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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Pemission to be HUMAAN

I want to dedicate this President's Message to focusing on three things that I feel are at the heart of the Phi Psi experience vulnerability, resilience and communitybuilding. These three traits are essential elements in a successful life and career. They are qualities that you probably developed and refined through your life, but I am sure that your Phi Psi experience

made these features stronger in you than they would have been otherwise.

Vulnerability

So, what is vulnerability, why should it be considered a strength and how does Phi Psi develop it in its members?

To me, vulnerability is giving yourself permission to be human

and to be a genuine, authentic person. People who reveal vulnerability are relatable. They are approachable. When people show vulnerability, it humanizes them in the eyes of their peers or teammates. It demonstrates authenticity and transparency, making it easier for others to relate to and trust them. People tend to connect more with others who acknowledge their own imperfections and challenges.

Phi Psi is certainly an organization that helps us develop vulnerability. No matter our accomplishments as students, campus leaders or athletes, few of us escape our college years

without being brought down a peg or two by our chapter brothers – especially when we need it ... when we get a little too full of ourselves. That vulnerability continues as alumni, no matter what success or accomplishments we experience after college. We are still known by the simple loving term "Brother" to all who knew us in college and often still known by our old — and sometimes embarrassing — nicknames.

For example, I was recently on a virtual meeting of my original chapter's house corporation where I was warmly greeted by my nickname, which was funny when I was 18, but it is not as cool to be called "Porkchop" 40 plus years later. I certainly felt vulnerable, but also welcomed and embraced.

Resilience

I believe Phi Psi also helps its members develop resilience and supports them in overcoming challenges. How does it do that?

First, Phi Psi offers a supportive community based on brotherhood, which by definition is supposed to be greater than friendship. The basic idea here is that men who are truly trying to be as close as blood brothers will not let their fellow Phi Psis give up and succumb to challenges.

Our Ritual encourages and even compels us to expect more from our brothers than they are currently demonstrating or even imagining they are capable of achieving. In addition, being a Phi Psi should mean that we are the toughest critics of our brothers and say things that our we brothers may not always want to hear. These types of tough love messages are delivered with a good purpose in mind, and to build up and not tear down

another Phi Psi.

When I was an undergraduate, I had the opportunity to confront a brother who when sober was a great guy and very popular, but who, on occasions when he would drink more than he should, become combative and aggressive. While I picked a terrible time to confront him (one night at a party when he was drunk, combative and aggressive), in the clarity and sobriety of the next day he told me that no one had ever identified his behavior as being an issue. He actually thanked

me for saying something. I was relieved and satisfied that my chapter brother was willing to be resilient in the face of a challenging situation.

Did you have an experience as an undergraduate Phi Psi where either a brother challenged you to change some behavior or tendency that was holding you back or you had the opportunity to challenge a brother to make a change?

Reflecting on these situations is not only a good endorsement of the value of Phi Psi but also can help us remember that our duty to helping brothers is never discharged even after we leave the campus and our chapter.

THE LESSONS I'VE LEARNED

To be candid, I had prepared myself for the possibility of not receiving a bid. I acknowledged that I didn't fit the stereotype

of fraternity. I never perceived myself as "cool," and I was one of very few who had navigated an entire semester of college without consuming a drop of alcohol. Adding to that the color of my skin ... yes, that was a concern. Was it justified? Probably not, but I didn't explicitly ask, and no one explicitly told me that it wasn't.

As I opened the yellow envelope and pulled out two bids, I felt a sense of relief.

The choice was not difficult. My conversations with the men of Phi Kappa Psi were genuine, and I felt at home every minute that I spent with them. It never dawned on me that this decision would commence a lifelong journey. Furthermore, the thought of Fraternity extending well beyond the carefully manicured campus of Butler University also eluded me.

I can't claim that my next three and a half years as an undergraduate member of Phi Kappa Psi were stellar. At 19 years old, although the Fraternity was important to me, I encountered other challenges that got in the way. Despite the scholarships, grants, and loans that covered my tuition, I juggled two and sometimes three jobs at a time to pay dues and have some spending money. I was also learning how to manage my time, between schoolwork, Fraternity obligations, and my family. Above all, I was still trying to figure out who I was.

Ultimately, the challenges in my life opened my eyes to what being part of Phi Kappa Psi really meant to me. You see, when considering membership and fearing the worst, it was easy for me to see what set me apart from the others in my chapter. However, over the next three and a half years, I came to realize how much more we shared in common than the differences I initially saw.

Just like the others, in Phi Kappa Psi I found a home away from home. A family that was there for me when my biological family was a few hundred miles away. Older brothers to challenge me and younger brothers to offer advice to. A road trip would often turn into an educational journey, while spirited debate often resulted in a newfound respect of those with differing opinions. Community service opportunities offered a window into the world outside of the bubble that I'd grown up in. Most of all, packed into a room every Sunday evening at 8 p.m. for chapter meetings, the leadership, teamwork and trust that we placed upon one another showed me what was possible when a group of well-intentioned college students came together to get stuff done.

Of course, there were some college shenanigans that came along the way, and yes, those experiences brought forth valuable lessons as well. With each encounter came a new life lesson, and with each lesson a deeper sense of loyalty grew. It's been two decades since I graduated from Butler, but Phi Psi continues to be a source of support and growth for me.

Every fall a new group of students step onto a college campus, ready to embark on a newfound four-year journey. With the first taste of freedom comes numerous questions and challenges, an exploration to unpack the first 18 years of their lives. It's not an easy road, and I can't imagine it's an easy journey to travel alone.

I wouldn't be the man I am today without the love, care and guidance of my parents and my family at home. However, it is my brothers in Phi Kappa Psi who helped me understand who that man really is.

Oregon Alpha Earns Charter While Celebrating 100 Years ON THE ROAD TO SUCCESS

The Oregon Alpha chapter is officially a 100-year-old startup. Founded in 1923, our chapter has experienced a few absences from the University of Oregon in times of war, social upheaval, and anti-establishment sentiment on campus. But, in 2018, it was our own behavior that resulted in losing our charter. So, with our 100th anniversary just years away, we found ourselves in start-up mode.

Our local alumni immediately started planning our return with three goals in mind: earn our charter, grow the chapter membership enough to reoccupy our house, and organize a topnotch 100th Anniversary celebration in Eugene, Oregon — all in a two-year period. We were not entirely confident we could pull all three of these off, but we had a lot of alumni support behind us and knew we could make a good run at it.

Any brothers around the country that have been involved in the chartering process know it is a heavy lift for alumni and undergraduates alike. The keys to our success were coordinating closely with Phi Kappa Psi and the University of

Oregon, forming a Chapter Advisory team of alumni to offload the House Corporation, committing to hiring an expansion consultant for at least two years, and communicating regularly with our alumni. We were committed to doing this the right way and it paid off at our 100th Anniversary celebration.

100th Anniversary

The Oregon Alpha 100th Anniversary event took place in Eugene on August 17-20, 2023. Nearly 200 people participated in a reception, golf tournament, BBQ at the chapter house, tours of the world-class athletic facilities at Oregon (Go Ducks!), and a formal dinner at a downtown hotel.

The highlight of the weekend was earning our charter. Executive Director Ron Ransom *Butler '00* and Executive Council President Bob Marchesani *Butler '94 (IUP '79)* were joined by six other national representatives to present the Oregon Alpha charter to our Alpha class of 26 members. The moment represented a lot of hard work and a culmination of events that helped us reach all three of our goals set several years earlier. The 100th Anniversary was everything we hoped it would be, and more.

This could not have happened without the tireless efforts of dozens of alumni volunteers serving on the various boards and committees. Three in particular deserve special recognition: House Corporation President Eric Mueller '93, Chapter Advisory Chair Mike Billings '87, 100th Anniversary Chair Bob Hastings '74. We are also incredibly grateful to brother PJ Sarkar *ASU* '20 who has served as our expansion consultant and resident live-in advisor for two years.

The Work Is Just Beginning

As tempting as it might be to think our work is done, we know it's just the beginning. We are now designing a new mentoring program to help our undergraduate brothers fully realize the value of brotherhood in their lives and make professional connections that will give them a head start after graduation. This start-up is now on the road to success at the University of Oregon.

Carole remembers her son, Tayton T. Troidl *RIT '18*, being full of life and into "everything." Tayton says he recalls little of his childhood, compartmentalized into a box that he didn't know he wanted to reopen. A singular week with his father, Darryl, when he was nine or ten years old was the only instance of paternal effort he received. For most of his life, Tayton was primarily raised by Carole and his grandmother. They loved him dearly, but a void followed him where he lacked male role models.

"His dad would promise him money and gifts and he never came through," noted Carole. "There was constant disappointment there."

High school for Tayton didn't begin well. Unhappy with his environment, he neglected homework and his grades suffered. Concerned that he might get into fights or drop out of school, he was placed in alternative education.

Tayton says the school change is what ultimately prepared him for college. "They really put in the effort for kids who wanted to expand their lives beyond what they were dealt," he said. Despite his initial challenges, Tayton went on to graduate from high school and became the first member of his family to enroll in college. After a few years at a local college, Tayton decided to transfer to RIT in Rochester, New York.

Phi Psi is Happy Accident

Arriving at RIT, Tayton found himself unfamiliar with anyone. This wasn't a surprise, given his tendency to keep to himself, compounded by the fact that most of his high school peers didn't pursue higher education. Nonetheless, it didn't take him long to make acquaintance with an upperclassman during orientation. Tayton described him as "someone he wanted to emulate." At the end of orientation, as each of them were going their separate ways, the upperclassman extended an offer to Tayton to reach out to him if he needed anything.

Shortly thereafter, Tayton remembers a day when he felt sad. Alone in a new place, he did something that surprised himself — he reached out to the upperclassman and shared his feelings. 'I want to be like you' Tayton texted.



In response, the upperclassman invited him to gatherings with friends to help Tayton integrate into the college experience. While Tayton wasn't fond of social interaction with others, he found himself in a situation where he had to engage with unfamiliar people — and he enjoyed it. Through these conversations, he discovered enlightening connections with like-minded individuals. These interactions allowed him to connect with people and engage in enthusiastic discussions through genuine, thought-provoking dialogue. So, he kept coming back. Eventually, it dawned on him that these weren't ordinary gatherings. They were recruitment events for Phi Kappa Psi. After Tayton realized he was being recruited to join Phi Psi, the chapter members told him to look at other fraternities and consider all his options. "For me it was such an organic interaction, "he said. "I never thought about joining another group of people.

'A Life in Boxes'

Even though his father was only present in his life until he was seven or eight, Tayton doesn't remember much from his childhood. His mother Carole believes he may have blocked many of the unpleasant memories out of his mind. "He had a good side to him," Carole said referring to Tayton's father. "He could be charming, he could be funny, but there was that dark evil side of him that I didn't know in the beginning that you start to see more over time." On January 18, 2021, Darryl suffered a heart attack and died. Tayton would never get the opportunity to talk directly with his father to fill in some of those memories or understand why his father never delivered on his promises.

With burning questions about his father's life, Tayton decided to seek answers by creating a documentary as his capstone project for his film and animation degree. "There were things that I feel like I needed to express to him and that I wanted him to express to me, and that got taken away from me too soon," Tayton said. "This was a way to put a close to that chapter and move on." He traveled to the house where Darryl lived in Dayton, Ohio. With an entire production crew in tow, Tayton asked former neighbors, family, and friends about his father.

Tayton described the experience as chaos. Good, organized chaos. "You can plan everything under the sun," he laughed. "But when a wrench gets thrown in your plan, you have to just adapt." Throughout the process, Tayton focused on treating people right. "You call in favors, you ask people to do things," he said. "It doesn't mean you need to ask people to do unreasonable things or not accommodate them." Reflecting on the reception of his film, he credits the unwavering support of his Phi Psi brothers, stating, "I could not have done it without the love and support of my chapter brothers."


Tayton titled his documentary "A Life in Boxes." What started

as a capstone project has become an award-winning film. The documentary won Best Documentary Student Filmmakers: East Region at the Directors Guild of America (DGA) Student Film Awards. His film was shown at the Buffalo International Film Festival and the Urban Mediamaker Film Festival in October 2023.

My Life Changed for the Better

Tayton didn't embark on his college journey with the intention of creating a documentary about his childhood or his father. "They were the cards that were dealt to me," he said. The same can be said for his decision to join Phi Kappa Psi. "I was just a very socially awkward kid going into college," he reflected. "Somehow this group of people accepted me for who I was at that time and constantly tried to make me better — and did make me better."

"A Life in Boxes" teaches we can't control the boxes we're given, but we can decide what to do with its contents.

HOME AT LAST

Parallel lives of WWII heroes, chapter brothers and their families span 80 years

A chapter already steeped in Phi Psi tradition; history is being made at Pennsylvania Alpha. It is a place where brothers who have committed their loyalty — and their lives — to the organization and our country are home at last.

In the Summer 2023 issue of *The Shield*, we reported the discovery of a WWII pilot's remains — a fantastic story on its own, and yet there's a sequel! Another brother, Charles (Chuck) Reynolds *W&J* '39, was reported missing in 1943.

1st Lt. Reynolds and 1st Lt. William (Bill) Montgomery *W&J* '38 had more in common than their rank in the military. They were chapter brothers who played basketball together, which *The Shield* (Jan. 1940) recorded: "Bill Montgomery, Al Skinner *W&J* '39, and Art Marston *W&J* '39 were also varsity men. Chuck Reynolds was high scorer with sixteen points in the first basketball game of the year...".

Both served their country as pilots in World War II. Their similarities did not end there, as fate and the fight against fascism took them to foreign shores.

Reynolds, stationed in New Guinea, crashed his B-25 plane into a lagoon and was last seen waving to his comrades from its wing. Presumed alive in the jungles of the Pacific, he was never heard from again.

Montgomery flew his B-24H bomber over France and received Nazi air fire. He sputtered to England in his smoking plane, which fell to the earth near Arundel castle. His crew parachuted to safety, saved by the pilot's skill and heroism.

Both lieutenants made the ultimate sacrifice. Neither came home. Their next mention in *The Shield* would be in Chapter Eternal. Until enhanced scientific testing in 2023 revealed and confirmed their identities.

Digging posed challenges, as Montgomery's plane had impacted the English turf so hard, it buried him to an unreachable depth. Awaiting his journey home, a rosette

was placed at the site bearing a Phi Psi mantra, "United by Friendship, Sustained by Honor, Led by Truth, We Live and Flourish."

When the excavation uncovered Montgomery's remains, DNA and his Fraternity signet ring positively identified him.

Meanwhile, scientists analyzed a tomb for an unidentified American soldier in the Philippines, and the results confirmed they had also recovered Lt. Reynolds! The friends would finally come home — and within the same calendar year.

Lt. Mongomery was honored on September 13, 2023, receiving full military honors at Arlington National Cemetery. SWGP Bob Marchesani *Butler '94 (IUP'79)* and Duncan Forsyth Esq. *WebJ '71*, attended the ceremony. They were able to meet Montgomery's nephew and namesake, Bill, and present him with the Military Shield of Honor. After Bill received a copy of *The Shield* last fall, he called HQ to thank us for honoring his uncle. "I am really moved to have such a wonderful piece about him in the magazine, and to have Phi Psi members attend the service and receive the medal ... it's overwhelming. Thank you!"

Marchesani, too, was overwhelmed, "It was a true honor to

attend Brother Montgomery's service. What an unforgettable experience." Less than a week later, he read and reported to HQ the account of Lt. Reynolds' remains — another Phi Psi from the same chapter!

When Matt Gariano *W&J* '22 and Nick Reeping *W&J* '22 learned about their lost chapter brothers, they were compelled to attend Reynold's ceremony in late September. Brothers Gariano and Reeping met through wrestling as freshmen at Washington & Jefferson and pledged Phi Psi together — a camaraderie in sports and brotherhood, much like the lieutenants.

In Bridgeport, Ohio, Reynolds' hometown, people lined the streets to wave American flags while the funeral procession rolled by. Congregating at a local funeral home, veterans, family members and the two young chapter brothers rose to speak in Reynolds' honor. The family shared immense gratitude at the turn out.

Charles Marty, Lt Reynold's nephew and namesake, told those gathered how he was born on Memorial Day, 1949, when the family had finally come to accept the loss of their relative. He recounted the story of how Uncle Chuck slouched during the enlisting process so that he would not exceed the height limit for pilots. Such was his dedication to the cause.

Gariano and Reeping realized they had experienced something bigger than themselves, looking at the broader scope of service to others. "The ceremony gave me a sense of selflessness. Like Lt. Reynolds, you can impact people's lives," Reeping said.

Gariano agreed, saying the ceremony aligned with Phi Psi's value of "becoming a better person."

The lives of these young men — then and now — indeed reflect the camaraderie and loyalty of Phi Psi. Their stories span generations and will be forever chronicled as part of our rich history and certainly will live on at Pennsylvania Alpha.

Gariano and Reeping didn't realize their parallels with the lieutenants. Their similarities played out before there was knowledge of them. Likewise, neither nephew was aware of the resemblance in their legacies — both being namesakes of longlost, but never forgotten, war heroes.

History plays out before our eyes and often repeats, while our brotherhood remains steadfast. That's what Fraternity is: a living story.

AGAINST ALLODDS

Brad Cousino *Miami '73* hoped that scoring a touchdown would protect him from abuse today. His parents embraced and celebrated from the sidelines, sharing high fives with surrounding parents, the biggest fans of their budding football star son while in public. But in his book, "Unwanted, Unworthy, UNSHACKLED," Brad describes the terror no one could see through the

windows of the Cousino bungalow. Beatings and solitary confinement were frequent throughout Brad's childhood, shaping his understanding of family through a lens of trauma.

Football was a lot of things to Brad — an escape from his reality, a fleeting moment of parental approval, an outlet for his own frustrations and anger, and soon, a pathway to college.

Brad recognized his best chance at college would be through an athletic scholarship. Due to his smaller stature, Brad was overlooked by every college football program even after making the first-team All-League, All-City, All-District, and All-Regional on offense and defense in high school. Rather than throwing in the towel, Brad

acted, mailing dozens of packets out with letters and highlight reels, begging for the opportunity to prove himself on the field.

Finally, the call came. Brad earned a walk-on spot on Miami University's football team.

With so much of his life revolving around football, Brad decided to explore Greek life at Miami. He attended a few Rush events, but kept hearing the same thing, 'Hell Week'. The concept of acceptance through physical and mental torment was inconceivable to Brad. He couldn't imagine putting himself in the line of more trauma. He'd already lived through so much.

Then, he heard of a new fraternity with an ambitious and positive spin on hell week from a fellow football walk-on, Paul Apyan *Miami '72*.

A 1975 issue of *The Shield* referenced the young chapter: "colony members believed that 'Hell Week's' hazing and general beratement of pledges was detrimental and immature. As an alternative, they introduced the concept of 'Help Week,' which emphasized the positive approach of this chapter. They felt that it was the responsibility of the chapter to do something FOR a pledge, not something TO him. Stressed during the first pledge program were the ideals of good scholarship, university involvement and community service..."

"They weren't interested in tearing someone down. They wanted to build people up. They went out looking for projects to help others on campus and in the community," Brad said with a smile.

Ohio Lambda offered Brad a community outside of the locker room to build healthy, lasting relationships. His football schedule

and scholastic responsibilities kept Brad from living in the chapter house and fully participating in Fraternity happenings, but he made the most of the time he did have building the bonds of brotherhood.

"50 years later and we're still friends. There's still a group of guys that I can call at any given point in time and they're there. They support me. That's what matters."

Because of his small size, Brad went undrafted following college, but he became the only rookie

free agent to make an NFL team in 1975! He led the league in special teams' plays. Brad played for the Cincinnati Bengals, the New York Giants and Pittsburgh Steelers. Breaking the cycle of multi-generational abuse, Brad is the proud and loving father of four adult children and 11 grandchildren with his wife of 46 years, Tami Cousino, whom he met on a blind date at a Phi Psi event!

Brad shares his story with tens of thousands and consults with small to mid-sized companies using his team-oriented perspective. He published his harrowing memoir in November 2022. "Unwanted, Unworthy, UNSHACKLED" is available at Amazon.com and Barnes Noble.com. Brad credits Brother Apyan and his Big Brother, Larry Larson *Miami '72* for helping frame his Phi Psi story within the publication.

Brad's incredible experience of overcoming familial abuse is in preliminary discussions with three production companies to make his memoir into film.






STUDY ABROAD | FULBRIGHT INTERNSHIP IN WALES

Having the opportunity to attend the Fulbright UK Summer Institute in Wales during the summer of 2023 was certainly a life-shaping experience. I was drawn to the program because of its mission of developing leaders and cultural ambassadors and the chance to learn and discuss serious issues alongside like-minded peers. Given recent events in American society, I felt it was crucial that, as an aspiring leader, I should try to equip myself with the tools necessary to facilitate meaningful discussion on these increasingly contentious problems, both on campus and in my local community.



I believe that my time in Wales helped me to do that and so much more. From the moment I arrived, I was embraced by a welcoming community that was more than willing to share their beautiful country with me and my cohort. In particular, the two peer mentors attached to our group worked tirelessly to ensure that our experience was as engaging and fulfilling as it could be through showing us around the nearby town of Aberystwyth and taking us on trips up and down the length of the country to visit royal fortresses, Iron Age villages and more.

Although the core of the program was centered around lectures and discussions from faculty at Aberystwyth University on topics relating to Welsh cultural identity, I believe it was the time spent outside

the classroom that will stay with me the longest. While I did enjoy hearing from the lecturers about everything from ancient myths to modern-day political tensions, I was always looking forward to when classes would end for the day, and I could go with my group to see what Wales had to offer.

Every day was a new experience, from walking through castle ruins nestled between wind-swept hills to speaking with elected officials in the Welsh Parliament about their fight for independence. It seemed that every interaction I had was an invitation to learn about Welsh culture and history, and I eagerly accepted each one. I can confidently say that I gained more firsthand knowledge on the struggles of Welsh public education over pints at a local pub than I did in a lecture room. This meant that in addition to gaining a deeper understanding of the foundations of national identity and guidance on how to be a better leader when discussing these subjects, I also came away from the trip with countless fond memories that I will carry with me through college and beyond.

I would be remiss if I did not mention the pivotal role that my Fraternity brothers at Indiana Gamma played in my time abroad. They were there for me at every step: encouraging me to apply, reviewing my application essays, and reaching out to me when I was away to see how I was doing. I'm extremely grateful to have a community of brothers like the one I have here at Wabash.

STUDY ABROAD | PUBLIC HEALTH IN RURAL INDIA

Taking the Hard Route

My experiences in college have been led by two philosophies that I credit Phi Psi for teaching me — exploiting every possible opportunity available to me, and to always seek a challenge. These challenges have taken different forms in my college



career, be it in academics with two majors and two minors, extracurriculars like being on the University Speech and Debate Team, or the kind of challenge that makes you question its worth, makes you bang your head against the wall, but ultimately provides you with greater satisfaction than all your other activities put together — like my Fraternity. One of our alumni (and the brother I hold responsible for recruiting me to the chapter) once told me that taking

the harder route will leave you with the greatest possible sense of satisfaction; taking the easy way out is not the Phi Psi way. And so, I applied this principle to my professional life and began looking into internships in healthcare.

Leading into the summer of 2023, I knew I wanted to have an experience in the realm of public health. I also knew that I wanted to go abroad alone, being that I had never undertaken a task like that before. I decided to investigate going to India, though not

my first time there. I am ethnically Indian and speak two Indian languages, and I was certain there were many experiences in public health to choose from by going to a nation that is still developing.

While searching online for organizations to work with, I stumbled upon Raah Foundation, a nonprofit based in Mumbai aimed at empowering tribal communities in Western India.

Working with the Raah Foundation was truly a riveting experience. I got to see their corporate office in a well-to-do part of Southern Mumbai, and just a few weeks after landing, got to visit Jawhar, a municipality where Raah first started its work.

Originally, the nonprofit focused its efforts on water retention and sustainable agriculture in the tribal Warli community in Jawhar but have since expanded to other projects like afforestation and job-skills training for the unemployed in Jawhar and other places nearby. They were extremely flexible when I asked if I could work on a public health project instead, stating that it was up to me how I wanted to help the community, and that I should not limit myself by worrying about the resources the project may require.

The most rewarding part of the experience was being able to deep dive into the realm of problem solving. I got to witness firsthand what a team of people dedicated toward solving social issues looked like, and I engaged in what can only be described as primary research. My main motive was to better understand what healthcare looked like in rural India, and to identify any problems that were plaguing the community. That would allow me to understand how Raah could use its manpower and resources to improve the health of people there.

The first thing I noticed was that the officers in Raah were adamant that the main service work be done by members of the community itself. This was imperative in to build a sense of community ownership in the work that Raah was doing for the populace. I also understood that it was one thing to formulate questions that you wanted to ask people, but another entirely when trying to extract information we wanted. The community we were working with were quite afraid that people who came asking questions about their quality of life wanted to take away their land or government subsidies.

One of the main barriers that I faced was my "city accent." For anyone who speaks Marathi, the difference is quite stark; many of the villagers were able to tell immediately I was not from around there. The "city accent" is much more traditional, and the words used are occasionally borrowed from other languages, including English.

I also had a chance to interact with doctors at the local Public Health Centers (PHCs) who practiced both Western and Traditional Medicine.

The biggest lesson that I learned though was that community ownership must be organic when working for a social cause. Even though conducting discussion groups with the community to come up with seemingly obvious answers to complex questions may seem futile, it is by far, in my updated opinion, the most effective way to get people comfortable with talking about collective problems.

It only took asking the midwives and nurses at the local PHC about their opinion on the quality of aid they receive from the Central Government (equivalent to the Federal Government in the U.S.) for them to go on a rant about what kind of support they were truly lacking.

I learned that volunteering can only go so far as the volunteer is willing to go — but a discussion never ends just because people drop in and out of the conversation. What is most important is just the foundation of such a discussion in the first place; a process I am proud to say I was a part of.

It was an incredible experience, and I learned so much — but the best part is that I had the honor of writing this story for my brothers across the world. Amici!

A Decade Remembered

On the morning of November 9, 2013, Brother Christopher Grimaud Ole Miss '12 joined Chapter Eternal after being involved in a tragic automobile accident. His older brother, Michael Grimaud '10 also was a Phi Psi at Ole Miss. Their mother stated, "Phi Psi will always hold a special place in our hearts because of what the brothers and the Fraternity meant to our sons." The family recalled busloads of Phi Psis who drove through the night to be with them during the mass for Chris. Brothers stood at every pew, served as honor guards and participated in the graveside service. Until the very end his brothers were with him.

And they still are. A decade later, eight Phi Psi brothers can say Chris still has a profound impact on their lives. In their son's honor and memory, Chris' parents established the scholarship through the Foundation which annually is presented to an Ole Miss brother with financial need and who excels in extracurricular activities, philanthropic contributions and/or community involvement.

PROGRAMMING WITHIN ARM'S REACH

On January 5, 1996, Phi Kappa Psi launched the President's Leadership Academy (PLA) at the Hickory Ridge Conference Center in Lisle, Illinois, with 32 chapter presidents. PLA was a revolutionary program, offering participants an intensive and interactive leadership development experience. The goal was to prepare Phi Psi officers to lead their chapters — with consistency.

Over the last 28 years, much has changed within Phi Kappa Psi, the fraternity/sorority industry and society. Fraternity membership is up 66%, advances in technology have changed how we consume information and the needs of undergraduate students have evolved. The result is a renewed approach to core Phi Psi programming.

Introducing *Compass*, Phi Kappa Psi's online learning management system. Adopted in 2021, *Compass* allows the Fraternity to provide rudimentary education and training to the entire active membership with the click of a mouse or tap of a finger. The modules housed on *Compass* deliver consistent messaging, can be accessed anywhere the internet is available and at any time, and cost just cents on the dollar compared to previous in-person counterparts.

The first two steps in extending online programming to members have already taken place. In the fall of 2021, Phi Psi launched its first online training modules designed to familiarize new chapter officers and committee chairs with their roles within the chapter. Collectively known as *Ascend*, the program builds a foundation of fundamental leadership skills and then targets officer-specific responsibilities for each role.

The second online program, *Embark*, was unveiled in August 2023. *Embark* is the Fraternity's hybrid new member education program. The online modules were designed to supplement

in-person meetings led by the chapter's Fraternity Educator with new member classes. *Embark* offers modules on Phi Kappa Psi history, the history of fraternities and sororities, an introduction to leadership, values-based living and various cultural awareness topics. The goal of *Embark* is to prepare members for an impactful and developmental lifelong membership in Phi Kappa Psi.

While in-person experiences remain a critical aspect of the Phi Psi programming model, there has been an expanded focus on creating leadership and educational opportunities that all members of the Fraternity have access to.

Online programs like *Embark* and *Ascend* ensure that every member of a chapter can receive consistent education and training during their Phi Kappa Psi journey. Members engage at a pace that is suitable for them, and each module includes features like closed captioning and scripts to better support members with hearing difficulties or those who learn better through reading. The content is available year-round instead of participants missing potential training opportunities that are only in person once or twice per year. As soon as participants take on an officer role, they can access their training to best prepare themselves for the role as opposed to waiting until an in-person experience is offered.

The Programming Team at Phi Kappa Psi aspires to develop additional modules that enhance skills and further educate both undergraduate and alumni members on various topics that can contribute to wholistic development of all Phi Psis. We want Phi Psi to continue to be an asset to members up until and after graduation, so if you're interested in learning more about future endeavors and how to contribute, please contact programming@phikappapsi.com.

His calm demeanor and willingness to roll up his sleeves made him a steadfast and invaluable advisor to the chapter.

No one really knew but Neil, but in life, he planned to continue

In his forwardthinking generosity, Neil used his life insurance and retirement account to establish a fund with the Phi Psi Foundation dedicated to ongoing chapter advisor education. This initiative ensures that the next generation of Phi Psis will have mentors and advisors, continuing the lifelong chain of brotherhood that Neil passionately believed in.

"He was so much fun to be around," said Hal Dick *Bowling Green '55.* "[Neil] was my friend and my brother."

As we bid farewell to Neil, we honor what he did for Phi Psi and his legacy. We carry forward the torch of volunteerism, mentorship and brotherhood that he so passionately lit. In the tapestry of Phi Kappa Psi, Neil's thread remains woven, a shining example of a life well lived in service to others.

Zoom-ing to Success

Chapter Advisor recalls his challenge to stay connected during the pandemic.

At my desk, leg bouncing, I counted down the minutes until 5:30 p.m. A lonely Zoom lobby glowed on my desktop that would soon fill with 200 people — the best evening of quarantine entertainment a suggested donation can buy. Friday, Feb. 19, 2021 the 169th anniversary of the founding of our beloved Fraternity. 'Nervousness' would be an understatement.

Leadership agreed that in-person Founders Day events would be canceled due to COVID-19.

My idea: "Do a Zoom-based event!" Keep it short, sweet and enticing to attend with a featured guest. My sights settled on Minnesota Golden Gopher football coach PJ Fleck. Everyone agreed that it had to be Coach Fleck or no event at all. No other guest speaker would match his appeal.

Scouring my Rolodex, I landed a University of Minnesota athletic department email! A polite message and hitting "send" was all to do.

Two weeks later, my leg bounced. I hit refresh on my Gmail, waiting for a response. A friendly follow up email? That did the trick, and soon talked to the Coach's assistant on the phone. He asked about the event, our organization, and what we wanted from the Coach's address. Most important, I told him, the organization would love to make a donation to the Coach's charitable foundation. Success! Coach Fleck booked for a 30-minute address and Q&A session.

My euphoria settled. Now we needed to put together an entire event in less than a month. Undergraduates and alumni leadership mobilized like never before. Presidents of Minnesota Beta and our House Corporation wrote their addresses, Scholarship Advisors scheduled interviews, the alumni association president got the word out and drove sign-ups. Everything worked in perfect harmony. It was a symphony, and I – Leonard Bernstein.

I've planned events and found that a month of planning demands the laws of physics to attract more stress to event day than the previous 29 combined. The good news? Approximately 200 attendees forecasted. The bad news? I'm more technologically inept than your average millennial — and up against the myriad of unforeseeable technical issues that can arise in a webinar.

Such as: The password reset, and we couldn't access the account hosting the event. We couldn't even access the email list of attendees to send them a link for a new Zoom.

We were running out of options.

I called the president of Minnesota Beta and explained the

predicament. "Everyone makes sacrifices for the good of the brotherhood, and your sacrifice is going to be sitting on hold with the university's IT department," I said. "No matter how long it takes." I hung up with just enough time to brood over the debacle. I needed to finish slideshows, layer in Brother Ransom's State of the Fraternity address and confirm with Coach Fleck's assistant. As a CPA, I can say the weight of this bore on me like tax season.

"Crap, it is tax season; why couldn't we have been founded in June?"

Time to execute.

The Zoom password issues resolved, and attendees trickled in. I directed them to their virtual happy hour ... but realized it was an impossible task. I let the organized chaos unfold.

The formal programming ran until the now-infamous halftime raffle. A painstaking 20 minutes. I saw the interest level of our attendees plummeting. A merciful conclusion put us 15 minutes behind schedule with Coach Fleck to join in five minutes. The award ceremony still ahead. I messaged our Scholarship Advisor to start the five-minute countdown.

The Scholarship Advisor presented the most efficient awards ceremony ever. He even allowed recipients to unmute themselves and give an acceptance speech.

I'd dodged every landmine. So far.

We waited for the Coach to join our Zoom.

Large beads of sweat ran down my forehead that I hoped could not be seen through a web camera. My leg bounced. My mind raced...

Suddenly, a black box appeared on the Zoom checkerboard. It read "PJ". A moment later, Coach PJ Fleck filled my screen. Relief washed over me. I told him to take it away and he gave a booming "Hello, Phi Kappa Psi!"

Few moments in life have rewarded me more than seeing every face brighten in the Zoom as he spoke. All the while, I received innumerable text messages from attendees, congratulating me on pulling this off (which I replied with 'a team effort!').

I thanked the Coach for his time. After clicking "End Meeting for All" I stared at my computer screen, reflecting on the past 90 minutes. Founders Day was the most important event of the year for me; a way to honor the past, celebrate the present, and look toward the future of our Fraternity. And we didn't allow the pandemic to interrupt this sacred event we've celebrated for decades. At a time when our brothers needed connection and community more than ever, we gave it to them. This year we were able to receive more than \$3,000 of donations along with getting 1,420 distracted driving pledges signed. New President, and former Philanthropy Chair, Andrew Kearney '22 was even able to receive signed pledges from the President of CU Boulder, along with the Chancellor of the Boulder Campus, and the Chancellor of the Denver Campus.

Chance encounter harvests sustainable insights

I met Colin Benitt *Delaware '15* while working on a spearfishing feature on Long Island. Canadian wildfire smoke turned the skies overhead orange. The visibility above water was just as murky as below. Battling the elements and fighting insane currents and frigid temperatures, the odds of catching anything were low. After several hours, Colin emerged victorious from the water. In his hands, a fresh sea bass. We jetted to a small sandbar and lit a fire. As the bass sizzled to perfection over the open flames, Colin resurfaced from the water again with two bags full of seaweed he'd just harvested. With a few quick rinses to remove sand and shells, a squeeze of lemon, and a dash of salt — we had the perfect side dish. A briny seaweed salad, the freshest fish you could ask for, great company, and a sandy set up — just a few steps from the source. Society expected him to walk straight from graduation into a 9-5, but Colin charted his path, challenging the status quo. Exchanging slick wetsuits for a stiff coat and tie, and fancy white tablecloths for fresh catches over open flames.

Taste for Adventure

Colin's taste for adventure started early. As a child raised on Long Island, he joined the Boy Scouts, ultimately attaining Eagle Scout status. Years of high adventure trips led to a passion for the outdoors and his love for hiking and diving. On a trip to the Florida Keys with the Eagle Scouts, Colin realized his love of marine science and the sea ran deeper than he thought. An idea was sparked, and Colin devoted his life to the ocean.

Forged Friendships

Though he planned to attend a military academy, the ocean led him to the University of Delaware, where he completed a double major in Environmental Science and Marine Science. After meeting several Phi Psis, he joined the Delaware

Alpha Chapter, jumping at the opportunity to dive deeper into their friendships with the brotherhood. Like so many Phi Psis before them, Colin and his brothers forged friendships that lasted well beyond graduation. These relationships and the brotherhood stand out, even when the tides of life get rough. "It's the camaraderie... offering a place to stay if needed ... helping out if you're in a tough situation. I can reach out to anyone even if it's been years, and we can bond like we did eight years ago, like no time has passed."

Professional Ventures

Brother Benitt received his Master's in Marine Science from Stony Brook University. There, he conducted extensive SCUBA research and

lab work, including time in the Cayman Islands. As his connection to the ocean deepened, he began to explore spearfishing and bowhunting for fresh, local food. "I can remember where I was or the date for almost every single deer and notable fish that I've harvested. I truly believe that fisherman/hunters care and respect these animals and fish more than anyone else ever will." This connection between our lives and our food sources resonated deeply with Colin and laid the groundwork for his first professional ventures at sea.

Diving headfirst into the world of sustainability, Colin had an idea for a regenerative ocean farm on Long Island. In 2020, he reached out to renowned spearfisher Valentine Thomas.

"We leased a 1-acre shellfish farm for about a year and a half," Colin said. "We collaborated with people all over the world to try and capitalize on the blue economy."


One autumn night, when their setup was still in its infancy, a rogue boat ignored all caution buoys and drove through the farm. Back on land, unaware of what transpired, a call rang through from the Coast Guard. They shared the heartbreaking news. The farm and all the work they'd put into it were

destroyed, almost in its entirety. "The person was never caught, so we were never able to be refunded for the damages," Colin said. He described the time of uncertainty for their careers. "It was very disheartening, and we decided since it takes years to get a farm back up and running, rebuilding wasn't necessarily an option." Though the setback was significant, their prior successes showed Brother Benitt that this passion for the food sector was worth fighting for.

Documenting and Educating

For the average American, we don't often gather around an open fire to share a meal of fresh sea bass and seaweed salad on the beach. For Colin, that's just another day at the office. To document his unique lifestyle and find new ways to educate people, he took to videography on Instagram. Documenting his dives, spearfishes, and meal preparations, he shared the value and excitement that can come with returning to nature. His feed-friendly content highlights the shortened distance between the farm (or ocean) and the table and the joy of involvement in the process from start to finish. Emphasizing

SUSTAINABILITY PRACTICES

By recognizing the interconnectedness of our actions with the well-being of the oceans is essential for a more sustainable future for both our planet and future generations.

Seafood Choices

- Educate yourself about sustainable seafood choices by referring to resources like the Marine Stewardship Council (MSC). These organizations provide information on which seafood is harvested in an environmentally responsible manner.
- Make an effort to avoid seafood species that are overfished or caught using destructive methods. Opt for alternatives that are more sustainable, such as farmed seafood or species that are in abundant supply.

Reduce Plastic Waste

• Reduce your plastic consumption and waste by using reusable shopping bags, water bottles and containers. Dispose of plastic waste responsibly, recycling whenever possible. Participate in local beach cleanup efforts to remove plastic debris from coastal areas.

Mindful Water Usage

- Conserve water in your daily life to reduce the strain on freshwater sources.
- Avoid overuse of fertilizers and chemicals in your yard and garden to prevent runoff into stormwater drains, which can carry pollutants into the ocean.

conservation and education, Colin said, "I enjoy educating people on the choices they make in the supermarket and their community. Knowing when local produce is in season and supporting those local industries is the best thing an individual or family can do." While the majority of the issues could be solved with policy, Colin believed in educating and empowering the average person to make better decisions, viewing it as his moral obligation. He recommends that consumers start with something simple, "Avoid the common overly ordered fish, and instead try local varieties; you will be shocked how much fresher it tastes."

Staying Connected

Adventures took him near and far, and Colin used these trips as a chance to stay connected with fellow Phi Psis. Throughout the years, he brought a few brothers along, sharing his unique world with them. "No one else was in the same major as me, but I've taken a few diving with me." Back on land, he and his brothers typically meet up several times a year in various groups. The impact of Phi Psi has extended to skills of "communicating and relating with people from different backgrounds and ethnicities," proving invaluable while he travels and teaches.

Ultimately, Brother Benitt aims to continue using his experiences to educate consumers and ensure a bright future for our oceans. Adding to his arsenal of educational tricks, Colin churns out content highlighting his unique lifestyle and connection to nature. He hopes that folks stop scrolling for a moment and consider how they impact their food sources. They may even take to sourcing their own fresh catch. One thing is certain — Brother Benitt has charted his path, showing that the world can be your oyster inside and outside a typical 9 to 5.

We Remember and Honor George Humphries Oregon '50

Brother George W. Humphries *Oregon* '50 was a luminary figure within the Fraternity, dedicating a lifetime to the ideals and principles that bind us together.

George joined Phi Kappa Psi at the University of Oregon in 1950. Little did he know this would begin a legacy defined by a deep-seated commitment to the organization. Over the span

of 23 Grand Arch Councils, George's presence

became synonymous with wisdom, integrity and an unwavering devotion. He assisted countless members as a chapter advisor and in many colonization efforts across the state of California.

"He wanted a clear course to continue brotherhood forward," said John Ciccarelli *CSUN* '72.

In 1978, George joined the esteemed Order of the S.C. His leadership prowess did not go unnoticed, and in

1982, he assumed the role of National Vice President, a position he held with distinction His crowning achievement came when he ascended to the presidency, becoming the 49th National

George started various business ventures — not always met with success. Perhaps it was his transient childhood, marked by frequent moves due to his father's job as a lumber worker, that fueled George's desire for connection and brotherhood. He started companies such as a dry-cleaning business, owning

a campground and a chain of T-shirt shops to gather people under a common goal. This love of entrepreneurship and bringing people together was maintained alongside a successful career in law, practicing in Los Angeles.

One of George's greatest joys was sharing the
Praternity experience with his son, Mark Humphries
Stanford '86 attending numerous Grand Arch
Councils together. Their familial bond exemplifies
Brother Humphries' enduring commitment and love
for the principles that have defined Phi Psi.

"My father has offered me a beautiful web of relationships that I cherish," Mark said.

As brothers gathered in Eugene, Oregon, in August for the rechartering of the Oregon Alpha chapter, George's spirit was undoubtedly present. In our hearts and minds, we carry the torch he lit, illuminating the path for future brothers. George recognized the majesty of Phi Kappa Psi, and his legacy lives on in the vibrant tapestry of our beloved Fraternity.

Brother Humphries entered Chapter Eternal on July 4, 2023.

Honoring Brother Jerry Nelson UCLA '48

Brother Jerry Nelson was initiated into the Cal Epsilon Chapter of Phi Kappa Psi on March 21, 1948, joined the Phi Psi Foundation's Board of Trustees in 1989, and was inducted into the Order of the S.C. in 1998.

Jerry was a giant both inside and outside the

Fraternity. He was a visionary businessman, an almost unparalleled philanthropist, and

a mentor to more than he could ever have known. He was a friend to brothers old and young, and a brother who embodied The Great Joy of Serving Others perhaps more than any Phi Psi ever has.

In Phi Psi circles, Jerry was a man that needed no introduction. He made it his mission to improve the lives of our undergraduate men.

"My life is richer because of my friendship with Jerry. He believed in the transformative power of the Fraternity experience. I have never known a man who inspired others so effectively and so consistently as Jerry did. His loss is softened only by the magnitude of his impact and the legacy he has left in the thousands he touched throughout his amazing life. Phi Psi has lost a giant," shared Donald Fites Valparaiso '53, Foundation Trustee.

A man from modest means with an adventurous spirit, he founded Pinnacle Peak Land Company and Pinnacle Paradise, Inc. of Scottsdale, Arizona and was responsible for the development of 9,000 North Scottsdale acres, 8,000 homesites, and some of the world's best golf destinations. In partnership with his late wife, Florence Ely Nelson, the couple established environmentally friendly building codes that preserved Scottsdale's Sonoran Desert landscape. They then advanced their vision for Scottsdale by educating 6,000 children annually through their Desert Center programs. Through these entities

Peak Country Club and Shopping Plaza, Troon Village and Troon Golf & Country Club, Troon North and Troon North golf course. Other developments also occurred in Scottsdale and Prescott, Arizona and Cabo San Lucas, BCS, Mexico. Throughout his life, Jerry funded the creation and startup of numerous companies including Simulnet, Video Electronics, Ticketmaster, Antenna Technology Corporation, Technology Control Services and Troon Golf Management.

> Jerry led the charge to grow the Phi Psi Foundation and expand the Board to what it is today. He singlehandedly drove the establishment of many of Phi Psi's most well-known programs and initiatives. He was the catalyst behind the now robust Chapter Scholarship Program, promoted the Foundation as the "community foundation" for Phi Psi's almost 100 chapters, and was a leader in the promotion of grants and reserves for safe and competitive chapter housing. He founded the American Leadership Academy (ALA), a program designed to guide Phi Psi leaders of tomorrow. During the creation of the ALA, he truly displayed a heart to serve as he

opened his home and resources to educate and invest in the future of our undergraduate brothers.

Many years later, the Nelson Leadership Institute (NLI) was established to carry on the mission of impacting young Phi Psis through leadership and character development programming. The Institute carries Jerry's name as a reminder of his catalytic and entrepreneurial spirit which has well served thousands of young Phi Psis.

"I was fortunate to travel throughout the country with Jerry for more than two decades speaking and connecting with the next generation of leaders. It is rare to be in the company of someone so accomplished, yet so humble, who consciously strives to make the lives of those around him better. The number of



individual minds that Jerry influenced in his lifetime is unheard of. He was a mentor to me and to those he never met. When he said 'if it is to be, it is up to me' to a room full of young men, he was leaving a simple yet sage lesson in their hearts. He taught others to have a plan, take initiative and do good work," said Paul Wineman *Washington '55*, Past National President and Foundation Trustee.

At the 2000 Grand Arch Council, Phi Kappa Psi recognized Jerry's outstanding achievement as a volunteer and philanthropist with the National Leadership Award. In 2004,



Jerry was selected by the North-American Interfraternity Conference Foundation as Philanthropist of the Year. The NICF, now known as the Foundation for Fraternal Excellence, represents the educational foundations of over 60 men's and women's fraternal groups. As part of Jerry's 80th birthday celebration in 2009, a scholarship was established – the Jerry Nelson Award. Given annually, the award recognizes an undergraduate or graduate Phi Psi who demonstrates high moral standards, positively influences those around him, and displays an entrepreneurial spirit.

Jerry's legacy will live on in the hearts and minds of so many. His infectious smile and wit are already living through others who embody Jerry's spirit. In addition to his many intangible qualities, Jerry left resources that will allow his impact to continue. With a \$33-million life insurance gift to the Phi Psi Foundation, he leaves funding for the NLI, the Chapter Scholarship Program, educational housing support, and has established an operating endowment.

With his own youthful passion, Jerry Nelson has accomplished more than most people could in half a dozen lifetimes. He's an example of what core values, as expressed in Phi Psi's Creed, such as honesty, trust and being a man of your word, can achieve. Sharing his wealth not only monetarily, but also fostering a level of personal standards and business ethics that would benefit an individual, a businessperson and even help improve a country, Jerry Nelson is proof that selflessness and philanthropy are alive and well.

AN ENDURING LEGACY Remembering Brother Hank Marvin Southern Cal '56

"Dad always rode in on a white horse," reminisced Tanya Marvin, Hank's daughter. The image captured the essence of Hank — a man whose cowboy words and gentleman's spurs aligned seamlessly with the ideals of Phi Kappa Psi.

In 1956, Hank Marvin was initiated into Phi Psi's Cal Delta Chapter at the University of Southern California. It is there that he met Bruce McMahan *Southern Cal'57* and a lifelong friendship was formed.

Hank and Bruce were leaders and visionaries from their earliest undergraduate years.

Hank was a three-year letterman on the USC tennis team and a member of more chapter committees than one could count, while Bruce served as Chapter Vice President, New Member Education Chair and District Council Delegate.

Post-graduation, Hank ventured into the corporate world, earning the role of CEO for the ISU Stephen

B. Marvin Insurance Agency. Hank positioned the agency, and those they served, as family.

While finding success and building their own families, Hank and Bruce never lost their brotherly bond. "Referring to themselves as best friends, these two didn't let geographic distance and other challenges stand in the way of their relationship. Whenever they connected by phone or saw each other they would pick up right where they left off," commented Wayne Wilson *Michigan State '59*.

The two men, ever appreciative of their bond, worked tirelessly throughout their post-graduate years so more men would learn the immeasurable value of brotherhood. Both joined the Phi Kappa Psi Foundation's Board of Trustees in the mid-90s.

Hank's more than two decades of service on the Board of Trustees (1996-2017) was marked by distinguished contributions to the brotherhood as a donor, volunteer, advisor, leader, and mentor evidenced by his most generous direct financial investments as well as his gift of insurability. Hank brought his years of experience as a decorated individual in the insurance and finance world, serving on numerous councils and boards, and extensive service to and knowledge of the Fraternity, to the Trustee position.

In addition to his volunteer work with the Foundation, Hank was heavily involved in supporting the Antelope Valley Medical Center (AVMC). He served as an elected director of the medical

> center from 1992 to 1997 and was chairman of the board in 1996. He also led the AVMC Foundation from 1998 to 2000 and was acting treasurer from 2001 through 2008. His commitment to the community was also evident through his service as a director of a seven-branch community bank and his regular involvement with other area community organizations.

Hank's Phi Psi legacy will live on through the creation of the Marvin Laurel Hall Operating Endowment, established with a \$2 million gift, which is part of a

larger \$23 million gift to the Foundation made by himself and Bruce. The vision of these two brothers was to strengthen the Foundation's long-term financial position in an effort to do more good in the world. Their foresight and generosity will fund many millions of dollars in educational benefits for Phi Psi's brothers in perpetuity.

"[It's] hard to sum up a lifetime of love, family and community leadership," Tanya shared.

At Hank's funeral, his granddaughter placed a familiar stuffed animal in Hank's casket — USC's mascot, Traveler, so Hank may always ride in on his white horse.
