Chapters have surrendered their charters because alumni did not like the identity of one of their members and found it too difficult to be generous, compassionate and loyal comrades.

At our upcoming Grand Arch Council (GAC), I will introduce a Committee on Diversity and Inclusion. This Committee has already begun its work. Its mission is to develop policies and procedures where we can recruit and be welcoming of Honorable men from all walks of life. We want and need Honorable brothers of all identities to help us strive for intellectual, moral and spiritual excellence. We need these men to help strengthen our characters and deepen our integrity, and to counsel and guide us on our lifelong quest for noble perfection.

Our Creed and our Ritual clearly state Phi Kappa Psi is a lifelong commitment. It is a lifelong membership. Far too often, our members get initiated and disappear. Fortunately, many of

our members do not. At the GAC, we will celebrate the 100th Anniversary of the founding of the Order of the S.C.

The Order of the S.C., due solely to its secrecy, has received unwarranted criticism from some circles. Without revealing any secrets of the Order, I can say the Order and its Ritual is a celebration of those Brothers who with great pride view Phi Kappa Psi as a lifelong commitment. The Order is an acknowledgement of those Brothers who proudly say I am a Phi Psi and toast their devotion to the education and cultivation of Honorable men.

For those of you planning to attend GAC in Minneapolis, I say welcome, and I look forward to seeing you there. For those of you on the fence about wanting to attend, I urge you to strongly consider. **Phi Psi needs you**.

We have important work to be done, and we need you to be part of the solutions for the problems facing our Fraternity and the Greek world. For those of you, who feel you do not belong, or are not welcome, I assure you, your voice is wanted, your voice is needed and your voice is valued. Our doors will be opened to all who are willing to knock.

Most importantly, if you want to make your brotherhood better, if you want to enhance the experience for your brothers, but are unable to attend GAC, please get involved with a local chapter or alumni association. If there isn't one nearby, consider starting your own! Everyone at Headquarters would be more than happy to help you get involved.

At a quiet dinner in San Francisco last May, Brother Carlos Hernandez *Stanford* '78, shared with me some of the greatest wisdom I have received in my life: **People and institutions crave to know your distance travelled**. What is the path you have taken to get to your point in life? What lessons did you learn on that path and on your journey? The importance is, everyone's distance travelled, taken collectively, experiences shared, lessons learned improve the organization and you as an individual.

Throughout life, we travel great distances, encounter obstacles, challenges, learn and move on. How great would it be to include Honorable men from all walks all life to share their distance travelled, their experiences, and their wisdom, to make us better men, better fathers, better husbands, better sons, better uncles, better citizens and better brothers?

You are Phi Psi. I am Phi Psi. We are all Phi Psi.

I'll never forget April 13, 2000. It was a Thursday night. It was the night of my initiation into Phi Kappa Psi. I stood in a church, surrounded by my brothers and began a journey I had no idea would lead me to where I am today.

When I made the decision to join Phi Psi, there was still a hint of uncertainty in the back of my mind. Growing up in the suburbs of Columbus, Ohio, I'd grown acutely aware of the fact that the color of my skin mattered to some people. As a high schooler, I'd been called names, lost prom dates and had my abilities questioned, all because I was different. What I was not aware of at the time was that the fate of several men like me only 50 years prior, had taken a different path when they attempted to join Phi Kappa Psi.

I often find myself thinking about members who have been initiated into Phi Kappa Psi but no longer feel that they have a place in our fraternity. Perhaps you feel this way because of an experience you had as an undergraduate or alumni volunteer, an action or lack of action taken by our organization that made you feel that you were not valued, or a simple failure by our organization to assure you that you belong. I say this because for many years, I was one of those members.

I realize some wounds may be too deep to be healed, but I want to make sure that this message is extremely clear. **If you are an initiated member of Phi Kappa Psi in good standing, you are welcome here.** There are no asterisks or exceptions. There are no debates. When you were initiated, you made a lifelong commitment to the values and beliefs of this organization. When each member of this organization is initiated, he makes a commitment to support you as well. *Amici us que ad aras*.

The stories between these pages share just a glimpse of the amazing lives that our members lead around the world. I'm asking you to take a moment to share your story. Let us know where you've found success in your life. I want our members to read about Phi Psis like Dante Barry *Monmouth* '10, who has dedicated so much of his adult life to eradicating gun violence. I want our members to read about Scott Sutton *Lycoming* '04 (Winter 2018) who left an amazing gift for his son Alec before entering Chapter Eternal. I want people to see the work that Brother Eric Stark *Wabash* '85 (Fall/Winter 2019) is doing in the performing arts.

I want you to see the stories because I know how incredible they are. I've traveled this country for 16 years and met Phi Psis all over who are doing amazing things. There's still so many of you who I've not met who have stories to tell. Go ahead, pull out your pen and paper or open a Word document and start typing. You can send letters directly to me. I can't wait to read each and every one of them, respond, and help share your story.





Facing Uncertainty Together

Phi Kappa Psi responds to COVID-19

Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity was born on the idea of *The Great Joy of Serving Others*.

It was born on the idea of friends helping friends. Friends helping strangers. It was born during a time of great fear, strife, and sickness that had taken over the Jefferson College Campus and the surrounding Canonsburg Community.

168 years later, campuses and communities are once again frozen and are in a state of uncertainty. In the winter of 1850-51, it was typhoid fever that took over the small hamlet in western Pennsylvania. As this magazine goes to print on March 16, it is the Coronavirus (COVID-19) that is running rampage across our campuses, the United States, and the entire world.

COVID-19 represents something that we have not seen in generations — an outside threat that is challenging much of what we know about what is "normal." Phi Kappa Psi is as impacted by such uncertainty as any organization made up of members committed to a common set of values. Through united efforts our brotherhood was able to overcome previous battles; WWII which saw our chapter houses taken over to become barracks; the Spanish flu which rampaged our chapters and campuses like it did communities throughout the world, and any number of tumultuous economic circumstances that had deep impact on people and society.

It was William Henry Letterman and Charles Page Thomas Moore who took it upon themselves in 1852 to look after and care for those in their campus and neighborhood community who had come ill. Many of you today are following in their footsteps. You're delivering food and supplies to your elderly neighbors or those otherwise unable or fearful of going out. Some of you fall into a second category —

immunocompromised, having an existing health condition, or of a certain age that also puts you at a greater risk. Regardless of which category you fall into, or if you fall into the area somewhere in between, the most important thing that you can do, that we all can do; is to listen to the experts and follow the law, rules, and regulations put into place in your local communities.

It is an odd feeling to be going to print with *The Shield* today. What you will read when this arrives in your mailbox, assuming the mail goes through, is something written several weeks ago. At this time, 60 of the 101 campuses that host an active Phi Psi chapter have instructed their students to go home. This impacts hundreds of thousands of students. 6,000 of which are Phi Psis who are supported by hundreds of volunteers, each of which is thinking about how to support those students while also caring for their personal affairs. With all that has changed in our world in just the last few days, it is impossible to say what the circumstances will be as you read this piece. We can confidently share that the senior staff leadership and all national and local volunteer boards are diligently working through scenarios wherein we consider our social responsibility to each other foremost, and wherein we are addressing what we anticipate the needs of local chapters and undergraduates will be in the near future.

Great battles and trials have faced us as a nation and a Fraternity before, and we have triumphed and come out stronger every time. It is our firm belief that we shall come out stronger on the other side of this, regardless of what else happens.

We can think of no better way to close this message than with these simple and comforting words: "May Peace and Harmony ever be with us, and our Great Ruler in Heaven ever Guide us."



Alumni engagement is essential to Phi Psi's future success

Are you a Phi Psi who knows *The Great Joy of Serving Others?* Several hundred Phi Psi alumni get that "great joy" by serving their local Phi Psi chapter and mentoring young Phi Psi brothers.

While the Phi Kappa Psi experience is one where young men learn how to operate as a cohesive group, they also grow as individuals because of their fraternity experience. The personal growth, the leadership lessons, the learning from one's mistakes, the fun... that all comes with the experience. But at times it does require a little guidance from alumni. This is where volunteers come in.

Should you consider volunteering?

The most important consideration is whether you have a desire to serve your undergraduate brothers. If the answer is yes, then there's likely a role suited to your interests, location and time. There is also likely the need. Typically, volunteer roles fall into one of three major categories, but ultimately, they all have direct impact on students.

The Chapter Advisor

Young chapter leaders always require a little support, guidance and at times, a mentor to help them through difficult decisions. Advisors are there to guide and support; not lead. Each chapter requires at least a Chapter Advisor, but chapters should have additional volunteers to provide guidance in the areas of finance, recruitment, university relations, philanthropy, alumni relations and a number of other operational areas. Generally speaking, successful advisors attend at least one chapter meeting per month during the school year. This helps the

chapter get to know the advisor and associate a face with a name on paper or a voice on the phone. Scheduling regular touchpoints with student leaders is also a hallmark of an effective chapter volunteer.

The House Corporation volunteer

Housing is often a big part of fraternity life. Our undergraduate chapters need adequate housing that is competitive with their peers on campus. Those houses are managed, and oftentimes owned, by a House Corporation made up of Phi Psi alumni who manage the facility, the contracts with students, and the financial assets of the chapter that fall outside of undergraduate control.

Each Housing Corporation consists of a president, vice president, treasurer, secretary, and as many general Housing Corporation members as needed.

The Alumni Association volunteer

Phi Kappa Psi is a lifelong membership, not something that ends after graduation. Our alumni associations give Phi Psis an opportunity to continue that brotherhood through various social functions, events with a local chapter, and opportunities to vote at national Phi Psi conventions.

Alumni Associations consist of a president, vice president, treasurer, secretary, and must maintain a roster of at least 15 members to maintain their formal recognition by the Grand Arch Council. Alumni can maintain membership in multiple alumni associations, and we encourage you to be involved with one that is local to you or of significance to your chapter.




Attendees also nominate and elect Executive Council members to serve for the following two years and make committee recommendations to the Headquarters staff.





My International Ice Patrol Story started in 2014.

I was transiting through St. John's Newfoundland, Canada returning from my final Navy detachment as I was to retire from the Navy that November. There was a Coast Guard C-130 parked near where we parked our Navy C-130. I asked the ground support guy there at the airport what they were doing there? He said, "They're here for the International Ice Patrol." It was at that moment I said to myself: I'm going to fly with those guys and write a story about it.

In college, I wanted to be a Navy fighter pilot, but my vision rendered me ineligible. Instead, I snagged an aircrew position with the US Navy Reserve as a C-130 Loadmaster (non-pilot enlisted aircrew). I logged 4000 hours in 12 years as a member of the World-Famous VR-62 Nomads and visited 69 countries.

I knew the Coast Guard had an Auxiliary program that had a flying component. I joined the Auxiliary to land my story. During my first Air Safety meeting at Coast Guard Air Station Cape Cod, I told the Operations Officer I was a former C-130 Loadmaster with VR-62, and I wanted to write a story about the Iceberg Hunters. To my surprise, he said he flew with VR-61 before he transitioned to the Coast Guard. He said he would make a few phone calls.



Before I knew it, I received an invite to the annual International Ice Patrol conference in New London, CT. In a room filled with representatives from other nations involved with the International Ice Patrol, everyone was asked to introduce themselves. I let the introduction part go past me. Then someone else entered the room, and the Commanding Officer asked them to introduce themselves. After, the Commanding Officer pointed to me and said I think we missed you, please introduce yourself.

I spoke with the pilots and the Commanding Officer, and very soon, I was scheduled to meet the Coast Guard C-130 in New London CT for a flight with IRD3 (ice reconnaissance detachment 3 for FY19) to St. John's Newfoundland Canada to get my story.

Sometimes it's a matter of asking the question!

Brother's passionate pursuit positively impacts others

Today, Dante Barry *Monmouth '10* is a nationally recognized community leader promoting human rights solutions to ending gun violence.

Brother Barry is recognized among the country's most influential African American commentators by media giants including MTV, MSNBC, and the Huffington Post. In 2012, he founded Million Hoodies Movement for Justice, and was recently awarded Monmouth's inaugural Recent Graduate Award for excellence.

But his journey to pursuing his passion to make a positive difference in the lives of others didn't come easily.

"My mom struggled to put food on the table for my brother Jordan and me," Barry recalls. "I was ashamed of coming from a meager background."

He was awarded a scholarship to attend Monmouth from the Educational Opportunity Fund, a statewide program for first-generation college students. "Here I was on a nearly all-white campus. A first-generation college student trying to find where I fit in. I felt pressure to conform."

His initial quests to join a fraternity were marred by racial degradation during the rush process — not once, but twice. "I didn't need that. I was pretty much done with fraternities until the beginning of my senior year, when I got involved with the Phi

Psi colony. They were good people, people I could share my experiences with. I felt like I belonged."

For Brother Barry, Phi Kappa Psi helped redeem the integrity of what authentic Greek life means, restoring what had been broken in his first quest for bids: brotherhood and

friendship. "One of the things most important for me is to be in a relationship with people who share the same values as I do — who are not necessarily from the same background as I am. Phi Kappa Psi also provided me a lot of structure and learning in terms of how you run meetings with a clear purpose, conduct business, and follow Robert's Rules of Order."

Barry's passion in founding Million Hoodies Movement for Justice goes hand-in-hand with the principles in which Phi Psi is rooted. "It's about how to be in a respectful relationship with every human being, regardless of their identity. Everyone should feel valued. Everyone should feel they have worth.

"Million Hoodies Movement for Justice is about more than stopping gun violence. It's about larger issues surrounding that - providing education and health care and

opportunities for people to succeed. Everybody should have a shot at life, at happiness, and health. Some of us aren't afforded that yet; a lot of my passion is getting us to a place where we all have a social safety net."

His hope for Phi Psi is that the fraternity continues to lead the way in alcohol and drug abuse prevention; respect and equity among all persons, whether it's a woman, a gay person, a person of color. "I also think it's really, really important to have a mentorship program that connects alumni from different chapters, backgrounds, and areas of life experience so we can offer one another the chance to augment the life skills and build a more successful future for all."

Dante Barry holds a bachelor's degree in political science with a concentration in international relations and specialization in communications. He is a frequent commentator to Al Jazeera America and has appeared on The Daily Show with Jon Stewart, MSNBC, CNN, NPR, New York Times, Democracy Now, and Washington Post. Brother Barry is published in popular outlets such as The Nation Magazine, The Guardian, and Ebony Magazine. Beyond his career commitments, he greatly values spending time with his family.

Phi Psi has really shown me a way of showing love, care, and support for people who are in the Fraternity. That has made an impact in my life: you might not talk to them all the time, but they will be there for you.

I didn't know how I was going to re-engage with another fraternity again after an earlier negative rush experience, so I think Phi Psi has been a good place in my life.



OVERCOME Disabilities



Brother Luke Campbell *Wittenberg* '17 found his passion in sports — particularly baseball — early on in life.

"Being someone that was born with one arm, I always relied on sports to gain that sense of normalcy I was missing in my life," says Campbell. "People aren't afraid to stare when you have a disability, so I wanted to give them something to look at. Playing baseball at the collegiate level

was a blessing and reassured me that I can overcome any obstacle in my life."

Driven by his own experience, Campbell started a campaign to give people with disabilities, like his own, the opportunity to participate in athletics, however that may look for them. What started as a simple tweet has flourished in the last eight months.

"I sent out a tweet with my story and from there, it really took off. People have been spreading the word about OVERCOME ever

since," shares Campbell. He began selling bracelets, stickers and shirts with a logo he designed to raise awareness and funds to support his campaign. Since launching the campaign in September of 2019, Campbell has donated \$4,500 to organizations that give athletes who have a disability the opportunity to excel in sports.

In February, Campbell took OVERCOME one step further. He competed in Wittenberg University's Department of Business third annual "Tiger Tank", a comparison to ABC's Shark Tank, where students get to pitch their ideas to select Wittenberg alumni. Campbell pitched his vision for OVERCOME and won the grand prize package worth \$25,000.





Campbell's vision is for OVERCOME to become a registered non-profit to host camps and events for children with disabilities so they too can participate in athletics. "I wish I had a role model that looked like me growing up. I want them to have someone they can relate too and can show them the only limitations they have are the ones they put

Phi Psi has been a strong support system for Campbell. "Since starting OVERCOME, my chapter has helped me raise money, host events, and spread the word about the mission of my organization," he says. "Every member of Phi Psi wants to see the guy next to them succeed. Without my brothers pushing and expecting the best from me, I don't know if I would've been confident enough to start this initiative."

Developing Opportunities

Brother Kevin Norgaard *UC Irvine* '17 was introduced to software engineering when he began developing an app for his high school peers to talk about the things that were happening on campus or in the news. The app gained a userbase of 800 students and 40 clubs. "The initial app release took an entire summer of weekly meetings at a local Starbucks," says Norgaard. "After the release, work continued by getting direct feedback from our users and making changes accordingly. While this experience gave me technical skills, I also learned to network with local businesses, work as a team, get out of my comfort zone, and transform a vision into a reality." Norgaard now uses the skills he learned when developing the app by creating and maintaining web apps for others, including his own chapter's website.

Music has also had a big impact of Norgaard's life, helping to keep him in balance. He began playing the saxophone in middle school and played for two years in advanced band followed by a year of jazz band. He used his musical experience to represent Phi Psi during his freshmen year in a male talent show hosted by another Greek organization on campus. "I produced a beat, performed a rap, and won the competition," says Norgaard. "Producing music helps me feel balanced when I am furious, disappointed, etc. It has helped me through stressful times, channeled my creativity, and made me who I am today."

Norgaard gives credit to his mentor, Brother Carlos Hernandez *Stanford '78*, for helping him work toward his career goals. "After assessing Brother Hernandez's LinkedIn account, noting his

Stanford degree and excellent recommendations, I knew he had something, but I didn't know what exactly," shares Norgaard. "I messaged Brother Hernandez through LinkedIn where I pitched him a start-up that I was involved with and asked him to be my mentor." The two had never met in person but started exchanging ideas through biweekly calls. They eventually met at the 2018 Grand Arch Council.

Norgaard. "He helped me identify and execute many aspects of my personal and professional life.

Norgaard has benefited from Phi Psi and several programs

that the brotherhood offers undergraduates, including the Professional Development Conference (PDC). "PDC fast-tracked my professional growth, taught me dining etiquette, refined my career plan and pitch, and built bonds with unfamiliar faces," says Norgaard. "If anyone is on the fence about applying for a Fraternity program, my recommendation would be to go for it. It just may change your life."



During four weekends in January and February in 13 locations across the country, Phi Psi hosted Regional Officer Training.



Remembering the 'Other' Widow Letterman



We are familiar with the story of the Widow Letterman.

"On the 19th of February, 1852, in the upper room of the house occupied by the Widow Letherman, Canonsburg, Pennsylvania, Phi Kappa Psi was born."¹

The "Widow Letherman," of course, refers to Anna Ritchie Letherman². Anna was the daughter of Craig and Mary Jane Ritchie, Scottish immigrants from Glasgow who settled in the southwestern Pennsylvania town of Canonsburg. There Craig Ritchie prospered as a merchant. Anna met and married Jonathan Letherman, a young doctor who had studied at Jefferson College in Canonsburg.3 To this marriage six children were born, including three sons. Craig Ritchie Letherman, Beta Theta Pi, was named after his maternal grandfather, and known to the family as "Ritchie." Jonathan Letherman, M.D., Beta Theta Pi, was named after his father, and became Medical Director of the Army of the Potomac during the Civil War. The youngest son was William Henry Letherman, co-founder of Phi Kappa Psi. Unfortunately, in 1844, Dr. Jonathan Letherman, the elder, died, leaving his widow Anna to raise her children alone. Thus the reference to the "Widow Letterman."

Like his brothers, William Henry Letterman attended Jefferson College. He graduated in 1853 as the valedictorian of his class. Upon graduation, he attended Jefferson Medical College in Philadelphia, graduating in 1856.⁴ He practiced medicine in Pennsylvania and Baltimore, and served as a civilian contract surgeon in the U.S. Army in the Civil War. He then practiced in Cotton Hill, West Virginia until 1875.⁵ He then moved west to Missouri.

The Slaughters of Culpeper

In the 1870s, in Prairie Home, Cooper County, Missouri, there was living a young woman named Laura A. Slaughter. Cooper County is in central Missouri, just across the Missouri River to the west of Boone County, location of Columbia, the University of Missouri, and our Missouri Alpha chapter. Miss

Slaughter was descended from quite a noteworthy family. Her third great-grandfather was Francis Slaughter of Culpeper County, Virginia.⁶ Francis Slaughter and his brother, Robert, were the first wardens of St. Mark's Parish of the Anglican Church, established at Germanna, Culpeper County, Virginia, in 1731.⁷ The Slaughters of Culpeper were descended of English stock with the family's chief seats in Hertfordshire, Gloucester, and Worcester.⁸ Subsequent generations of the family held positions of authority, and among them there were seven officers of the Revolution. 9 Miss Laura's parents were Professor Alfred Slaughter of Rappahannock County, Virginia, and Laura Wheaton Abbott Slaughter, of Rockingham County, Virginia. Prof. and Mrs. Slaughter had moved west in pursuit of Alfred's teaching career. In the 1870s, Prof. Slaughter served as principal of The Prairie Home Institute, a co-educational preparatory school. His daughter, Laura A. Slaughter, was also on the faculty.10

In May, 1874, Laura travelled to Cotton Hill, West Virginia, to visit her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Isaac H. Abbott. There she met Dr. William Henry Letterman. On September 28, 1875, Miss Laura A. Slaughter married Dr. William Henry Letterman in Cooper County, Missouri, Elder B. G. Tutt presiding. After the wedding, William and Laura travelled in West Virginia. During that trip they travelled from White Sulphur Springs to Kanawha Falls in the company of Brother Charles Page Thomas Moore. It was the first opportunity for the new bride Laura to meet Judge Moore, and she enjoyed the conversation of the reunited Letterman and Moore. In November, 1875, William and Laura moved to Prairie Home.

Texas connection

In 1878, William and Laura left Missouri and moved to the small village of Duffau, Erath County, in the hill country of Texas. Two children were born to the couple. Their daughter, born in 1876 in Prairie Home, was named Laura after her mother and grandmother. Their son, born in Duffau in 1879, was named William Gordon, and known to the family as "W.G." Unfortunately, William Henry's health failed. Ritchie Letterman joined the family in Texas to help care for William Henry, but to no avail. In 1881, William Henry Letterman died at age 48, and is buried at Duffau, Texas. The young Laura Slaughter Letterman, then age 27 and with two young children, became the second Widow Letterman. Soon thereafter, Laura and the children, of necessity, moved back to her parents' home, then in Pike County, Missouri. 14 Professor Slaughter had left The Prairie Home Institute to become head of McCune College in the town of Louisiana, Pike County, Missouri, on the Mississippi River upstream from St. Louis. Ritchie Letterman stayed behind in Texas.

Laura later married Mr. William Boyer, who was a minister.¹⁵ The Boyers settled at 5506 Maple Avenue, St. Louis.¹⁶ The home, which is no longer standing, was located in the 'north of Delmar' section

of St. Louis, near the boundary between the Visitation Park and West End neighborhoods. When Laura and William Henry's children reached adulthood, daughter Laura married John Lynott. W.G. married Mary Sparks and practiced dentistry in the St. Louis area. Late in his life, suffering from blindness, Ritchie Letterman returned from Texas and joined the family in the home on Maple Avenue.

Grand Arch Council

In 1902, W.G. Letterman and his sister, Laura Lynott, attended the semi-centennial Grand Arch Council at Pittsburgh. On April 2, 1902, during the GAC, two hundred fifty Phi Psis travelled by special train to Canonsburg, Pennsylvania. ¹⁷ William Gordon Letterman was initiated into Phi Kappa Psi in the old college hall of Jefferson College at Canonsburg. ¹⁸

Laura Lynott had no children. She lost her husband, John, in 1908. Based upon the great interest she had always shown in Phi Kappa Psi, the Fraternity of her father and brother, Laura Lynott was known as "the only Sister to 7,000 Brothers." W.G. and Mary Sparks Letterman had two children. Their son, Gordon Sparks Letterman Missouri '38, married Elma Allen, and they were the parents of Gordon R. Letterman West Virginia '72. Their daughter, Laura Marie Letterman, married Calvin Ellis, and they were the parents of Jonathan Ellis Missouri '73.

Bellefontaine Cemetery

Armed with the foregoing information and search engine technology, it was not difficult to locate the final resting place of Laura Slaughter Letterman Boyer. Laura, who died in 1937, is buried in Bellefontaine Cemetery, a grand old cemetery in the north end of St. Louis. The Slaughter/Letterman/ Ellis family plot No. 5012 can be easily located by using the search tool on the Bellefontaine Cemetery website. 20 Those buried in the family plot are Prof. Alfred and Laura Abbott Slaughter; William Boyer, Laura Slaughter Letterman Boyer, John and Laura Lynott; W.G. and Mary Sparks Letterman; Laura Marie Ellis; and Ritchie Letterman. In February, 2019, as part of the St. Louis Alumni Association Founders' Day celebration, I made the journey to Laura's grave. I was joined by Steve O'Rourke Missouri '74, and Wynn 'Wheels' Wiegand Missouri '74. To our surprise, we found no stone at Laura's grave. We found it curious that no stone was placed at the grave, particularly because it is next to the grave of Laura's second husband, William Boyer, and his grave is marked with a stone. Upon reflection, we reminded ourselves that Laura died in 1937. In that year, our nation was revisited with a severe economic downturn which rivalled the earlier years of the Great Depression. 1936 had been the hottest year in decades in the nation's heartland. Many Midwestern farms had failed and related markets suffered. One speculates, but perhaps in those years the placement of granite monuments was not the highest priority for families in the Midwestern United States. It was hard times. A few years later, the attention of our nation was consumed by World War II. The absent grave stone, once overlooked, may have faded from memory.

Rest in peace

But now, with the very able assistance of Mr. Richard Lay, Vice-President of Customer Relations, Bellefontaine Cemetery Association, St. Louis, and with the advice and consent of Brother Gordon R. Letterman, a stone has been obtained and is placed at the grave of Laura Slaughter Letterman Boyer. The stone commemorates Laura's life and her marriages to William Henry Letterman and William L. Boyer. For those who wish to experience a small part of Phi Psi history, a visit to the family plot in Bellefontaine is well worthwhile. While Laura now has a stone, it might also be noted that there are no stones at the graves of Prof. Alfred and Laura Abbott Slaughter, nor at the grave of Ritchie Letterman. But those are tasks for another day. Rest in peace, Miss Laura. Our thoughts are with you.




