. A crowd began to form around the scene. When Bennett looked up to scan the crowd he found a life-saving device: a Cheesecake Factory employee's apron.

During an atypical training, he practiced many first-aid scenarios like this one. Bennett attached the apron to Brumbaugh's leg, creating a makeshift tourniquet to stop the flow of blood to his leg. Once the tourniquet was secure, Bennett sat behind Brumbaugh holding him up. He talked to Brumbaugh, asking about his day, keeping him awake and alert until help arrived.

"Keeping him awake is important. If he had passed out his body could have gone into shock," said Bennett.

He also mentions how Bennett himself needed to stay calm in this situation for Brumbaugh's sake. If Brumbaugh were to notice Bennett in a panic, and start panicking himself, Bennett may have lost control of the situation.

An ambulance arrived and took Brumbaugh to the hospital where he underwent a successful four-hour long surgery. He was released three weeks later from the hospital.

Mike Howard, a physician's assistant at the UT Medical Center's Trauma and Critical Care service, said Bennett may have very well saved Brumbaugh's live by applying the tourniquet and stopping the blood flow.

"You are looking at about five minutes of rapid blood flow until you get to a point where even if you start to resuscitate the individual, they may have been in too much of a shock situation to be able to get them back," said Howard.

Brumbaugh is in excellent condition today and is back to a normal and healthy life. Bennett spent time with Brumbaugh in the hospital and grew to know him better. The two are now closer because of the accident.

"People keep telling me you did such a good job, but deep down I think what anyone else in my position would have done," said Bennett. "People who had some type of training would have done exactly what I did. It just happened to be a coincidence that I was there." Brother Bennett undoubtedly acted out the Phi Psi value of service by giving of his time and talents to save Brumbaugh's life.

Marine Brother Takes Action to Save a Life

Jim Wrenn (*Northern Illinois* '11) and a group of friends were traveling back to Plainfield, IL from Starved Rock State park after a day of hiking. While driving down I-80, the group witnessed a car zip by at an excessive speed, striking the back of a box truck and landing in a ditch. Joining Wrenn inside the car was the driver Clare, her boyfriend Chris and their friend Robert. Once the car was in the ditch, Robert yelled for Clare to stop the car.

Clare pulled over and the group jumped out of their car to assist the now burning car in the ditch. Another car, carrying an Army vet and his family, stopped to assist. Robert and the army vet pulled the driver out of the front seat



to a safe distance from the car. Robert then rushed back to the car to check the backseat for additional passengers. Once he was sure the car was clear he went back to check on the driver who was sitting with Wrenn awaiting help.

Jim and his friends are no strangers to lending a helping hand to those in need. Chris is a Marine Veteran, Robert an active Marine and Wrenn is a reserve Marine. The three friends, along with the Army vet in the other car, made for an incredible

team to save the life of the driver.

The team cared for the man until the fire department arrived. The car was now completely engulfed in flames and the driver was trying to resist their help. He was eventually loaded onto a gurney and strapped down because he continued to fight.

"Anybody would have done it. Plenty of other cars pulled over and tried to assist but we just happened to be in the right time at the right place," said Robert.

With a record 799 people having attended the recent New York City GAC, this month's 'From the Archives' features another GAC record holder: The SC Badge of Edward H. Knight and his 38 Stars.

Initiated into Indiana Gamma at Wabash College in 1893 at the age of 16, "Eddie" Knight would quickly become a popular and reoccurring face at every GAC from 1894 until 1970. Brother Knight's (and the Fraternity's GAC record) stands at 38 Grand Arch Councils and also comes with an asterisk. You may notice there is a break in the stars on the SC badge. In 1944, the Fraternity (much like the entire country) was in a state of emergency fighting for the American way of life against fascism. Given the ongoing war in Europe and Asia, Phi Kappa Psi decided to forgo that biennium's GAC. And so, with no star to go in the 1944 location, Brother Knight decided to simply leave a vacant space to mark the GAC that never was.

At each Grand Arch Council, two awards are given in honor of Brother Knight's life-long devotion to our strong band; the Edward H. Knight Award of Merit and the Eddie H. Knight Award for Attendance. The latter award recognizes the brother who has attend the most GACs. The current holder of the Eddie Knight Award (Hal Dick, *Bowling Green* '55) has "only" attended 30.
